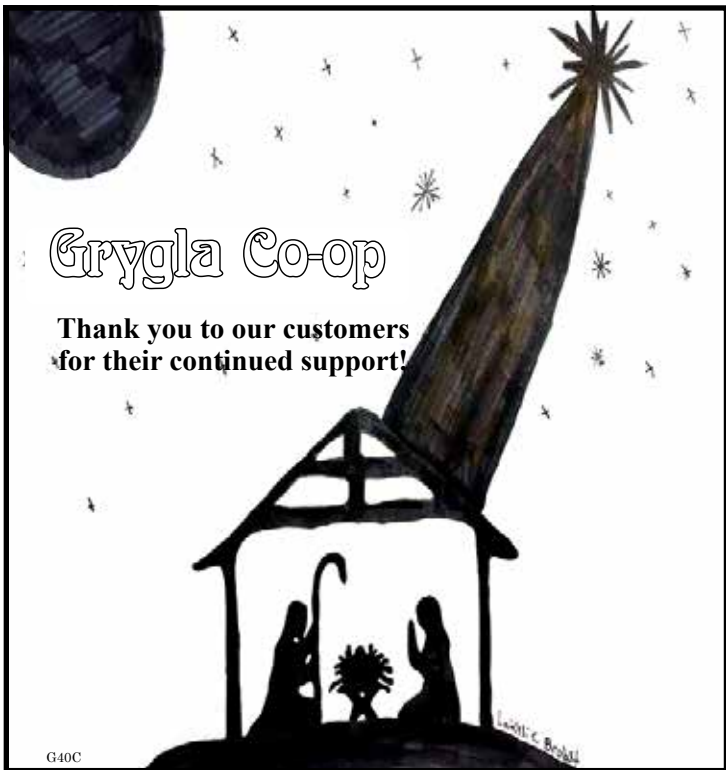

Point was gearing up to let rangers out. Call ahead to your favorite access to see what's available.
 Red Lake is still a zoo and fishing is OK. 12' of water is best and get away from the crowds. Be careful out there, still some weak ice.

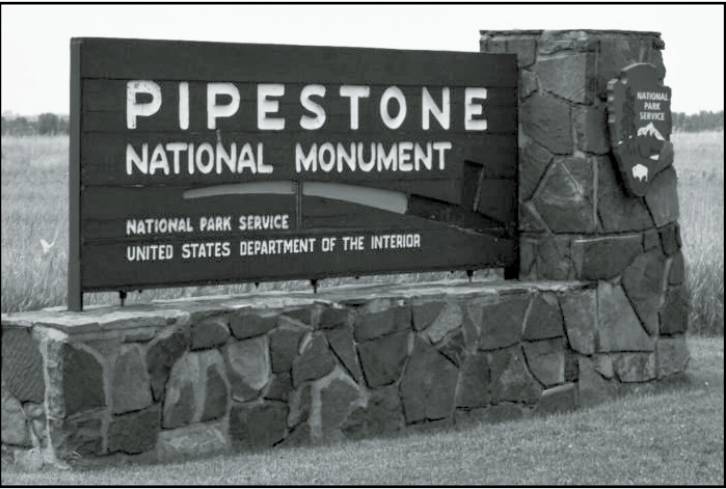

Only in Minnesota: a weekly feature in the Eagle

The story behind these mysterious stones in Minnesota will fascinate you

Here in Minnesota, we are lucky to have many beautiful natural wonders. From waterfalls to sparkling lakes to thick forests blanketed in snow, there's something for just about everyone. And add one more to the list: our rock formations. We have delicate arches, tall bluffs, and ruggedly beautiful cliffs. We also have a series of mysterious stones that, on first look, are truly baffling.

Pipestone National Monument is a beautiful and historic place in southwestern Minnesota. Its address is 36 Reservation Ave., Pipestone, MN 56164. The monument is home to gorgeous pink quartzite cliffs that have been the site of Native American pipestone quarrying for centuries.

Many rock formations make this a beautiful place to visit. For example, Pipestone Creek is riddled with large and small boulders. The creek becomes Winnewissa Falls when it runs over another tall quartzite cliff. This lovely little waterfall is beautiful both above and below.

While all of Pipestone's rock formations are fascinating, perhaps the most strange are the Three Maidens overlooking Lake Hiawatha. The boulders were regarded as symbols of the spirits

that protected the pipestone quarries. Many left offerings to the spirits at the Three Maidens, and some still do today.

But why do they hold such a symbolic meaning - and why are they notable today? In short, it's because these massive stones do not match any of the other rocks found at Pipestone National Monument. The rocks are made of granite, for which there is no nearby source. They were carried here (likely as one large boulder) thousands of years ago by a glacier and left behind when the ice melted.

