Lots of changes at the gravel pit out east

Last week brought a lot of changes to the gravel pit out by Grande Corner, about 12 miles east of Grygla, with some still to come!

As many know, the gravel pit is visited by many locals who enjoy dropping a fishing line in or catching some sun on the beach, or playing in the water. Well, over the years, the brush has grown up, making the beach area shrink down to a pretty small area.

With the DNR taking the time to stock the fish, and visiting the spot frequently, they suggested to Fourtown/Grygla Sportsman's Club member and Eagle Editor, Kari Sundberg, about looking into a fishing pier, providing a safe place for people to fish. That got the ball rolling with all sorts of fun. Kari brought the idea back to the Sportsman's Club meeting, where it was very well received, and a small committee was formed to make some improvements to the outdoor recreation area. The gravel pit is on public land, but the gravel rights belong to Holthusen Construction, so the first step in everything was meeting with them. The Fourtown/Grygla Sportsman's Club members who are on the committee include Robert & Kari Sundberg, Jeremy & Tonia Haack, Carson & Missy Saurdiff, Jack Nelson, and Blair & Denise Holthusen.

Beach
After receiving the support

of Holthusen's Construction, and consulting with them on beach expansion, creating more room for families and individuals, all the while staying safely out of Holthusen's way, allowing them to continue their daily operations there, a plan was formed Thursday evening and the work began right away the next morning. Holthusen Construction cleared the entire east and south sides of brush and rocks, creating a huge beach space that made the entire shore sure look different. It exceeded the hopes and expectations greatly! They deserve a huge thank you for being on board with the bigger beach idea, and tackling it without hesitation.

Fire pit
Sundbergs will be doing some work out there this week that includes dragging the beach areas and putting in a fire pit. It is the hope that people respect the area, pitch in and pick up, leaving it clean for the next person. The fire pit will be placed on the east side, near the rock border that Holthusen Construction set up, which also makes for a great parking spot to keep vehicles off the newly-made beach.

Keep it clean
Signage will be getting ordered within the next week, instructing visitors to help maintain the cleanliness of the area. There is still a garbage barrel on site that will be get-

ting dumped by Sportsman's Club members from time to time, however, there are bears in the area, as well as people who don't pick up after themselves, but if everyone can pitch in to keep the area clean, it will continue to be a great outdoor recreation spot.

DNR fish stocking
Also added to the pit last week was 375 pounds of fish, which happens annually by the MN DNR. That process was very interesting to get in on. The fish came out of Balm and Dellwater Lakes, near Clearbrook. In a nutshell, DNR Fisheries Specialist Mike Rolf explained that they place trap nets in the lake overnight. One single panel runs from the shore out; fish run into it, get funneled into a rectangular frame that necks down to a circular frame and that's how most are caught. The day they pulled the nets, specialists also caught a few by Electrofishing, which temporarily stuns the fish, bringing them to the surface. Stocked at the gravel pit on Thursday were 285 lbs of bluegills, 42 lbs of pumpkinseed sunfish, 14 lbs of crappies and 35 lbs of largemouth bass.

Fishing Pier
As mentioned previously, this all began with the idea of a fishing pier, mentioned by Andrew Thompson, Assistant Area Supervisor, Section of Fisheries. Update to share on that project: Kari Sundberg has

been in contact with a few different companies to get ideas, including the City of Clearbrook, who recently installed a fishing pier with the help of a grant. After receiving 3D images of pier/dock options, along with quotes, Sundberg applied for an \$18,000 grant through Beltrami County PILT funds. The awards will be announced sometime in June. The grant app sounds hopeful, but there are a few other funding options to explore if the grant dollars are not awarded. More information to come once that is determined and announced. MN

Boardwalk LLC is the company undertaking the project. They are pushed out until August anyway, so we're looking at later summer/early fall before that addition that we feel hopeful about, which is also one Holthusen Construction supports. We'll all be working together to determine the best location of a floating pier, allowing Blair and his crew to still go in and dig, if needed.

Working together
With this being such a fun spot that is frequented by a lot of locals, just use this reminder to work together on keeping

the area clean. Pitch in, pick up, leave the area clean for the next family of fishermen, beachgoers, or folks who just want to enjoy the outdoor area. For the most part, it's well-taken care of and picked up by people, but there has been patio furniture and shingles dumped on site, garbage left behind, glass bottles on the sand, people ripping up the beach, etc. Let's all be respectful of the area that's open to us as a privilege. We are so fortunate to have that area here and it'd be such a bummer to lose it.

Pitch in. Pick up. Be kind.

Even though it is only May producers are reminded that they must file a crop acreage report each year with the Farm Service Agency (FSA) to be eligible for most FSA program benefits..

July 15, 2021 is the deadline to timely file an acreage report with FSA for most crops, in-

cluding CRP, but no time like now to get it done to beat the rush later.

