Stanley family in need of community support after mom suffers two strokes, baby battles RSV

What should have been nothing but a warm welcome home and new baby snuggles, quickly turned into a scary health battle for both Chelsea Stanley and her new baby Maverick.

Chelsea and Anthony Stanley had their baby boy on August 8th. Maverick was born perfectly healthy and was to join his family at home in rural Grygla, which includes his siblings Ryelin and Piper.

When Anthony and Chelsea were discharged from the hospital on August 10th, they had stopped to pick up their other two children at Anthony's parents house, Brian & Bonnie Stanley. Chelsea sat down at the table and all of a sudden lost her vision. "It was so scary. We called the doctor right away and they said to come in immediately," she shared. Chelsea has a blood clotting disorder but had been off of her medication due to having Maverick. Symptoms of a stroke quickly started to appear. On the way to Grand Forks, the left side of Chelsea's body had started to go numb - her hand, up her arm, into her ear, and on the left side of her face and tongue. "It was so scary," she said.

Anthony called the ambulance, but since they were outside of Thief River Falls

already, they said it would be quicker to just continue driving themselves. At 120 mph, with the hazards blinking, the Stanleys continued on to Grand Forks where Chelsea was admitted and watched for a couple of days. The plan of action included pumping magnesium into her via IV in order to get her blood pressure down. An Echo was also performed and it was discovered that Chelsea has a hole in her heart. With the exertion of delivery, a blood clot had went through her heart and down into her kidney; this was what caused the first stroke.

A few appointments quickly followed, including a trip to Fargo to see a blood specialist who put Chelsea on six different medications. Everything was going better, but on Friday, August 26th, Chelsea's hand started to go numb again. She checked her blood pressure and it was very high. Like before, the symptoms started to get worse on the left side of the body, including her leg going numb this time. By the time they got to Thief River Falls, Chelsea couldn't walk into the hospital. After an MRI and CT Scan, everything was clear. However, TIA's (mini strokes) don't show up on those procedures.

From that point, Chelsea went to see her blood special-

ist again in Fargo. He set her up with a Cardiologist where a procedure is being planned for Tuesday, September 13th. A scope will be inserted in order to look at the heart and determine how big the hole is, if it can be fixed, and what the next step will be.

With her own health to worry about, Chelsea was also thinking about her children at home. Especially the newest arrival, Maverick, who had started to get a little congested last week. His breathing had gotten difficult for him, so Anthony and Chelsea decided a doctor visit would be best. Maverick was sent to Grand Forks and admitted for a 24-hour observation. He was put on fluids and oxygen, and diagnosed with RSV Bronchiolitis. After 5 days in the hospital, doctors tried to wean him off the oxygen, but little Maverick wasn't ready to tackle the breathing without assistance quite yet. Chelsea stated, "He was retracting quite a bit, meaning he was breathing very hard. But the doctors said we are at the peak of it so hopefully he gets better from here on out." Maverick isn't on any medication as RSV is a virus that needs to run its course. His mom also shared that he is eating like a champ again, so right now it's just a waiting game. She added, "We don't know how long

we'll be here, so please keep those prayers coming."

Neither Chelsea or Anthony are able to work right now. Chelsea works as a Para in Grygla's Head Start room and often pitches in to help out in other parts of the school also. The Grygla School has put together an online silent auction for Chelsea and her family. Classes and organizations within the school will be putting baskets together as part of the fundraiser. In conclusion, Chelsea had expressed her gratitude, saying, "Thanks to everyone that has reached out to us. We really appreciate all the kind words. We also want to give a huge thanks to our school and our community for setting up the online silent auction for us, we can't appreciate you guys enough. It brings tears to my eyes and means the world to us that we have such an awesome support system while we go through all of this."

After losing her vision for about 20 minutes due to her first mini stroke, Chelsea's eye sight was slightly damaged, prompting her to now wear glasses. Her two mini strokes were caused by a hole in her heart. Due to the exertion of childbirth, a blood clot had traveled through the hole and down to her kidney. She will have a surgical scope procedure done on September 12th that will help her doctors determine their next step.

MinnesotaCare premium relief continues through 2025

Approximately 90,000 Minnesotans will continue to save money on MinnesotaCare premiums through the end of 2025, thanks to the federal Inflation Reduction Act signed last month by President Biden.

As part of the landmark law, MinnesotaCare premiums will remain at reduced levels for an additional three years, helping workers and families maintain their access to affordable health care. MinnesotaCare covers people who earn too much to qualify for Medicaid but not enough to purchase other health insurance.

Until January 2026, people with incomes under 160% of the federal poverty level will not have to pay premiums for MinnesotaCare. People whose incomes fall between 160% and 200% of the federal poverty level will pay reduced premiums. The lower premiums began in 2021 and had been set to end in January 2023, until the new federal legislation became law.

"MinnesotaCare premium relief makes a big difference for many families," Human Services Commissioner Jodi Harpstead said. "Continuing the savings through 2025 results in more affordable health care coverage for Minnesotans who are facing financial struggles."

MinnesotaCare is designed to offer affordable premiums and lower out-of-pocket costs for coverage that is typically broader than insurance options available on the individual market. The program includes dental, vision and comprehensive behavioral health services.

Because of the Affordable Care Act, higher premium tax credits result in lower MinnesotaCare premiums. In 2021 and 2022, premium tax credits were increased by the American Rescue Plan Act to improve the affordability of health coverage purchased through the federal exchange or a state health insurance exchange such as MNsure. The Inflation Reduction Act extends the enhanced premium tax credits through 2025.

