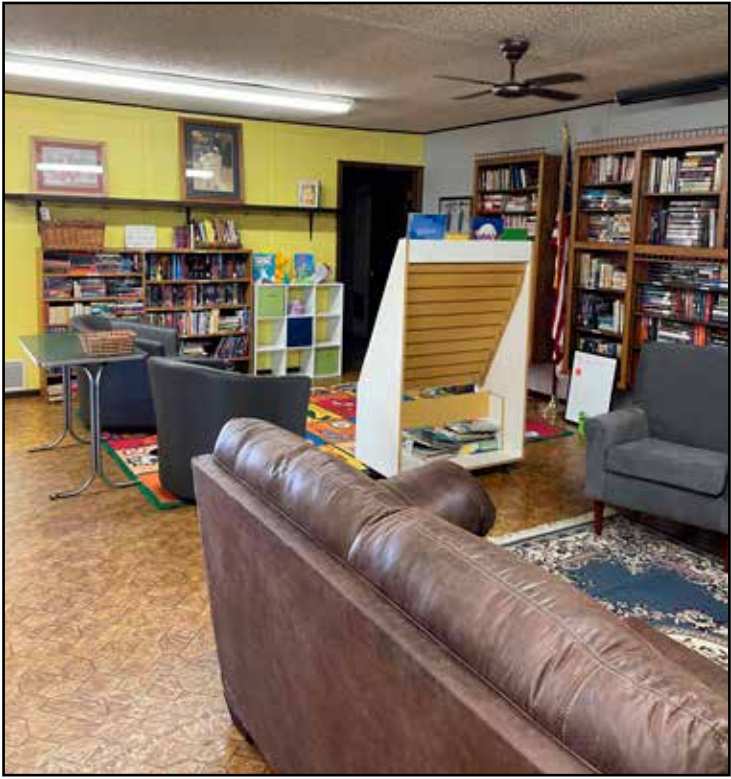
The library is looking for other volunteers and are open to other hours, as well.

Grygla School Board Meeting on May 20, 2021, 6:00 p.m. Chairperson of the board Jeremy Rychlock called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm with James Verbout, Tera Nordby, Luke Nordvick, Gretchen Smeby, Principal Gieseke and Superintendent Jamie Lunsetter present. Clinton Brobst absent. Pledge of Allegiance

Motion by James Verbout, second by Jeremy Rychlock, to approve the agenda as presented. Passed 5-0. Minutes of the 4/15/21 regular school board meeting are approved as printed. Approve payment of bills: Motion by Tera Nordby, second by Gretchen Smeby to approve payment of the bills check #38051 through check #38110 and wire payments. Passed 5-0.

Finance Report: Bills: General Fund \$156,390.91 MS-DLAF \$1,586,029.11 Food Service \$4,735.30 Checking \$12,633.41 Community Service \$1,088.81 Trust \$ Scholarship \$ Student Activity \$16,206.25 Total \$178,421.27 Total \$1,598,662.52

Greg Crowe from Ehler's Financial was present, as our operating referendum is expiring this year, to present information in regards to a renewal and possible increase to the current \$211/student. In addition, he also gave an update on a possible Bond Issue involving replacing the current boiler system. Mr. Crowe discussed the potential tax impact to our local taxpayers, and state aid that is available as a part of any proposed project. More information will be made available as we get deeper into the possible project.

Student Report Given by Kia Klein. The Elementary Basketball night was a huge success and the kids all had a lot of fun! The Grygla ECFE also held their annual fundraiser, which raised around \$2,000 for the ECFE program. Items were donated by people and business for a silent auction, and barbecues and chips were served, along with a 50/50 raffle. The local AAL donated \$200 for the food, and Kim Cleven made the barbecues and donated her time. The NHS and Peer

Helpers also helped with the setup, serving and clean up. The money raised was sent to the Marshall County Initiative to purchase books for the Dolly Parton Imagination Library, which benefits children in our district under the age of 5. ECFE had their graduation night, with 10 students moving on to Kindergarten in the fall.

Teacher Report Given by Mr. Rath. Mr. Rath reported that May has been a very busy month for our staff and students. Track numbers have been low this year, but they have done an excellent job of competing at meets. The girls team has broken 12 of the 17 records and are very close to beating a few more. The boys team won their first meet in school history! Trap will be headed to the State meet on June 14th, with 13 students participating. High Mileage also had a good year. They had a top a run average of 226.4 MPG and placed 5th out of 20 teams. They were also a finalist for the Craftsmanship Award. Evening with the Arts was also a huge success. Many students took part in the FACS, Art and Woodworking segments, as well as the school play performance. On May 19th, the Student Council held the Staff Appreciation Breakfast. Prom was held this year, and was an outstanding evening. Fozzie's catered, with the Juniors taking care of the planning and decorating. Post prom was also held, with one of the highlights being a hypnotist. The Student Council held a food shelf drive during the week of Spring Fling. Charger Kindness Day was held, with students going out into the community to help with clean up and other small projects. The 6th grade and Seniors went on their class trips to Duluth, taking in several different experiences. Graduation will be this Sunday. We wish the Seniors the best in the future and appreciate all of their commitment to the Grygla School.

