From Norway to Grygla

Dale Cariveau traveled to Grygla all the way from Norway in search of his Great Grandmother's grave. This was his second trip here. With help from the crew at the gas station in Grygla, Dale was pointed in the right direction, which included help from Tammy Sparby, who found the grave in the St. Petri plot book. The first time Dale traveled here about 12-15 years ago, he thought he had found the grave in Valle Cemetery, but it ended up being the wrong years.

Finally, this trip he found what he was looking for; Anne Olson's headstone.

Anne was originally from Norway. She was later married and settled near Thompson, ND. Anne's husband died in 1892. They had at least 10

children, one of which lived in Grygla and farmed. Anne then came to live with her son, Omund Olson. It turns out she is buried right next to him in the St. Petri Cemetery. Before heading out, Dale put an American flag on Omund's grave and a Norwegian flag by Anne's. He was hoping to see where Omund's original farmstead was, as he found out it was only a couple of miles south of St. Petri, but there is nothing left of the homestead. It's just farmland today.

Only in Minnesota: a weekly feature in the Eagle

Few people know the infamous Andrew Cunanan had a chilling history in Minnesota.

Although often overlooked in media accounts, the three-month murder spree that ended in the death of Gianni Versace began with Andrew Cunanan in Minnesota.

In late April of 1997, Cunanan traveled to Minneapolis to visit his friends Jeffrey Trail and David Madson. Shortly after his arrival, Cunanan's visit took a grisly turn.

On April 29, 1997, a concerned co-worker discovered the body of Cunanan's first victim, Jeffrey Trail, rolled up in a rug in this Minneapolis apartment building. Trail's body was found in David Madson's apartment.

The co-worker had come to check on Madson, who had failed to show up at work for several days.

At first, police suspected

that Madson had killed Trail. Eventually, police learned Cunanan had stolen Trail's handgun. He then lured Trail to Madson's apartment, ostensibly to retrieve the gun. But when Trail arrived, Cunanan bludgeoned him to death with a claw hammer.

Madson's friends and family members insisted that Cunanan had kidnapped him.

Tragically, their suspicions proved correct. A few days later, on May 3, 1997, two fishermen discovered Madson's body on the shore of East Rush Lake, near Rush City, Minnesota. Cunanan had used Trail's handgun to kill him.

On the same day, Cunanan drove Madson's Jeep to Chicago, where he bound and tortured renowned real estate developer Lee Miglin in a garage behind his Gold Coast townhome. Miglin was found stabbed to death. Cunanan left Madson's Jeep and stole Mi-

glin's Lexus. Law enforcement agencies launched a nationwide manhunt for Cunanan, spearheaded by the FBI.

Cunanan fled Chicago and drove to New York, then Pennsylvania. He eventually ended up in New Jersey, where he killed his fourth victim, William Reese, on May 9, 1997, and stole his red Chevrolet pickup.

Reese was a caretaker at Finn's Point National Cemetery. His wife alerted authorities when he didn't come home for dinner. Police discovered his body in the caretaker's office at the cemetery. He had been shot with the same gun Cunanan had used to murder Madson. Law enforcement tracked Cunanan to South Florida, where he arrived around May 12, 1997.

Cunanan's trail went cold for more than two months. The FBI added Cunanan to its "Most Wanted" fugitives list on

June 12, 1997.

On the morning of July 15, 1997, Cunanan assassinated Gianni Versace in front of his Miami Beach home. Versace had gone out to a cafe to buy magazines and was just returning when Cunanan ambushed him. Cunanan evaded capture for another eight days until law enforcement found him hiding aboard a houseboat on July 23, 1997.

A Miami Police SWAT team and FBI agents stormed the vessel only to discover that Cunanan had fatally shot himself with the gun he'd used to murder Versace.

Although Versace and Miglin are the most often mentioned victims of Cunanan's murderous rampage, the serial killer brought untold sorrow to the friends and family of his Minnesota victims, David Madson and Jeffrey Trail, as well.

Thursday, November 17:

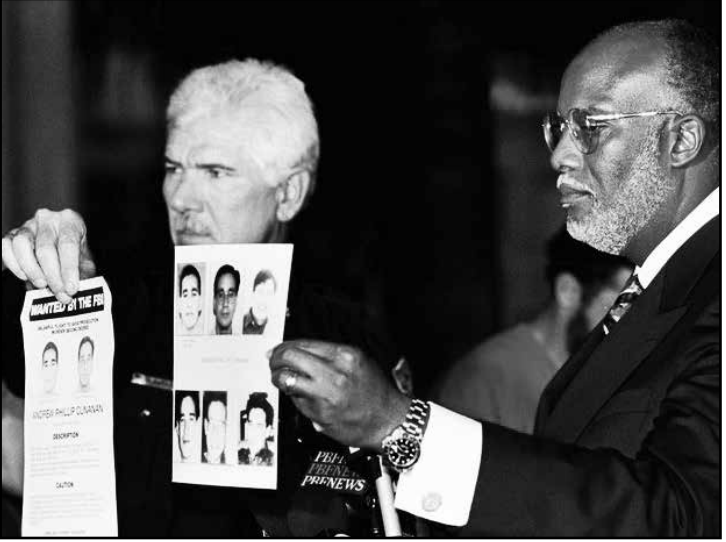
Winter housing – space requirements, feeding strategies and spring scours

