Manhunt continues in homicide investigation



Press Release as of July 9th: The Pennington County Sheriff's Office, along with the assistance of surrounding agencies, is actively investigating a homicide that occurred in rural Pennington County on July 9, 2021. The suspect, Erik James Reinbold (44), remains at large. If you see him, please call your local law enforcement agency. Do not approach as he could be armed. If anyone has any other information on his whereabouts, please contact the Pennington County Sheriff's Office at 218-681-6161. A Federal Warrant has been issued for his arrest.

Press Release as of July 11th: Erik Reinbold is being sought by U.S. Marshals and Pennington County Sheriff's Office as the primary suspect in the death of Lisette Reinbold, his wife. A reward of up

to \$10,000 is being offered for information leading to the apprehension of Reinbold. Point of Contact: U.S. Marshals at 1-877-WANTED-2 (1-877-926-8332)

Other information: Reinbold was recently released from prison after being convicted of making pipe bombs and is now wanted in connection with the murder of his wife in Oklee, MN, on July 9th. He was released this past March for "compassionate care" reasons because of his medical issues and those of his family, which came after his wife contracted and recovered from COVID-19, with Reinbold's parents having to watch their children.

Prior to this, Reinbold pleaded guilty to an incident in 2015 when he rammed his pickup into a car with his wife and children inside. Reinbold was also given a five-year prison sentence after being convicted in Fergus Falls in late 2018 for possessing pipe bombs.

During the search of his hunting property near Oklee, Minnesota, police also found a 32-page notebook on Reinbold's desk entitled: "How one person can make a difference: Instruction booklet at the HCU (home-made commando university)." The notebook detailed how to survive in the wilderness, how to build bombs, identify enemies, and how to "start the second American Revolution and win."

Northern Lights fishing report

On this week's report, I took Christina and Riley to Balm for some sunfish action. Last Thursday we set out at the crack of 9am and got to Balm around 10ish. The lake was nice and calm and we set out.
As we were nearing the spot of my last trip to Balm for sunfish, I started marking fish in 28'-30'. We stopped and trolled around in the hopes that they were the nice crappie I had caught there last year. The fish were suspended 15'-20' down and I had picked up minnows just in case I found the crappie. A few passes landed some surprise 9" blue gills. I then located a school and we caught over 100 sunfish all 7"-9".
After that we went to see if we could get any bass to blow up under the pads, my favorite and Christina had never done it. We had lots of blow-ups and only 2 hooked up, but it was a blast. Riley was a trooper carrying her half full 5 pound jar of animal crackers and wanting to touch each fish, unless it fell on the floor, then she went as far away from it as possible.
Balm still continues to be one of my favorite lakes to fish. There are multiple species to chase and just peaceful to be on. This coming week we will be at Long Lake for a nice long weekend tenting and chasing trout, crappie and bass.
I hope to get back into the art of fly fishing, as well. It's been too long.
Anyway, the reports on Lake of the Woods have been very inconsistent. In the morning in 6'-14' off the blinker and the sand bar has been ok, producing fish primarily on spinners. Then out at south tip and whiskey flats, jigging, spinners and cranks have been producing out deep in 2'-30' with most of the action in 27' in the mud. The deep mud flats off the reefs and in the middle of nowhere would be where I would start, especially if I don't want to make a long run.
I know Garden Island, Knight and Bridges have been good but is such a long run to me. Locating the fish on a graph in the flats is key and staying with the school.
My go to right now would be a spinner with a crawler and trolling the flats. I would then mark on my GPS every time I mark a fish and catch one and then switch baits, colors and tactics to see what gets them to bite.
One tactic that is often avoided is a jig and plastic. A jig and plastic allows you to cover a wide range of colors and presentation if you are marking fish that would not bite on anything else. I always have some in my boat.
Good luck and be safe.

Everyone goes nuts for the hamburgers at this nostalgic eatery in Northern Minnesota
A re-run of this one as it's so close to home and totally worth the hype!
With new restaurants popping up all the time, it's easy to forget old favorites. It's even easier to forget those located far from any urban areas. But there are great small-town restaurants all over Minnesota waiting to be discovered – or rediscovered. One of the best is Earl's Diner in Roseau, where they serve up classic burgers with a side of nostalgia. Take a look!
In Roseau, just miles from the Canadian border, Earl's Drive-In is definitely a classic. It's been around in the tiny town of Ro-



seau for more than 50 years. And during that time, the restaurant has drawn visitors from near and far. For many, a stop at this seasonal restaurant is a summertime tradition. Burning restrictions expand

