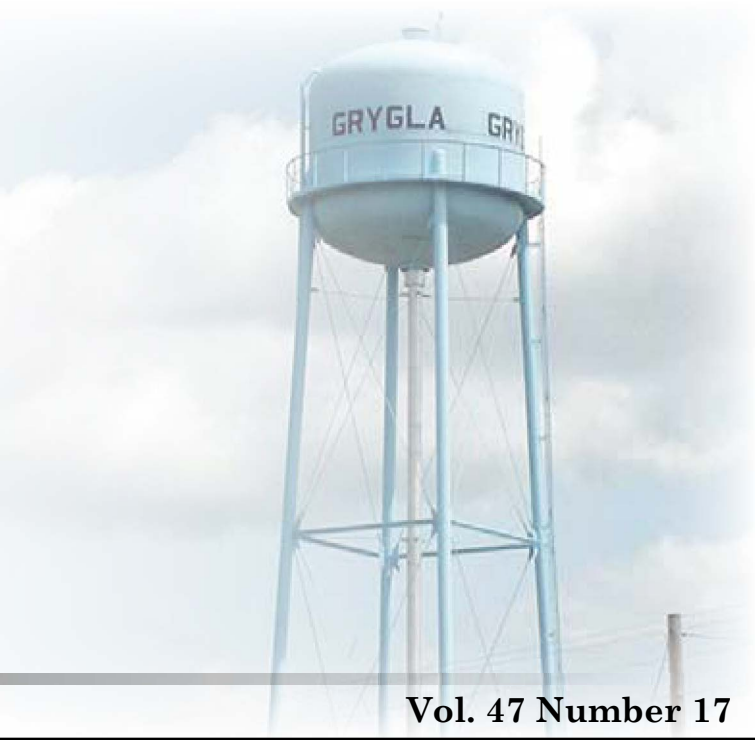

Roaring to Recovery Benefit brings in over \$18,000, to be split between two local families

Northwest Minnesota came together on Saturday and raised over \$18,000 to be split between two local families whose children are both in the fight against cancer - Dylan Wichterman and Alex Gullingsrud.

Dylan is the 13-year-old son of Jennifer and Ryan Wichterman. He was recently diagnosed with Brain Cancer, underwent surgery and is now recovering and receiving treatment at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester.

Alex is the 8-year-old son of Mike and Nicole Gullingsrud. He was recently diagnosed with Osteosarcoma and has been undergoing chemotherapy treatments at the Mayo Clinic. Both families still face many trips back and forth to Rochester.

A "Roaring to Recovery" benefit was held at the Grygla School last Saturday as many came together to rally behind the two fami-

lies. It was held in conjunction with the Frostbite Volleyball tournament, bringing in much support from all areas of the region.

The day began with volleyball competitions on the court, along with live auctions, silent auctions, 50/50 drawings, and a smoked beef brisket meal.

The benefit couldn't have happened without area schools, teams and communities all helping: Northern Freeze (Marshall County Central & Tri-County); Fertile-Beltrami; Warroad; Badger-Greenbush-Middle River; Red Lake Falls; Red Lake County Central (Oklee/Plummer); Win-E-Mac; Stephen/Argyle Central; Sacred Heart-East Grand Forks; Goodridge-Grygla, along with many other businesses and individuals throughout NW Minnesota and beyond.

Marie Wick Memorial

Marie Wick, born and raised in Grygla over 100 years ago, was brutally murdered in a Fargo hotel when she took a trip to visit her aunt. The story has generated much curiosity online after a 4-part podcast was recently released detailing the tragic events that unfolded on June 7th, 1921.

The Grygla Eagle Newspaper will run a full-length story on Marie Wick: The Girl in Room 30 in next week's Eagle.

However, a memorial has been organized by various Grygla community members for Sunday, October 30th, 3pm, at the Valley Cemetery where Marie is buried.

October is recognized as Violence Prevention & Awareness month. If anyone would like to make a donation to the Marie Wick Memorial, all proceeds will go to the Violence Intervention Program in Thief River Falls, Minn.

