Northern Lights fishing report

On this week's report, the Home, Sport & Family show has come and gone. This past week, I was busy getting ready for the show, pouring all sorts of jigs, and poured some of the new jigs that I had made for jigging on Lake of the Woods called the Tog jig. Overall, the show went pretty well; lots of vendors and a very good turnout checking out the show.

I have some different jigs and crank baits I will be putting back up at the store as well. Thanks to everyone that stopped by and checked us out!

The new Tog jig

The Tog jig, or as my buddy calls it, the garlic jig, as it looks like a clove of garlic, is a deep sea jig for fishing Sheepshead and Toutog fish, which require a lot of bottom pounding to attract them. They use a whole shrimp or other live bait to jig for them. So basically, the same principle as jigging for walleye without a whole frozen shiner on, leech or live minnow. The design of the jig allows it to always stand up. It has a larger surface area and sharp edges to increase sound from hitting the bottom and lifting silt and mud off the bottom. I will have some of those at the store as well.

As far as the fishing side of things, the Rainy is open past Birchdale and is close to, if

not open, at Frontier landing. I've heard mixed reports about the walleye fishing. The main theme is slow with 2-6 wall-eyes per boat and a couple of sturgeon. The sturgeon they are catching are pretty good size - been seeing a lot over 50".

The walleye catch-and-release season does end on April 15. On the west side of the lake some are still out chasing flags for a chance at a trophy pike. This coming weekend, some turkey seasons open, as well, and it's a good time to walk through the woods looking for sheds.

So, lots of outdoor activities to go and do. I will be heading to South Dakota for Easter and a little fishing off the dock and golf. So come check out the store in a couple of weeks and go enjoy the outdoors! Hopefully we will have some warmer weather coming. Be safe and have a good week.

Bear hunting license applications available

Prospective bear hunters have until Friday, May 6, to apply for a bear hunting license from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. Applications for the 2022 season can be submitted online, at any license agent or via telephone at 888-665-4236.

A total of 3,605 licenses are available in 14 permit areas for the season, which opens Thursday, Sept. 1, and closes Sunday, Oct. 16.

The number of permits available is based on Minnesota's bear population, which has stabilized and started to increase during the past nine years because of more conservative permit quotas. Populations in nearly all bear permit areas are stable to increasing. Several permit areas in northern Minnesota require additional permit reductions to stabilize their populations.

Notable changes for the 2022 season

After conversations with the Red Lake Nation, DNR split Minnesota's Northwest Angle off into its own bear permit area, creating permit area 14. Bear hunting has occurred in the Northwest Angle for decades, but the area was part of permit area 12, which is directly to the south.

Differing landscape, population dynamics, vegetation and food resources, as well as concerns about increased bear and human interactions, prompted the split. The new permit area provides the DNR greater flexibility to develop hunting strategies specific to the Northwest Angle's bear population and control hunting pressure in response to the local bear population.

For 2022, DNR is offering a small number of hunting permits in the Northwest Angle, reflecting a status-quo level of harvest for the first year of this new area.

The DNR also has modified the boundaries of permit areas 28 and 47 to follow the Leech Lake Reservation boundary. This change is consistent with adjustments made to deer permit area 197 in 2021.

Lottery winners will be notified by Wednesday, June 1. The deadline to purchase bear hunting licenses awarded by lottery is Monday, Aug. 1. Any remaining unpurchased licenses will be available over the counter starting at noon Thursday, Aug. 4.

An unlimited number of bear licenses also will be sold over the counter for the no-quota area that includes east-central and far northwestern Minnesota. No-quota licenses are valid only in the no-quota area.

Hunters with either a quota or no-quota license who are interested in taking a problem bear should contact the area DNR wildlife manager (mndnr.gov/Areas/Wildlife) to be added to the hunter contact list if the opportunity arises.

Complete instructions about how to apply for a license, maps of permit areas and a listing of permit availability for each area are available on the DNR website (mndnr.gov/Hunting/Bear).

