MPCA is now recruiting volunteers around Grygla

As spring arrives in Minnesota, it's time for the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) to kick off its popular program that relies on Minnesota residents to help monitor Minnesota's 12,000+ lakes and 92,000+ miles of streams. The MPCA is now recruiting volunteers to measure water clarity in numerous lakes and streams - including several high-priority sites along the Mud River in the Grygla area - and then report back to the agency. This is the perfect opportunity for outdoor enthusiasts and those interested in helping protect our state's natural resources!

Through the Volunteer Water Monitoring Program, volunteers do a simple water clarity

test in a body of water twice a month during the summer. Lake monitors boat or paddle to a designated spot in the lake to check the clarity, while stream monitors record data from the streambank or a bridge over it. We provide all the equipment and training, so no experience is needed.

The MPCA uses the data to help determine whether lakes and streams are meeting water quality standards designed to protect aquatic life and recreational activities like fishing and swimming. In some cases, the information gathered by volunteers is the only monitoring done on a particular lake or stream.

Program volunteers come

from all walks of life; from retirees and families to teachers with their classrooms and entire community groups, anyone can be a volunteer!

We'd like to offer you an interview with a program expert who can discuss the importance of our volunteers' work to help protect water quality and how anyone can get involved. We also may be able to connect you with an existing volunteer in the area to learn more about their experiences in the program or provide you with volunteer quotes, photos, stories, etc.

Bear hunting license applications deadline

Last reminder in the Eagle that prospective bear hunters have until Friday, May 6, to apply for a bear hunting license from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. Applications for the 2022 season can be submitted online, at any license agent or via telephone at 888-665-4236.

A total of 3,605 licenses are available in 14 permit areas for the season, which opens Thursday, Sept. 1, and closes Sunday, Oct. 16.

The number of permits available is based on Minnesota's bear population, which has stabilized and started to increase during the past nine years because of more conservative permit quotas. Populations in nearly all bear permit areas are stable to increasing. Several permit areas in northern Minnesota require additional permit reductions to stabilize their populations.

Notable changes for the 2022 season

After conversations with the Red Lake Nation, DNR split Minnesota's Northwest Angle off into its own bear permit area, creating permit area 14. Bear hunting has occurred in the Northwest Angle for decades, but the area was part of permit area 12, which is directly to the south.

Differing landscape, population dynamics, vegetation and food resources, as well as concerns about increased bear and human interactions, prompted the split. The new permit area provides the DNR greater flexibility to develop hunting strategies specific to the Northwest

Angle's bear population and control hunting pressure in response to the local bear population.

For 2022, DNR is offering a small number of hunting permits in the Northwest Angle, reflecting a status-quo level of harvest for the first year of this new area.

The DNR also has modified the boundaries of permit areas 28 and 47 to follow the Leech Lake Reservation boundary. This change is consistent with adjustments made to deer permit area 197 in 2021.

Lottery winners will be notified by Wednesday, June 1. The deadline to purchase bear hunting licenses awarded by lottery is Monday, Aug. 1. Any remaining unpurchased licenses will be available over the counter starting at noon Thursday, Aug. 4.

An unlimited number of bear licenses also will be sold over the counter for the no-quota area that includes east-central and far northwestern Minnesota. No-quota licenses are valid only in the no-quota area.

Hunters with either a quota or no-quota license who are interested in taking a problem bear should contact the area DNR wildlife manager (mndnr.gov/Areas/Wildlife) to be added to the hunter contact list if the opportunity arises.

Complete instructions about how to apply for a license, maps of permit areas and a listing of permit availability for each area are available on the DNR website (mndnr.gov/Hunting/Bear).

DNR: Safety mindset essential around cold water

The weather so far in April has been anything but consistent and the same can be said for the ice-out status of Minnesota's waterways. However, as people's focus turns to open water, the Minnesota Department of Resources reminds boaters and paddlers that cold water is dangerous and unexpected falls can turn tragic quickly.

Each year, about 30% of fatal boating accidents happen during the cold-water period. In many instances, the victims weren't wearing a life jacket. Wearing a life jacket – not just having one somewhere on the boat – is the most effective way to survive a fall into cold water.

