Diamond's Bar and Grill will be open Mondays through Saturdays from 12pm until 10pm, with the grill closing at 8:30pm. They are closed Sundays.



Yo-Hawn's Bar and Grill will be open Tuesdays through Saturdays 11am-10pm, with the kitchen closing at 9:30pm. They are closed every Monday.

With some restrictions still in place, restaurants are able to open back up as of Monday, January 11th

Governor Tim Walz's new orders are now in effect. There are many details, but here are some highlights regarding our local bars and grills, indoor/outdoor events and organized sports.

- Indoor dining at bars and restaurants will be allowed at 50% capacity, not to exceed 150; up to six people per table with a six foot distance between tables.
- Bar seating is allowed for

parties of two.

- Bars and restaurants dine-in service must end by 10:00 p.m. daily.
- Outdoor events and entertainment continues at 25%, but capacity increases to a maximum of 250 people. Social distancing is required.
- Indoor events and entertainment venues (movie theaters, museums, bowling alleys, etc.) may open at 25% capacity with a maximum of

150 people in each area of the venue. Face coverings are required and no food service after 10:00 p.m.

- Youth sports resumed practice on January 4th and games may resume on January 14th. Spectators are allowed, following the appropriate capacity limits for indoor or outdoor venues. Inter-region tournaments and out of state play are discouraged.
- Wedding receptions and

other private parties may resume with limits. If food and drink are served at the event, the event is limited to two households or 10 people indoors and three households or 15 people outdoors. If there is no food or drink, they are covered by event venue guidelines. Wedding or funeral ceremonies are guided by rules for ceremonies and places of worship.



Fourtown Store and Tavern will be open Tuesdays through Sundays from 10am until 10pm. Closing time isn't set in stone and may be earlier if no customers are around. They are closed on Mondays.



The Grain Bin Café in Grygla will be open Mondays through Saturdays from 7am-5pm. They are closed Sundays until further notice.

Minnesotans fish free with kids January 16-18

Take a Kid Ice Fishing Weekend is this Saturday, January 16, through Monday, January 18. During the weekend, Minnesota residents age 16 or older can fish or dark-house spear without an angling or spearing license if they take a child younger than 16 fishing or spearing.

"Ice fishing is lots of fun and is another way to enjoy the outdoors," said Benji Kohn, volunteer mentor program coordinator with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. "If you're looking to start ice fishing, check out our helpful information online."

Additionally, the DNR's Becoming an Outdoors Woman program is presenting an ice fishing webinar from noon to 1 p.m. Thursday, January 14. During the webinar, pro angler Mandy Uhrich will teach the basics of ice fishing and demonstrate the equipment and techniques used for this winter tradition. The webinar is free, open to the public and registration is required.

Ice conditions vary and there is no such thing as 100 percent safe ice. Always check local ice conditions before heading out to a lake or river. Visit mndnr.gov/icesafety for ice safety guidelines.

Happy New Year! Let's get right into a couple of things. First, Book Blizzard has begun. It's just a fun, laid-back program that I'll be running for our adult readers in January and February. Every time you come in and check out an item, you'll put your name on a piece of paper that will go into a drawing for a cozy sweatshirt; the perfect thing to curl up in while you read on these chilly days. Make sure to swing in to the library on Wednesdays from 2-6.

Next up, Taylor Jenkins Reid: the author that I'm currently obsessed with and have been for a while.

What's so coincidental is that this exact week last year I had shared a Taylor Jenkins Reid book with you guys: Daisy Jones & The Six. (Still one of my most favorite books, by the way.) I think I'll include a short review below. But also TJR has written another favorite of mine called The Seven Husbands of Evelyn Hugo. I just love her creativity and writing style and plan to read a couple others of hers in the next couple of weeks - if I can just find the extra quiet time.

Anyway, TJR has seven novels published. One isn't out until June, though. That'll be a great summer read! It's called Malibu Rising - I won't share a summary of that one yet as it's not even out yet and it'll just make you wish it was out NOW. But stay tuned come June! Check out one of Reid's other novels for now. My favorite, hands down, is Daisy Jones. Maybe you've read it since I already suggested it this time last year. If you haven't, here ya go!

