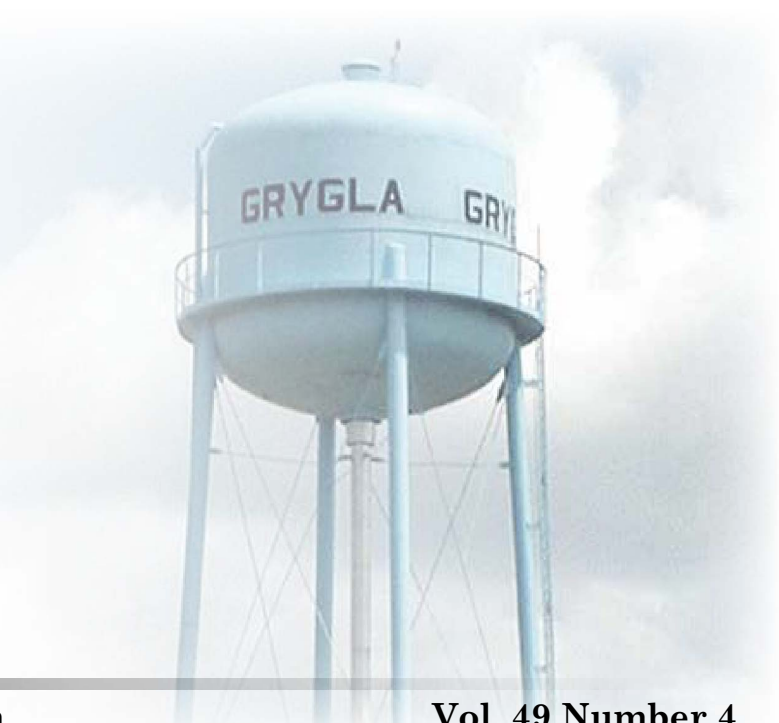

Elementary basketball/ECFE night

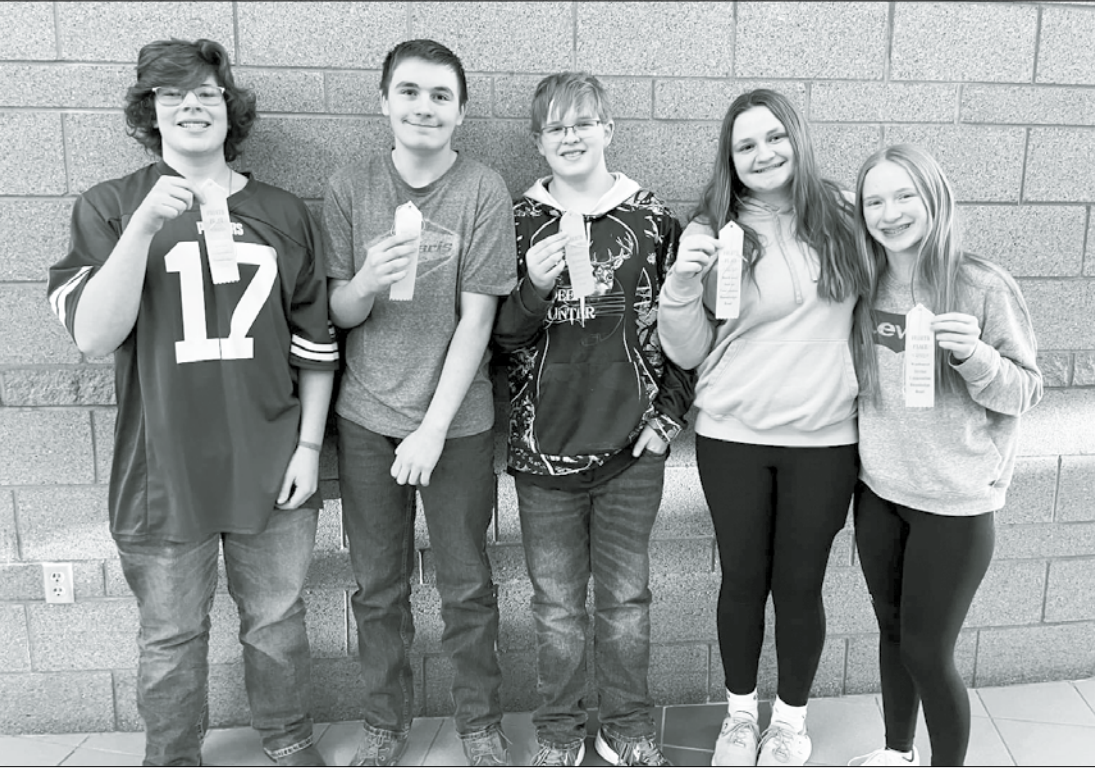

Only in Minnesota: a weekly feature in the Eagle

You won't want to miss the most eye-popping Lady's Slipper bloom in Minnesota this spring

Spring tends to come a little later in Minnesota than in many other places, but by April, we start to see some lovely wildflowers popping in the southern part of the state. However, if you wait just a bit longer – toward the end of May and into June, when spring starts thinking about putting on its summer clothes – you'll be treated to a favorite wildflower bloom in the Land of 10,000 Lakes. It's this time of year when we start to see Lady's Slippers in Minnesota, and there's one spot, in particular, where they're not only spectacular, they're incredibly accessible. Head on over to the Lady Slipper Scenic Byway and see for yourself!

