Greetings to all residents served by the Grygla Volunteer Fire Department

Greetings from the Grygla Fire Department! Usually about this time of the year, we send out letters inviting people to our annual Firemen's Supper. After careful consideration, we have made the difficult decision that we will not be holding a meal again this year. Throughout the pandemic, our volunteers have continued to serve the community. During the past year, the fire department has responded to 49 calls. This included 6 wildland/grass fires, 4 structure fires, 4 auto/atv accidents, and 25 medical calls. We also had 2 alarm

activation/ service calls. Have you checked your smoke detector recently? We have recently purchased washing and drying equipment for our turnout gear. This is important because of carcinogens that collect on our protective gear over time. We have been making upgrades to our radio and paging system, with the goal of complete transitioning to the new 800 Mhz requirements. We have also added cordless extraction tools to our inventory. We are looking to acquire a newer main engine pumper

truck to replace the one we currently have. Our main engine pumper is now 22 years old and we plan to keep it as a back-up. We are continuing to apply for, and hope to receive special funding for this vehicle. We know it wouldn't be possible without the contributions from the taxpayers of Marshall and Beltrami Counties. We would like to acknowledge the support of all the individuals, businesses, service clubs, and civic organizations in our area. With your generous donations, we have been able to make improvements to our

equipment, attend trainings, and maintain our Fire Hall. The Grygla Fire Department serves 6 townships in Marshall County, 8 townships in Beltrami County, and provides mutual aid (when requested) to the surrounding departments in Goodridge, Middle River, and Roseau. **Serving the community since 1941**

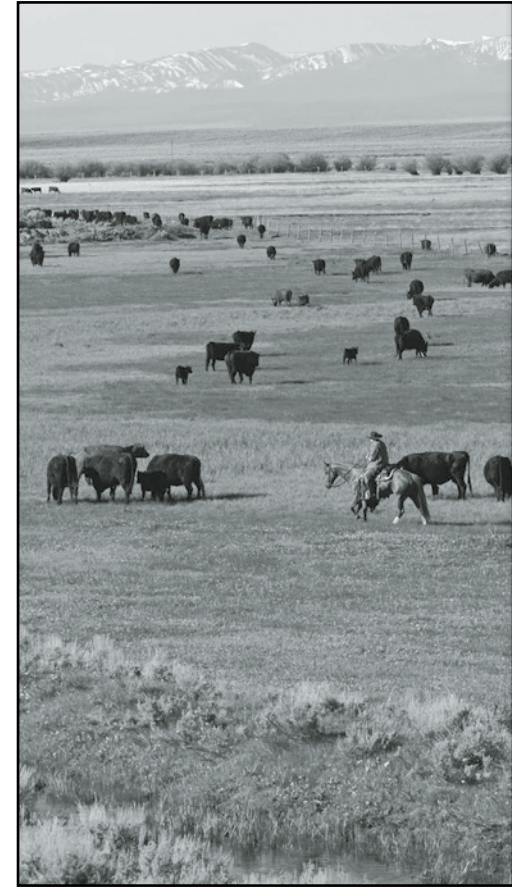

Northern Lights fishing report

On this week's report, not much has changed. The river is still producing sturgeon. With the past cold week, the water temp hasn't changed much to move the crappie spawn into full swing. If you are heading to a crappie lake look for them in the winter spots or on the breaks from bay areas. I may try next week to fish for crappie if time and weather allows for it. I would start in the basins off of points first, 20'-30' of water. You should be able to locate a school with your fish finder - for the most part in the deep water. But still put a line in in case they are on the bottom. I would use a small, 1/8 or less ounce, hand tied jig or a jig and small 1/2"-1" plastic. If you still have your ice finder out bring that with. A lot of times I have my ice finder and my ice rod in the boat just for this reason and use it just like I was ice fishing. If nothing happens, I'd move to the drop offs around the bays in the 10'-15' of water. I'd use the same set up and troll around and jig and

cast and retrieve. It wouldn't hurt to go in shallow and see if there are a few fish in the bays.
I am heading up to the Rainy River on Wednesday to fish for sturgeon for 3 days. We are staying at Borderview Lodge. Hopefully we will catch a few sturgeon. The thing I want to check is the water level and see where it's at. I know the lake and river are down in the range of 5'. So my next report I should have an idea on water levels at the public access in Warroad. I'm also going to try get a hold of Springsteel and see how their harbor and access are.
If you are heading out fishing or shed hunting good luck and stay safe.

This week's recipe is simple + delicious. Hence the name of the column. I made these this week and they were gone in two days.

