



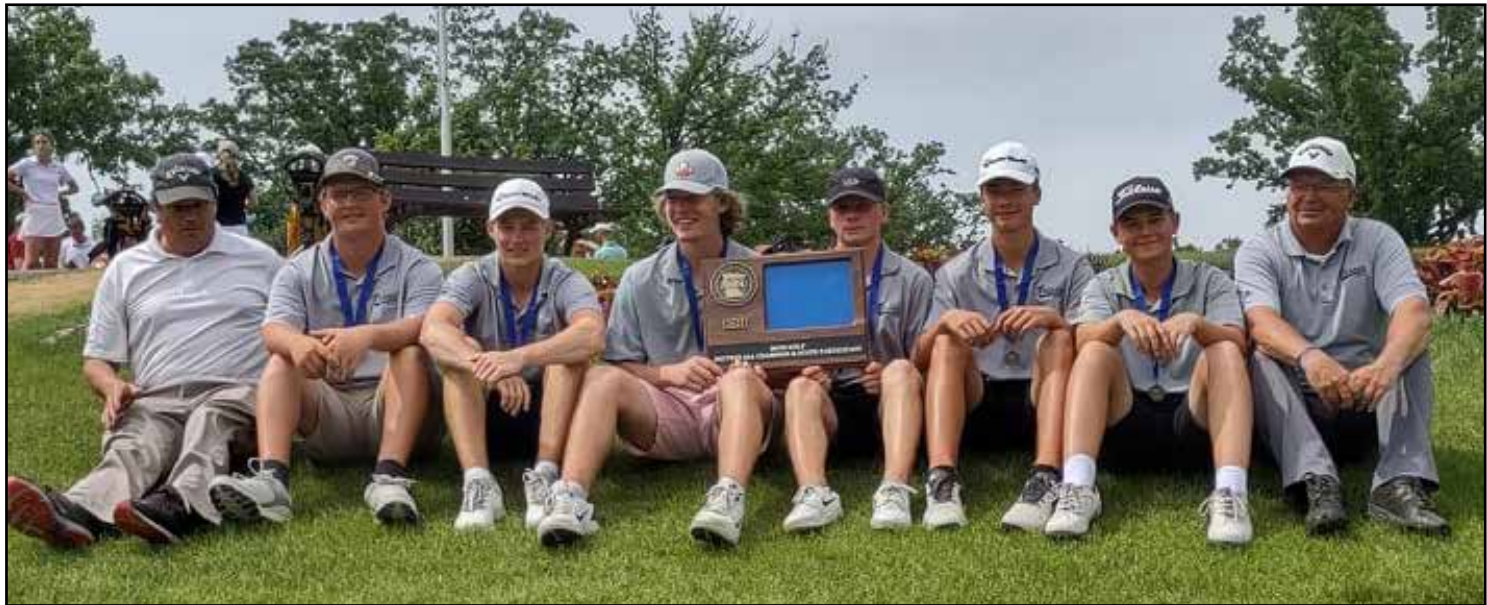

Thompson and the rest of the Ram's Golf team head to state

The Roseau Rams Varsity Golf team, which Grygla Junior Justin Thompson is a part of, were named 2021 Section 8AA Champs, which means they are heading to State in Jordan, MN, this week. This will be the first time at stake for Roseau since 2011 and the first time in golf for the Grygla School!

This is the first time Grygla has ever been able to participate in Golf, which was a co-op with the Roseau School. Justin Thompson, son of Bob and Lori Thompson, joined the team as a JV/V player and quickly worked his way up the ranks, earning him a spot on the six-player team that is working for that State Championship.

Last week, the Section 8AA finals were held in Bemidji, where the Rams placed 1st, advancing them to the State Meet in Jordan at the Ridges at Sand Creek Golf Club on Tuesday and Wednesday, June 15th-16th.

Teams involved include Blue Earth Buccaneers, Cloquet Lumberjacks, Delano Tigers, New London-Spicer Wildcats, Roseau Rams, Staples-Motley Cardinals and Totino-Grace Eagles.

Good Luck to Justin Thompson and the Roseau Ram Golf team. The Grygla Fire & Rescue Department helped escort the team out of town last Sunday. Stay tuned on their results coming next week.

Roseau Rams Boys Golf – 2021 Season Recap

The Roseau Rams Boys High School Golf Team is having a very strong season to date, just one week prior to the two-day Section 8AA meet to be held in Bemidji on June 7-8. The Varsity team has been able to finish in 1st place in 9 of its 11 meets during this 2021 season. Eight different individuals have provided a contributing individual score to the team score at some point during the season to show the true depth of this 2021 golf team. The 6-person team that will compete at the section meet will include one senior, Judd Ginther; two juniors, Markus Nelson and Justin Thompson; two sophomores, Teagan LaPlante and Max Wilson; one freshman, Bradyn Thingvold. Here is the year in review:

The season opened with a 9-hole meet on April 22nd, 2021, in Thief River Falls. The Roseau varsity team finished in 1st place and Roseau JV finished 2nd in the 6 team event. The Roseau team score was 158 led by meet medalist Teagan LaPlante with a 37, Markus with 38, Judd with 40 and Max with 42 for four team scores.

