Minnesota Man invents Water Skiing in 1922
Water skiing was invented in 1922 when Ralph Samuelson, left, used a pair of boards as skis and a clothesline as a tow rope on Lake Pepin in Lake City, Minnesota. Samuelson experimented with different positions on the skis for several days until the 2nd of July, 1922. Samuelson discovered that leaning backwards in the water with the ski tips up and poking out of the wa-

ter at the tip was the optimal method. His brother Ben towed him and they reached a speed of 20 mph. Samuelson spent 15 years performing shows and teaching water skiing to people in the United States. Though he is considered the “father” of the sport, he never patented any of his ski equipment. \ (Fred Waller of Long Island, NY, received the first patent on a design for water skis in 1925.)

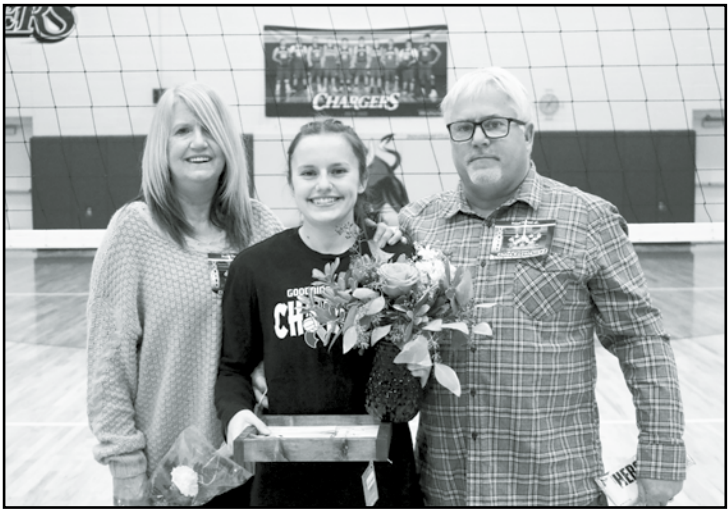
