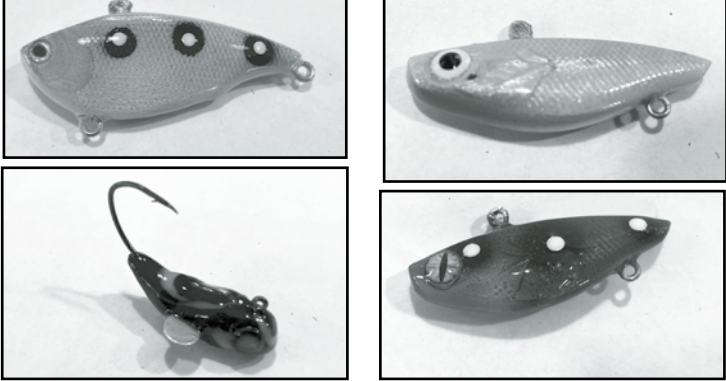

Northern Lights fishing report

On this week's report, all of the resorts are a go. Most of the resorts are letting almost any combination of vehicle and house out. With that being said, fishing has been really slow.
We started our trip last Thursday and were out for 4 days. We nonetheless made it to Adrian's road and my dad let us know that he forgot the food for the weekend, besides a brisket. We had chips and dip, hoping to catch a couple fish for dinner anyway, but that didn't happen. We barely had enough fish for lunch Friday with the brisket for dinner.
Needless to say, we all survived and I'm still here to report fishing was really slow and to not count on it for food on your trips. My mom came out Friday to deliver provisions and visit. We were out 10 miles or so past Pine Island - the road goes about 13 miles past, last I knew, but they were extending it every day.
We pulled off in about 35'-36' of water. We marked a lot of fish and would get a few to follow and fewer to bite. Over the 4 days we maybe caught 30 fish for 6 people. The night bite was nonexistent, as well. Our minnows were still very much alive in the morning. Our experience has been the same pretty much across the lake - slow with a few little fish. We had about 22" or so of ice. If off roading on sleds or wheelers, be careful of the ice chunks and ridges. Red Lake has the same report; not much happening. It's all about being in the right place at the right time. This week, I may try my luck again at going to Balm Lake and hopefully have a better fishing report, but I think the mid-winter slump is here for a while. Good luck fishing.

Only in Minnesota: a weekly feature in the Eagle

There's no chapel in the world like this one in Minnesota

From intricate mosaics to the stunning silhouette, when it comes to chapels in Minnesota, none can outshine the beautiful Lakewood Memorial Chapel on Hennepin Avenue in Minneapolis, MN. Lakewood Cemetery has been around

since 1871, and holds many an architectural treasure. The chapel in particular, while modeled after the Hagia Sofia, certainly holds its own unique place in history.

Harry Wild Jones, a Minneapolis architect, designed the building, and New York designer Charles Lamb completed the interior. Six mosaic artists who

had worked on the Vatican created the mosaic with more than 10 million pieces. When the chapel was completed in 1910, it was the only one in the country with an authentic mosaic interior. The 4 mosaic figures represent love, hope, faith and memory, and were based on paintings by Ella Condie Lamb. The chapel dome is 65 feet high

and the beautiful stained-glass windows actually serve as a sundial. The stunning chapel is one of the most amazing examples of Byzantine mosaic art in the US. In 1996, the chapel was renovated and restored by architect architect Jim W. Miller, AIA.

Chromebooks and wireless hotspots available

Yes, you read that right! We have some helpful, exciting things available for you guys to check out! Northwest Regional Library currently has 11 Chromebook laptops available for checkout. All you need is a NWRL card to check them out. I should clarify that getting a NWRL card is FREE and also checking out items with your card is FREE. It takes me about 2 minutes from start to finish to hook you up with a library card. That's it! I know people have asked me before how much it costs to get a card or checkout items. I thought everyone knew library cards were free...checking out items is free...but let me make sure you all know it's FREE! Come in and get a card...start checking out books, movies, audio books, magazines and MORE! That more now includes laptops and wireless hotspots!

The laptops are easily checked out with your library card. Of course, due to the cost of each laptop, we'll just have to go over a few guidelines upon checkout, as well as going over replacement costs if anything gets damaged or lost. Only NWRL patrons are eligible to borrow the laptops. The Chromebooks are meant to be used with an internet connection. They automatically delete anything saved to them, so it is recommended to save things to a cloud service like Google Drive or using a flash drive.

Full replacement for a Chromebook kit is \$335. Missing pieces, as with the hotspots, will require adding manual charges to the patron's account.

As for how long you can have them, we offer you a 14 day checkout with 2 renewals allowed, each renew goes for

14 days from date of renew. Customers will be charged for any missing or damaged congests: case/shoulder strap \$30, mouse \$5, power cables \$55, for example. We can go over these in the library before you leave with anything, just so you feel comfortable with our lending guidelines (which are pretty basic and standard).

Note: If laptops are not returned on time, our IT Dept. disables the device, rendering it unusable and the customer's account will automatically be charged the full replacement fee until everything is returned in full.

Also for checkout – we have 10 wireless hotspots available! Only NWRL residents are eligible to borrow these, as well. Lending guidelines are pretty similar to what I mentioned above regarding the laptops. Replacement cost for these are \$190 each.

We don't have a lot of issues with patrons not returning things, so I feel hopeful these laptops and wireless hotspots will be checked out responsibly and treated with proper care.