The first 18-hole meet of the season was on April 26, 2021, in Crookston. Roseau varsity team finished in 1st place in the 4 team event. Roseau team score was 309 led by meet medalist Max Wilson with a 73, Teagan with 74, Judd with 79, and Carter Christanson with 83 for four teams.

Friday, April 30, 2021, was an invitational tournament in Fergus Falls that included teams like Detroit Lakes and Moorhead. Roseau varsity team finished in 4th place in the meet with a team score of 318. Individual scorers included Max with a 77, Teagan with 77, Markus with 78 and Judd with 86 for four team scores.

On May 4, 2021, in East Grand Forks, the Roseau varsity played a difficult course in very cold, very windy conditions. Roseau varsity team finished in 1st place in the 4 team event. Roseau team score was 324 led by meet medalist Max Wilson with a 78, Teagan with 79, Judd with 83, and Markus with 84 for four team scores.

The Roseau team was invited to participate in the 2-day 15-team Fargo North Invitational held May 7-8 at Edgewood Golf Course in Fargo, ND. The field included 13 teams from the eastern half of ND including all Grand Forks, Fargo and West Fargo schools, along with Roseau and Detroit Lakes. Day 1 of the meet left Roseau in 3trd place with a team score of 315, six strokes behind leaders Fargo Davies and Grand Forks Central. Team scores for Day 1 included Markus with a 72, Teagan with 74, Max with 79, and Tucker Lundgren with 85. Day 2 witnessed the Roseau boys charge into the lead of the tournament over the final nine holes and eventually win the tournament by 5 strokes over Fargo Davies with a 2-day total score of 614. Day 2 team scores included Markus with 74, Teagan with 74, Judd with 74, and Max with 77 for a 299 team score on Day 2. Overall tournament individual medalist was Markus Nelson with a 146 score over the two rounds. Teagan LaPlante finished in 2nd place individually overall with a 151.

On Monday, May 10th, Roseau was invited to play in the 16-team Bemidji Invitational with teams like Alexandria, Bemidji, Brainerd and Detroit Lakes. The team struggled on this day for a total score of 331 to finish 6th overall. Individual scores included Markus with a 78, Teagan with 84, Tucker with 84 and Bradyn Thingvold with 85.

Friday, May 14th, 2021, was the TRF Invitational meet. Roseau varsity team finished in 1st place in the five team event. Roseau team score of 320 was led by meet medalist Markus Nelson with a 78, Teagan with 79, Bradyn with 80, and Max with 83 for four team scores.

The next day, Saturday, May 15th, was this year's only home meet for the Roseau boys with the Annual Roseau Invitational held at Oakcrest Golf Course. The Roseau varsity team finished 1st place in the 6 team event. Roseau shot a season best team score of 293 led by meet medalist Max Wilson with a 1-under par round of 70, Teagan with a 73, Markus with a 73 and Bradyn with a 77 for four team scores.

Wednesday, May 19th, 2021 was the Crookston invitational held at Bemidji Town & Country Club. The Roseau varsity team finished in 1st place in the 5 team event. Roseau's team score of 314 was led by meet medalist Max Wilson with a 76, Markus with a 78, Teagan with a 78, and **Justin Thompson with 82** for four team scores.

May 25, 2021, was the Section 8AA North Pre-Sub Section meet at Crookston. The Roseau Varsity team finished in 1st place in the seven team event. Roseau's team score 308 was led by meet co-medalists Markus Nelson and Max Nelson with scores of 76, Judd with 77 and Teagan with 79 for four team scores. Roseau boys also had the top 4 scorers individually in this meet.

Tuesday, June 1, 2021, was the official MSHSL Section 8AA North Subsection Meet at Crookston. The Roseau varsity team finished in 1st place in the seven team event. The Roseau team score of 311 was led by Markus Nelson with 77, Teagan LaPlante with a 77, Max Wilson with a 78 and Judd Ginther with 79 for four team scores. **Justin Thompson shot 81** and Bradyn Thingvold shot 84 to round out the Roseau squad.

Good luck to the Roseau Rams boys golf team at the section meet on June 7-8 in Bemidji.

The manic depth was 8-14 feet with the bulk of the bite in 12. We did catch a 27.25" and a 23".