The Lady Slipper Scenic Byway runs between Blackduck and U.S. Route 2 on the east side of Cass Lake. Starting in late May and running through June, keep your eyes peeled and scan the roadsides for Lady's Slippers, which are orchids that are native in

Minnesota. In fact, the Showy Lady's Slipper is our state flower. As you reach Pennington township, just north of where the byway crosses the still-tiny Mississippi River, you'll find a rest area. It's more than just a rest area, though. There's also a boardwalk trail into the boggy woods where you can see them up close for yourself. During the late spring, orchids bloom all along the boardwalk. In late May and early June, you'll start to see pink Lady's Slippers. Yellow Lady's Slippers - both large and small - start to arrive around then, as well. Later in the season, in mid-June, start looking for the stars of the show: Showy Lady's Slippers. It's always wonderful to hit that mid-June sweet spot when you'll find all of the varieties in bloom at the same time!

Plan to make a trip to the Lady Slipper Scenic Byway this spring. With its location right on the edge of the Chippewa National Forest, this part of the state is simply gorgeous – and it's perfect for a weekend getaway.

Baked Potato Soup

This Baked Potato Soup has a thick and creamy broth that's loaded with bacon and chives, cheddar cheese, sour cream, and smooth potatoes. It's a really filling dish and so easy to make.

Ingredients

- 4 large russet potatoes, equal to 2 lbs.
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 6 slices bacon
- 1 large yellow onion
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 Tablespoon butter
- ¼ cup flour
- 3 ½ cups chicken broth
- 2 cups half and half
- ¾ cup sour cream
- ½ teaspoon pepper
- 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 1/8 cup chives, finely diced

Instructions

Cut the bacon into 1-inch squares with kitchen shears. Cook in a large pot over low heat. Remove and set aside once crisp. Leave 2 Tablespoons of drippings in the pot. While the bacon cooks, peel the potatoes and cut them into 1-inch cubes. Add to a stock pot and cover the potatoes with 1 inch of water. Add the salt and boil gently for 20 minutes or until very fork tender. Drain, then gently mash. Set aside.

Add the diced onion to the pot with the bacon drippings and cook until softened, about 5 minutes.

Add garlic and butter and

cook 1 more minute.

Whisk in flour, use a silicone spatula to stir as the flour cooks for 1 full minute to remove the raw flour taste.

Add the chicken broth. Use a silicone spatula to loosen any bacon remnants from the bottom of the pot, this will add flavor.

Slowly add the half and half. Bring to a boil, then reduce to a simmer.

Stir in the potatoes, then mix in the sour cream, and pepper.

Remove from heat. If desired, blend with an immersion blender or transfer it to a blender in batches.

Gradually sprinkle with shredded cheese and stir until combined. Make sure the base of the soup isn't too hot or the cheese won't melt creamy and smooth. The soup will continue to thicken as it sits.

Garnish with chives and bacon, serve.



DNR postpones elk research project in northwest Minnesota



The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is postponing the elk research project in northwest Minnesota due to scheduling delays and unfavorable conditions to safely and successfully capture and collar elk.

Capture efforts were planned for January 2025, when temperature and snow conditions are typically optimal for spotting and capturing elk. Scheduling delays by the contracted helicopter capture company pushed captures to mid-March and currently, the project area has no or minimal snowpack. Both near- and long-term forecasts predict above average temperatures and inadequate snow accumulation.

"The decision to postpone the project was difficult and made out of an abundance of caution for the health and well-being of the elk," said Amanda McGraw, DNR deer, moose and elk scientist. "Not only were we facing challenging conditions due to higher temperatures and lack of snow cover, but the delays had pushed the capture window into the late-term pregnancy period for cow elk, where capture and handling present the greatest risk to both cows and calves."

The project is rescheduled for the winters of 2025-2026 and 2026-2027. Researchers plan to capture 25 adult cows and up to 15 adult bulls each

of these two winter seasons and fit the animals with GPS collars that will collect their locations every three hours and alert researchers of potential mortality events. Biological samples will also be collected to assess herd health and genetic diversity.

Cow elk will also be fitted with transmitters so researchers know when they give birth, allowing researchers to quickly locate newborn calves. Up to 25 calves each spring will be fitted with GPS collars to monitor their survival and assess what habitat types they are using.

The research will allow managers to better understand the state's elk population and address interest in maintaining and strengthening the resiliency of the elk population and the potential for future growth of Minnesota's elk herds.

Funding for the elk research project comes from the Minnesota Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund as recommended by the Legislative-Citizen Commission on Minnesota Resources and approved by the Minnesota Legislature. The DNR is also providing in-kind support.
