Grygla School Board votes to renew/increase referendum and asks voters for approval on a boiler system bond issue

The Grygla school board, at its regular meeting on Thursday, August 19th, voted unanimously to renew and increase their current referendums during the general election in November. In addition, the board also voted to go to the district taxpayers for approval on a boiler system replacement. The current boiler system is nearing 50 years of age. The present referendum is scheduled to run out at the end of the 21-22 school year.

What are referendums and how do they work? Since 1971, Minnesota schools have been financed by receiving a set dollar amount per pupil. The more pupils you have, the more revenue your school receives. Even though there have been numerous minor changes to this concept, the basis of school funding is still based on the number of pupils in your school. Operating referendums tax only homeowners and up to 1 acre of homesteaded land. Agricultural and Seasonal Recreation land are NOT taxed in an operating referendum. Presently, the pupils in a school are weighted. Kindergarten students are weighted at .5 because they have historically attended Kindergarten half time. Elementary students (Gr. 1-6) are counted as approximately 1.0 units while a student in grades 7-12 is counted as 1.2 units. The rationale behind the larger high school unit is that high school students are more expensive to educate due to higher costing curriculum, equipment, and facilities. A school district multiplies the number of pupil units in attendance by the per pupil dollar amount set by the MN legislature. Presently, the per pupil amount is \$6567. As an example, our school will receive approximately \$919,380 in general education funding for the 2021-22 school year (140 students x \$6567). Even though there are smaller, additional revenue sources beyond the basic revenue; schools often find themselves with expenditures that are higher than the

revenues they receive. At this point, schools generally have only two things they can do: a) cut costs, or b) raise additional revenue. The only way schools can raise additional revenue is to go to the district’s voters and ask permission to raise taxes. Our current operating referendum is set at \$212/student, and we are asking our taxpayers to approve an increase to \$460/student, which would also maximize state aid. On a \$100,000 house this increase would cost a homeowner \$58 in additional taxes per year.

Our school district has planned for future decreases in enrollment, and saved considerable tax dollars in doing so. For reference, during the 2013-14 school year, our school had an enrollment of 153 students. During the 2021-22 school year, we are anticipating an enrollment of 135 students. If we consider that all 13 students left at the end of the 2013-14 school year, that would be lost revenue of approximately \$85,000 per year over the next 7 years, totalling \$598,000 in lost general education revenue alone over the 7 year span. However, because of our district’s forward thinking, we have managed to maintain a fund balance that looks very similar to the 2013-14 fund balance.

We are asking our taxpayers to renew that \$212 per student in question #1, which would have no tax impact, and in a question #3, to approve an increase to \$460/student, which would also maximize state aid., and approve our bond issue, which I will discuss further in next week’s article.

An Omelette Grilled Cheese - the most delicious breakfast sandwich you didn't even know you'd been waiting for.

Ingredients:
3 eggs, beaten
1/4 cup red bell pepper, chopped
1/4 cup cheddar cheese, shredded
1/8 cup green onion
1/4 cup bacon, cooked and chopped
1/4 cup spinach, chopped
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 slices sourdough bread

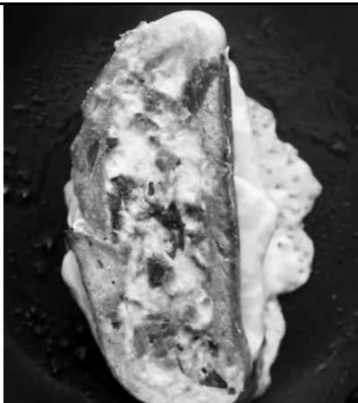
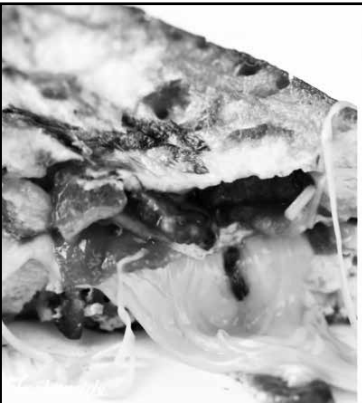
2 tablespoons butter
3 slices colby jack cheese

Instructions:

In a mixing bowl, add beaten eggs, peppers, cheese, green onion, bacon, spinach, salt and pepper. Mix until combined.

