Grygla School sets public meeting for September 28

In order to answer specific questions from the community regarding the upcoming referendum and bond vote, the Grygla School has set a public meeting for Tuesday, September 28th at 7:00 in the big gym.

This meeting will consist of two parts. First, a brief presentation will be given by Superintendent Lunsetter, the school's engineering firm, Architectural Resources Incorporated and the school's financial team from Ehler's Financial. Superintendent Lunsetter will give a brief overview of what the process has been in making this decision. Architectural Resources will highlight the reasons why a new boiler system is necessary, as well as discussing our ten year facilities maintenance plan (LTFM). Finally, Ehler's will discuss the funding mechanisms available

to our schools, what the local taxpayers responsibilities are and how state aid works.

Following the presentation, Ehler's and Architectural Resources conduct "breakout" sessions, where they will be available to answer individual questions. The school board will also be available to answer any questions the public may have. In next week's article, Superintendent Lunsetter will be discussing the funding that the school has received to fight COVID, and how that is different from an operating referendum and a bond issue. Grygla School looks forward to seeing everybody out on September 28th, and in the meantime, if you have any questions, don't hesitate to contact your school board members, Jamie Lunsetter or Derek Gieseke. Northern Lights fishing report

On this week's report, goose hunting is over and grouse has just begun. This past week I found myself giving up on goose hunting with the lack of birds and switching my attention to cranes and some grouse hunting in the evening.

Saturday morning came around and we were ready for the cranes. It was quickly shot down as the birds did their own thing and did not come in. We strained a few and they went sailing away.

We decided to go for some sharp tail and what not. We walked 5.5 miles for 1 ruffle. We only flushed one grouse. Hopefully this isn't an indication of what's to come. Sunday morning, we tried the cranes again and this time they did it perfectly. I decided to use my dad's old double barrel 20g. It was my first duck gun. The first flock of geese came in and I mistakenly pulled both triggers. I knocked one down and my buddy got another. Then we had some more geese in, and I was just about to call the shot on a pair when I saw the unmistakable look of 3 cranes coming in on a string. I told my buddy to hold - we have 3 cranes dead center. At 10 yards I called it and this time there was no mistake. This time I pulled both triggers and dropped one dead and knocked the other down; my buddy got the 3rd one. My second crane stood up, I grabbed my other gun and put him back down. I learned my lesson from last year to just finish them off and avoid the fight. After a while, we had 8 more cranes on the deck low and heading right for us. I told my buddy, "This is your shot." At 15 yards I called it and he dropped one on the

first shot. He was ecstatic and crane hunting's becoming one of our favorite hunts. Now we have to get more decoys for it.

To the fishing part - Lake of the Woods is steadily getting better and you don't have to go as far if you don't want to. The blinker (in 15' give or take) has been producing more keepers than anything. Trolling a crawler or a crank has remained the best, but the jig bite should pick up as the fall goes on. There have been reports that there are some large schools of baitfish in shallow, 8'-15'. This applies from the blinker to swift and the sandbar as well. South tip has been decent, same depths and tactic. The biggest thing is to locate fish or the bait fish and work the area for active walleye. No matter what area, it seems that on the south side it's been working. Especially along drop offs and structure.

Good luck to anyone heading out this coming weekend. I will be hitting the sloughs for the elusive duck for the opener this weekend. I still plan on getting ice fishing stuff up in November and may put a rod or two up there as well. I will also be donating two ice rods for the benefit at the school on October 16th.

Good luck again this weekend and stay safe.

Individual Artists apply by October 1 for \$5,000

Grant money is available from the Northwest Minnesota Arts Council. Grants are awarded to performing artists, visual artists, media artists, and creative writing artists from our seven county Minnesota service area including Kittson, Marshall, Norman, Pennington, Polk, Red Lake and Roseau counties.

To be eligible you must be out of high school and at least 18 years of age. College tuition is not an eligible expense. This is the main category that individuals use to support their artistic business or advance their technical skills. This category is for non-hobby artists who make substantial yearly income from their art. Grants are awarded annually with \$1,500 going to four individuals and \$5,000

going to four individuals. Support for this program comes from The McKnight Foundation. The deadline is October 1 for \$5,000 level applicants and November 15th for \$1,500 level applicants.

You absolutely must reside in our region (for one year prior) and remain living in our region during your entire grant year (2022). In the case of college students, your school or your home mailing address must be in our region. You will have to show proof of residency, usually your driver's license.

Also available on a first come-first served basis are Quick Turn Around Grants for \$500. These grants can be used for artistic training, arts marketing, and equipment purchases related to creating a

body of artistic work, as well as recent loss of income from canceled gigs, due to the pandemic. Use the Quick Turn Around Grant application in the Individual Artist grants.