Violence Intervention Project awarded Otto Bremer Trust Grant

(Submitted) In mid-April, the Otto Bremer Trust awarded Violence Intervention Project (VIP) a general operating grant. VIP plans to use this funding to repair their parking lot, sidewalks and entrance and to install gutters. The parking lot has been in desperate need of repair for several years," says Staci Reay, Co-Executive Director. She says that the large potholes and crumbling pavement have started to create unsafe conditions for people and vehicles and that VIP has struggled to raise money for this type of expense.

VIP did do a mail fundraiser in 2020 in lieu of their annual luncheon and raffle ticket fundraisers. VIP wasn't able to do

these fundraisers because of COVID -19 restrictions. "These were are two biggest fundraisers," says Reay, "and it was concerning that we were unable to do them last year. We weren't sure how we were going to recoup these funds."

Reay said their direct mail fundraiser was a success. "These individual donations combined with the Otto Bremer Trust grant, will help pay for the parking lot repairs," said Reay. "We are grateful to everyone that participated in our direct mail fundraiser and to everyone that continues to support VIP with cash and material donations."

Goosey Oatmeal & Craisins Bars

I found this recipe on Pinterest while I was looking up things I could make with a bag of Craisins that I have sitting in the cupboard. I think this is the winner! I plan to make these this week; I wonder if any will be left by the weekend? My kids don't like oatmeal OR craisins, but their mom sure does...

For the filling:

- 2 Cups of Craisins
- Dried Cranberries – Cherry Juice Infused
- 2 Cups + 1 Tablespoon of Water
- 1/2 Cup of Sugar Substitute
- 2 Tablespoons of Flour
- 1/4 Teaspoon of Salt
- 1/2 teaspoon of Vanilla Extract
- 1 Tablespoon of Butter
- 1 Tablespoon of Lemon Juice
- 1 Tablespoon of Corn Starch

For the bars:

- 1/2 Cup of Unsalted Butter
- 1 Cup of Light Brown Sugar
- 1 Egg
- 1/2 Tablespoon of Vanilla Extract
- 1 Cup of Flour
- 1/2 Tablespoon of Baking Soda
- 1 Cup of Quick Cooking Oatmeal
- 1 Cup of Craisins
- Dried Cranberries – Cherry Juice Infused

How to Make:

Start by adding 2 cups of water, sugar substitute, flour, salt, vanilla extract, butter and

lemon juice to a pan over low heat and stirring it all together. Then, quickly add two cups of Craisins.

With heat on low, cook down mixture until it's a soupy consistency. After about ten minutes of simmering the mixture, mix together one tablespoon of cornstarch and one tablespoon of water in a bowl and then pour it into the mixture, stirring well to help the filling thicken up.

After about two more minutes over low heat, remove and put in refrigerator to cool while you mix up the bar batter.

Add butter and sugar to mixer and blend until creamy. Then add egg, vanilla extract, flour and baking soda, blending together until it's a smooth batter. Add your oatmeal and craisins, and stir until well



combined.

Next up, assemble the bars. Preheat your oven to 350 degrees. Next, place parchment paper in the bottom of a square baking dish and grease it so that the bars won't stick.

Add ¾ bar batter to the bottom and gently push down. Next, pour about a cup of the filling mixture of the bars and smooth it out. Finally add the remainder of the bar batter on top, using your fingers to gently flatten it out to seal the filling.

Place in oven for 30 minutes, until top is golden brown and feels slightly crunchy. Remove and let cool completely. Bars will fall apart if they are still warm. Once totally cool, remove from pan by pulling up on parchment paper. Cut into squares and serve.

Freeze Baseball drops a pair of games to end regular season. Heads into postseason versus top-seeded Sacred Heart

Freeze 2 Greyhounds 17 (five innings):

After a scoreless first inning between the Fosston Greyhounds and Freeze baseball teams, the game would change in the second inning. By inning's end, the Freeze were looking up at an 8-0 deficit.

The Freeze couldn't recover, allowing the Greyhounds—the top-seeded team in the opposite sub-section—to continue to add on and falling by a 17-2 final, via 10-run rule in five innings, on May 24 at home in Karlstad.

Freeze Head Coach Shawn Donarski pointed to pitching wildness and defensive miscues as the difference in that second inning.

"We ended up walking quite a few guys and then they hit the ball really well, and then we had a few errors in that second inning if I'm not mistaken," Coach Donarski said. "... They took advantage of our errors on defense and they put the game away."

For the game, the Freeze finished with four errors, walked 12 batters, and hit one batter.

After surrendering eight in the second, the Freeze allowed six more in the third and three more in the fourth. In the fifth inning, the Freeze broke through with two runs.

For the game, Greyhounds pitchers L. Balstad and B. Levin combined to give up one hit, walk three, hit one batter, and record 12 strikeouts. Jade Werb finished with that one Freeze hit, also posting an RBI.

Caleb Bray took the pitching loss for the Freeze. In two and one-third innings, he gave up 14 runs, five earned, on seven hits and six walks, and struck out three.

