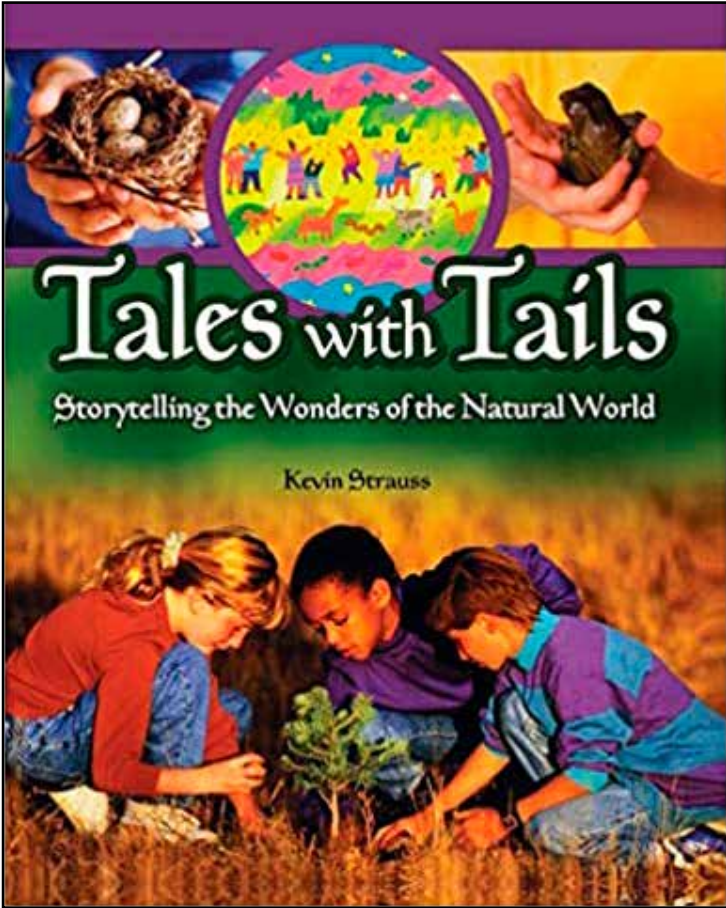
Fourtown Store & Tavern switches ownership

Children's program coming to the library

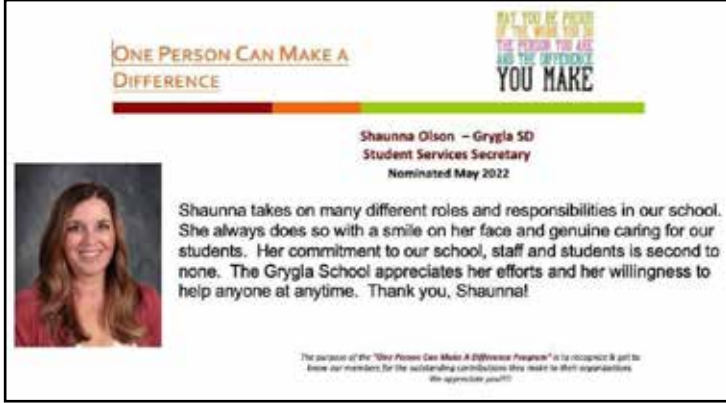

Cheyenne has officially taken over as the owner of the Grygla Coop Store, which was formerly owned by Randy & Janelle McMillin, who purchased the store three years ago. Cheyenne graduated in May from the University of Minnesota Crookston with an Agricultural Business major. She also has two minors: Marketing and Management. She finished 4 years of college in just 3 - carrying a very heavy credit load in order to graduate early. Cheyenne has worked at the Grygla Coop since she was in 8th grade and has gained so much experience through the years by doing so. She never planned to run the store in her future, but one day, Randy joked about taking it over. Cheyenne took that home with her, sat on it for awhile, visited the idea, revisited it, and finally made the decision to go for it. Along with the years of work experience at the store itself, Cheyenne also had many great resources available to her while attending UMC. Her advisor was extremely helpful at guiding her down the right path to be a successful business owner. When the McMillins purchased the store a few years ago, it was done to keep the business open, but the couple had hopes to transition it to a new owner within a few years. The timing was perfect for Cheyenne to set her eyes on the goal, which she has now accomplished. New grants benefit community child care providers

Nearly \$3 million will support family, friend and neighbor child care
A new round of state grants recognizes the grandparents, relatives, friends and neighbors who care for children in diverse communities across Minnesota, often without the resources available to licensed child care providers.
A total of \$2.9 million for community organizations will provide training and support for family, friends and neighbors who provide child care for the youngest Minnesotans. The Minnesota Department of Human Services will distribute grants to organizations serving unlicensed family, friend and neighbor child care providers. Funding comes from the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act and the American Rescue Plan Act.
Family, friend and neighbor care is common in diverse cultural and ethnic communities and is often the only child care option for parents who work evenings, weekends, overnight shifts and other nonstandard hours. It may be full- or part-time, paid or unpaid, and provided in the child’s home or the caregiver’s home. Providers typically care for one or two children.
“These grants will support family, friends and neighbors who step up to provide child care, often without receiving the same benefits as licensed child care providers,” said Human Services Commissioner Jodi Harpstead. “Providing more resources for this essential child care option will

strengthen the workforce behind the workforce.”
All the organizations receiving grants will support multicultural, refugee and immigrant communities across the state. The grants will help develop new networks and strengthen existing connections for family, friend and neighbor child care providers; offer training and materials; and connect providers to services and resources.
Grantees may use the funds for:
• Culturally appropriate training and resources to enhance and promote children’s health and safety
• Training to support school-age children’s distance learning
• Social emotional learning, health and safety, and early learning kits
• Information about child care licensing
• Transportation to school readiness and other early childhood training activities.

