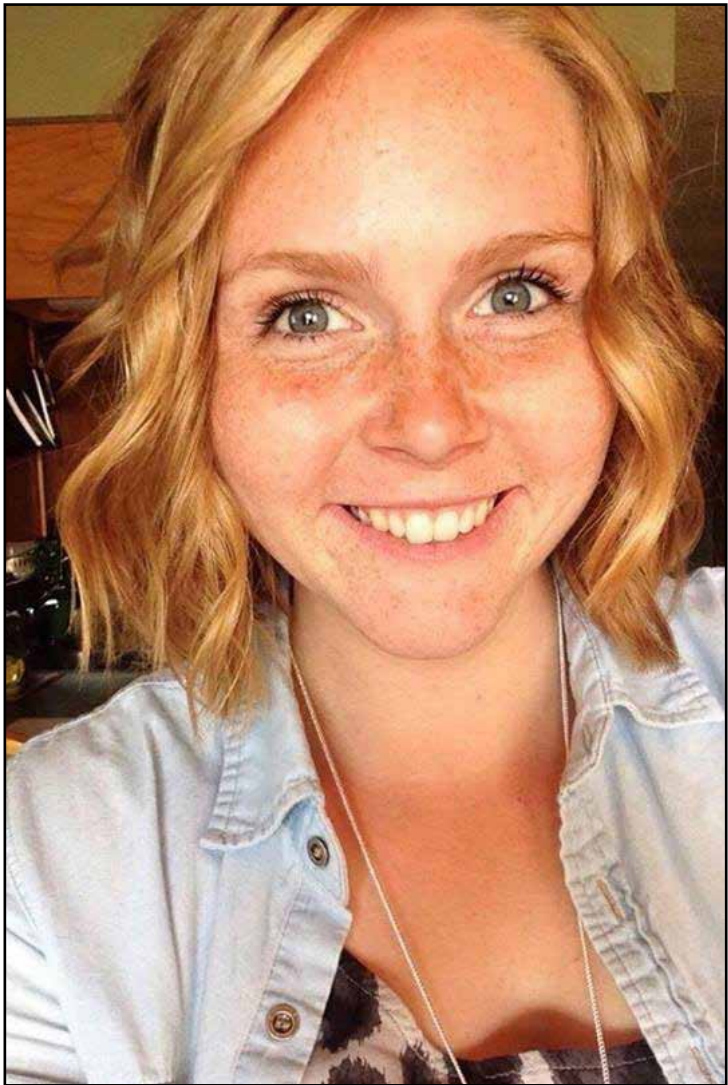

Sorvig shares follow-up from her Mayo Clinic visit

As a follow-up to last week's front page story on her rare medical diagnosis, Amy Sorvig shares information from her visit to the Mayo Clinic last week. Amy met with her doctors on Wednesday, June 1st. What was supposed to be only 3 appointments that day, ended up being 11. After doing numerous tests, her thyroid doctor said Amy's numbers looked good and he had no concerns about her thyroid moving forward. The cancer, along with the thyroid, has been removed and the radioactive iodine pill she took a few months ago seems to have done its job. Amy's doctors will do a follow-up appointment in six months, along with an ultrasound to make sure no cancerous tissues are left. She'll have to be on thyroid meds for the rest of her life, but her doctors feel confident the thyroid issues have all been taken care of.

Next, Amy and her husband, Ryan, met with a team of doctors concerning her Erdheim Chester Disease. To summarize, although the disease isn't curable, her doctors are

hopeful they can keep it under control and also help reduce the swelling in her eyes. Amy met with a new doctor who is world renowned for this particular disease. "You'll never truly be cured at this point, because there is no cure at this point, but we can do treatments that we feel will help," he told her.

At this stage, Amy's new medication and treatment plan is a chemo injection that she will give herself weekly. She will be able to administer the shot into her stomach from home, which helps with the travel to and from the Mayo. She is hopeful her insurance will cover this medication, but they are still waiting for the final approval. Her doctors want to keep her on this injection for six months to a year; after that, they'll see where she is at and how her body is responding. "Some people have been taken off the medication and the disease hasn't returned...some people it has," they informed her.

