Grain drive helps raise funds for new playground



Last week, the fundraising efforts were at \$50,000 towards the new playground equipment for the Goodridge School/Community. The end goal to renovate the entire playground has an estimated cost of \$220,000.

A recent grain drive helped the numbers get a little bit closer to that goal. Mishawn Homme and Brody Marquis, with the Farmer's Union Oil Fertilizer Plant in Goodridge, helped coordinate the local grain drive on October 8th. Local farmers made donations towards this project over the weekend. With it still being early in the harvest, many calls have also been received about people who are pledging to donate at a later date to one of the accounts at CHS Hazel and Farmer's Grain Thief River Falls.

The Goodridge School/Community playground equipment was purchased and put in place in 1992. Per a recent inspection, many pieces need to be upgraded and replaced due to wear and tear, as well as safety standards.

Donations are being accepted towards this playground renovation. You can send them to Tomas Loberg at the Goodridge School. Loberg added, "We have some larger grants in the works right now. Some of them look pretty likely, but nothing definitive. We are still climbing the hill and looking to get community members involved." The playground project is scheduled to begin in the summer of 2023.

Staying safe on cold water is everyone's responsibility

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources reminds anyone whose autumn plans include spending time on or around the water to keep safety in mind. While more boating-related accidents happen during the summer, boating fatalities are higher during the cold-water season. As water temperatures drop, water-based activities become riskier. A fall into a cold lake, pond or river can result in even a strong swimmer becoming incapacitated quickly. Further, cries for help can go unheard and rescues can take longer than in the warm-weather months when more people are on or near the water. "Nobody expects to encounter a life-or-death situation when they're out on the water, but the people who survive such experiences tend to be the ones who are best prepared," said Lt. Adam Block, DNR boating law administrator. The easiest and most effective way to stay safe and survive a fall into the water is to wear a life jacket. Having a life jacket "nearby" will not help in an accidental fall. Foam life jackets are the best option when the water is cold because inflatable life jackets may not fully inflate. While boating or paddling, people can reduce the likelihood of a fall overboard by distributing weight evenly and abiding by the manufacturer's weight limits. Changes in weather that result in shifting winds and storms can also lead to a treacherous situation, so it's vital for anglers, hunters and others recreating on or near the water to keep an eye to the sky. USDA funding available to help buy or repair homes

USDA Rural Development has funding available for low-income individuals and families seeking to purchase or repair a home in a rural area. The Direct Home Loan program offers financing to qualified very-low and low-income applicants that are unable to qualify for traditional financing. No down payment is required, and the interest rate could be as low as one percent with a subsidy. Applicants must meet income and credit guidelines and demonstrate repayment ability. The program is available in rural communities of generally 35,000 people or less. The maximum loan amount is \$40,000 at a one percent interest rate, repayable for a 20-year term and can be used to improve or modernize homes and do essential repairs. Grants of up to \$10,000 are available to homeowners 62 and older and must be used to remove health or safety hazards, such as fixing a leaking roof, installing indoor plumbing, or replacing a furnace. Time is limited to receive funds for the current fiscal year. Contact a USDA Rural Development Housing Specialist in your area today, to see if you qualify 218-681-2843 x4. USDA Rural Development loans and grants provide assistance that supports infrastructure improvements; business development; housing; community services such as schools, public safety and health care; and high-speed internet access in rural areas. 3 charming small towns in Minnesota with historic trolley tours

Minnesota is rich in history, both in its small towns and in its bustling cities. You can explore it through museums and historic tours – but there may be no better way to see the state than aboard one of its historic trolley tours. You can take Minnesota trolley tours across Stillwater, Chisholm, or Excelsior; each one is a little different. You'll see lovely street views and some of the state's

most historic buildings. When you're done exploring aboard an old-fashioned vehicle, some of these tours are bundled with museums that go more into the history of these fascinating vehicles.

1. Stillwater Trolley Co. (Stillwater)
Stillwater is a charming town of around 15,000, and it's full of historic sights to see aboard its famous trolley. The tours are given twice a day and three times on Saturday and only cost \$14 for adults for a

tour of the area. Some of the architecture in Stillwater is truly amazing, making this one of the best rides in town.

2. Minnesota Discovery Center (Chisholm)
The Minnesota Discovery Center is a small museum in Chisholm focusing on state history - and it has a \$5 seasonal trolley ride! It'll take you past some of the most fascinating turn-of-the-20th-century houses still standing in Minnesota. Once your tour is complete, explore the museum for some

fascinating looks back into the state's history.

3. Minnesota Streetcar Museum (Excelsior)
This museum has lovingly restored two real streetcar lines to run seasonally, and both can be ridden from the headquarters of the museum. The look outside the train is uniquely peaceful, especially during the fall. Not only are the usual rides a lot of fun, but the museum frequently hosts kid-friendly special events on board.

Creamy Roasted Butternut Squash Pasta with Sausage and Spinach

I do love me some squash – especially this time of year FRESH out of the garden. These cooler autumn nights make recipes like these just go hand in hand, don't they?!

Roasted Butternut Squash

2 cups butternut squash (peeled, seeded and cubed)
1 tablespoon olive oil
salt and pepper
Sausage
1 tablespoon olive oil
1/2 lb sausage, crumbled, without casings

Creamy Pasta Sauce
1 tablespoon olive oil
4 garlic cloves minced
6 oz spinach
1 cup heavy cream
1/3 cup Parmesan cheese shredded
1/4 teaspoon salt

Pasta Instructions

Roast Butternut Squash
Preheat oven to 400 F. In a large bowl, toss cubed butternut squash with olive oil, salt, and pepper. Spread the squash on a parchment paper-lined baking sheet in one layer, without over-crowding. Roast in the preheated oven at 400 F for 30 minutes. Remove from oven.