What's so fun about this story is it's fictional, but it seems SO REAL. It's written in an oral history format so you feel like you're reading an actual interview with an actual band from the 70's.

Even more exciting - it's been picked up by Amazon and

will be made into a mini-series with the author Taylor Jenkins Reid and Reese Witherspoon helping produce it. No release date has been set yet, but I can't wait to see it come to life in the 13 episodes. The author makes you fall in love with many of the bands hit songs in the novel, which Amazon will release and bring that original music to life, as well. It's just a smart, cool project and I give Taylor Jenkins Reid all the credit in the world on this one. If you love reading and writing, you'll appreciate every sentence in this book.

Here's a summary to capture your attention - if I haven't done so already:

Daisy Jones and The Six centers on the propulsive rise of an iconic 1970s rock band. Everyone knows them, but nobody knows the reason behind their split at the absolute height of their popularity...until now.

Daisy Jones is a free-spirited young singer with big dreams, an abundance of talent, and a pocketful of pills. Billy Dunne is a guitarist and front man for The Six who works and plays hard, but is better in front of a crowd than he is at being a family man.

Daisy and Billy cross paths when a producer realizes that the key to supercharged success is to put the two together. What happens next will become the stuff of legend.

The making of that legend is chronicled in this riveting and unforgettable novel, written as an oral history of one of the biggest bands of the seventies. Taylor Jenkins Reid is a talented writer who takes her work to a new level with this book.

Northern Lights fishing report

First full week of January is in the books. This past week, I was able to make it up to Lake of the Woods Thursday and Saturday. Both days out of Longpoint. Thursday, my dad, a buddy of his and I rented a day house from Longpoint. They picked us up and brought us to a house out in 34' of water. On our way out to the house they had a pressure ridge bridged and had cut through another; it looked like cracks were all over. For the most part, you can get around them. Once fishing, I was marking fish the whole time, but bites were at a premium. It seemed like a dead stick with little jigging was the best...either with a glow green, blue or glow white (my tungsten eyeball jig). Jigging an orange rattle spoon with a shiner got a lot of interest, but only a few bites. We managed to keep 17; 3 didn't go back down, and also caught a few little ones.

On Saturday, I went a little shallower and further east out of Longpoint. I couldn't get where I wanted to be because there was a ridge that had opened and had water on top. Throughout the day it opened more in spots. Fishing was slower than Thursday and there were quite a few people out fishing. It seemed that my eyeball jig and glow white jigs were the best on the dead stick and my orange rattle spoon worked a lot better than Thursday, as well.

It was pretty slow around the lake. We kept 10 between 4 of us - and a perch. We did get

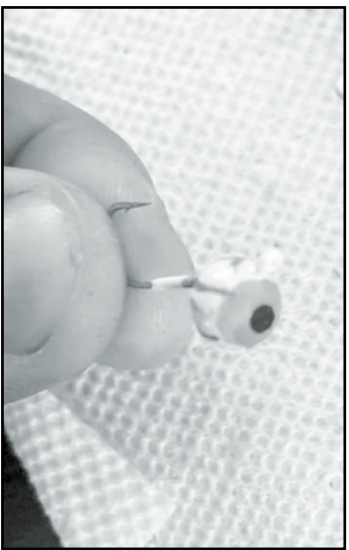
one at 20" but most of the fish were 10" and under.

Fishing reports around the lake were the same as what we experienced, slow and catching little fish. Adrians is letting 3/4-1 tons pulling 21' and less houses and 1/2 tons pulling 24' or less houses out. Longpoint was letting the people that rented houses this past weekend drive their trucks out with the plan to let trucks out this week. Springsteel was only allowing trucks out this past weekend as they continue to work on their road and the ridges opening up.

Red Lake is pretty much letting everything out and the fishing has slowed way down out there. They are still catching a few in 12' during the day, but the early morning and night bite has been better in shallower. I have a feeling that we are entering the slump period on LOW and Red with more mediocre days. If you are able to get away from people you may have better luck.

This coming week I'm thinking of chasing some pan fish and will hopefully have a report for that. Good luck fishing.