Amy left the Mayo Clinic feeling reassured. "They told me I'll be a lifer at the Mayo.

I'll have a group of specialized doctors that will keep a close eye on me and do regular checkups," she said. "I felt much better leaving this time," she added.

Amy goes back to the Mayo Clinic in four weeks to see how her body is handling the new medication. Although the disease is rare, and isn't fully understood in the medical community, Amy does have a better understanding of it after meeting with her doctors. "Is the disease a cancer or an autoimmune disorder? They don't really know for sure. It's being classified as a cancer because it seems to respond well to cancer treatments. But from what I understand, the blood produces white blood cells that fight off infections. For whatever reason, my body over produces and it gets "stuck" so-to-speak and attaches to the muscles or eye tissue," she explained. "It's been a fight in the medical community about what to label Erdheim Chester – a cancer or an autoimmune disease."

In last week's story, it had mentioned Amy was having

trouble with her ankle. The Erdheim Chester Disease can show up in the long bones of the body, so Amy was concerned about this. As of right now, it's only present in her eyes, but she is waiting on the results of the bone x-rays. "My doctor said it could be the Erdheim Chester affecting my ankle, but we'll have to wait and see," Amy said.

Amy had a lot of precautionary tests done at the Mayo, including a contrast MRI on her brain; everything came back normal there with nothing showing up.

For now, Amy feels relieved. "All in all, I'm happy with the way things went. At least this time, I wasn't sent home with a bunch of bad news," she says.

She'll be meeting with her team of doctors again in July and they will go from there.

Amy and her husband, Ryan, have one daughter, Ava, who is 9 years old. A benefit is being held for Amy this Sunday, June 12th, from 12-4pm at the Grygla Community Center.

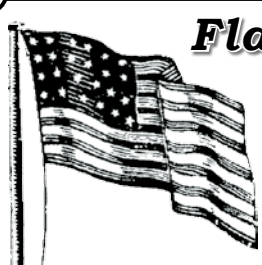

The Beltrami County Sheriff's Office, Division of Emergency Management, has scheduled an additional Skywarn class in Beltrami County. The class will be held on Thursday, June 16th, 6pm, at Our Savior's Lutheran Church, 37048 Hamre Rd NW, rural Grygla. The 2.5 hour class is free, open to the public and there are no pre-requisites to attend; no RSVP is needed. Skywarn was developed by the National Weather Service in the early 1970's to equip the public and emergency responders with training in the detection of severe weather and how to effectively and efficiently report severe weather to the National Weather Service. Skywarn spotters provide real-time information to the National Weather Service, which assists in forecasting and the warning decisions during severe weather. Class attendees will be provided with the National Weather Service Field Spotter's Guide and view a multi-media presentation on severe weather. Anyone with an interest in weather or becoming a contributing Skywarn member is invited to attend. Wet Weather Raises Nitrogen Loss Concerns

Brad Carlson, UM Extension Educator, who works with soils and water quality, shares this week's timely tip.

Recent, excessively wet weather has raised concerns over the possibility of nitrogen (N) loss in corn for some parts of Minnesota. As the calendar has now turned to June, it's likely that anywhere from half to all of the applied N, regardless of the fertilizer form or application timing, is in the nitrate form. This conversion is due to soil microbial activity and is fueled by heat and moisture. This is significant, since nitrate is susceptible to environmental loss.

Nitrate will "denitrify" when the soil is saturated. Denitrification is the conversion of nitrate into inert nitrogen gas, which is then lost to the atmosphere. This is also a microbial process that speeds up when the soil is warm. Most recently, the Southern Research and Outreach Center in Waseca reported the 4" soil temperature was at 64° F. Research shows that soils that stay saturated for four days at this temperature will lose approximately 10% of the N present in the nitrate form, and the loss approaches 20% if the soil stays saturated for 10 days.

Additionally, nitrate will leach (move downward) as the water drains away. A rule of thumb for this is that nitrate will travel approximately 6" for every 1" of water that leaves as drainage. It is important to note that these processes will be highly variable across most fields based on local soil and

water conditions.

