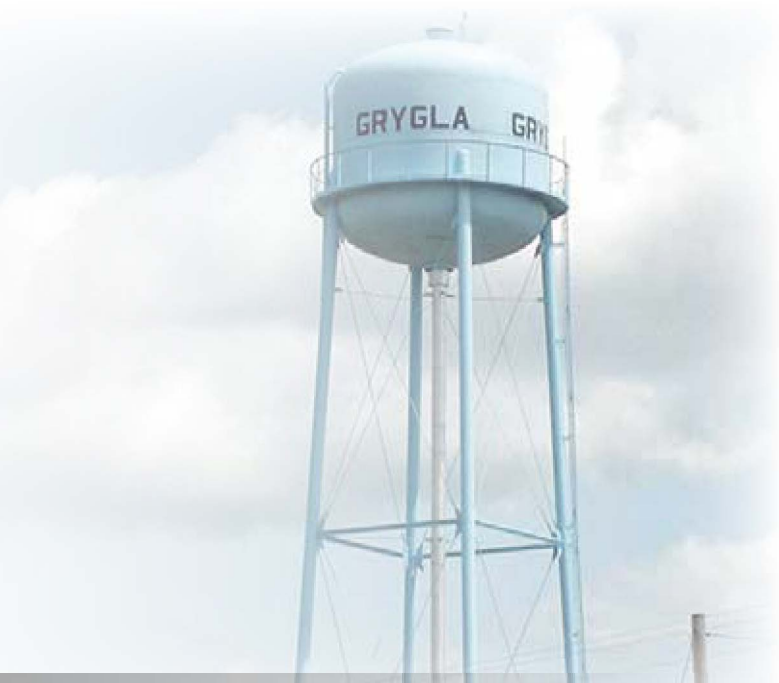


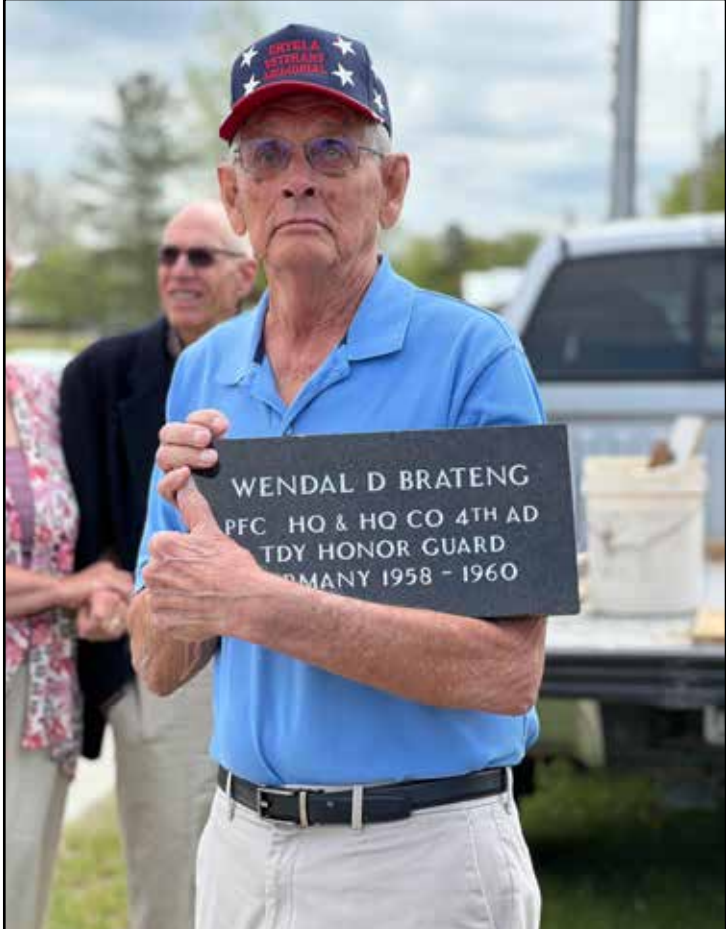

Planting decisions *(Submitted by U of M Extension)*

Many farmers are concerned about the cool spring weather and cold soil temperatures. Usually, farmers have started planting by now. Hopefully, the weather will warm up and planting will progress. Farmers have started to discuss prevented planting. As the planting season goes on, farmers will have to decide whether to plant or not to plant. Final planting dates for corn producers were May 25 (northern Minnesota) and May 31 (southern Minnesota). June 10 is the final planting date for soybeans for the whole state. If you decide not to plant, there is a formula to use to determine your prevented planting rate. There is a simple payment rate of \$5.90 multiplied by your APH and your insured percentage multiplied by 55% to get your prevented planting rate for corn. For example, 85% coverage is \$5.90 *180 bushels (APH)*.85 = \$496.49 per acre payment less premium. For soybeans: \$14.33*50 bushels (APH)*.85 = \$365.42 per acre payment less premium.

