Over 42k raised for new playground equipment

Henrickson is a member of GAD and also on the community playground committee, showing tremendous support of this renovation. To date, the Goodridge Area Development has now donated \$16,000 towards this project.

The Goodridge community/school playground equipment was purchased and put in place in 1992. Per a recent inspection, many pieces need to be upgraded and replaced due to wear and tear, as well as safety standards.

The end goal is to renovate the entire playground with an estimated cost of \$220,000. So far, \$42,600 has been raised.

Loberg says they are happy with that number so far. It's just been donations coming in from foundations or civic organizations. No fundraisers have

been done yet as the Goodridge School didn't want to compete with its student fundraisers that happened last year. However, a few fundraising events are now in the works for this year.

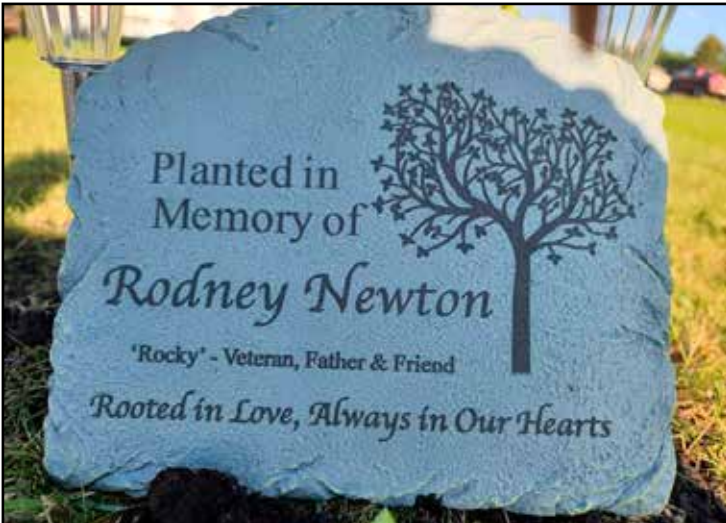
Donations are being accepted towards this playground renovation. You can send them to Tomas Loberg at the Goodridge School. Loberg added, "We have some larger grants in the works right now. Some of them look pretty likely, but nothing definitive. We are still climbing the hill and looking to get community members involved."

More Minnesota families eligible for food assistance

More Minnesota families struggling with grocery bills will soon be able to get help buying healthy food through SNAP, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. When the program's gross income limit increases on Sept. 1, an additional 1,400 households may become eligible for SNAP or may continue receiving their existing SNAP assistance, even if their income goes up.

For most households, the gross monthly income limit for SNAP in Minnesota will rise to 200% of the federal poverty line, up from 165%. Under the new limit, a family of three with an annual income of up to about \$46,000 before taxes will be eligible.

"This change will help more Minnesotans feed their families," said Human Services Commissioner Jodi Harpstead. "Rising food costs can quickly wipe out any increase in in-

come, but we can help offset that with more support for individuals and families who continue to face food insecurity."

The change won't increase or modify the monthly amount of SNAP assistance for an individual or family. Rather, it simply means that more Minnesotans may now be eligible to receive - or continue receiving - nutrition assistance.

The Minnesota Legislature passed this eligibility change during the 2022 session and it was signed into law by Governor Tim Walz. SNAP's gross income limit increased once before, when the 2010 Legislature raised the limit to 165% of the federal poverty line, up from 130%.

