A special moment of true sportsmanship on the football field



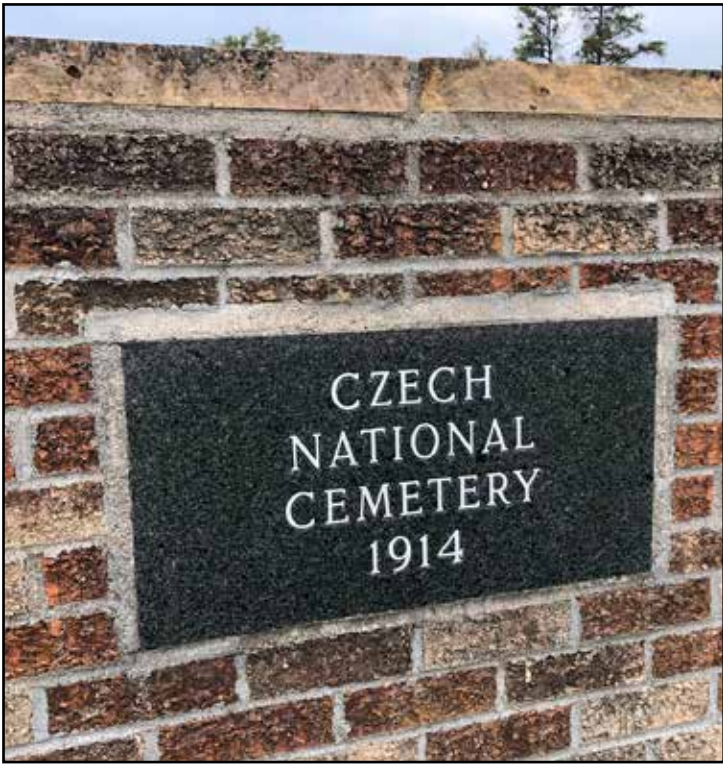

Mail-in ballots for Grygla School District vote

The Marshall County Auditor's office was preparing to mail ballots to all Grygla School District voters around October 1st. Many of you potentially already have the ballots. In previous articles, I've discussed the need for the ballot measure that we are bringing to the voters. In this article I'll be discussing more specifics about the ballot itself, and the measures.

Question #1 is asking to renew our existing referendum. This question does not raise your taxes, only allows the school district to continue receiving the tax revenue that was approved in 2011. If you wish to renew the school district's current referendum, vote yes to this question.

Question #2 is asking for the district's ability to issue bonds to replace the fifty year old boiler system. If you wish to allow the district to issue bonds, your property tax will increase (I've detailed these specifics in previous articles). If you wish to allow the district to issue bonds for the boiler system, vote yes

to this question.

Question #3 is asking to increase the operating referendum. This will add approximately \$40,000 in revenue annually for the school. This will also increase property taxes (This has also been detailed in previous articles). If you wish to allow the school district to increase the operating referendum, vote yes to this question. It's important to note that if you're intention is to vote yes to question #3, you must also vote yes to question #1.

Once you've received your mail-in ballot, you can fill it out and return it in the pre-addressed envelope. The ballots must be postmarked by October 19th, 2021. The votes will be counted on the evening of November 2nd. Recordings of the Tuesday, September 28th Community Information Meeting are available on the Grygla School website and Garden Valley TV. It's October, witches.

This week's column contains beautiful, witchy, autumn vibes as I share with you a book series suggestion. Let's dive into Alice Hoffman's Practical Magic series, shall we?

Made up of four books, the series starts with Practical

Magic (Book 1) that was written back in 1995. (You've maybe seen the movie that came out a few years later? Starring Nicole Kidman and Sandra Bullock? Yes. That one.

Let's start with Practical Magic.

For more than two hundred years, the Owens women have been blamed for everything

that has gone wrong in their Massachusetts town. Gillian and Sally have endured that fate as well: as children, the sisters were forever outsiders, taunted, talked about, pointed at. Their elderly aunts almost seemed to encourage the whispers of witchery, with their musty house and their exotic concoctions and their crowd of black cats. But all Gillian and Sally wanted was to escape. One will do so by marrying, the other by running away. But the bonds they share will bring them back—almost as if by magic...

The Owens sisters confront the challenges of life and love in this bewitching novel from the New York Times bestselling author of *The Rules of Magic*, *Magic Lessons*, and *The Book of Magic*.