Cut out the center of the bread slices, leaving only the crust. Heat butter in a large nonstick pan. Place bread slices in pan and fill each piece with egg mixture.

Cook about 3 minutes and flip. Cook an additional 3 minutes. Add cheese to 1 slice of bread. Top with remaining slice and place a lid over the pan to melt cheese. Remove from heat and serve.



FSA Livestock Forage Disaster Program available for pasture losses

Local Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Offices want to make producers aware that livestock producers in all counties in NW MN are now eligible to apply for 2021 Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) benefits on pasture crops. LFP does not pay for production losses to other forage crops such as Alfalfa, Mixed Forage Hay, etc. LFP provides compensation if you suffer grazing losses for covered livestock due to drought on privately owned or cash leased land.

Eligible livestock include: Adult beef cows or bulls, Non-adult beef cattle, Adult beef-alo cows or bulls, Non-adult beefalo, Adult buffalo or bison cows or bulls, Non-adult buffalo or bison, Adult dairy cows or bulls, Non-adult dairy cattle,

Sheep, Goats, Alpacas, Deer, Elk, Emu, Equine, Llamas, and Reindeer.

Unweaned non-adult beef cattle, beefalo, buffalo, bison, or dairy cattle are not considered grazing animals as defined and are not eligible for LFP.

You must complete a CCC-853 LFP application for payment and submit the required supporting documentation by no later than January 31, 2022, for 2021 losses.

ELAP covers losses from additional cost of transporting water to livestock

Local FSA County Offices want to make producers aware that if you've incurred additional operating costs for transporting water to livestock due to an eligible drought, assistance may be available to you through the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP).

An eligible drought means that part or all of your county is designated D3 (extreme drought) or higher as indicated by the U.S. Drought Monitor. All Counties in NW MN are currently at D 3 on the U.S. Drought Monitor so ELAP assistance is available for transporting water.

Eligible livestock must be adult or non-adult dairy cattle, beef cattle, buffalo and beefalo, as well as alpacas, deer, elk, emus, equine, goats, llamas, reindeer, or sheep. Additionally, the livestock must have been owned 60 calendar days prior to the beginning of the drought and be physically located in the county designated as a disaster area due to drought.

Adequate livestock watering systems or facilities must have existed before the drought occurred and producers are only eligible if they do not normally transport water to the livestock.

Livestock that were or would have been in a feedlot are not eligible for transporting water. ELAP covers the additional cost of transporting water and does not cover the cost

of the water itself.

You must file a notice of Loss on form CCC-851 within 30 calendar days of when the loss is apparent to you. Producers can file a an ELAP Notice of Loss by telephoning their local FSA County Office.

Additionally, the deadline to submit an application for payment for 2020 ELAP assistance is Jan. 31, 2022.

Producers will need to provide documentation to FSA that shows the method used to transport the water, the number of gallons of water transported and the number of eligible livestock to which water was transported when the application for payment is filed.

Documentation could be, but not limited to, a ledger indicating the dates water was hauled, location(s) hauled from, location(s) hauled to, number and type livestock, and quantity of gallons hauled. Producers who are transporting the water themselves should also have available a listing of equipment used in the process and hours committed daily to transporting water.

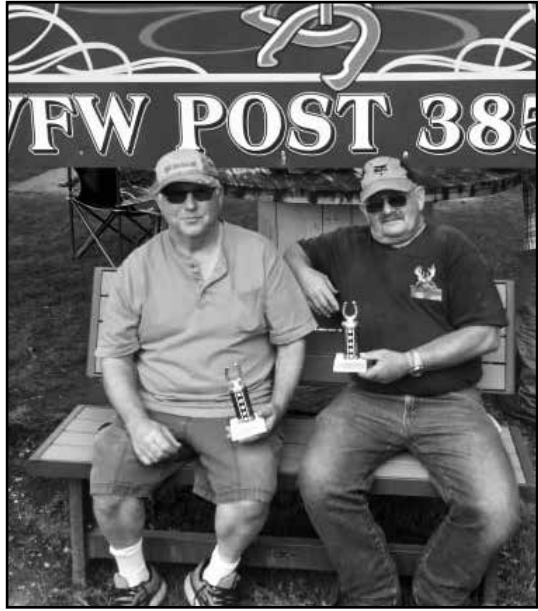