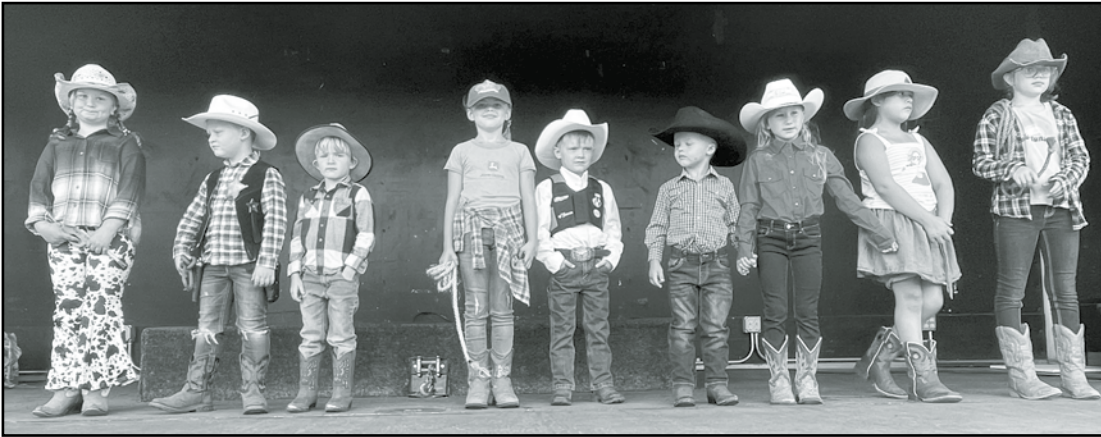

Marshall County Sheriff's Office Press Release



On August 28, 2022, the Marshall County Sheriff's Office arrested Catherin Lancot of Warroad, MN, for theft of a vehicle.

The Marshall County Sheriff's Office was notified that a vehicle in Grygla, MN, was



stolen. The caller stated that his 2007 Chevy Silverado was stolen out of his garage. When Lancot was stealing the vehicle, she drove over the caller's John Deere lawn mower and drove through the garage door, causing over a \$1,000.00

worth of damage. The vehicle was found in a ditch by Grygla. Through the investigation, the Marshall Counties deputies located Lancot and arrested her for theft of a motor vehicle.

Lancot is currently in the Marshall County Sheriff's Office waiting her first appearance. She is being held on the charges of 3rd Degree Burglary, Theft of a motor Vehicle, and Criminal Damage to property. All charges are felony level charges.

On August 25, 2022, the Marshall County Sheriff's arrested Brent Jevne, Middle River, for 3rd Degree Possession of Drugs.

On August 25, 2022, the

Marshall County Sheriff's Office along with the Minnesota DOC did a probation check on Brent Jevne, from Middle River, MN. While doing the probation visit, methamphetamine was located. A Marshall County deputy applied for a search warrant to search the rest of the residence. A search warrant was granted by a judge and the warrant was executed. 12.70 grams of methamphetamine were seized along with \$2,909.00.

Brent Jevne is currently in the Marshall County Jail on charges of felony 3rd Degree Possession of Drugs with a \$10,000.00 bond.

MinnesotaCare premium relief continues through 2025

Approximately 90,000 Minnesotans will continue to save money on MinnesotaCare premiums through the end of 2025, thanks to the federal Inflation Reduction Act signed last month by President Biden.

As part of the landmark law, MinnesotaCare premiums will remain at reduced levels for an additional three years, helping workers and families maintain their access to affordable health care. MinnesotaCare covers people who earn too much to qualify for Medicaid but not enough to purchase other health insurance.

Until January 2026, people with incomes under 160% of the federal poverty level will not have to pay premiums for MinnesotaCare. People whose incomes fall between 160% and 200% of the federal poverty level will pay reduced premiums. The lower premiums began in 2021 and had been set to end in January 2023, until the new federal legislation became law.

"MinnesotaCare premium relief makes a big difference for many families," Human Services Commissioner Jodi Harpstead said. "Continuing the savings through 2025 results in more affordable health care

coverage for Minnesotans who are facing financial struggles."

MinnesotaCare is designed to offer affordable premiums and lower out-of-pocket costs for coverage that is typically broader than insurance options available on the individual market. The program includes dental, vision and comprehensive behavioral health services.