For every day after your final planting date, your coverage declines by 1%. If you planted corn on June 9, your coverage level would decrease by 9% from 85% coverage to \$5.90 *180 *.85=\$902.70, to \$5.90 *180 *.85 *.91=\$821.46, with crop yield potential expected to be lower by at least 36 bushels to 144 bushels. Selling these bushels for \$7.15 cash in the fall would gross \$1,029.60 and there would be no crop insurance payment. There would also be higher drying costs and lighter test weights with this example.

If you decide to plant soybeans on June 15, your coverage will go down by 5%. Your coverage would drop from \$14.33 *50 bushels *.85=\$609.03 to \$14.33 *50 *.85 *.95=\$578.57. What will your actual yield project be on June 15? Less than 35 bushels? Thirty-five bushels at \$14.64 or a total of \$512.40 per acre. There would be an insurance payment in this example of over \$66.17 per acre with total costs per acre projected at \$551 per acre.

If a farmer chooses the prevented plant option, the yield used for their APH will not be affected unless a second crop is planted. The yield used for 2022 would be 55% of farm corn APH and 60% of soybean APH. The current fall prices available show a farmer would be able to cover their cost by planting, even past the final planting date.

Dealing with planting delays

On top of a cold, wet start to the season, recent rains have led to further planting delays across SW MN and other areas of the state. If conditions are keeping you from wrapping up planting, the following are some points to consider:

Projected yield impacts. Both corn and soybean hold their yield potential pretty well when planted up until mid-May, especially when the season starts out as cool as it has in 2022. After this point, however, decreases in yield potential become more significant. If planting is delayed until May 20, long-term U of MN research shows yield potential in corn can be expected to range from 92 to 95% of maximum, and around 94% of maximum in soybean. If planting is

delayed until May 25, yield potential for corn drops to around 87 to 92% of maximum, and to 91% of maximum for soybean. If planting is delayed until May 30, yield potential for corn drops to 82 to 89% of maximum, and to 87% of maximum for soybean. If planting is delayed until June 4, corn can be expected to yield 76 to 84% of maximum, and soybeans 82% of maximum. Soybeans can be planted throughout June, but yield potential drops to about 50% of maximum with a planting date of July 1.

When to switch corn maturities. It is recommended to stay the course with full-season adapted corn maturities until May 22. If planting is delayed until May 22 – 28, a hybrid 5 to 7 relative maturity (RM) earlier than full-season is recommended. Note if you started with a shorter maturity, you could hang onto your original selection a bit longer than this. If planting is delayed until May 29 to June 4, a hybrid 8 to 15 RM earlier is recommended; and from June 5 to 10, a hybrid 15 or more RM earlier is recommended.

When to switch soybean maturities. For soybean, the standard recommendation is to keep with your original maturity until June 10, at which point it is recommended to switch to a variety 0.5 maturity group (MG) earlier. If you started with a very full season variety, consider making this switch by June 1. If you started with a shorter-season variety, you can hold onto this maturity until late-June.

Soil Conditions Make a Difference. When the calendar and weather are working against you, it can be very tempting to push soil conditions to get the crop in. Results from a U of MN Extension survey of farmers after the 2019 season, where MN had an unprecedented level of prevent plant acres, demonstrate the importance of soil conditions at planting on yield potential. When adjusted for planting date, planting into "good" conditions resulted in the greatest reported yields of both corn and soybean. Corn yields dropped 2 bu/ac when conditions were described as "slightly wet," and 10 bu/ac when conditions were described as "very wet." When adjusted for planting date, soybean yield dropped 1.5 bu when conditions were described as "slightly wet", and 2.5 bu/ac when conditions were described as "wet".

Don't skip pre-emergence herbicides. When time is tight, it can be tempting to forgo a preemergence herbicide and focus on planting. Effective preemergence herbicides are critical for control of problem weeds like waterhemp, especially since many of our waterhemp populations are resistant to multiple postemergence herbicides. Also keep in mind many preemergence herbicides used in soybean cannot be used once soybeans start to emerge. Be sure to check herbicide labels for options and prioritize weed control along with planting to help protect yield potential (and prevent weed escapes from replenishing the seed bank).

How late should I try to plant if delays continue? The last recommended planting date in MN for corn for grain is June 5 in central and northern MN, and June 10 in southern MN. If harvesting corn for silage, the last recommended planting date in southern MN is June 20. Planting corn in June in MN carries much risk and depending on your situation, taking prevent plant or switching to another crop may be a better alternative. Results from our 2019 farmer planting date survey was very telling. Comments we received included: "Remind me to never plant corn in June again!" and

Experience the tropics without ever leaving Minnesota when you visit Marjorie McNeely Conservatory

Minnesota's bounty is all around us! The great outdoors of the Land of 10,000 Lakes offer a beauty that is hard to beat. But sometimes, Mother Nature drives us indoors. That's certainly the case every winter, when the temperature plunges below freezing, the snow drifts build up, and your car never quite warms up before you reach your destination. Luckily, though, there are plenty of warm oasis' throughout the state. One of our favorites – and an amazing place to visit year-round – is the Marjorie McNeely Conservatory in St. Paul. Read on to learn about this beautiful – and warm – Minnesota treasure: Marjorie McNeely Conservatory is a delightful Twin Cities destination. It's part of Como Park, making it a popular spot in every month of the year.

