Arts grants funding available

Individual Artist Grants have a November 15 deadline for \$1,500 and an ongoing deadline for quick turnaround grants for \$500. These grants are awarded to performing artists, visual artists, media artists, and creative writing artists from our seven county Minnesota service area including Kittson, Marshall, Norman, Pennington, Polk, Red Lake, and Roseau counties.

Individuals must be out of high school and at least 18 years of age to be eligible. College tuition is not an eligible expense. This is the main category that individuals use to support their artistic business or advance their technical skills. This category is for non-hobby artists who make substantial yearly income from their art. Grants are awarded annually with \$1,500 going to four individuals. Support for this program comes from The McKnight Foundation.

Nonprofits and government organizations can apply for one arts project at a time. Upcoming grants deadlines for these

are November 1 and March 1. Grants are between \$500 and \$10,000. Funding sources for these grants are Clean Water, Land and Legacy funds and general allocation funds from the State of Minnesota.

Organizational arts activities funded through these two very important grant opportunities include festivals, community theatre projects, folk music entertainment, sponsorship of visual demonstrations, creative writing workshops and many other activities that improve the quality of life of people in our communities. This is a great way to bring arts experiences to your community.

Schools in our seven-county region can also apply now for an Artist Residency grant of \$2,600 plus an additional \$400 if the residency needs supplies. Our teaching artist roster is a great resource to view artists available to teach in our area and is available on our website at www.NorthwestMinnesotaArtsCouncil.org under the artists tab. Another resource to view artists available to en-

hance curriculum is COMPAS.

Schools can initially apply for one residency. Then based on remaining funding, can request up to three additional residencies into spring and summer. Funding for residency activities comes from the Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment in Minnesota.

Schools can also apply for Arts Equipment for their school by November 1 each year. Grants are for up to \$3,000 with a 25% cash match requirement. Funds for this arts equipment in schools grant program come from the general fund of the State of Minnesota.

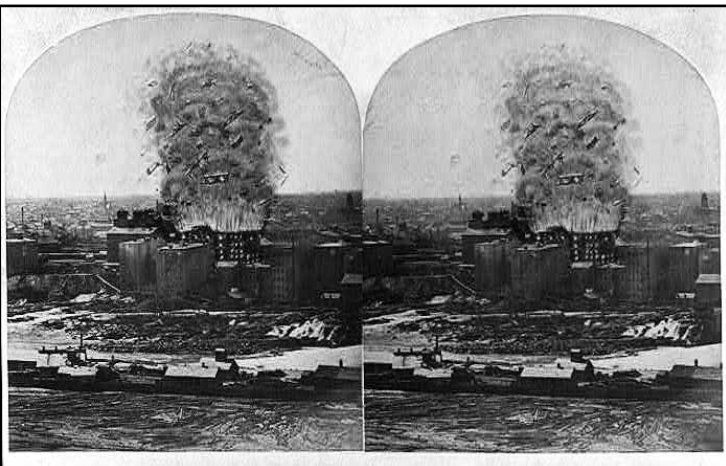
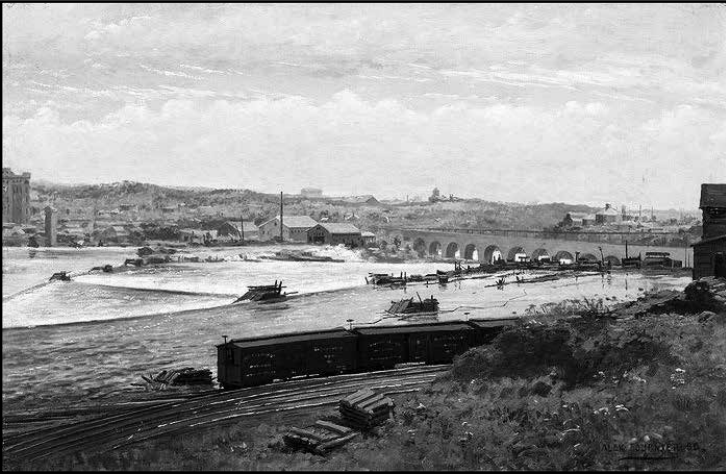