Crescent Roll Cheesecake

Ingredients

- 2 pkgs crescent rolls (I like to buy the crescent sheets - it's way easier to roll out)
- 2 pkgs cream cheese
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla

1 egg white

Instructions

Sprad crescent rolls or sheet on bottom of 9x13 greased pan. Mix cream cheese, sugar and vanilla together with mixer and spread on top of dough. Lay 2nd crescent rolls or sheet on top of that. Beat 1 egg white & brush over top crust. Sprinkle a cinnamon & sugar mix on top (about 1/2 cup sugar + 1 tsp cinnamon.)

Bake at 350 for 30 minutes. Store in the fridge.

Grygla's Blood Drive brings in 31 volunteers

There was a community blood drive in Grygla last Thursday, April 22nd, hosted by the Grygla Student Council along with Vitalant, which helped collect a total of 29 units of blood products for patients in need.

A total of 31 individuals volunteered to donate blood with 26 individuals being able to donate at the Vitalant blood drive. A total of three donors also came forward to donate Power Red Cells (2RBC) which collects two units of red blood cells while returning platelets, plasma and a saline solution back to the donor. There were three people who volunteered for the first time.

Vitalant expressed their gratitude to Audrya Nelson, who coordinated the drive, and Student Council which sponsored the blood drive, as well as others who assisted the day of the drive: Levi Kiesow, Jared Haack, Chloe Kuznia, Madison Cullen, Ahna Stanley, Brigitte Watne, Ellie Sabourin, Kia Klein, Allie Sundberg, Emily Johnson, Owen Larson, and Harlie Hagen.

Living through a pandemic can lead to many uncertainties, although one thing we are sure of, is that the need for blood never ceases. Blood is only useable for 42 days, so a constant supply is always needed, no matter the season.

Vitalant is currently testing

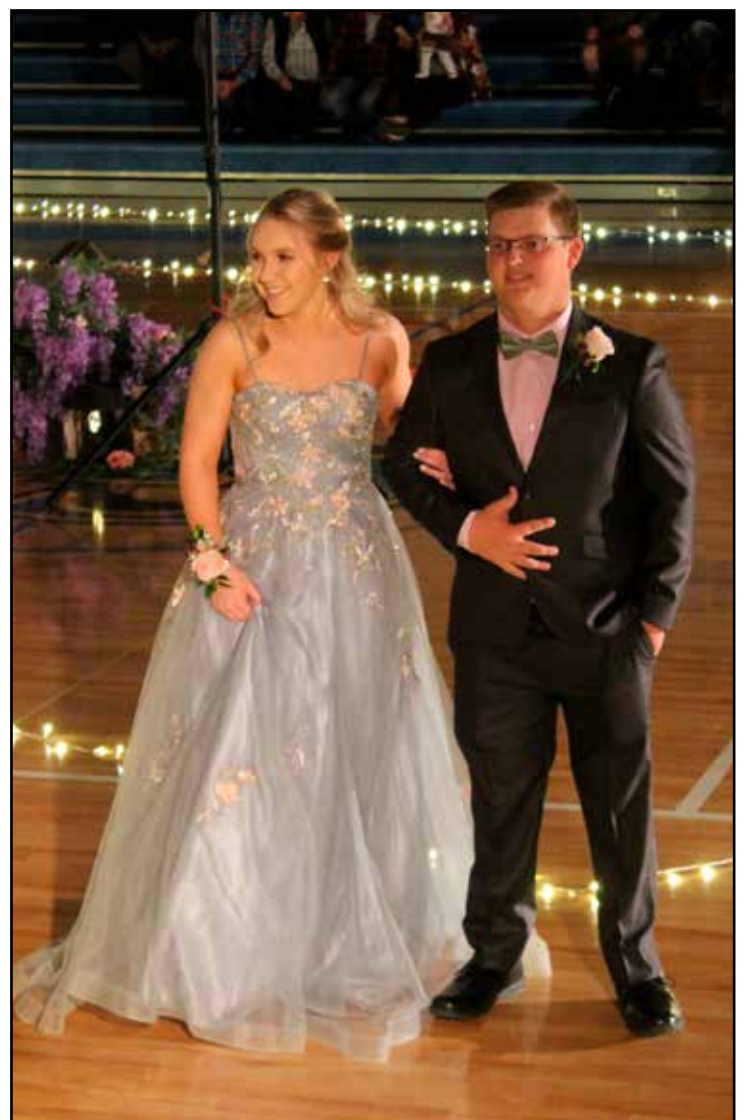