The conservatory dates back to 1915, and it's only gotten better in the 100 years since. During warmer months, people flock to the conservatory to stroll through the outdoor gardens. The bonsai collection is a fascinating ode to the ancient Japanese artform. The bonsai collection is housed within the larger Ordway Gardens. This section, complete with a peaceful water feature, is perfect for quiet reflection.



Other outdoor features include a lily pond, a European-style garden, and more. But when the temperature drops, there's still plenty to do at this conservatory. Peek through the window of the Orchid House for glimpses of the conservatory's most unique specimens.

The Tropical Encounters exhibit combines the animals of the Como Zoo with the beautiful plant life of the conservatory. You'll walk through an indoor jungle, your path lined with stingrays, frogs, turtles, and free-roaming birds. Don't forget to pay a visit to Chloe the sloth!

The Palm Dome is a glass dome that houses towering palm trees. The leafy foliage of this section looks like a trip to the equator. And because of the warmth and humidity needed to care for the trees, it'll feel like it, too!

The most well-known part of the Marjorie McNeely Conservatory is probably the Sunken Garden. Updated seasonally, the gorgeous garden showcases beautiful blooms year-round!

All in all, Marjorie McNeely Conservatory is a lovely place to visit all year – especially during a Minnesota winter. Visiting is free, and it's open 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Blackstone Grilled Kielbasa, Tortellini, & Spinach Casserole

This dish is full of flavor and so easy to make as it combines kielbasa, tortellini, and veggies into a one-of-a-kind pasta dish that you prepare 100 percent outside on the grill in no time.

- Ingredients
- 2 (12 oz) bags of frozen cheese tortellini

2 (14 oz) packages Polska Kielbasa, sliced thinish

8 oz container fresh mushrooms, sliced, optional

8 oz bag fresh spinach

Cherry tomatoes, sliced in half, optional

Fresh Mozzarella
- Instructions

Take tortellini out of the freezer. Slice kielbasa, if you would like it a little crispy, slice it on the thinner side. Clean and slice your mushrooms. Pre-heat your Blackstone to medium heat. Put your kielbasa on the Blackstone first. Then put your tortellini on the grill. It will be partially defrosted and that is fine. Moisten with some EVOO.

After cooking a few minutes, add your mushrooms on. Give them a little spritz with some EVOO. Start combining all of the ingredients as they cook. Add in spinach. You can add some halved cherry tomatoes. Add some fresh mozzarella right at the end. Remove from heat when your kielbasa and tortellini are starting to brown.



Iron Chargers compete at World Championship

The Grygla Drone Team competed at the World Championship in Dallas Texas May 10-12th. The students who traveled and competed at the first ever Drone Worlds Championship were Anthony Englund, Reece Sundberg, and Chelsie Nelson. We started off the trip by driving about 20 hours with stops. We arrived down in Dallas midafternoon on Monday and decided to go out and eat at In-N-Out, which was a first for a couple of the students. On Tuesday, we headed to the convention center to check in, get the drone inspected, and take advantage of the practice fields. After we were finished at the event center, we decided to go check out a few very large malls as well as take a crack at an escape room. We decided on an escape room based on the Old West where we had to escape the prison cell, figure out secret menu items at a saloon, and determine the order of poker hands. We completed the escape room in 39 minutes flat, just 2 minutes short of the monthly record.

Wednesday and Thursday were the serious days with competition and skills events. On Wednesday, the team went 1-2 placing them in 35th out of 67 teams. Wednesday was also the start of the Skills competition where the team has to

program the drone to fly without human interaction. After our 3 attempts, we scored 27 points, 3 inches from scoring an additional 15 points. With our 27 points, we finished in 16th place, 63 teams attempted skills. If we would've been able to land and secure the additional 15 points, we would've tied for 2nd.

On Thursday, our luck was a little better. We finished the qualification matches with a record of 4-3 and placing 17th. We were selected to join alliance with the 10th place alliance team moving into the round of 16. In this tournament bracket, it's a one and done style, losing means you are done. After the 3 minute match, all 4 drones were flying and the match ended in a tie with a score of 71-71. We had to replay the match. This match didn't end in our favor, we ended up losing 43 to 33.

Our trip was very fun and we learned a lot for our seasons to come. We want to give a big thank you and shout out to everyone that supported us in any way, from cheering us on by watching the live stream event or keeping up to date on our Facebook page and to everything who donated to make the trip possible. Thank you again and we look forward to continuing the Robotics and Drone program here in Grygla.