Only in Minnesota: a weekly feature in the Eagle

One of the deadliest accidents in U.S. history happened right here in Minnesota

For the most part, not a whole lot happens in Minnesota. Sure, we have crimes and other incidents. But few events ever draw national attention. However, Minnesota is the site of one of the deadliest accidents in U.S. history. It happened long ago, but it will not soon be forgotten. By the time Minnesota officially became a state in 1858, it was already home to a thriving milling industry.

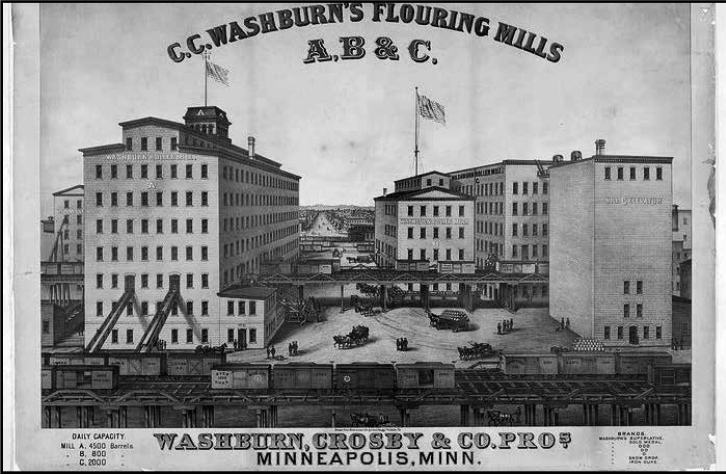
Both flour and lumber milling were profitable, with the state's busy rivers serving as the base of operations. In Minneapolis, many flour mills sprouted up along the banks of the Mississippi River. It was all the mills could do to keep up with demand. At one point, Minneapolis was known as the Flour Milling Capital of the World.



In 1874, the enormous Washburn A Mill was built along the river. Started by Cadwallader Washburn — future founder of General Mills — it was one of the city's largest employers. Four years after it was built, in 1878, the 200 employees were going about their business when disaster struck. As workers changed shifts, an enormous explosion rang out. Some say it could be heard 10 miles away in St. Paul. Fourteen workers were killed in the initial explosion. And in the ensuing fire, four more were killed.

With about half of the city's flour supply gone, Cadwallader Washburn promised to rebuild. In time, he did. He implemented many new safety standards designed to prevent such a disaster from occurring again.

Today, you can still visit ruins of the mill at the Mill City Museum.



Minnesota Crookston Trap finishes regular season ranked third in conference

Two former Grygla Chargers Trap Team members are on this team - Peyton Verbout and Gracie Lunsetter! Congrats to them both!

The University of Minnesota Crookston trap team finished the regular season in third place in USA College Clay Target League Conference 1A-4. The Golden Eagles had 3,075 points over five weeks of the regular season. Their week five score was 638.0, their third-best team score of the season. Minnesota Crookston finished 567.5 points behind Lake Superior College, and 619.5 points behind Southwest Wisconsin Technical College. They defeated Lake Area Technical College and Mount Aloysius College.

Lily Krona (So., Bemidji, Minn.) finished the regular season in third among all female shooters in the USA College Clay Target League, with an average of 23.7. Alysia Kasprick (Sr., Thief River

Falls, Minn.) finished tied for eighth among female shooters with an average of 22.7.

Cole Girtz (Jr., Park Rapids, Minn.) was ranked sixth in the conference for all male shooters, averaging 24.2 for the season. Nick Grams (Sr., Belle Plaine, Minn.) finished ninth among male shooters in the conference, with an average of 24.0. Krona was second in the conference for female shooters, with an average of 23.7. Kasprick finished fifth. Kelsey Harms (Fr., Norwood Young America, Minn.) was tied for seventh with teammate Heather Kaup (Fr., Forest Lake, Minn.), both averaging 22.1.