Along the entrance road to the park, you'll see the huge boulders near a pond; they still hold spiritual significance to many today. There are several different Indigenous traditions regarding the Three Maidens. Whether the Maidens hid in the rocks from violence, natural disaster, or were granted permission from the Great Spirit to stay at the quarries, the result is a sacred space where the Maidens act as caretakers or guardians of the quarries. Many American Indians leave offerings at the Three Maidens when they visit the quarries. Visitors are asked to be respectful of the reverence surrounding the Three Maidens by maintaining distance and not disturbing any offerings left for them.

Whipped Hot Chocolate
I've shared some Christmas cookie recipes the last couple of weeks, so this seems like a perfect way to end on a sweet note. Whipped Hot Chocolate. I haven't made this yet, but added the ingredients to my shopping list as I think it'll be the perfect drink to sip on Christmas morning when we're opening our presents around the tree.

This hot cocoa only takes a few minutes to make, but feels like you just walked out of a coffee shop with this fun whipped drink.

So when you make a whipped hot chocolate, it's basically like a hot cocoa flavored whipped cream that becomes a dreamy topping in your glass.

This list below makes two cups, so plan accordingly.

Ingredients
1/4 cup hot chocolate mix
1/4 cup powdered sugar
1/2 cup heavy whipping cream, needs to be cold
1 cup milk

Directions
In a bigger bowl, add cold whipping cream, hot chocolate mix and powdered sugar. Beat on high until the mixture begins to thicken. Keep beating until it has soft peaks or you can make an indent in it that holds its shape.

Warm the milk in the microwave. Pour 1/2 cup into each mug. Place your whipped

cream into a piping bag or strong sip-top style bag. Snip the corner and pipe a swirl over the warmed milk. Of course you can just put a big dollop in each glass, but why not make it look fancy, ya know!?

Add marshmallows, chocolate bits or any other toppings and ENJOY.

Variations

Use chocolate milk to make things a little more chocolatey.

Add a splash of vanilla for a twist, or even a tiny drop of peppermint extract. Then top with crushed candy canes for a minty version.

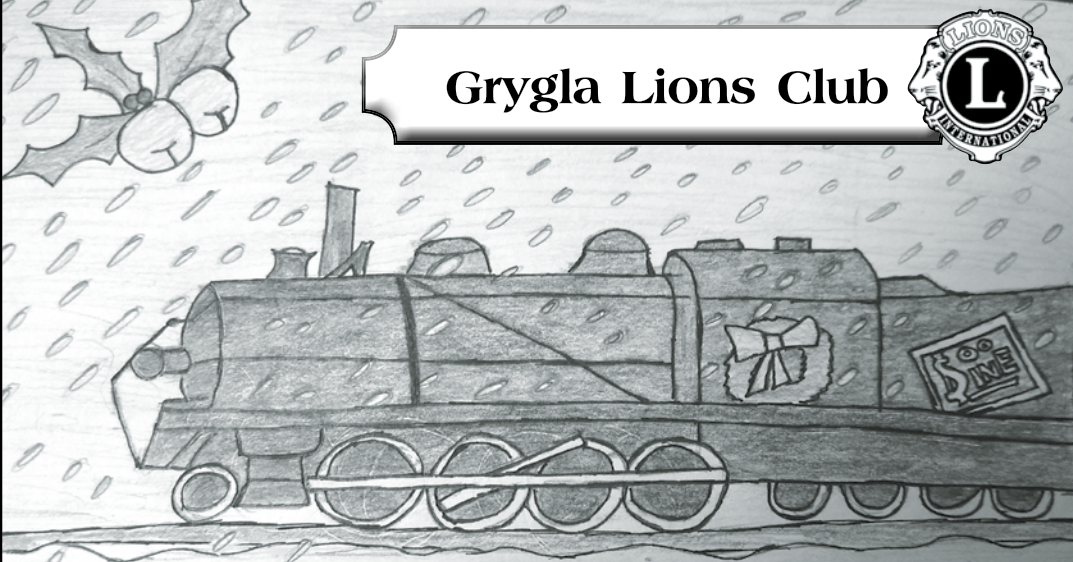

Grygla's Blood Drive brings in 33 volunteers

The Grygla community hosted a blood drive with Vitalant on December 16 at the Community Center which helped collect a total of 32 units of blood products for patients in need.

A total of 33 individuals volunteered to donate blood with 28 being able to successfully donate. A total of five donors also came forward to donate Power Red Cells (2RBC) which collects two units of red blood cells while returning platelets, plasma and a saline solution back to the donor. There were three people who volunteered for the first time.