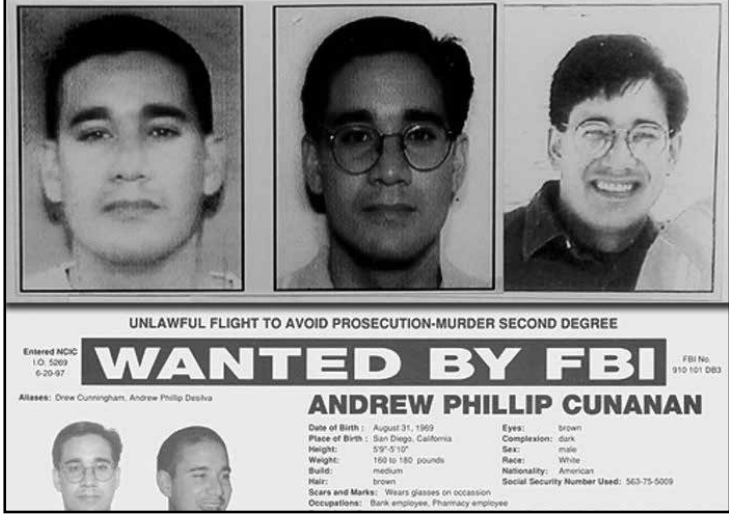

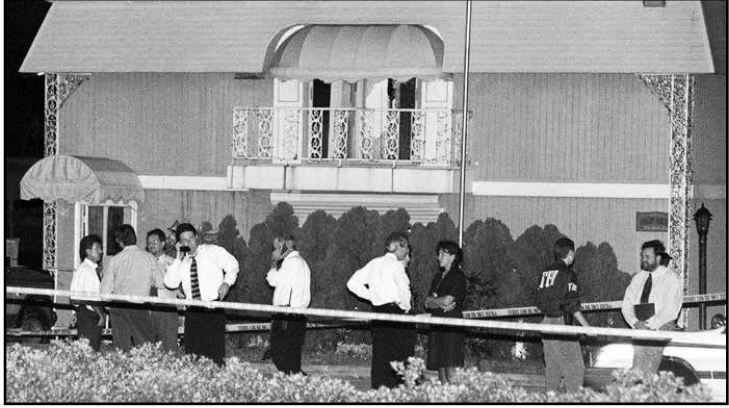

Is there a cost to participate?

Make a plan for deer hunting season

As deer hunters enjoy current hunting seasons and 400,000 hunters prepare for the opening of firearms deer season on Saturday, Nov. 5, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources reminds them to plan ahead for a safe and enjoyable hunt.

The DNR's online make a plan tool (mndnr.gov/Deer-Hunt) provides a comprehensive step-by-step list of information hunters need to consider before heading to deer camp. The tool covers topics including hunting regulations, deer processing, chronic wasting disease sampling, safety and how to make the most out of a hunt. To use the online tool, hunters need their deer permit area number, which they can find on an interactive deer map.

In Minnesota, archery deer season began Sept. 17 and continues through Saturday, Dec. 31; firearms deer season begins Saturday, Nov. 5, with various closing dates depending on a hunter's DPA; and muzzleloader season is Saturday, Nov. 26, through Sunday, Dec. 11.

Individual Artist Grants have a November 15 deadline

Individual Artist Grants have a November 15 deadline for \$1,500 and an ongoing deadline for quick turnaround grants for \$500. These grants are awarded to performing artists, visual artists, media artists, and creative writing artists from our seven county Minnesota service area including Kittson, Marshall, Norman, Pennington, Polk, Red Lake, and Roseau counties.

Individuals must be out of high school and at least 18 years of age to be eligible. College tuition is not an eligible expense. This is the main category that individuals use

to support their artistic business or advance their technical skills. This category is for non-hobby artists who make substantial yearly income from their art. Grants are awarded annually with \$1,500 going to four individuals. Support for this program comes from The McKnight Foundation.

Nonprofits and government organizations can apply for one arts project at a time. Upcoming grants deadlines for these are November 1 and March 1. Grants are between \$500 and \$10,000. Funding sources for these grants are Clean Water, Land and Legacy funds and

general allocation funds from the State of Minnesota.

Organizational arts activities funded through these two very important grant opportunities include festivals, community theatre projects, folk music entertainment, sponsorship of visual demonstrations, creative writing workshops and many other activities that improve the quality of life of people in our communities. This is a great way to bring arts experiences to your community.

Schools in our seven-county region can also apply now for an Artist Residency grant of

\$2,600 plus an additional \$400 if the residency needs supplies. Our teaching artist roster is a great resource to view artists available to teach in our area and is available on our website at www.NorthwestMinnesotaArtsCouncil.org under the artists tab. Another resource to view artists available to enhance curriculum is COMPAS.

Schools can initially apply for one residency. Then based on remaining funding, can request up to three additional residencies into spring and summer. Funding for residency activities comes from the Clean Water, Land and Legacy

Amendment in Minnesota.

Schools can also apply for Arts Equipment for their school by November 1 each year. Grants are for up to \$3,000 with a 25% cash match requirement. Funds for this arts equipment in schools grant program come from the general fund of the State of Minnesota.