The Golden Eagles were guided during their final week by Girtz, who hit 49-of-50 targets. Harms also hit 49-of-50 targets to help lead the way, as did Charles Walsh (Sr., Park Rapids, Minn.) Grams connected on 47-of-50 targets for the Golden Eagles. Krona went 47-of-50, as did Ellen Payne (So., St. Louis Park, Minn.). Brandon Van Den Einde (Fr., Fertile, Minn.) went 46-of-50

for the final week, as did Peyton Verbout (Sr., Goodridge, Minn.). Gracie Lunsetter (So., Gatzke, Minn.) connected on 45-of-50 targets, as did Jaeden McCleary (Sr., Enderlin, N.D.). Josiah Bullivant (Sr., Dassel, Minn.) went 44-of-50 for the week, as did Cali Gutknecht (Fr., Mayer, Minn.), and Kasprick. Lane Hanson (Fr., Ada, Minn.) connected on 43-of-50 targets, as did Kaup, and Hailey Olson (Jr., Albertville, Minn.). Hunter Kasprovicz (So., Radium, Minn.) was 41-of-50 for the week. Ethan Benedict (Fr., Maple Grove, Minn.) connected on 40-of-50, as did Collin Schlomann (Fr., Redwood Falls, Minn.). Madie Wildfeuer (Sr., Ormsby, Minn.) was 37-of-50.

The other USA College Clay Target League conferences were won by Mid Michigan College, Black Hawk College, and Western Michigan University.

The Golden Eagles will now compete in the 2022 College National Championship. It allows all USA College Clay Target teams to participate in a virtu-

al event to cap off the 2022 fall season. The event will run from October 31-November 7. The teams in the USA College Clay Target League are: Minnesota Crookston, Mid Michigan, Garden City Community College, Jefferson Community College, Lawrence Technological University, Cayuga Community College, Kent State University, Black Hawk College, Williston State College, Black River Technical College, Indiana Wesleyan University, Wilmington College, Bemidji State University, Western Michigan, Bismarck State College, Itasca Community College, Bethany Lutheran College, Paul Smith's College, McPherson College, Ferris State University, Southwest Wisconsin Technical College, Lake Superior College, Lake Area Technical College, and Mount Aloysius College.

Minnesota Crookston is in their first season under Head Coach Anne Prudhomme and is in their fourth season as a program. They finished fifth out of six teams in the conference during the 2021 season.

The fall fisheries assessment on the Red Lakes found the walleye population to be at a healthy, sustainable level with a wide range of sizes. This winter's walleye regulation on Upper Red Lake is based on the abundance of mature female walleye, or spawning stock, in "optimal" condition. The fall numbers indicated that a regulation that allows a moderate amount of harvest is most appropriate to maintain spawning stock at a level that is both sustainable and promotes the consistent success of new year classes.

Last winter, the bag limit was four fish in an effort to reduce "surplus" spawning stock to a level that is more likely to encourage success of young fish and relieve some pressure off the walleye population's primary forage, yellow perch.

"We are actively managing for optimal spawning stock

to maximize the likelihood of strong year classes, which bodes well for future fishing," said Edie Evarts, Bemidji area fisheries supervisor with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. "Our fall survey indicated that the walleye population is healthy and there should be an abundance of harvestable fish just under 17 inches, and always an opportunity to catch a larger fish."

The Red Lake Nation and the DNR manage the walleye harvest on Red Lake under a joint harvest plan that the Red Lakes Fisheries Technical Committee revised in 2015.

The DNR will determine next year's open water harvest regulations after the winter fishing season. An Upper Red Lake Citizen Advisory Committee reviews walleye harvest totals and regulation options and provides recommendations for regulations for the state waters of Upper Red Lake.