Because of the Affordable Care Act, higher premium tax credits result in lower MinnesotaCare premiums. In 2021 and 2022, premium tax credits were increased by the American Rescue Plan Act to improve the affordability of health coverage purchased through the federal exchange or a state health insurance exchange such as MNsure. The Inflation Reduction Act extends the enhanced premium tax credits through 2025.

Minnesotans can apply for MinnesotaCare online through MNsure, with the help of a navigator, or by working with their county. Enrollment is available year-round. Visit the DHS website at mn.gov/dhs/health-care-coverage to learn about application options and find help available in several languages.

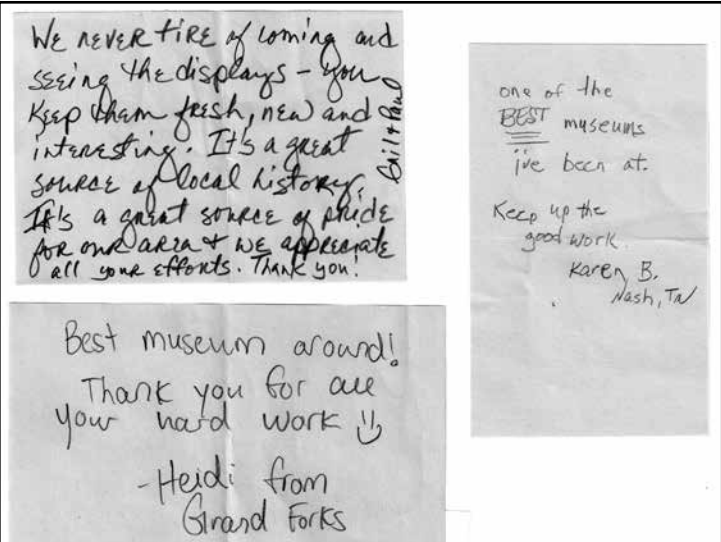
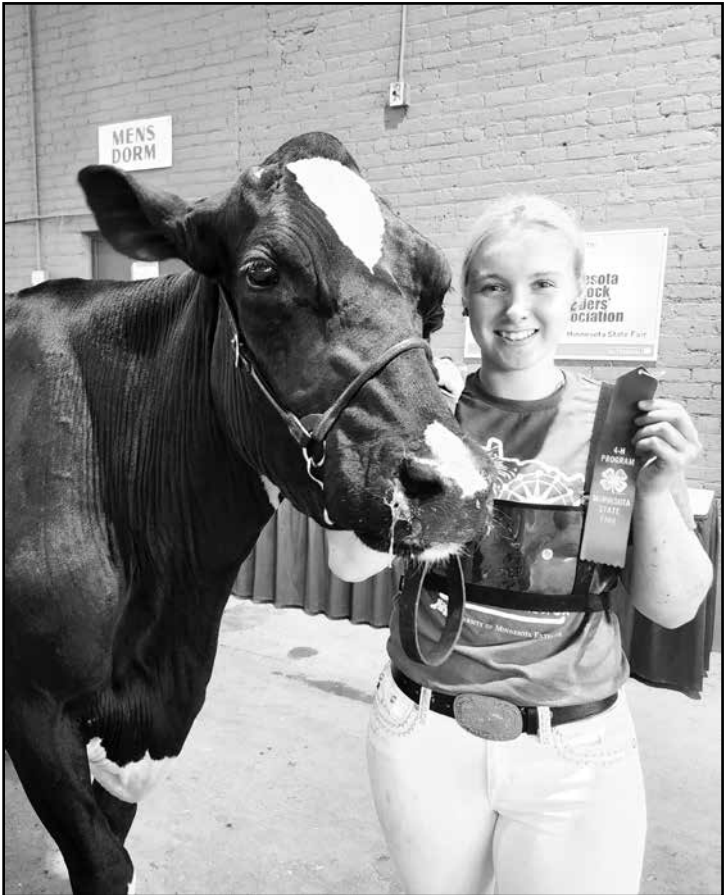