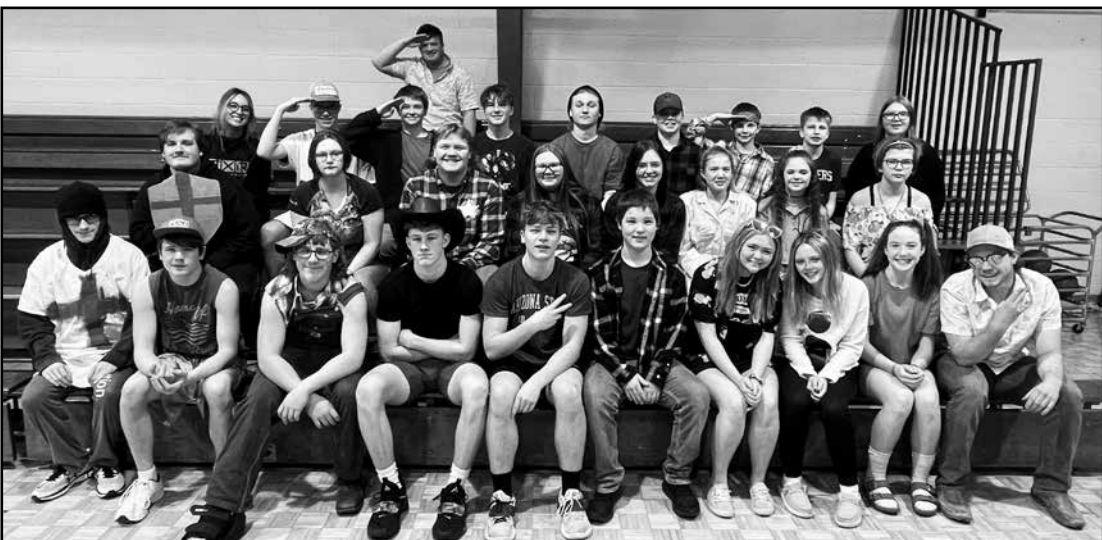

Strategic Farming talked biological pest control in soybeans

Sometimes organisms in our crop fields are already helping us with pest control. Growers can take advantage of the benefits these predators and parasites provide.

The soybean aphid, a major pest of soybean, invaded the U.S. from eastern Asia in 2000. Shortly after its arrival, Dr. Heimpel, a University of Minnesota entomologist, traveled to Asia to hunt for natural predators of this pest. "We looked for parasitic wasps that were attacking aphids in their native range," he explained. Their hope was that they might be able to bring them back to the United States for release in soybean fields.

They found about 20 species of tiny parasitic wasps, called parasitoids, that were attacking the soybean aphids. Through an extensive screening process in the USDA quarantine lab at the University of Minnesota campus, researchers found two species that attacked only the soybean aphid. Unfortunately, they were not able to get established in Minnesota. Other parasitoids were tested and rejected as biological control agents, because they would attack our native aphid species.

Aphelinus certus (A. certus) was one of the parasitoids that had been tested and rejected in the quarantine lab. However, it was accidentally introduced in Pennsylvania around 2005. It arrived in Minnesota in 2011 and quickly became widespread and persistent.

Between 2011 and 2021, soybean aphid density over the season has generally declined. In most parts of the state, soybean aphid populations have been relatively low the last few years. At the same time, the rate of parasitism by the wasp has increased.

The big question according to Heimpel was, "Is A. certus responsible for the decline of soybean aphids?" To help answer that question, his lab conducted several studies.

An early field study suggested that A. certus alone suppressed soybean aphid densities to below the insecticide treatment threshold. These early results were exciting, but unfortunately not consistent with studies that followed.

A follow-up study showed that while aphids were suppressed, there wasn't strong evidence for significant control. "We learned that higher parasitism rates did lead to lower aphid growth rates, but the parasitism rates just weren't high enough," Heimpel stated.

Their next step was to model a typical season in the field. What did they conclude? Under most normal conditions, they would expect A. certus to suppress aphids to levels below the economic injury level (EIL) – the level where yield is reduced - about 31% of the time. In the same way, aphid suppression below the economic threshold (ET) – where insecticide treatment is recommended before populations reach the EIL – might be expected about 10% of the time.