"For many of us, our most cherished memories revolve around time spent on the water," said Lt. Adam Block, boating law administrator for the DNR Enforcement Division. "But the water can be cruel and unforgiving, and failing to take the proper precautions before heading out can have disastrous consequences."

As boaters and paddlers take their first trips of the year onto the water, they should:

- Ensure their boat is registered and equipped with proper safety equipment, and that all pieces are functioning properly.
- Wear a life jacket (a foam life jacket is more effective than an inflatable life jacket during the cold-water season).
- Distribute weight evenly and abide by manufacturer's weight limits to reduce the likelihood of falling overboard.
- Have a means of communication. Boaters also should let other people know where they're going and when they plan to return.
- Watch the weather to avoid shifting winds or storms.
- For those planning bonus days on the lingering ice:
 - Wear a life jacket and carry readily accessible ice picks.
 - Check the ice thickness frequently.
 - Double the DNR's ice thickness recommendations, which apply to new, clear ice.

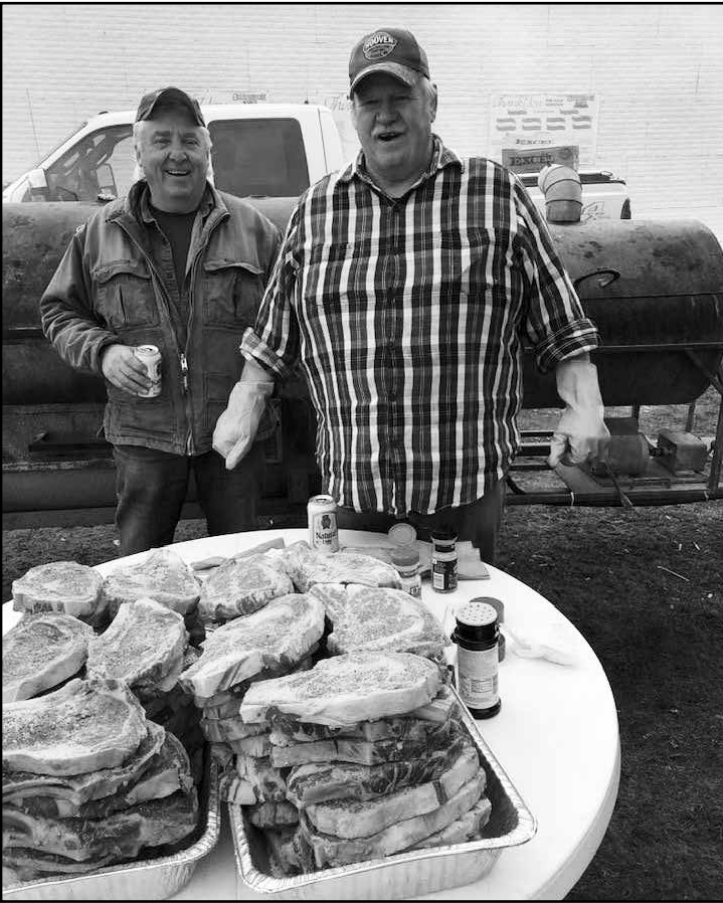

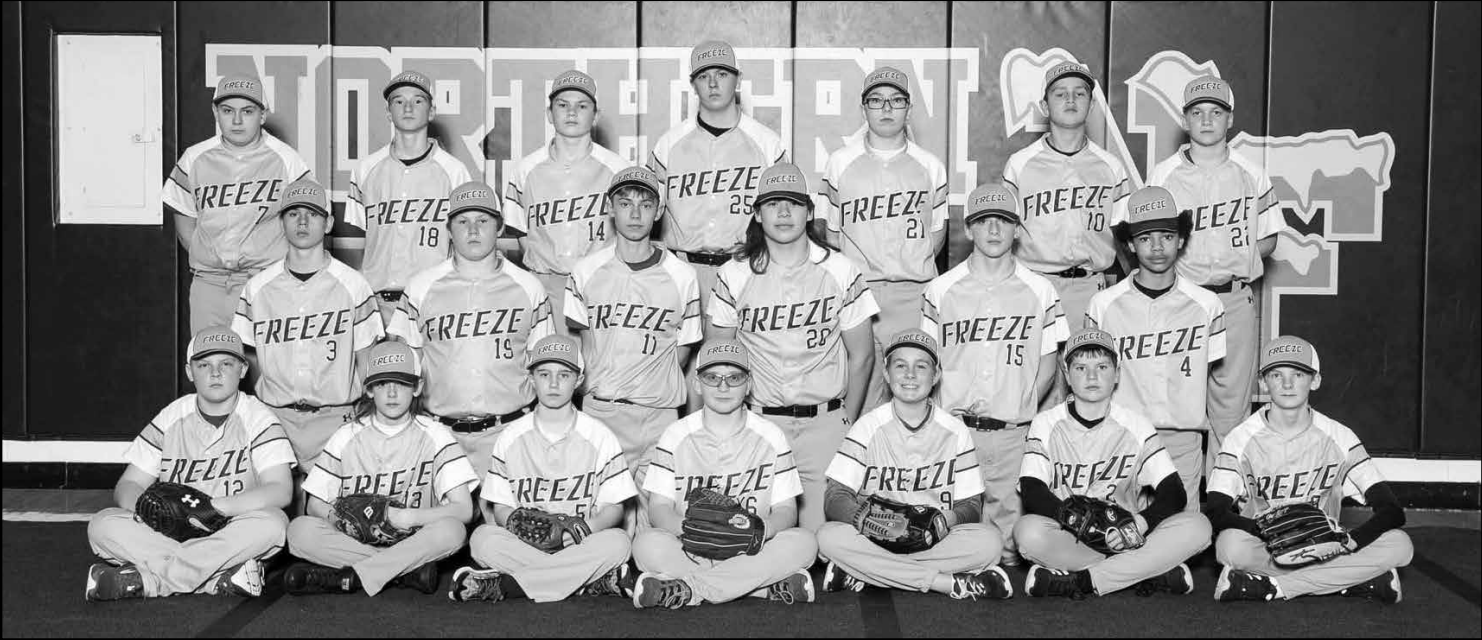

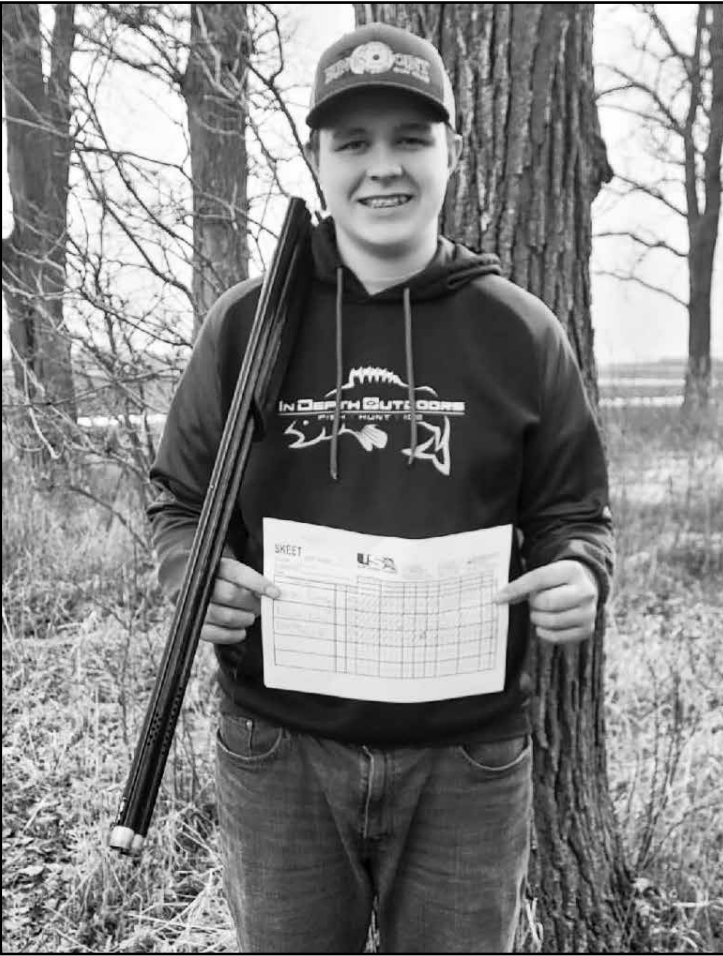

Motion by Tera Nordby, second by Gretchen Smeby to approve the final bid of \$1,799,165.50. Passed 5-0.