The grant application process is conveniently online and NWMAC's Executive Director Mara Hanel can help walk you through the process of using the grants portal. Only in Minnesota: a weekly feature in the Eagle

Minnesota is home to the world's largest black bear sanctuary

Minnesota is home to many fascinating wildlife species. Endangered Canada Lynx prowl northern forests. Unique plants, such as lady's slippers, sprout up in wildflower fields. And our state bird – the common loon – is unique among a map riddled with robins and cardinals. Many of our most interesting species are elusive, but it's still possible to see them up close. One example is the black bear. To catch a glimpse of these shy creatures, you don't have to go to a zoo. Instead, take a trip to the world's largest black bear sanctuary. It's located right here in Minnesota. Vince Shute Wildlife Sanctuary is located in Orr, Minnesota. That's about 100 miles north of Duluth, deep in the Kabetogama State Forest.

Operated by the American Bear Association, the sanctuary is the ideal place to safely see wild black bears. The promise of food keeps the bears coming back year after year. On your visit, you will first turn off of the scenic Nett Lake Road to drive about a mile down a gravel road. This leads to the sanctuary parking lot.



From there, a shuttle bus will take you the rest of the way. Because the bears are wild, it's important to keep cars far from their sanctuary habitat. You'll be dropped off at a viewing platform above the sanctuary area.

On the deck, volunteers will be able to answer any questions you may have about the sanctuary or the bears. Then, get looking! You'll definitely want to bring a camera, and maybe even binoculars.

In addition to the bears, the surrounding forest is home to many other wildlife species. Nature lovers will feel at home in the peaceful surroundings.

Of course, bears are the main event here. From the observation deck, you'll likely be able to spot quite a few bears going about their daily business.

Some will be sleeping or eating. If you're lucky, you'll get to see the bears at playtime. If you visit the sanctuary at the right time, you'll have the chance to see bear cubs! They are common in the early summer - and adorable year-round.

Vince Shute Wildlife Sanctuary is located at 12541 Nett Lake Road in Orr, Minnesota.

My daughter also needed a non-fiction book for school. She had me order in *My Story* by Elizabeth Smart. She is interested to learn more about the 2002 abduction told directly by Elizabeth Smart herself. I have also read this book (and went



to see Elizabeth Smart share her story live a few years ago). It's a story that'll definitely stick with you. Anyway, it's fun to see our young readers coming in and requesting specific books. I love that.

Next up, Jordan had some time to kill so he came in and took advantage of the quiet space and free Wi-Fi to get some homework done! He had his laptop with him, but we've also got two computers for public use if anyone needs.

Moving along to my book suggestions for this week. I want to specifically give our young readers some titles to consider. I would say these are geared more towards a 3rd-4th grade reading level. These are four older, classic novels that still make the top of the list.

Tales of a Fourth Grade Nothing by Judy Blume: Living with his little brother, Fudge, makes Peter Hatcher feel like a fourth grade nothing. Whether Fudge is throw-

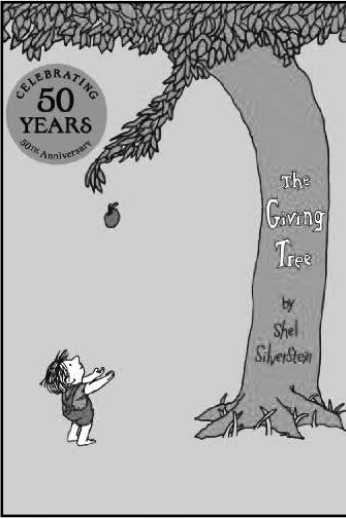
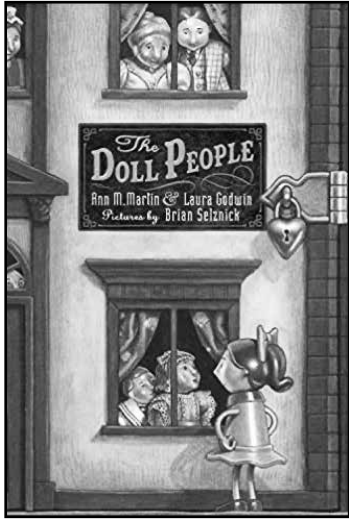
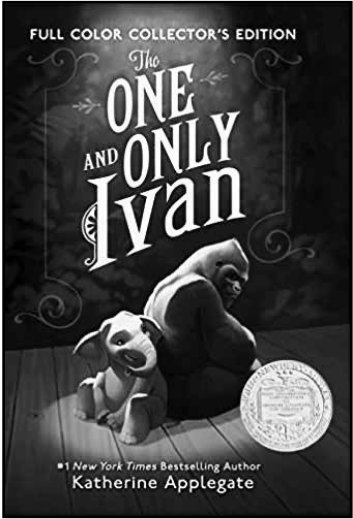
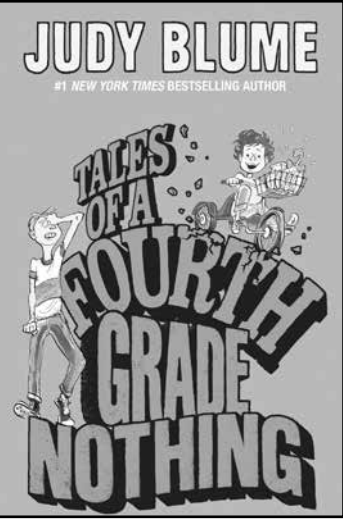
ing a temper tantrum in a shoe store, smearing smashed potatoes on walls at Hamburger Heaven, or scribbling all over Peter's homework, he's never far from trouble. He's a two-year-old terror who gets away with everything-and Peter's had enough. He's put up with Fudge too long. How can he get his parents to pay attention to him for a change? Sibling rivalry is one theme in this book, but another is love of family. This book also shows us that one way to deal with problems is through a sense of humor.