Freeze 1 Fusion 11

The Freeze would host the West Marshall Fusion in the team's final regular season game and the Freeze seniors' final home game of their careers. The Fusion put a damper on this finale.

Falling into a 4-0 first-inning hole, the Freeze allowed the Fusion to score two more in the third and one more in the fourth, putting the team in an 7-0 deficit going into the bottom of the fourth. This hole proved too deep to dig out of and the Freeze eventually fell 11-1 to the Fusion on May 27.

Coach Donarski highlighted the pitching performance of the Fusion's M. Jacobson. In five innings of work, Jacobson gave up one run on one hit, one hit batter, and four walks, and struck out 11 to earn the pitching win.

"The (Fusion starting) pitcher threw an exceptional game. He threw really hard, very good placement of his pitches," Coach Donarski said. "We had trouble catching up to how fast his velocity was."

The one hit Jacobson did surrender came in the fifth inning when the Freeze's Easton Olson hit a home run.

"That was a highlight of the game for us," Coach Donarski said of that Olson home run.

Olson finished two for three at the plate with that home run, accounting for the team's only hits.

Following the Olson home run, the Freeze trailed 7-1 going into the sixth inning. The Fusion responded with two in the sixth and two more in the seventh, providing for the final margin.

Parker Nelson took the pitching loss for the Freeze. In three innings, he gave up six runs, five earned, on five hits and five walks, and struck out three.

Next Action: The eighth-seeded Freeze would open up

the Section 8A playoffs versus the top-seeded team in its sub-section, the Sacred Heart Eagles, in East Grand Forks on June 1. A win in this game would advance the Freeze into the double-elimination portion of the tournament.

Also with a win in this game, the Freeze would advance to the sub-section semifinals versus the winner of the fourth-seeded Kittson County Central and fifth-seeded Red Lake County game on Thursday, June 3 at 10:00 am from Sacred Heart (East Grand Forks).

With a win in this sub-section semifinal game, the Freeze would advance to the sub-section championship game, also at Sacred Heart at 3:00 pm that same day. With a loss in this sub-section semifinal game, the Freeze would fall into a loser's out game at 5:30 pm, also at Sacred Heart on June 3.

If the Freeze advances from this day, it would play in the Section 8A Tournament from Bemidji State University on Saturday, June 5 at a time to be determined. If still alive in the tournament, but in the elimination part of the bracket, the Freeze would play in Bemidji State again at a time to be determined on Tuesday, June 8.

"Everybody's record is 0-0. It doesn't matter... how the game played out the last time we played Sacred Heart," Coach Donarski said. "Good things can happen if all of a sudden everything clicks and we don't have any errors or have really reduced errors. And if they make an error, we need to capitalize on it."

Freeze Baseball season comes to an end

Starting the postseason with a clean slate, the eighth-seeded Freeze Baseball team hit the road to the play the top-seeded Sacred Heart Eagles in the first round of the Section 8A playoffs in East Grand Forks on June 1.

The Freeze allowed the Eagles to jump out to an early lead with eight first-inning runs. Falling into an 8-0 deficit, the Freeze could never recover before falling to the Eagles via 10-run rule in five innings by a 16-2 final, ending the Freeze's season.

"They (the Eagles) did a real good job of hitting the ball. We made a few errors and they managed to score runs," Freeze Head Coach Shawn Donarski said. "They stole a lot of bases on us and we couldn't necessarily stop them. We were our own worst enemy."

In this game, the Eagles collected eight hits and stole 11 bases. Defensively, the Freeze committed five errors and the team's pitching staff issued 11 walks and hit two batters.

After that eight-run first inning, the Eagles added two more run in the second. The Freeze broke through for one in the third and the Eagles responded in the bottom of the inning with two more runs to take a 12-1 lead after three innings.

The Eagles posted four more runs in the fourth before the Freeze added one run in the fifth to fall by the final margin.

Riley Duray took the pitching loss for the Freeze, surrendering eight runs, five earned, on four hits, four walks, and one hit batter in one inning of work.

Offensively, the Freeze collected five hits combined off three different Eagles pitchers. Jake Knutson finished two for two with two runs scored, and Jade Werb finished one for one with an RBI to lead the Freeze.

Speaking of Knutson, this loss marked the official end of his and fellow senior Easton Olson's Freeze playing careers. Coach Donarski recognized the contributions of these seniors.

"They played really well for us throughout the whole year. I'm going to be sad to see them go," Coach Donarski said. "They did the things that were asked of them and their presence on the field will definitely be missed."

Despite his team finishing with an 0-13 mark this season, Coach Donarski looked at the season in a positive way.

"Without having any wins, that really is kind of disappointing," Coach Donarski said. "And it just tells us... there's lots of room to improve."