Take a Kid Fishing weekend is this Friday through Sunday

During Take a Kid Fishing weekend (Friday, June 10 to Sunday, June 12) Minnesota residents can fish without licenses if they take children 15 or younger along.
“Fishing together with kids is a fun way to spend time in the outdoors,” said Benji Kohn, volunteer mentor program coordinator with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. “Making great memories can be as easy as finding some rods and reels, finding or buying worms for bait, and heading to a nearby lake to give fishing a try.”
Youth 15 and younger do not require fishing licenses at any time of the year, though they must observe all fishing seasons and other regulations. Take a Kid Fishing weekend allows adults to fish without a license as long as they take a child fishing with them. Minnesota residents also may generally fish in state parks without a fishing license if the body of water does not require a trout stamp.
Learn to fish resources
The DNR’s Learn to Fish page (mndnr.gov/GoFishing) covers fishing basics, where to fish, how to catch different types of fish, and the importance of fishing ethics and being stewards of Minnesota’s natural resources.
In the Twin Cities area, people can find accessible piers and shore fishing locations, and lakes stocked with fish, by going to the DNR’s Fishing in the Neighborhood webpage (mndnr.gov/FiN). For anglers across Minnesota, the DNR has an online map

of piers and shorefishing sites (mndnr.gov/FishingPiers). Parking at these locations is generally located within 300 feet of the pier or shore fishing site, with a hard surface path from the parking area. Most are designed to meet the needs of people with disabilities.
Adults who want to learn about fishing ahead of Take a Kid Fishing Weekend can view a recorded webinar (mndnr.gov/Discover#tab-1-2)—look under “Outdoors” and select “Opportunities”—which details the DNR Fishing in the Neighborhood Program and other resources to help people take advantage of the weekend fishing opportunity.
Anyone 16 or older can buy fishing licenses online (mndnr.gov/BuyALicense). The investment in a license supports management of the state’s fishing resources and habitat that benefits fish and aquatic systems.

Share photos and stories by uploading Minnesota fishing photos using the DNR photo uploader (mndnr.gov/Fishing/Photos.html), for possible use in DNR social media, in email notifications and on the DNR website.
Through the #MyMNOOutdoorAdventure campaign, the DNR invites people of diverse backgrounds to share photos, memories and stories of connection from their outdoor adventures. Options are being weighed in regards to turning the unpaid utility bills over to the county but a motion was made by Bob Thompson to send a certified letter to each resident as a "last chance" effort before turning them over if bills were not paid in full. Letters will be sent out by the city.

The council will further discuss this issue, along with policies and procedures at next month's meeting.

Cameras have been installed at the city dumpsters and already a few people have been "caught in the act". An unidentified group of adults

were photographed dumping items that are not acceptable for disposal; old windows and siding were unloaded and left at the city dumpsters. Another party had thrown a mattress out.

Any items that Spruce Valley Enterprises can't pick up, the City of Grygla is charged. If you have any questions about what items can or cannot be disposed of, there is a sign posted right behind the dumpsters or you can contact our City Clerk, Rose Aune at 294-6292 for further questions.

The city was accepting sealed bids on a couple of items and bids were opened and reviewed at Monday's meeting. Al Lorentzen bid \$1000.00 on the old city dump trunk and Chris Jelen bid \$75.00 on the 3-point blade; both bids were accepted.

Miracles come in small packages

On May 3rd, Keston John Klasen was born to his parents, Kevin and Justyne (Larson) Klasen of Gatzke. Justyne was only 25 weeks along, which meant she wasn't supposed to deliver for over 3 more months but their little miracle was on his way and arrived into the world weighing only 1 pound, 8 ounces.

Although today, Keston weighs 6 pounds, 6 ounces, he still has a ways to go on his road to recovery. The plan is to have Keston back home by the end of September.

When Justyne was only a couple of months along in her pregnancy, contractions started. Doctors kept an eye on her but it was when she reached about 20 weeks that the red flag went up. Doctor's put her on bed rest as a precaution. Justyne went into premature labor that was stopped with the Doctor's help.

After being in the hospital for three weeks in Thief River Falls, she was taken by ambulance to Fargo. Five days later, Keston was taken by emergency C-section because he was in distress.

When little Keston was born, he was doing ok for the most part. He was hooked up to a breathing ventilator, but was able to breathe on his own after just 24 hours. He was given steroids to help develop his lungs and take the inflammation down but given how early he was born, a few issues had developed.

Keston has undergone a blood transfusion due to a bleed on his liver, he has suffered high blood pressure and high blood sugar and he also had to have surgery on a hernia. He was supposed to be coming home about this time and had recovered nicely from his hernia surgery a few weeks ago but 3 days after his surgery, he was taken into an emergency surgery for yet another hernia that had ruptured.

Today, Keston is breathing on his own – with help of a CPAP (Constant Positive Airway Pressure) machine but has developed Stridor. Justyne stated that Stridor is swelling in the airway and the swelling starts to harden which could close the airway. Right now, Keston has been undergoing a balloon dilation treatment that will help expand his airway; this process will be done weekly.

Justyne also stated that this is something that could exist, even if they bring him home and they can bring him in for his weekly visits to get this procedure done until it is under control. As Keston continues to grow bigger and stronger, his body can heal itself a bit more as well.

"As of right now, we're just taking things day by day. The Doctor told us things are looking much better than he anticipated," mentioned Justyne.

Today, Keston is 3 months old and has been in the NICU in Fargo for 15 weeks. A benefit was held in Grygla on July 14th for the Klasen family and Justyne said the amount of support they were shown was so appreciated.

Only the best is wished for little Keston and he has a big team rooting for him to continue growing stronger so he can come home soon.