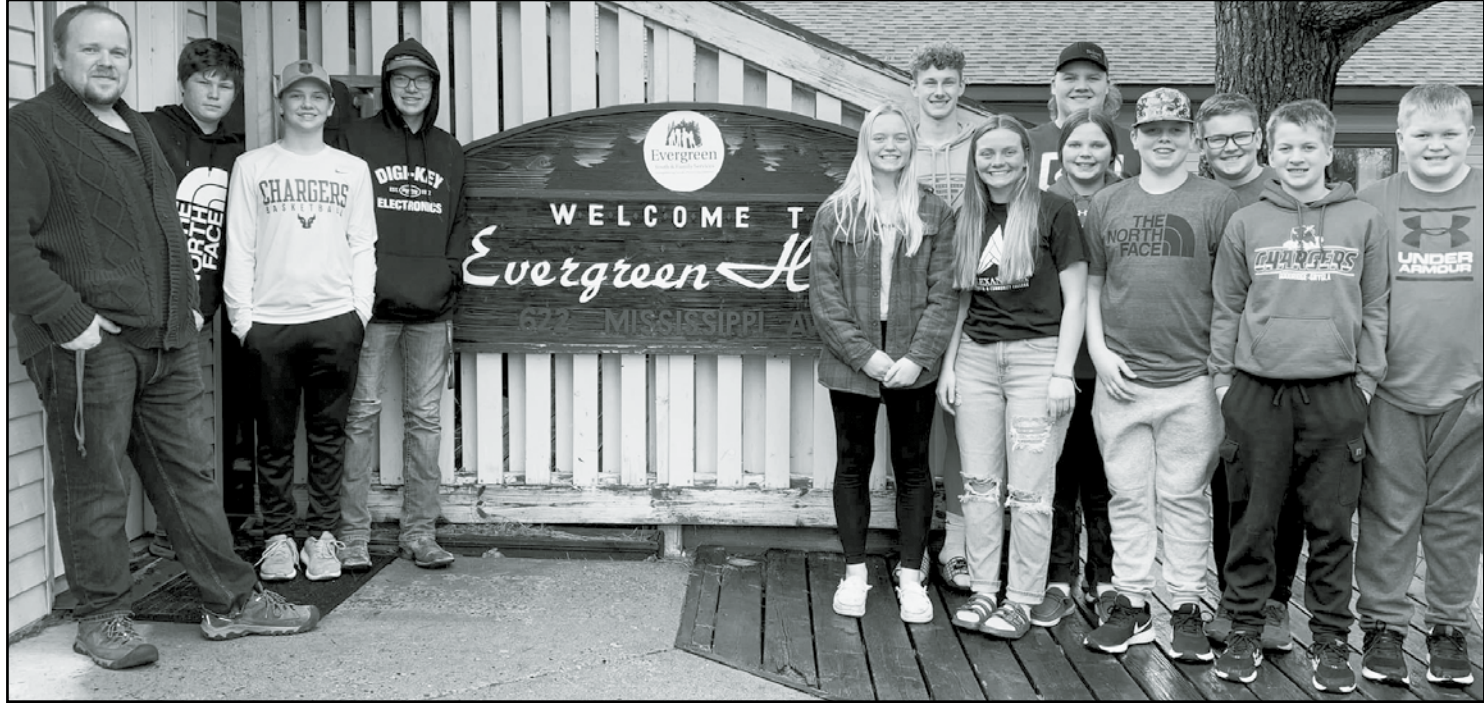