October is Domestic Violence Prevention and Awareness month

This year's DVAM theme is #Every1KnowsSome1 to highlight the fact that domestic violence can happen to anyone and is more prevalent than people realize. More prevalent than most realize, one in four women and one in seven men will experience domestic violence in their lifetimes. Anyone, regardless of age, gender, race, sexual identity or orientation, or socio-economic status, can become a victim of domestic violence. This year's campaign theme strives to highlight how common domestic violence is and that it is more than physical violence.

Abuse occurs in any kind of relationship; in the family, legally married or separated, dating or living with someone of the same sex or opposite sex.

Domestic violence thrives in silence. To be able to support and help victims and survivors, and to prevent domestic violence in the future, we all need to talk about it. And to talk about domestic violence, we need others to fully understand what it is. Domestic violence is any type of action or behavior that physically and/or emotionally hurts another person that is not an accident and is used to establish and maintain power and control over another person. This includes any behaviors that frighten, intimidate, terrorize, manipulate, hurt, humiliate, blame, or injure someone. It may be physical abuse, threats, intimidation, sexual abuse, emotional/mental abuse, stalking, financial abuse, technology abuse or destruction of your property. Signs of abuse include:

- Threatens to hurt you, your children, or other people you care about

- Hit, kick, punch, push, choke or use physical force against you
- Criticize or blames you for everything that goes wrong
- Humiliates you in front of other people
- Controls your access to money
- Controls the decision-making in your relationship
- Controls your time and actions
- Put you down, calls you names, make you feel like you're crazy
- Breaks your stuff or abuses your pets
- Threatens to hurt you or themselves or commit suicide if you leave
- Forces or coerces you to have sex when you don't want to

You are not alone, help is available. VIP advocacy services are available 24/7. If you or someone you know needs support, call the confidential 24-hour crisis line at 800-660-6667. Callers may remain anonymous. Other resources are the National Domestic Violence line at 1-800-799-7233 or Pennington County Victim Services at 218-681-0881.

We all can help. Learn about domestic violence, the dynamics of abuse, why it may be difficult to leave, and how to prevent abuse from happening. If you are concerned someone is in an abusive situation, have the courage to ask about their well-being in a supportive, non-judgmental way. Some people may not be ready to seek help right away, it's important to be patient with

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Northern Lights fishing report

On this week's report: wet and muddy. This past Thursday I found myself on another solo mission, this time the target was a soybean field loaded with geese. After all the rain we had, the field had some sheet water and looked to be a mess. So, I dawned on my waders and grabbed my layout chair and hit the field with 6 dozen decoys in tow. My plan was to lay under the decoys. The morning was misty and foggy. The first goose whipped into the decoys so fast I had to sit up and look for the little cackler. I found and shot him. The rest of the morning was filled with weary birds that were decoying wrong and what not. In all I did get my 5 geese. It was a good workout, I was covered in mud, but more was to come.

Friday and Saturday brought fun little duck hunts filled with bigger ducks and a couple more geese. Sunday the game plan was another muddy soybean field that was loaded, but it didn't go as planned. We showed up made the long track out, totaling 6 tenths of a mile. The geese, on the other hand, failed to show back up. As the cold morning warmed up, the field got worse and worse. We got more of a workout than we had bargained for. In all, the migration is starting, and the best is to come. I look forward to the cold, snowy mornings.

On the fishing side of things,

the lake hasn't changed much. The bite is going good - lots of little and big ones being caught with a few keepers. In the Warroad area, the blinker and sandbar continue to produce more fish. The magic depths seem to be 8'-15' and the bait of choice is a draw between jig and shiner and crawlers yet.

Good luck out this coming week. And good luck to all the youth hunters.

Essentia Health stresses importance of flu shots

Ahead of a flu season that many health experts believe could be severe, Essentia Health is offering several options for flu shots.

Flu vaccines are recommended for anyone six months of age and older. They are covered by most insurance and are one of the best ways to protect yourself and loved ones from influenza. "Last year's flu season was mild due in part to social distancing, reduced travel and masking," says Dr. Aaron Philipps, an infectious disease physician at Essentia Health. "Less cases of influenza last year means less people with boosted immunity this year. And less immunity this year puts us at high risk for increased infections, hospitalizations and deaths."