Is there a need for supplemental N?

If a significant amount of N has been lost, it is likely that a supplemental fertilizer application will be necessary to reach the crop's yield potential. The University of Minnesota has developed a worksheet to assist farmers with making supplemental N application decisions for corn. The worksheet can be found at: <http://z.umn.edu/supplementaln>. In addition, the worksheet is available as an app for smart phones at: <http://z.umn.edu/cropcalc>.

Here are a few things to consider before applying supplemental fertilizer:

Soils that have been saturated for a long time will in all likelihood have stunted plants with reduced yield potential, so will require less N.

In instances where leaching has occurred, it is probable that the N has moved lower in the soil profile; however, it may not be lost, since increased root growth may put the N back in reach of the plant.

There are several new technologies focused on making supplemental (and variable rate) N decisions, and while they hold promise, they are new, and the jury is still out with respect to how well they work.

Affordable home improvement loans available through Headwaters Regional Development Commission

"For everything from repairs to energy saving upgrades, the Fix Up loan program is helping Minnesotans improve their homes and their communities."

The Fix Up loan program provides fixed interest rate loans for home remodeling, repairs, accessibility needs and energy efficiency improvements. The program offers secured loans up to \$50,000 and unsecured loans up to \$15,000, with repayment terms up to 20 years.

"The Minnesota Housing Fix-Up Program has been a blessing for our family. Our dilapidated deck was unsafe for our children and our 30 year old shingles were in desperate need of replacement. Without

the Fix-Up Program, it would have taken us years to save up the money to make the necessary repairs to our home. Working with the HRDC was seamless and frustration free," said HRDC Fix Up borrower Ashley S.

Homeowners in the following counties can apply for Fix Up loans year round through HRDC: Beltrami, Clearwater, Hubbard, Kittson, Lake of the Woods, Mahanomen, Marshall, Norman, Pennington, Polk, Red Lake, Roseau, Todd and Wadena. Income limits go up to \$99,500 for regular secured and unsecured loans, and there is no income limit for energy efficiency and accessibility projects. Contact Jackie

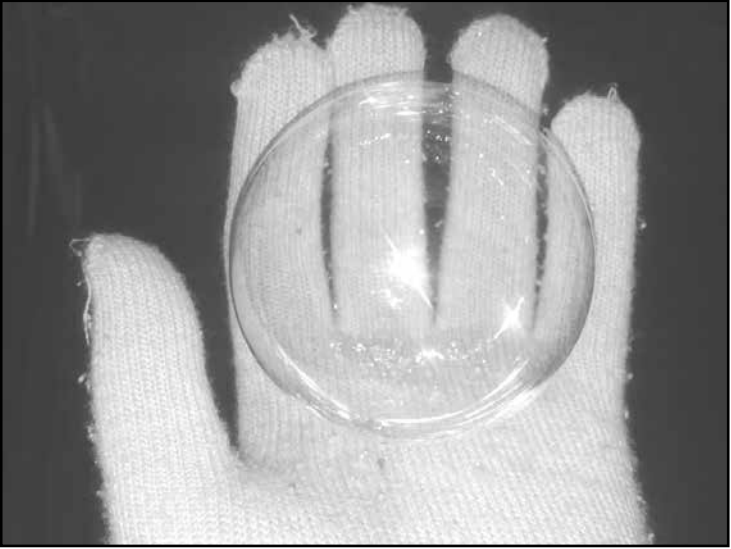

Mix all ingredients together and let sit for 24 hours.

