Hello Special Readers! I don't know what the weather will be when you're reading this, but right now it's quite yucky outside and the perfect day for curling up in a comfy chair and reading a book. I sure wish I had the time for that, but today's pretty busy. I hope that you're enjoying some quiet time though. Let me know what books held your interest on this snowy/rainy day. Maybe I'd enjoy something you're reading. (Smile!)

Well, we have the March items on the shelf for you now. It sure would be great to have you come in and pick out a few of them to take home! I'll share a few of the items here with you now and maybe you'll see something that piques your interest.

Two of the paperbacks we got in are LADY LUCK by Kristen Ashley and BIG JACK by J.D. Robb. The first book is about two people down on their luck and what happens when they get together. The second book is about Robb's NYPSD Lieutenant, Eve Dallas and the case she's currently embroiled in.

Seed Quality Issues

Growers and seed suppliers are in the midst of preparations for 2016 planting season, including the conditioning, sale and delivery of seed. Because of the given economic environment in agriculture, the natural tendency is to save money on each acre planted. U M and N D S U Extension agronomists have always maintained that seed is the one input in which you can't afford mistakes, including the purchase of cheap or low quality products. Working with a reliable seed retailer and understanding variety protection laws are two ways farmers can ensure they are planting high quality seed this year.

Field crop performance primarily is related to the genetic characteristics of the variety and adaptability of the variety to a geographic area's environment. Quality issues affect the emergence, vigor and health of developing stands of all crops. To help keep form making seeding mistakes; farmers need to pay close attention to the seed label. Germination, purity and seed count all contribute to the final stand count, which is important in today's precision planting environment. Know each variety's optimum plant population and how the label claim, especially in regard to germination and seed count, will equate to viable plant populations.

If you are using on farm or bin run seed, have the seed tested at an accredited laboratory for germination, purity and seed health issues. For example, test barley seeds for loose smut. Trained seed analysts can determine seed viability; what may look like a germinating seed in a home germ test may not produce a viable seedling under field conditions. Analysts also can identify the presence of weed seed, including perennial noxious types that are present in a sample. All farmers should work with a reliable seed retailer. A seed label or bulk certificate (with required seed testing information) must be provided at point of sale, and the variety protection status also should be clearly labeled. State and federal laws requires that all seed offered for sale must be labeled, and Minnesota and North Dakota seed law requires sellers to be licensed by the state Seed Department to label and market seed.

The North Dakota Seed De-

partment has identified some roving seed dealers and if they are working there; they are probably in Minnesota as well. These individuals or companies should be treated with caution and reported to the state seed department. Growers need to understand and respect variety protection laws. Nearly every seed source is protected by the variety owner under the Plant Variety Protection Act or plant patent. The use of on farm seed is legal in some cases, most often related to cereal crops. That use only applies if the seed has been acquired legally, meaning the farmer replants only the seed he purchased in a previous planting season. There is virtually no scenario where a farmer to farmer transfer of non-certified, commonly called brown bagging, is legal under variety protection laws, and other technology agreements protecting a variety or trait may be in place.

Seed produced under strict inspection and testing regimes found in seed certification programs are the industry standard for quality control. Certified seed represents a grower's best opportunity for good field performance, especially under difficult conditions. SIMPLY DELICIOUS

Maple Dijon Roasted Carrots

This is a tasty and super easy side dish that's perfect for Easter, or any other dinner for that matter!

This isn't your average maple Dijon glaze; it's been kicked up with the addition of garlic, soy sauce, rice vinegar and miso, which really creates a great blend of flavors. It requires very little effort to make this side dish - you simply clean the carrots, mix the glaze, toss the carrots in the glaze and roast until tender. That's less than 5 minutes of active time to create this simply delicious side dish.

- Serves 6**
Ingredients
2 pounds carrots, well scrubbed or peeled
2 tablespoons oil
2 tablespoons maple syrup
1/2 tablespoon grainy mustard
1/2 tablespoon Dijon mustard
1/2 tablespoon white miso paste
1/2 tablespoon rice vinegar
2 teaspoons soy sauce
1 small clove garlic, grated
Directions
Toss the carrots in half of the mixture of oil, maple syrup,

mustards, miso, vinegar, soy sauce and garlic. Arrange in a single layer on a baking sheet and bake in a preheated 400 degree oven until tender and lightly golden brown, about 20-30 minutes, turning half way through. Toss them in the remaining glaze prior to serving.

Note: You will want young carrots, with the leaves still on, and you want them to be thin, about 3/4 of an inch or less, so that they roast quickly.

Note: You should be able to find the miso in the Asian section of grocery stores and if you cannot find it simply omit.



DO IT YOURSELF

DIY 1: You've probably got the Easter Sunday menu down, but how about the centerpiece for your table? How unique and beautiful is this arrangement?! White eggs, brown eggs and dyed pink eggs (hard-boiled) arranged around your fresh flowers are a sure way to dress up the table for your guests.

DIY 2: Easter wouldn't be complete without an Easter bunny or two around the house, and these bunny spoon puppets are no exception! The puppets are really quick and simple to make, and you may already find you have some of the supplies at home.

Time to make - 45 minutes per spoon (including drying time)

You will need
Wooden spoons
Acrylic paint in white and gray

Round wiggle eyes
One sheet of white, gray and pink felt
Black permanent pen
Strong glue

How to make
Begin by painting the spoons with white or grey acrylic paint. Leave to dry. Cut out ears from grey or white felt, and then cut the inner ear pieces and nose from pink felt. Glue the pink inner ear onto the outer ear and leave to dry. Glue the ears to the back of the spoon, then glue the felt nose and wiggly eyes onto the center of the spoon. Add a smile and dots for whiskers using a black pen.

Time for spring burning - restrictions coming soon

Spring burning restrictions are anticipated to go in effect in northwest Minnesota counties by the end of March and will remain in place until grasses green up, usually mid-May. At present, burning permits are required in snow-free, open areas unless unbroken snow cover remains in the area surrounding the fire. Small campfires less than 3 feet across are allowed, but must be attended and put out cold.

During the burning restriction period, only variance permits for agricultural operations are issued, and only from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources Forestry offices.

Wildfires start and spread easily in the spring when grasses are brown and warm windy days are common. Spring burning restrictions have significantly

reduced the number of wildfires that occur in April and May. Fewer wildfires reduce the strain on volunteer fire departments that respond to the majority of wildfires in northwest Minnesota.

Restricting open burning during the high fire danger seasons is an effective way to prevent wildfires. The DNR encourages people to consider alternatives to burning, such as using municipal composting sites. If this is not practical, the summer growing season and winter are the preferred times to burn brush piles.