The One and Only Ivan by Katherine Applegate: This unforgettable novel celebrates the transformative power of unexpected friendship. Inspired by the true story of a captive gorilla known as Ivan, this book is told from the point of view of Ivan himself. Having spent twenty-seven years behind the glass walls of his enclosure in a shopping mall, Ivan has grown accustomed to humans watching him. He hardly ever thinks about his life in the jungle. Instead, Ivan occupies himself with television, his friends Stella and Bob, and painting. But when he meets Ruby, a baby elephant taken from the wild, he is forced to see their home, and his art, through new eyes. Applegate blends humor and poignancy to create an unforgettable story of friendship, art, and hope.

The Doll People by Ann M. Marlin and Laura Godwin: Annabelle Doll is 8 years old - and has been for over 100 years. Nothing much has

changed in the dollhouse during that time, except for the fact that 45 years ago, Annabelle's Auntie Sarah disappeared from the dollhouse without a trace. After all this time, restless Annabelle is becoming more and more curious about her aunt's fate. And when she discovers Auntie Sarah's old diary, she becomes positively driven. Her cautious family tries to discourage her, but Annabelle won't be stopped, even though she risks Permanent Doll State, in which she could turn into a regular, nonliving doll. And when the "Real Pink Plastic" Funcraft family moves in next door, the Doll family's world is turned upside down - in more ways than one! Readers will love this exciting story of adventure and mystery. The relationship between the two doll families, one antique, one modern, is hilariously, wonderfully drawn.

The Giving Tree by Shel Silverstein: So begins a story of unforgettable perception. Every day the boy would come to the tree to eat her apples, swing from her branches, or slide down her trunk...and the tree was happy. But as the boy grew older he began to want more from the tree, and the tree gave and gave and gave. This is a tender story, touched with sadness, aglow with consolation. Shel Silverstein has created a moving parable for readers of all ages that offers an affecting interpretation of the gift of giving and a serene acceptance of another's capacity to love in return.

Slow Cooker Pumpkin Spice Hot Chocolate

A few years ago I shared a recipe for Crockpot Pumpkin Spice Lattes. They were a hit at a meeting I brought them too. But I know not everyone loves the strong flavor of coffee or pumpkin (that recipe calls for actual pumpkin puree) so I found a similar recipe that will be SIMPLY DELICIOUS on these cooler fall nights. Pumpkin Spice Hot Chocolate. I know what you're thinking – how does pumpkin go with chocolate? Trust me. IT DEFINITELY DOES. You can top this recipe with marshmallows, whipped cream or both!

You'll need to grab your slow cooker and get busy with the following ingredients:

- 24 oz. milk chocolate chips
 - ¼ cup unsweetened cocoa powder
 - ¼ cup sugar
 - 2 tbsp. vanilla extract
 - 1 tbsp. pumpkin pie spice
 - 1 gallon whole milk
- Add everything to the slow cooker and stir. Cover and cook

on high for 2-3 hours, stirring occasionally.

Note: If you don't have any pumpkin pie spice, you can easily make your own using 2 tsp. cinnamon, ¼ tsp. nutmeg and a dash of cloves. Also, this makes a full crockpot that is very hard to travel with – trust me on that. I suggest making it on site. You can always heat up your milk in the microwave to speed up the process if needed.

Volleyball falls short last week

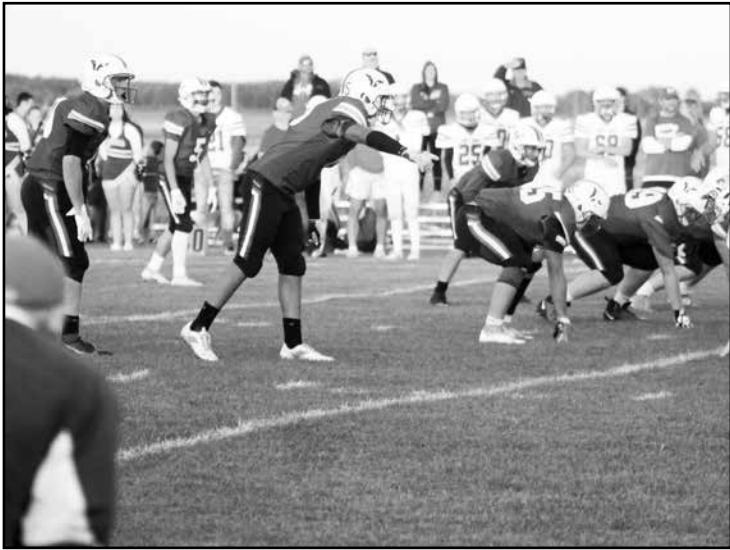
Charger's Volleyball had two games last week vs. Clearbrook/Gonvick and Roseau and came up short against both teams.
