“This song is about remembering what is actually important in life. Even when something bad happens, the ones who love you will always be there,” said The Jensen Sisters. Kendra and Kansas Jensen are Goodridge High Schoolers who are leaving quite an imprint on the world around them. “Flowers Grow” is just one of many original songs the sisters have recently written and composed. With intentions of writing the song about their family, who is extra supportive in everything they do, they say family really makes a lot of stuff possible for them.

The daughters of Erik and Kelsey Jensen live in rural Goodridge; Kendra is going to be a junior at Goodridge High School, while Kansas will be in eighth grade. Going public with their musical duo just two years ago, the sisters have been booking gigs steadily ever since. Two years ago, the young ladies signed up to perform at the Goodridge School Talent Showcase, saying how nervous they were to do so. “Our mom had to practically push us onto that stage! She told us we had to follow through with it since we signed up, but if we hated it, we never had to do it again,” Kendra laughed.

The opposite happened. The crowd loved the girls and they were bitten by the music bug.

Fast forward to the school’s talent show a year later, the sisters took to the stage once again, performing “Good Hearted Woman” by Waylon Jennings. “This is where it all kind of happened for us,” they say. “People started asking us to sing everywhere!”

Those performances have included a variety of talent shows, church services, weddings, funerals, coffee shop gigs, graduation ceremonies and area bars. Since then, they were also given the opportunity to open for artist Blind Joe when he came to perform in Goodridge!

While Kansas has always enjoyed singing, Kendra says she was always too shy and scared to use her voice. While she’s definitely using that voice these days, Kendra is self-taught on the piano and guitar and says she leads the duo more instrumentally, while Kansas offers strong vocals, though they do split who takes the lead on certain songs.

Having a love for classic country music, you can also hear The Jensen Sisters perform some classic rock hits, along with some originals.

The two idolize Dolly Parton and draw inspiration from her, along with Waylon Jennings and Chris Stapleton. “We obviously love country music, but we appreciate all genres. We listen to everything and like to surprise people with the songs we sing, throwing in a little bit of everything,” Kendra remarks.

The two sisters actually fulfilled an item on their bucket list recently; they attended the Dolly Parton concert at the Grand Casino Amphitheater in Hinckley, MN, on July 20th. They said it was breathtaking to see Dolly perform live. “She is just so humble and down to earth; that’s one of the things we really admire about her,” they offered.

Kendra and Kansas might not realize it quite yet, but like their idol, they’re pretty humble and down to earth, too. For such young ladies, they have very mature opinions about the world around them; it’s evident in one of their original songs, titled, “It Is What It Is.”

With lyrics that speak volumes, they sing, “The grass isn’t always greener on the other

crack at song writing was to put music to some lyrics their dad wrote. Undertaking this task was not easy, but it would prove to be successful. For Father’s Day last year, the sisters went to a studio and recorded that song their dad wrote. While visiting him out in Williston, their mom casually put the CD into the player. “It was the first time he ever heard his song 100% completed,” Kendra smiled. The name of that song was called “Are you over me?”

Let’s hope the public can hear that song, which holds a special spot in the Jensen’s hearts. The sisters are scheduled to perform at the Grygla Fall Festival later this month. They’ll take the stage on Main Avenue on Saturday, August 27th, from 3:30-6pm. With plans to sing a bigger, louder set list for Fall Fest, the duo hopes to debut some new original music, as well as some classic country favorites! “We’re going to do our best to have something for everyone,” Kendra promises.

Writing and performing together, Kendra and Kansas say it’s something that has brought them closer together as sisters. While teenagers and sisters have the occasional fight, these two say they’ve never argued while writing a song. “We are so on the same page when it comes to this,” they agree. “We might not hit every note perfectly, every time, but we just love playing music and performing....I don’t know...we just get up there and we do our thing,” Kendra says humbly.

And the two are doing just that - getting up there, doing their thing...and doing it GREAT.

Assistance available to help with conservation planning

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the Beltrami County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) have staffing resources available to help you manage the natural resources – soil, water and plants on your property. Together, we have the expertise to provide sound technical advice to help you with issues related to soil erosion, water quality, wildlife habitat and re-forestation. By reviewing your property, our staff can help you develop a conservation plan that can provide you with ideas on how to correct these issues and create a landscape that meets your overall property management objectives.

Once a conservation plan is developed, both the NRCS and the SWCD have programs that can provide financial assistance to implement these resource management activities. All programs are competitive and must go through a review/ranking process to determine eligibility. Applications taken throughout the year, however, the NRCS program has a current ranking sign up process that will end August 19th.

Apple Pie Egg Rolls

These Apple pie egg rolls are a fun spin on traditional apple pie. These are a nice single serving treat that taste great alone and paired with dipping sauces. I dipped mine in whip cream and I thought that tasted good. You could try different types of frostings or caramel sauces. Sprinkling them with powdered sugar would also add a little something extra. I didn't have the certain type of egg rolls wrappers the recipe calls for, so I made up my own egg roll dough. Since I made the dough myself I found they weren't very uniformly sized and the dough was all around a little thick. Also when deep frying these make sure not to puncture the outer wrapper or the inside will get oil filled and it won't taste as good.

Ingredients:

For the filling:
3 cups apples peeled and diced
4 tablespoons sugar
4 teaspoons flour
¼ teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon lemon juice
Other:
12 egg roll wrappers
Oil for frying

Recipe:

Combine all filling ingredients and mix well. Place two heaping tablespoons of filling in each wrapper. Fold up sides and roll wrapper tightly. Pre-heat oil to 350 degrees and fry each eggroll for about 4-5 minutes or until brown and crispy. Serve warm



DO IT YOURSELF

These past couple of weeks have been plenty hot outside and we all would love to just find a way to cool off. These are some fun DIY that can keep the kids cool and having fun. No one wants a hot and cranky little one...that is for sure. These are cheaper alternatives for expensive water toys that easily break in a short amount of time. These are cheap and quite easy to make and/or play.

Pool Noodle Sprinkler

Materials needed:

Foam pool noodle

Duct tape

Skewer

Hose

Instructions-

Puncture the pool noodle randomly around all sides of the noodle. The more holes, the better spray. Stuff one end with a small piece of foam or plastic cap, then duct tape the

end securely. Decide where you would like to use the sprinkler. Just laying it on the ground or hanging it from something like a swing set would work best. Position your hose and then slide the end of the hose into the foam noodle, pushing it in a few inches so it holds securely. You can also duct tape this a little to ensure that it will hold. Turn on the hose and let the fun begin!

Using a regular bottle for a smaller homemade sprinkler would work too. Just poke holes in the bottle and secure the hose to open and turn on.

"The Shark Bit my Cup"

This water game has a little shark twist; where the holes were poked the cup was "bitten by a shark." So not only was water spilling out of the top of the cup, but the bottom and sides as well.

Supplies Needed:

Two small buckets

One large bucket filled with water

Two cups (with several small holes poked in/near the bottom of each cup).

Directions:

Divide children into 2 teams. Each team starts standing on either side of the large container full of water. Place the small buckets a short distance away. On go, the children must fill their cups with water, place it on their head and run to their team bucket on the other side (attempting to keep as much water in the cup). Once they reach their bucket they dump out what is left in the cup, run back to the starting line, and pass the cup off to the next person.

The game ends when one team fills their bucket to the top, or whoever fills their bucket the fullest after a set amount of time.