Once producers have finished planting, they should complete their maps, according to the letter provided

The day of the tournament was even worse. We didn't get a walleye and couldn't get a pike over 26". I caught about 15 small 18"-24" pike.

Sunday I went out casting for pike and we got 3 and 1 over 27". I found out that the weekend before was pretty good and the water temp was 10 degrees warmer than this weekend. But I finally had an outing that didn't involve an adventure.

Lake of the Woods had various reports. Around the west end of the lake, they were finding some fish deeper 10'-18'+. Mostly little ones being caught with a few slot fish; this seemed to be the consensus around the lake. In the Longpoint area the shelf's off of Twin Islands, Gull Rock, and Twin Rock has been producing some fish again in the 15' range. The east side had the same deal. In the gap it seemed a little deeper water worked best. A jig and shiner

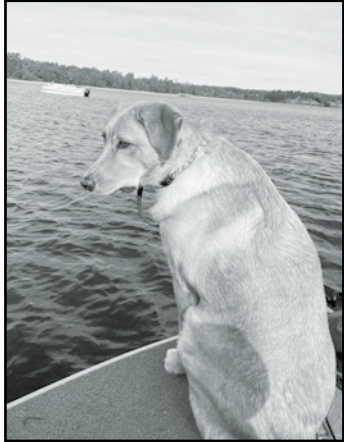
Goodridge Sand Volleyball

Miniature Magnificence: A Tiny Art Exhibit featuring Grygla/Goodridge artists

The Northwest Minnesota Arts Council (NWMAC) is pleased to announce Miniature Magnificence: A Tiny Art Exhibit featuring more than 133 pieces of art from all over our region. The exhibit is open now through July 26, 2021 at the NWMAC Gallery at Northland Community and Technical College in Thief River Falls.

Showcase Specialist Trey Everett explained, "It's fun to dream up themes for future art exhibits. Our current show, Miniature Magnificence: A Tiny Art Exhibit, came about as I was thinking of how to encourage people to submit artwork. Teaching art and hosting creative workshops over the years I've learned that the smaller the canvas the less anxiety and fear people seem to have around creating artwork. "What if," I thought, "the only requirement for an exhibit was that the art had to be very small?" It worked! People were so enthusiastic."

There are 133 individual pieces of art not counting about 80 to 100 chicken eggs. The exhibit includes four pieces from an artist from Michigan. Everett reached out to folk artisans and happily a number of artists accepted the challenge. "We have beautiful and thought-provoking Hardanger embroidery, needle felted wool, etched depression era eggs, alcohol ink paintings, batik, embroidery with tin on leather and wool, straw craft, pin cushion and so on. This

was a fun exhibit to set up and I greatly enjoy interacting with the amazing creative people in this region."

Marshall County Artist Jeremy Haug created the etched depression era eggs. He explained, "Eggs are inspiration. Years ago, I heard that artists either add or subtract to make art. Pinching pennies through the pandemic, I didn't want to splurge on paints or dyes for Easter eggs and started playing around with scratching off the outer layer, subtracting from the egg instead of adding the paint. The shape of the egg lends itself well to the simple designs I've been drawing since I was a kid. While etching the eggs the calcium dust that scratches off sparkles in the sunshine; I figure something good is happening."

Area students also entered work into this exhibit. According to Goodridge-Grygla Teacher Betsy Saurdiff, "Students created a series of five mini paintings and chose their favorite for the show. By working in a series, they were able to develop their ideas further."

Debbie Aune, Art Teacher from Greenbush said, "We were ALL OVER this real art show! I personally have had enough virtual. I made it a requirement for my craft class and my painting class. It was a crash course in watercolor; I gave the kids one hour to finish two small paintings! The urgency made it happen."

Finally, Artist Cindy

Kolling of Gully on her drawings, "These pen & ink drawings are part of a multi-step process that goes into much of my art. I want to make new art that invites viewers to expand their participation in life by developing and sharing appreciation and to consider our local world with fresh insight." with their maps. Information needed includes such things as: crop, variety (spring wheat or winter wheat, etc.), intended use (grain, hay, grazing, etc.), planting date, etc.

After completed maps and all acreage reporting information is received, FSA will make software updates and then contact producers to make arrangements to sign their Report of Acreage form (FSA-578).

Producers who have not yet received their acreage reporting maps should contact their

FSA County Office as soon as possible to pick them up.

Due to the Coronavirus Pandemic, it is not expected that producers will be allowed in the FSA County Office for acreage reporting so acreage reporting will have to be done remotely again this year. Therefore, it is very important that producer's maps are completed accurately by following the directions in the letter with their maps.

Producers with questions about acreage reporting should contact the Marshall County FSA Office at 745-4251 ext. 2, the Pennington County FSA Office at 681-1612 ext. 2, or their local FSA County Office.