There is still a lot to learn about A. certus and the field practices that might favor them. For example, their overwintering habits are something of a black box. Studies did show that when mummies overwintered on the soil surface, they did a great job of emerging in the spring. However, when they were buried just under the soil surface, like in a tillage situation, they couldn't emerge at all.

Ideally, Heimpel would like to see them overwinter in soybean fields, since they could emerge in time to suppress aphids. When they overwinter in a wood lot instead, emergence is too late for them to have an effect on soybean aphid.

Because suppression can vary from year to year and field to field, growers should continue to scout for soybean aphid and use the recommended economic threshold before applying an insecticide. When combined with integrated pest management practices, growers can take advantage of the free benefits biological control agents provide.

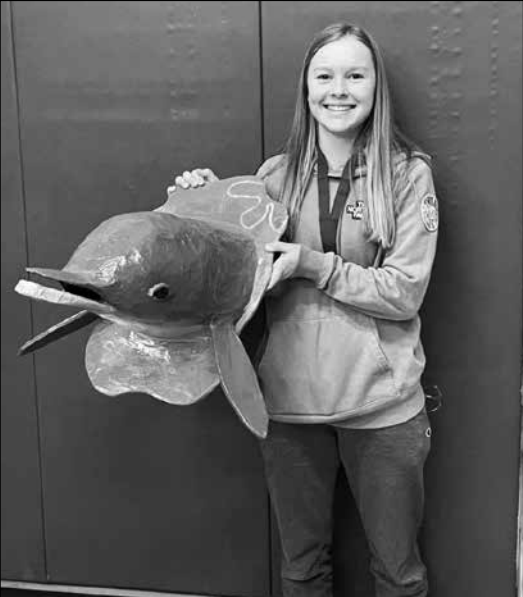

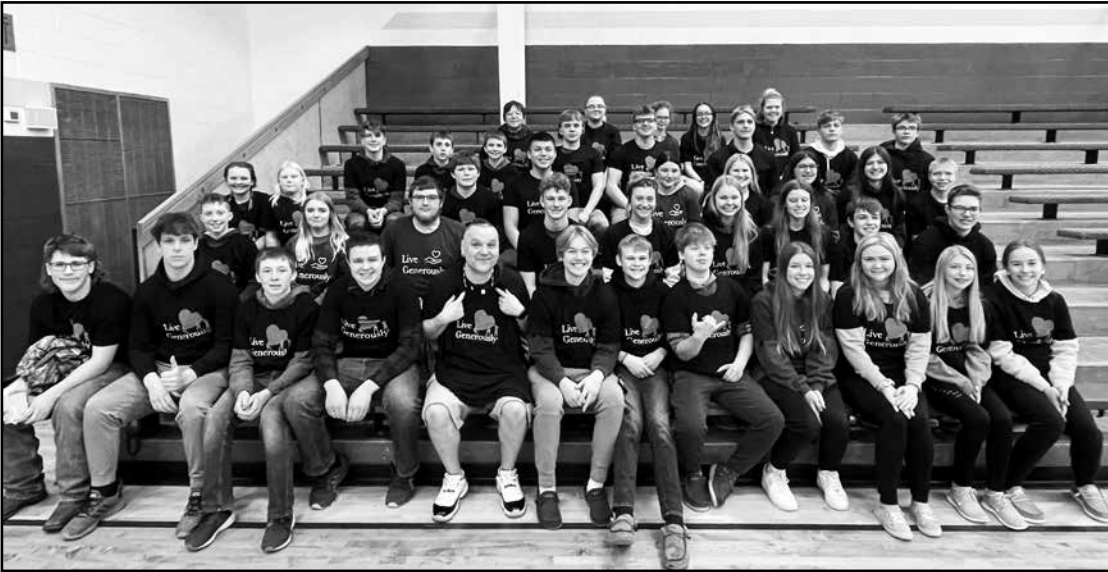