Moving on to 'wood bookshelf news, which is a personal book club ran by me. I will plug for it occasionally in this column, though, because a few of you are checking out the monthly book through the library. So I guess you could say it kind of ties in, even though it's not directly associated with the Grygla Library.

Anyway, we are finishing up our January book, which was The Winter Sister by Megan Collins. Over 50 people read it in just a couple of weeks! Before I announce February's book, this week is our MEET-UPS. Which means, we hold an online meetup with our author and also an in-person meetup.

Details from our online meetup: It was already held on Monday night at 6pm. How-

ever, you can still get in on it by checking out the 'wood bookshelf page on Facebook. I posted a 30-minute personalized video from our January author, Megan Collins. She made us such a cool, in depth video answering all of our questions I had compiled/sent her from various members of the book club. (THANK YOU to those who sent me such great questions.) GREAT INSIGHT was provided directly from our author, made especially for all of us.

Under the video I posted, members were able to discuss, comment, read, visit, talk, agree, disagree, etc. all about the January book.

SPOILER ALERT: If you haven't finished the book yet, I'd wait to view the video/comment thread until after you've done so.

For any questions you might still have for Megan, you are invited to comment them below the video I posted on the FB page, and she'll respond to them/comment back over the course of this week.

As for our in-person meetup, that is this Wednesday night at Yo-Hawn's from 7-8pm. Join us for a laid back, relaxed happy hour if you can. For those that live out of the area, remember you can host your own meetup with your fellow reader friends. This is your book club and you're free to customize it to your wants and needs, and be as engaged as you wish! Even if you live far away. For those of us locally, we are excited to get together for our first book club meetup.

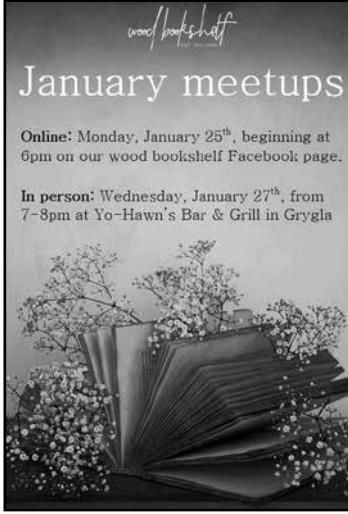

Healthy Banana Oat Muffins (3 Ingredients)

Clean eating. No sugar, no flour, no hassle.

This simple banana oat muffin recipe is a super fun and easy on-the-go breakfast idea for the family. They are especially ideal for kids. Definitely a much healthier option for breakfast, lunch boxes and after school snacks. And if your kids play sports, they're light yet packed full of energy for practice and game day.

You might be wondering how just a few bananas and oats can make muffins worth eating? The ripe banana is surprisingly sweet enough to exclude any added sugar, and your optional mix-ins give you lots of flavor.

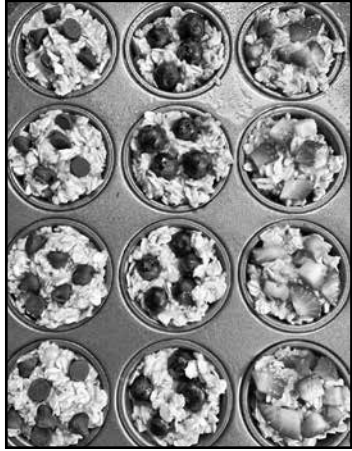
There are an endless number of mix-ins, so you can really customize them however you want (cinnamon raisin, chocolate walnut, pumpkin spice, berry vanilla... you name it!).

Because these are so dense, it's best to make them in a mini muffin tin so that you have small on-the-go snacks. These banana oat muffins really don't rise much (I mean...no flour, eggs or baking powder!) so you can fill the muffin tin all the way up. I wouldn't recommend traditional paper baking cups

because they tend to stick, but if you spray your muffin pan they'll just slide right out.

Ingredients
4 large ripe bananas (smashed)
3 cups oats
1 tsp vanilla extract
mix-ins of your choice (optional)

Instructions
Preheat your oven to 350 degrees and generously grease a mini muffin pan. In a large bowl, mix together the smashed banana, oats and vanilla. Add in the mix-ins of your choice; stir to combine. Spoon the mixture into your muffin pan, filling them up close to the top. Bake for 15-18 minutes and allow to cool for 5 minutes. Store any leftovers in the fridge for up to 5 days.

Online Beef Quality Assurance & Secure Beef Supply Training Scheduled

University of Minnesota Extension, along with Minnesota Beef Council, will host several online Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) and Secure Beef Supply (SBS) training sessions starting in February through April. Producers only need to attend one of these free workshops to receive a three-year BQA certification, and they will also learn the steps needed to begin their own Secure Beef Supply plan.

In an ongoing effort to show their commitment to providing the safest, highest-quality beef, cattlemen and women continue to show their dedication to the beef industry by completing a Beef Quality Assurance (BQA) certification program. Specific companies and feedlots have chosen to extend their own quality assurance protocol requirements to producers who are a part of their supply chain. A BQA certification is being required by many major industry buyers and processors. BQA certification is still voluntary for producers to complete, however, when a producer does not have current BQA certification the result is that many packers and feedlots simply cannot purchase those cattle because their company cannot source cattle from a producer who does not meet their certification requirements.

About the training: Pre-registration is required. You will not be able to access the Zoom meeting room without first pre-registering and receiving the secure Zoom link and passcode from Extension staff. The two hour training and certification session is free. Only one person from each operation is required to be certified to ensure the entire operation follows the BQA standards. However, everyone who handles and manages fed cattle is encouraged to become BQA certified. Certification is good for three years.