Vitalant expressed their gratitude to Audrya Nelson, who coordinated the drive, and the Grygla Student Council which sponsored the blood drive, as well as others who assisted the day of the drive: Chloe Kuznia, Levi Keisow, Chelsie Nelson, Callie Loken, Allie Sundberg, Anna Sundberg, Katelyn Larson, Brigitte Watne, and Riley Saurdiff.

Vitalant strives to keep a 5-day supply of every blood type on the shelf at all times to be able to meet the needs of patients across the region. Donations from O-negative donors, the universal blood type, are especially important this time of year due to increased accidents and trauma cases.

Vitalant is the only blood provider to nearly 70 hospitals across the region. The blood supply is dependent on selfless donations from volunteer donors to ensure the lifesaving needs of the region are met.

About 30 percent of Vitalant's blood supply goes to cancer patients across the region and one in seven people entering the hospital will need blood. Those relying on blood in the region receive that lifesaving blood from Vitalant.

Donors can make a convenient appointment to give blood at www.bloodhero.com or by calling 877-25-VITAL. With each donation, donors receive a free total cholesterol test and earn points in Vitalant's donor rewards program.

Blood donation takes about an hour from check-in to refreshments. Donors can save about 20 minutes by completing their Health History Questionnaire the day they donate on www.vitalant.org

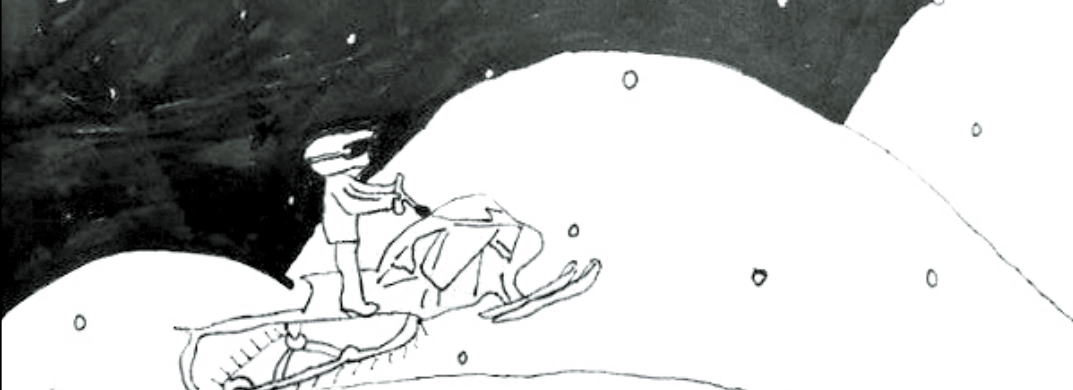

Grygla School Chairperson of the board Jeremy Rychlock called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm with James Verbout, Andrew Oslund, Gretchen Smeby, Principal Gieseke and Superintendent Jamie Lunsetter present. Clinton Brobst and Tera Nordby absent.

Pledge of Allegiance said. Agenda approved as presented/amended. Minutes of the 10/15/20 regular school board meeting are approved as printed/amended. Payment of bills approved, check # 37717 through check # 37769 and wire payments.

Finance Report: Mr. Lunsetter and Tracee Bruggeman, Brady Martz with Audit Report Bills:

General Fund \$144,893.36; Food Service \$5,567.39; Student Activity \$7,001.53; Total \$157,462.28
MSDLAF \$1,503,973.70; Checking \$204,241.62; Total \$1,708,215.32

Student Report Given by Jared Haack and Brigette Watne. Volleyball and football updates were given. COVID-19 has made it hard for the Student Council to conduct much for school morale and fund-raisers, but they did raise over \$2,000 for Gunder Paulson. The Peer Helpers have planned anti-bullying activities, but Distance Learning has interfered.

Teacher Report Given by Mr. Greg Monson. Mr. Mickelson and the Biology class have been collecting data using the 3M health monitor system that was purchased jointly between the Grygla and Goodridge schools to test the effectiveness of the new SAO system.

Mrs. Kucera has been working on embroidery and has it displayed in the library for her FACS class. Mr. Gene Lunsetter and Mrs. Kucera will be working on options for streaming a Christmas Program. The second grade has written their

turkey stories for TRF Radio. Media Productions is working on podcasts and American Education Week featured guest readers and a pajama day. Several teachers have been utilizing a new program, KAMI, to help with organization of assignments for staff and students.

Principal Report Given by Mr. Gieseke. We will be conducting early outs on Wednesdays moving forward to allow for prep time for our teachers, but to also satisfy the requirements set forth by Governor Walz. The 1st Quarter is over, and we had 35 on our “B” Honor Roll, 22 on “A” Honor Roll and 12 on our 4.0 Honor Roll.