Grygla Library summer ‘Read for the Win’ program

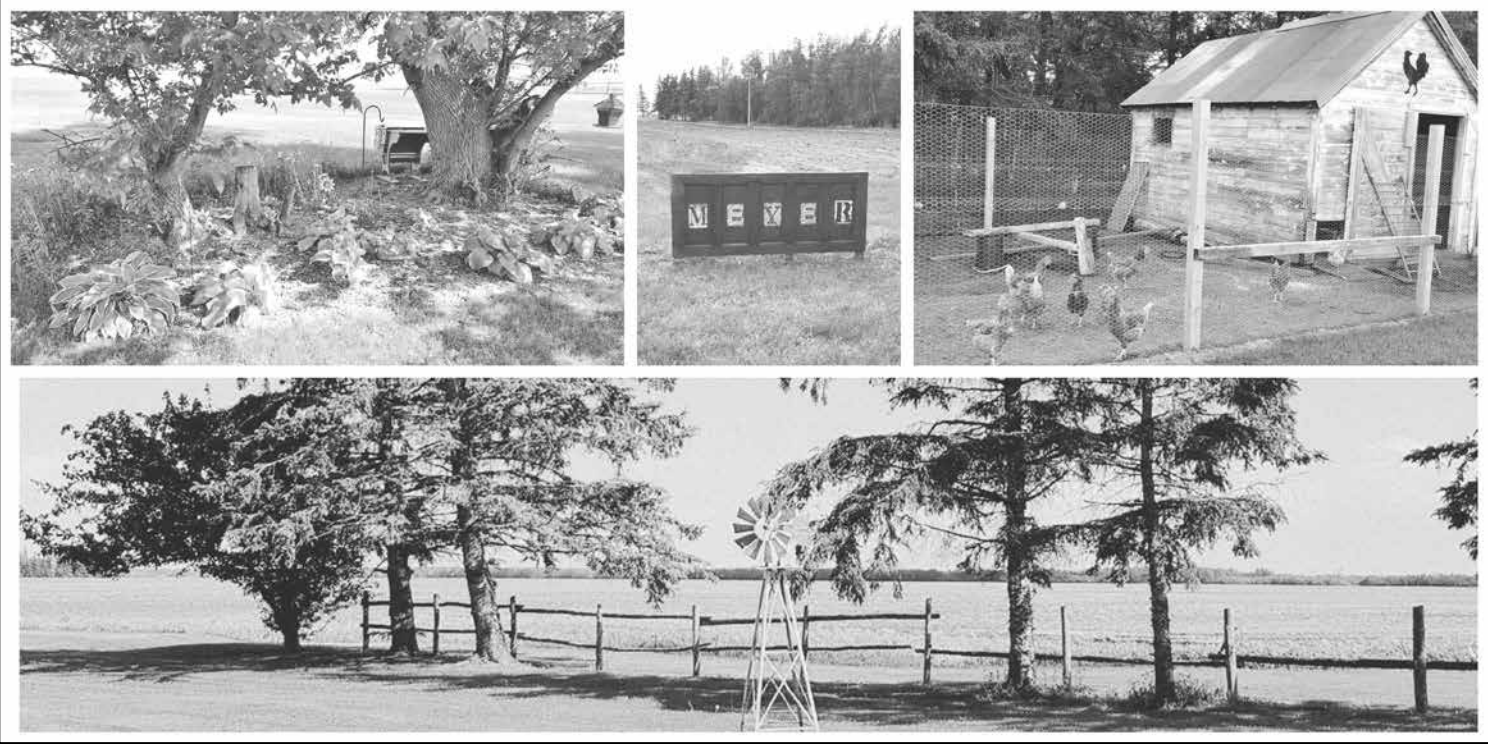

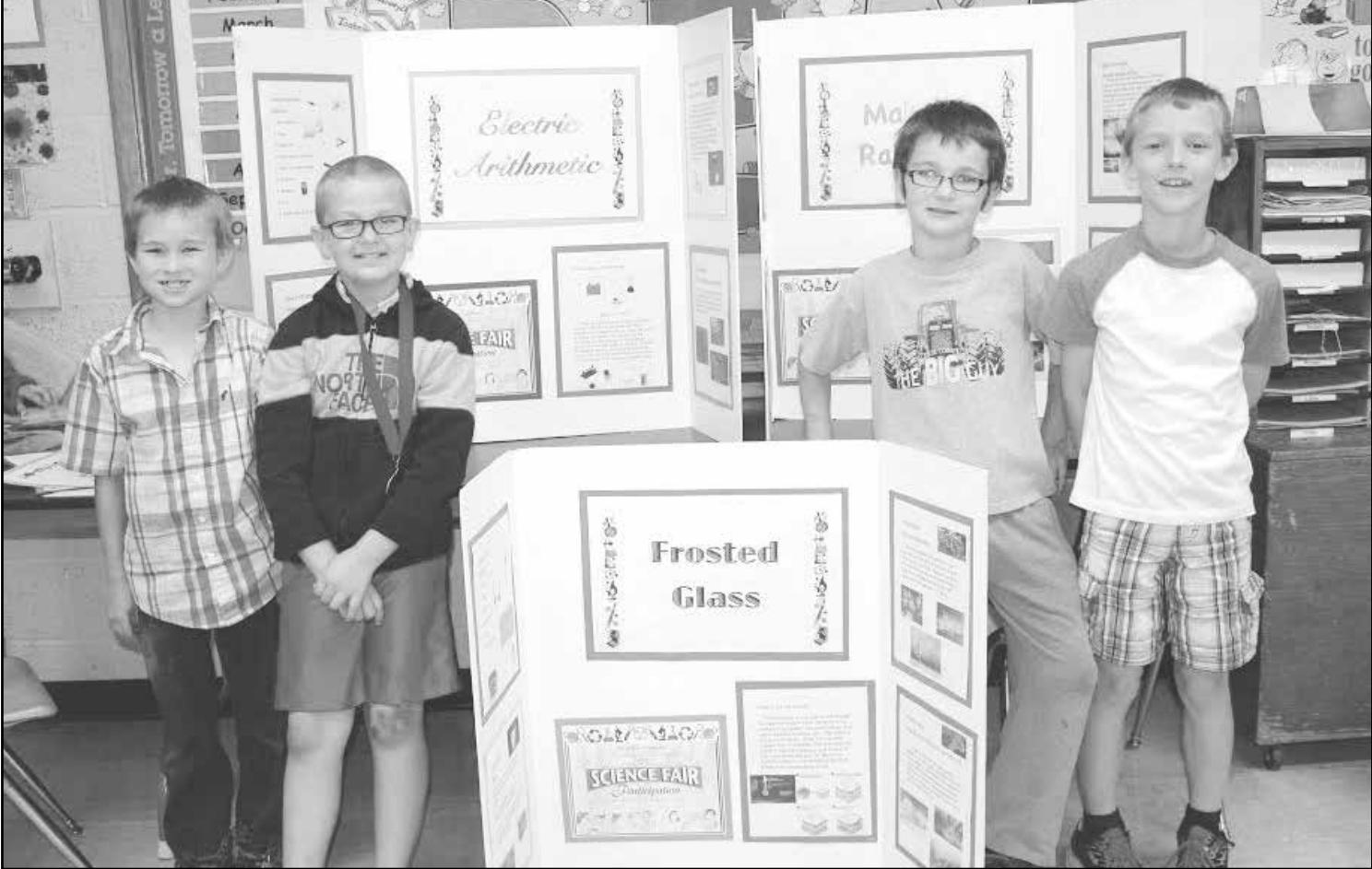
YARD OF THE WEEK

Ava Halvorson was named the 3rd grade Science Fair Grand Champion with her project, ‘Make a Rainbow’. Ava used a dish of water, a mirror, a flashlight, and a piece of paper to make a rainbow. While researching rainbows, Ava learned how rainbows are formed. Other related topics studied included refraction (the bending of light), color wavelengths, and prisms. The Goodridge School Science Fair was held at the end of the school year.



Libby Erickson was also named the 3rd grade Science Fair Grand Champion with her project, ‘Electric Arithmetic’. Libby made a board with arithmetic problems and answers (incorrect order). Metal brads were positioned next to each problem and answer. Libby created electrical circuits so when a student put probes on a problem and the correct answer, a light would light up. If the answer was incorrect, the circuit was incomplete and the light would not light up. Libby wrote her report on electricity, learning about electrical circuits, open circuits, closed circuits, conductors, insulators, and much more.