Cook Sausage
In a medium skillet, heat 1 tablespoon of olive oil on medium heat. Add crumbled sausage and cook for about 10 minutes, regularly stirring, until the sausage is cooked through. Remove from heat and set aside. Tip: Cook the sausage while the butternut squash is being roasted.

Make Creamy Sauce
In a separate, large skillet,

heat 1 tablespoon of olive oil together with minced garlic and spinach over medium heat. Cook, occasionally stirring, for about 5 or 7 minutes until spinach starts to wilt.

Add heavy cream. Bring to a brief boil, then immediately reduce to simmer (boiling but not intensely). Add shredded Parmesan cheese. Keep stirring the sauce with the Parmesan cheese on low to medium boil (simmer) until the cheese melts. Remove from heat. Season with salt to taste, about ¼ teaspoon of salt. No salt might be necessary if the sausage is very salty. Tip: Make the cream sauce while the butternut squash is being roasted.

Cook Pasta and Assemble

Cook pasta al dente in boiling water according to package instructions. That usually means cooking pasta in boiling water for about 7 to 11 minutes. Drain. To a large skillet with the creamy spinach sauce, add drained cooked pasta and cooked sausage. Stir. Season with salt and pepper, if desired. Top the pasta with roasted butternut squash. Stir the squash in or leave it on top.

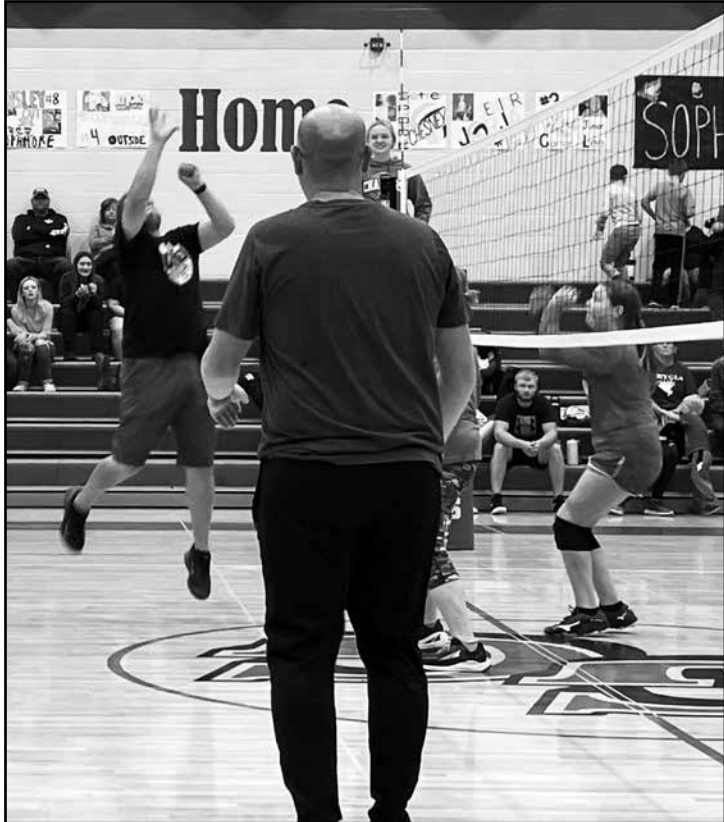
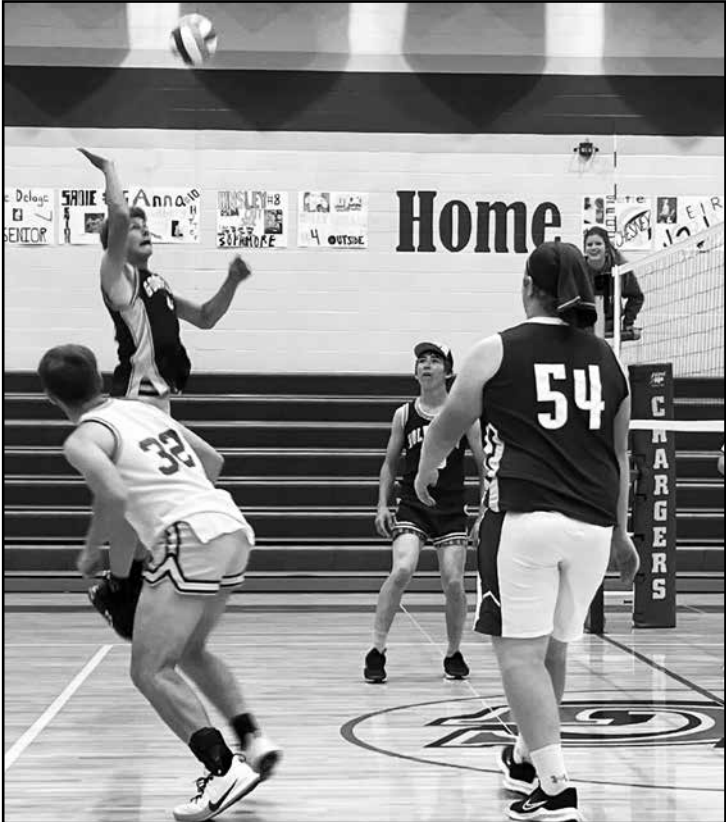
‘Battle for the Cattle’ last Friday night