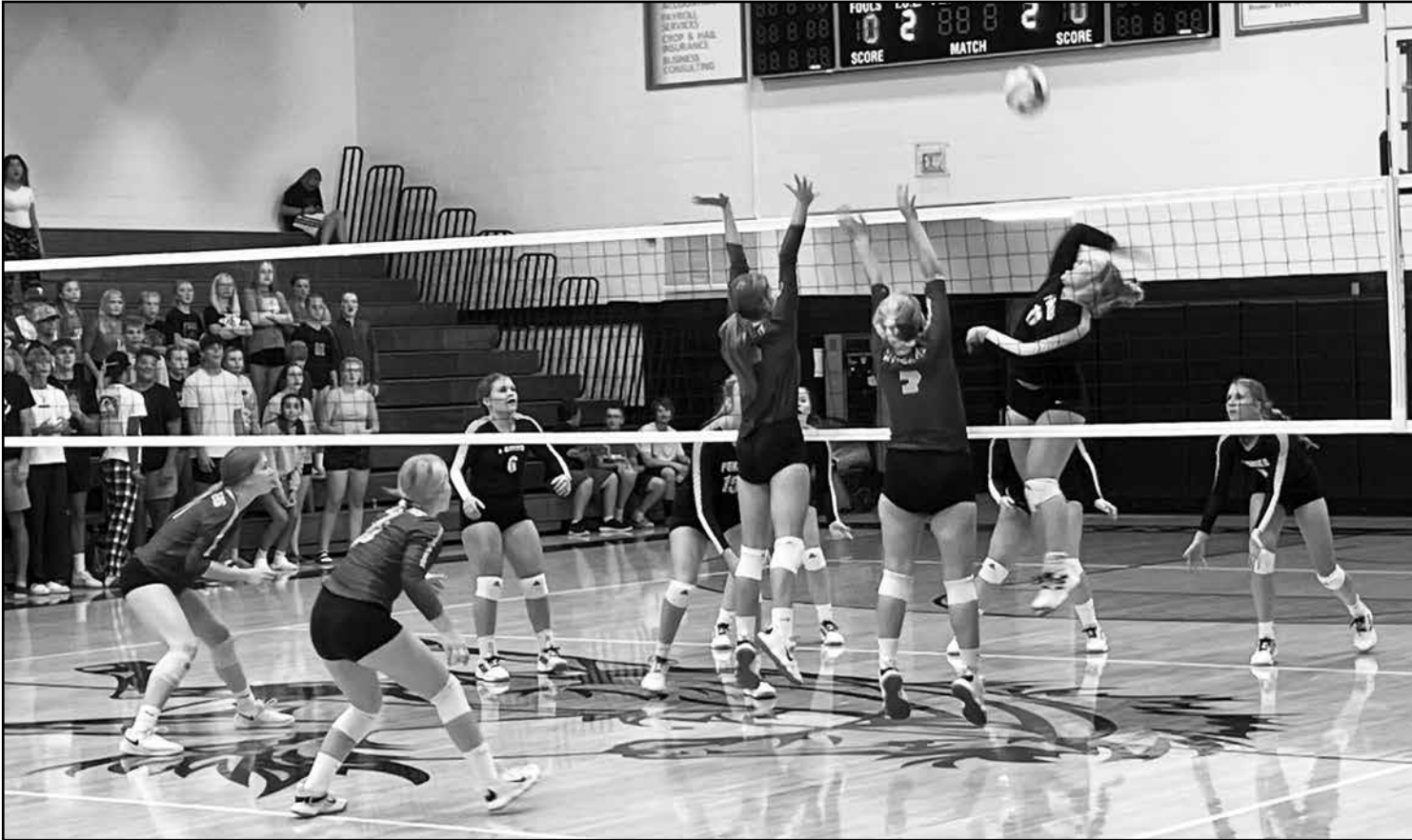