Northern Lights fishing report

This week's report: Lake of the Woods was a disappointment. Our trip on the big water never got better and we caught 6 "keepers" for a surf and turf lunch. Between the nonexistent fishing and bad weather, I was ready to leave Wednesday. Took a break Thursday and hit the water again on Friday for a day of trout fishing with Christina and Riley. It was a leisure trip - up at the crack of 9am and at Long Lake just

before 1pm. We were heading out to one of my spots when I started marking loads of fish in 45' about 150 yards off the landing. Christina had 2 in the boat before I had a line in. We were done by 3:30.
Then Saturday came around and I met up with Travis and his brother at Balm Lake around 11:30am, so not an early start. We caught a lot of nice sunfish and a little walleye out in 14'-17' along with a couple bass on leeches. Casting in 10'-12' produced the most bass and then top water fishing in the evening had great success.
Lake of the Woods on the west side has started to pick up. They are catching them at the blinker in 6'-14' on jig and shiner, but also pulling crawlers and leeches, along with some cranks. South tip and whiskey flats have been doing well, too. Pulling cranks in the flats off of reefs and middle of nowhere in 25'-27'.
I may try the big lake this week; time will tell. Good luck and be safe.

Incredible, almost unbelievable facts about Minnesota

Full of history and culture, there's always something new to learn about Minnesota. These crazy facts range from the ones you've always wondered about to the ones you never gave much thought to, but all of them are guaranteed to astound you. Here are some things that make Minnesota truly unique.

There are 69,200 miles of rivers and streams in Minnesota. That's enough to circle the equator 2 3/4 times! Distance around the equator = 24,901 miles. Sources: Minnesota Department of Natural Resources/National Geographic.

Minnesota produces more turkeys each year than there are people in California. Turkeys produced: 44-46 million

annually. Source: Minnesota Turkey Growers Association. California Population - 38,802,500. Source: US Census. Minnesota has one recreational boat per every six people; that's 909,528 boats, more than the population of South Dakota (and North Dakota).

Minnesota has over 3 times more white-tailed deer than college students. 1.5 million white-tailed deer. Source: Minnesota DNR. 433,952 Students. Source: Minnesota Office of Higher Education.

5.3 million cows live in MN. More cows than there are people in 20 different states.

The Mall of America in Bloomington is big enough to hold 32 Boeing 747 airplanes.

MN stocks its waters with 256,259,500 fish on average per year. That's enough to give 4 out of 5 people in the US a fish.

Minnesota harvests 18,900,000 lbs of fish per year; that's enough to fill the beds of 10,384 Ford F-150 Pickups.

CROP DISASTER - "I can't believe it," said Goodridge farmer Larry Srnsky about the ten inches of rain which turned his cropland into wasteland. "I suppose it was just too nice to get," he said of his 1975 crop prospects - which had looked great before the flood. Larry, pictured here with his sister, is standing on the water-covered access road to his farmstead better than a half-a-dozen miles south of Grygla. Larry

said that his whole farm was under water and that it was four to five feet deep in places. He said that all of his 320 acres was totaled by the rains and the flood of run-off waters. He said his loss was typical of many in the area, including a brother and his father. Srnsky, who has some beef animals, will probably be forced to sell his animals as the pasture is destroyed and the June hay crop is rotting in the wind rows.

USDA secretary requested to view Minnesota disaster area

Because of serious crop losses in the Red River Valley area, Minnesota Farmers Union President Cy Carpenter today has requested Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz to view the damage to Minnesota during his visit here July 14 and develop an immediate program of assistance.

"Farmers and small businessmen have suffered devastating losses and need assistance immediately to combat it," Carpenter said. "With the Agriculture Secretary visiting the Twin Cities July 14, it will give him an excellent opportunity to see firsthand the damage in the area."

If a meeting can be arranged, Sec. Butz will meet with a delegation of farmers,

community leaders, Farmers Union officials and other interested groups in discussing the crisis.

In the request to Sec. Butz, MFU asked for a realistic program which would provide grants and loans, under documented losses, as emergency disaster help.

Heavy rains drenched the Red River Valley area the past week, causing crop losses that will likely total over \$100 million to Minnesota alone.

"To prevent several decades of indebtedness due to this one disaster," Carpenter noted, "farmers will need some type of assistance to pull them through."

Carpenter continued, "The worst hit farmers will need a grant system in order to survive this crisis. Grants are needed over and above loans because this one-time disaster is so terribly severe."

Farmers Union officials, along with Carpenter, met with farmers and county officials in Thief River Falls Monday to discuss details of emergency disaster legislation.

Sunday afternoon the big stock car racing program with six racing events produced by the Northern Racing Association, with Jim Cockran, veteran Grand Forks race promoter, in charge, will attempt to break track records on the excellent Marshall County Fair half mile track. This has always been a big feature at the fair and is expected to be even greater this year.

The closing grandstand program Sunday night will feature the Blackwood Singers in a concert of gospel and popular music. This troupe played the Marshall County Fair in 1973 and was highly praised by the many who heard them sing. The Blackwoods believe in their music and what it says is first in their lives.

The big Midway will again feature the William D. Stanley Shows with its large assortment of rides, concessions and shows.

The advance sale of ride tickets for kiddies under 12, at 5 tickets for \$1 is now underway in all communities in the area. The advance sale continues until the opening day of the fair.

County Fair officials extend a most cordial welcome to everyone to attend one or more days of the big summer fair. There will be many new things to see, and much more to do for the young, as well as the older folks. So plan now to attend.