Minnesotans can apply for MinnesotaCare online through MNsure, with the help of a navigator, or by working with their county. Enrollment is available year-round. Visit the DHS website at mn.gov/dhs/health-care to learn about application options and find help available in several languages.

Only in Minnesota: a weekly feature in the Eagle

Most people have no idea this unique tunnel in Minnesota exists

If you find yourself way up north, past Two Harbors on the North Shore, you'll likely drive through this scenic tunnel on Highway 61. It goes 1,344 feet through Silver Creek Cliff and was only finally completed in

1994 to prevent drivers from having to take the treacherous route near the cliff's edge, or a detour several miles inland that was used prior to the 1920s.

The tunnel took 3 years to complete because 500,000 cubic yards of rock had to be blown away. When the prior road

was being used, visitors were in constant danger of boulders tumbling down onto the pavement... not to mention the giant drop into Lake Superior that was stopped by only a small barrier. The tunnel is beautifully designed with tile-covered walls and provides a much safer route. You can still explore

the views from the old road, as the Gitchi-Gami State Trail runs right along the cliffside. This 86 miles of trail provides stunning views, and of course most importantly, a closer look at the history of places like Silver Creek Cliff.

DNR encourages deer hunters to make a plan for archery season

Minnesota's archery deer season opens on Saturday, Sept. 17, and the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is encouraging hunters to make a plan for their season by considering safety, hunting regulations, chronic wasting disease and steps they need to take to process their deer. Hunters can use the DNR's make a plan for deer season webpage (mndnr.gov/DeerHunt) to find comprehensive hunting and chronic wasting disease information they should review before going afield.

Anyone can register for an outdoor skills webinar on preparing for archery hunting at noon Wednesday, Sept. 21, on the outdoor skills and stewardship page of the DNR website (mndnr.gov/Discover).

Grouse season opens Saturday, Sept. 17

Ruffed grouse and spruce grouse hunting season begins Saturday, Sept. 17, and lasts through Jan. 1, 2023. Woodcock season is from Saturday, Sept. 24, through Monday, Nov. 7. Hunters can find a variety of grouse and woodcock hunting information, including where and when to hunt, regulations, and safety and educational resources for those who want to learn to hunt these forest birds, at the Minnesota DNR's grouse hunting webpage (mndnr.gov/Hunting/Grouse).

Additionally, hunters seeking sharp-tailed grouse need to know the hunting season in the east-central zone remains

closed. The hunting season in the northwest sharp-tailed grouse zone will open Saturday, Sept. 17, and last through Wednesday, Nov. 30.

Anyone can register for an outdoor skills webinar on ruffed grouse hunting basics at noon Wednesday, Sept. 14, on the outdoor skills and stewardship page of the DNR website (mndnr.gov/Discover).

DNR webinars cover the basics of grouse hunting and preparing for archery deer season

The DNR invites Minnesotans interested in wildlife and outdoor skills to tune in to upcoming webinars that will discuss the basics of hunting ruffed grouse and preparing for archery deer season.

The first webinar is at noon Wednesday, Sept. 14. Charlie Tucker, DNR area wildlife manager, and Kraig Kiger, shooting sports program coordinator, will discuss the basics of hunting ruffed grouse, including equipment, where and when to hunt, and hunting methods.

The second webinar is at noon Wednesday, Sept. 21. Dana Keller, an archery coach at A-1 Archery in Hudson and a Level 3 USA Archery coach and bowhunter, will discuss how to prepare for the upcoming archery deer season and ways to have a more successful hunting season this year.

The webinars are part of the DNR's Minnesota Outdoor Skills and Stewardship Series. The webinars are free but registration is required. More information is available on the outdoor skills and stewardship page of the DNR website (mndnr.gov/Discover).

Farmland Rental Rate Information

What is fair farmland rent, will be the focus of several fall meetings in person across the state. Landlords, farmers and agri-business professionals should make plans to attend one of the informative fair farm rental agreement meetings being held across Minnesota. These free meetings are being provided by the University of Minnesota Extension. Farmland rental rates are the largest input cost the farmer has. Determining a fair farm rent agreement is a challenge in today's economy with current high corn and soybeans prices in 2022.

Negotiating a fair rental agreement that satisfies the landowner and the farmer is a challenge. David Bau and Nathan Hulinsky, Extension educators in Ag Business Management, will provide several ways, including examples, fact-

sheets and worksheets, to determine a fair farmland rental rate for both parties.

Topics covered at the meetings will include local historic and projected farmland rental rate trends, current farmland values and sales, and a worksheet that will help determine a fair rental agreement. Input costs for 2022 will be presented along with current 2022 corn and soybean prices. Worksheets will examine 2023 costs, affordable rent rates for farmers, the rate of return to the landlord at current market values and examine flexible rental agreements.

The schedule for workshops can be found in October at extension.umn.edu. Attendees will receive several informative worksheets and factsheets that will help to determine what is a fair 2023 farmland rental rate.

After the in-person farmland rental rate workshops, there will be several online

sessions. Starting in January 2023 there will be several sessions virtual across the state.

The majority of the materials presented at the workshops, can be found at:

Here you can find a statewide map with rental rates recently updated with 2021 and 2022 county rents, a spreadsheet by county of cropland rental rates and worksheets for landlords and farmers to fill out to help determine what a fair rental rate is for 2023 for farmland or pasture.

Trends from FINBIN database show Minnesota rents increased from 2020 to 2021 by 4.6 percent.. The USDA Minnesota statewide averages from 2021 to 2022 farmland rents increased by 4.5% . The two estimates are both close to 4.5%. This could be one way to plot a trend for 2023 rents.