To help ensure public safety and protect natural resources, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is activating additional burning restrictions beginning 12:01 a.m. Tuesday, July 13 for the eastern portion of Roseau County and all of Beltrami, Cook, Koochiching, Lake, Lake of the Woods, and St. Louis counties, within state jurisdiction.
Burning restrictions remain in effect for Cass, Crow Wing, Hubbard, Itasca, Morrison, Todd, and Wadena counties.
In the areas affected by the restrictions:
• No campfires are allowed for dispersed, remote, or back-country camping on all lands;
• Campfires are allowed only in an established fire ring associated with a home, cabin, campground, or resort;
• No fireworks may be ignited on any public or private land outside city limits (check with your municipality for any restrictions within city limits); and
• Burning permits will not be issued for brush or yard waste, nor will existing permits be activated.
The burning restrictions will remain in effect until terminated by the DNR commissioner when weather and environmental conditions indicate a significant reduction in fire danger. Tribal nations regulate

open burning for their communities.
The burning restrictions mean campfires are not allowed for dispersed campers at 40 state forests, and backcountry campfires are not allowed at 26 state parks and recreation areas – even if the backcountry campsite has a fire ring. Camping stoves are permitted. Listing of state forests and state parks under burning restrictions.
Linda Gormanson, burning permit coordinator, said the ongoing drought has created perilous midsummer conditions for wildfires. “The nearly 1,500 wildfires that have occurred in Minnesota since March are

more than we typically see in an entire year,” Gormanson said. “We want people to keep recreating and enjoying the outdoors, but in ways that reduce the risk of igniting a wildfire.”
To date, wildfires have burned 34,106 acres in Minnesota.
Check the DNR statewide fire danger and burning restrictions map and follow the fire prevention tips above. People who spot a wildfire should call 911.

As drought continues, risk of equipment-caused wildfire increases

With the ongoing drought increasing the risk of wildfire in northern Minnesota, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources urges off-road vehicle, heavy equipment and agricultural operators to be cautious in these dry conditions, as they could unintentionally a spark a fire.
Equipment use is a major cause of wildfires every year, but Minnesota's wildland fire management agencies report an uptick in recent weeks of equipment-caused wildfires due to extremely dry grasses and brush.
“Proper equipment use includes knowing the fire danger condition before you operate and making appropriate adjustments or delays to your planned activities,” said Ben Lang, Bemidji Area Forestry assistant supervisor.
Lang said it takes about 500 degrees to start a wildfire in the summer, and that exhaust systems on both road and recreational vehicles can reach temperatures of more than 1,000 degrees. “Use good judgement, avoid parking or operating in tall grasses or brush where exhaust systems could ignite vegetation, and keep ATVs on the trail,” he said.
In addition, various farm, construction, logging, welding, and lawn equipment have an assortment of belts, chains, buckets and blades capable of creating sparks when they hit against rocks or hard surfaces.
In northwestern Minnesota, mowing and haying activity is ongoing, and the coming wheat harvest later this month also brings concern for potential wildfire, especially as July and August are typically drier months.
Lang encourages the follow-

ing tactics to keep equipment from turning into fire starters:
• Make sure equipment has undergone maintenance and is fire safe, including use of an approved spark arrester on all internal combustion-powered equipment.
• When hauling equipment, take care to ensure trailer chains are not dragging, as this can create sparks on roadways.
• Always check current fire danger conditions at the DNR statewide fire danger and burning restrictions map and adjust or postpone operations as necessary.

Arts Grants applications have August 1 deadline

Applications are open for Arts Project Grants and Arts Legacy Grants. Grants are awarded to nonprofit arts organizations, communities, schools, individuals and other nonprofit organizations. Applications are being accepted from our seven county Minnesota service area including Kittson, Marshall, Norman, Pennington, Polk, Red Lake and Roseau counties.
Arts Legacy Grants is a main category for funding artistic activity within the seven-county service region. Funding can be used for Arts Projects, Arts Equipment, General Support, Public Art Projects and Arts Events in northwest Minnesota.
Arts Project Grants are used primarily for small budget arts projects and the sponsorship of performances of touring companies and artists. These grants are a maximum of \$3,000.00 with a required cash match.
Applications funded through these two very important grant opportunities include festivals, community theatre projects, folk music entertainment, sponsorship of visual demonstrations, creative writing workshops and many other activities that improve the quality of life of people in our communities.

Schools in our seven-county region can also apply now for an Artist Residency grant of \$2,100 plus an additional \$400 if the residency needs supplies. Our teaching artist roster online is a great resource to view artists available to teach in our area. Go to our www.NorthwestMinnesotaArtsCouncil.org website and click teaching artist roster on the left navigation bar. Another resource to view artists available to enhance curriculum is COMPAS.
Also available on a first come-first served basis are Quick Turn Around Grants for \$500. These grants can be used for missed gigs and income due to the pandemic. Use the Quick Turn Around application in the Individual Artist grants. See our website for more information and to apply.

USDA accepting applications to help low-income individuals and families buy or repair homes

USDA Rural Development is accepting applications for very low- and low-income individuals and families seeking to purchase or repair a home in a rural area.
The Direct Home Loan program offers financing to qualified very-low and low-income applicants that are unable to qualify for traditional financing. No down payment is required, and the interest rate could be as low as one percent with a subsidy. Applicants must meet income and credit guidelines and demonstrate repayment ability. The program is available in rural communities of generally 35,000 people or less.
The Repair program has a maximum loan amount is \$20,000 at a one percent interest rate, repayable for a 20-year

term and can be used to improve or modernize homes and do essential repairs. Grants of up to \$7,500 are available to homeowners 62 and older and must be used to remove health or safety hazards, such as fixing a leaking roof, installing indoor plumbing, or replacing a furnace.
Contact a USDA Rural Development Housing Specialist in your area today, to see if you qualify.
USDA Rural Development loans and grants provide assistance that supports infrastructure improvements; business development; housing; community services such as schools, public safety and health care; and high-speed internet access in rural areas. For more information, visit www.rd.usda.gov/mn.