Low-carb Cheesesteak Skillet

With everyone trying to get back to that healthy lifestyle (insert "new year/new me" motto here....) I wanted to share a low-carb recipe that's a favorite of mine. It's a cheesesteak skillet using ground beef. Eat it as is or dump it on top of lettuce. It's like a deconstructed cheese burger with peppers and onions. It takes little time to make, too, which is always great.

- Ingredients
- 1 1/2 lbs ground beef
 - 1 cup red, orange and yellow pepper strips
 - 2 cups green pepper strips

- 1/4 cup onion, sliced
- 1/2 cup mushrooms, thinly sliced (I left out the mushrooms. Gross.)

Provolone, Mozzarella or Swiss cheese (Use the amount you'd like.)

- 1 tablespoon steak seasoning
- 1 tablespoon olive oil

Instructions

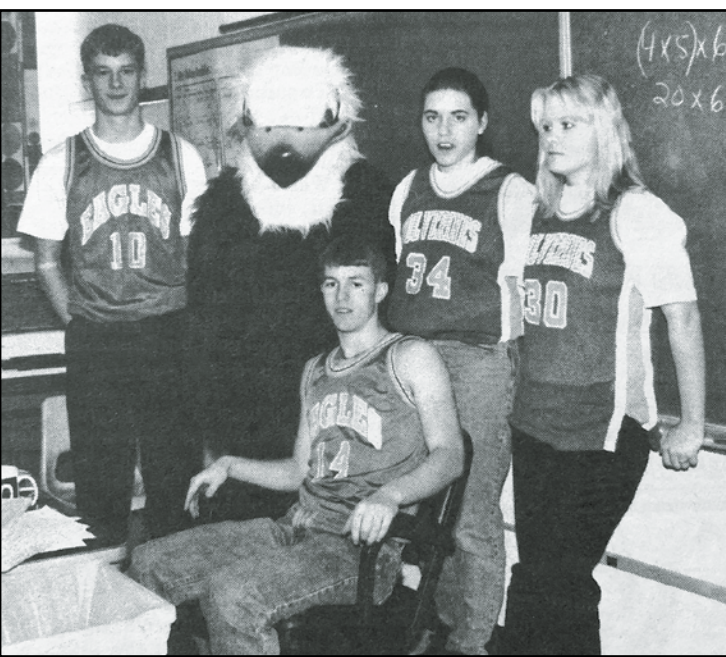
In one skillet, brown your ground beef, sprinkling the steak seasoning on top. In another, add your olive oil and saute the veggies until they're cooked through. Once both are done, pour the cooked vegetables onto the ground beef and mix well. Sprinkle your cheese on top and let it melt before serving.

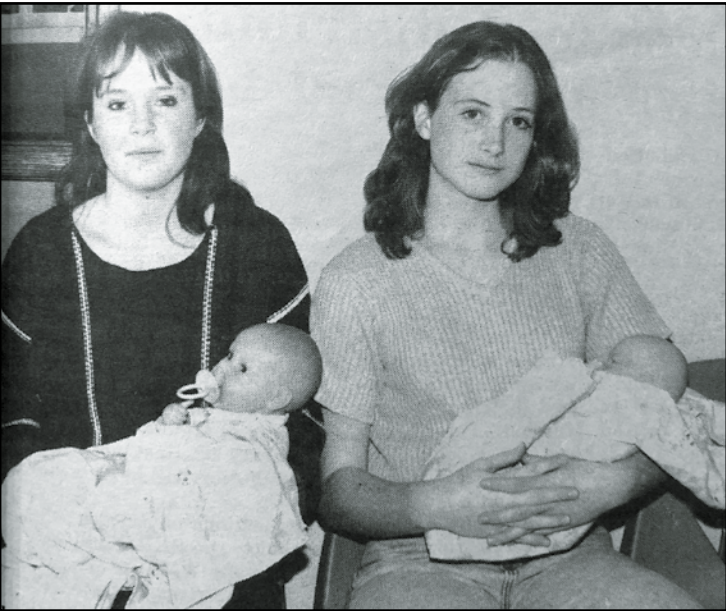