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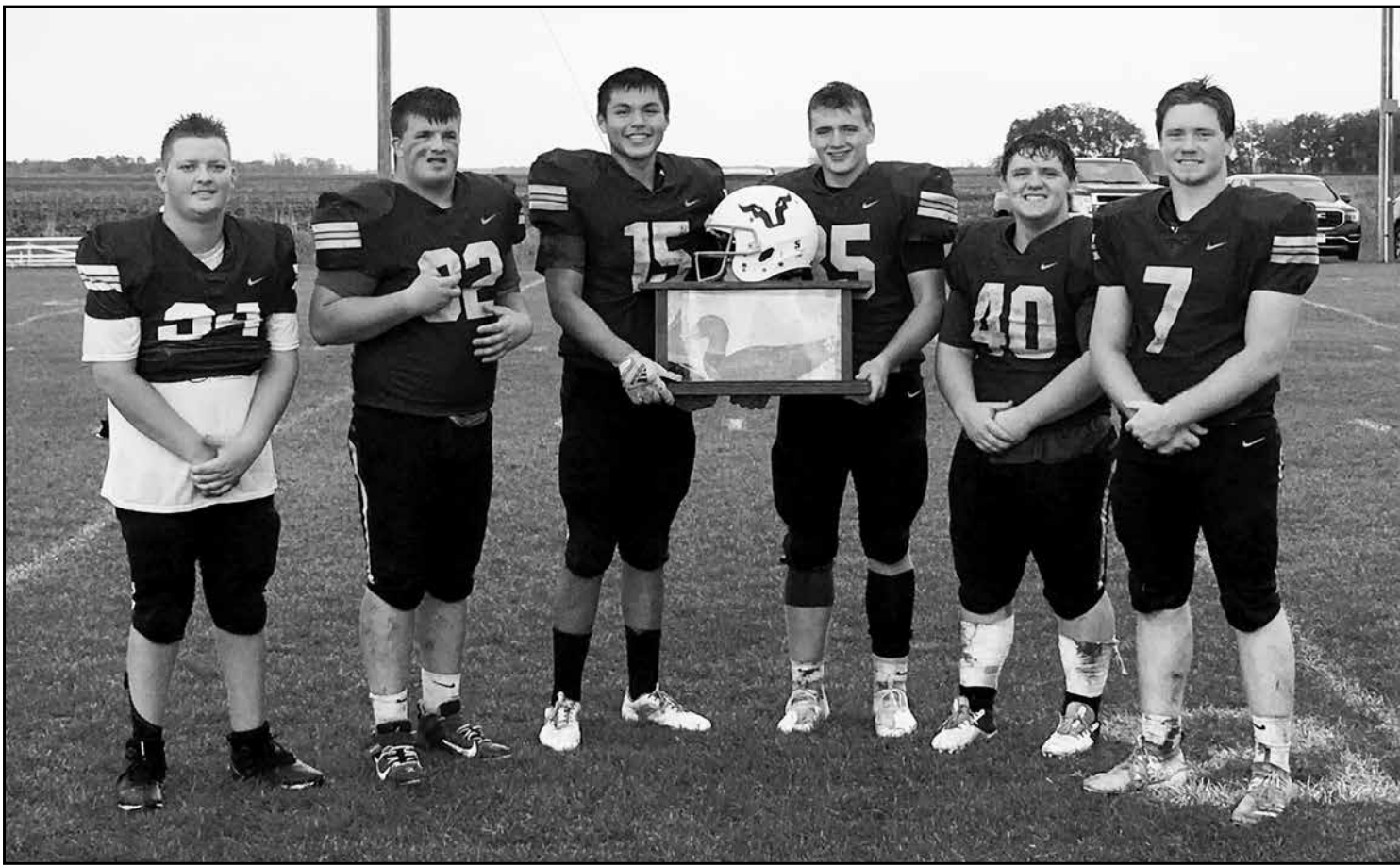

Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety

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National Fire Prevention Week is October 3-9

This year's National Fire Prevent Week campaign, "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety!" works to educate everyone about the different sounds the smoke and carbon monoxide alarms make. Knowing what to do when an alarm sounds will keep you and your family safe. When an alarm makes noises – a beeping sound or a chirping sound – you must take action.

What if someone in my home is deaf or hard of hearing?
 There are smoke alarms and alert devices that alert people who are deaf or hard of hearing. These devices include strobe lights that flash to alert people when the smoke alarm sounds. Pillow or bed shakers designed to work with your smoke alarm also can be purchased and installed.

What is your alarm telling you?
SMOKE ALARMS
 A continued set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep—means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
 A single "chirp" every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
 All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
 Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARMS
 A continuous set of four loud beeps—beep, beep, beep, beep—means carbon monoxide is present in your home. Go outside, call 9-1-1 and stay out.
 A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be replaced.
 CO alarms also have "end of life" sounds that vary by manufacturer. This means it's time to get a new CO alarm.

Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

Make sure your smoke alarms and CO alarms meets the needs of everyone in your home, including those with sensory or physical abilities.

Some tips:
 Install a bedside alert device that responds to the sound of the smoke and CO alarms. Use of a low frequency alarm can also wake a sleeping person with mild to severe hearing loss.
 Sleep with your mobility device, glasses and phone close to your bed.
 Keep pathway like hallways lit with night lights and free from clutter to make sure everyone can get out safely.

About Fire Prevention Week
 Since 1922, the NFPA has sponsored the public observance of Fire Prevention Week. In 1925, President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed Fire Prevention Week a national observance, making it the longest-running public health observance in our country. During Fire Prevention Week, children, adults, and teachers learn how to stay safe in case of a fire. Firefighters provide lifesaving public education in an effort to drastically decrease casualties caused by fires.

Fire Prevention Week is observed each year during the week of October 9th in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire, which began on October 8, 1871, and caused devastating damage. This horrific conflagration killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures, and burned more than 2,000 acres of land.