Dr. Philipps then noted the importance of getting immunized as a way to avoid further stressing the region's hospitals, which already are operating at or near capacity thanks to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"If we can immunize a significant portion of our population against influenza, we can reduce hospitalizations, allow-

ing us to keep resources available for COVID and other illnesses," he said.

Through Essentia, you can get a flu shot during an upcoming appointment that was already scheduled; at one of our myriad pharmacies offering walk-in availability; or by scheduling an appointment at the Essentia Health clinic nearest you. You can schedule your flu shot via our MyChart patient portal or by calling (844) 663-1068.

At each of our locations, we will take precautions to protect against COVID-19 and other illnesses, including universal masking, encouraging social distancing and performing strict sanitizing procedures.

your support. Abusers will often intentionally isolate their victims from their family and friends so that they no longer have a support system to turn to for help. Don't give up on them. You may be the only person left that they can turn to when they're ready. Let them know they are not alone; they may not think anyone notices or cares. Offer to be with them if they want to call or come to VIP to talk with an Advocate. If you see abuse or know someone who is using abusive behavior, say something. If you don't feel safe addressing their behavior, reach out to someone who can. VIP services are available to anyone who has questions or concerns.

On Saturday, October 23, VIP will hold an art event and candlelight vigil to remember and honor the lives of the victims of Domestic Homicide in MN last year. The event begins at 5:00pm at 246 Kendall Ave N, Thief River Falls, MN 56701. A local artist will assist with creating a mosaic to be featured at the shelter. There will also be an opportunity to create an individual mini-mosaic. The candlelight vigil will begin at dusk and the event

will be done around 7:00pm. Advocates will be on-site for those who may need to process. Children's games and light refreshments will be available. This event will be held outside. Bathrooms will be available.

From October 25-29, the Clothesline Project will be available for viewing at NCTC. This project memorializes victims of domestic homicide with a decorated shirt.

Violence Intervention Project is a community-based victim service agency providing free and confidential advocacy services to all people impacted by domestic, intimate partner, family or sexual violence in Kittson, Marshall, Pennington, Red Lake and Roseau counties. For over 30 years, VIP has served the communities in NW Minnesota by providing a 24/7 crisis line, emergency shelter, information, support, resources and referrals, assistance with civil protection orders, accompaniment to medical exams, court hearings, and law enforcement. VIP provides education services, presentations, support and outreach to schools, organizations, and communities. The Umbrella Tree Children's Safety Center provides supervised visitation and safe exchange of children in a safe and neutral environment.

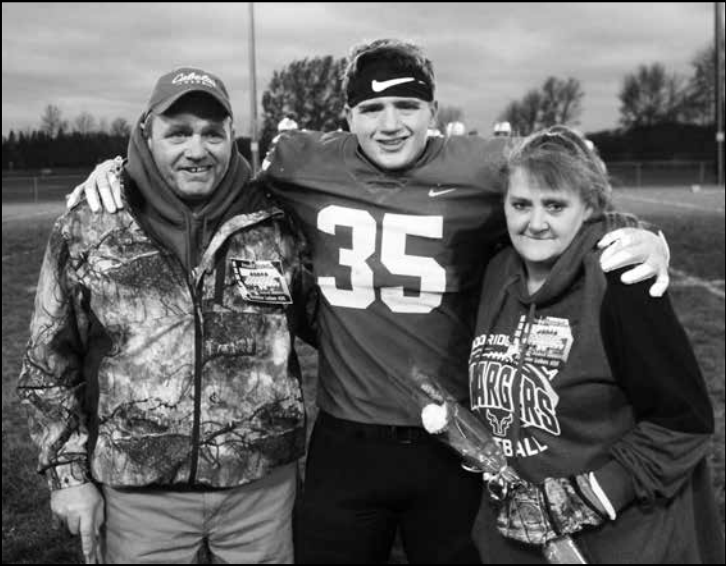
