Eagle Creek THEN and NOW

The video of their first official gig shows four young high school kids playing in front of their peers on the last day of school in Grygla. It was 2001 when Gavin Nordby, Tony Nordby, Geoff Larson and Nick Olson got up in front of the school and performed three songs for their first ever audience; "I Should've Been a Cowboy," by Toby Keith, "The Dance," by Garth Brooks, and "Right Where I Need to Be," by Gary Allen.

Fast forward 15 years and a couple of new members, and Eagle Creek is still performing for crowds today, however, their list of songs has grown from just 3 to well over 100 and their fan base has gotten much, much larger!

Gavin Nordby was a senior at Grygla High School back in 2001. Playing around with his guitar, he got the idea to start a band and reached out to some friends. Geoff Larson came to mind, as his dad was in multiple bands, and he also knew how to play guitar. Gavin's younger brother, Tony, happened to get a foot in the door, too, as luck would have it. "I didn't even play any instruments," Tony said. "I was in 10th grade and needed a half credit for school and Gene Lunsetter talked me into playing the bass guitar for the pep band. I didn't know the first thing about it," he laughed.

The three boys got together one day at Randy Larson's house, who is Geoff's dad, and started playing around. "We actually sounded pretty good together," recalls Gavin. From that point on, the boys would play together whenever they could; during study halls, after school, on weekends...you name it. Gavin sang lead vocals in the group, along with playing the acoustic guitar; Tony was on bass guitar, while Geoff played lead guitar. It didn't take long before word got around about the up and coming group and the boys' friends were excited. "They told us we should perform on the last day of school for everyone," Gavin laughed. In order to do that, the group needed to find a drummer. They asked fellow student and pep band drummer, Nick Olson, who agreed to get in on the action.

It was May of 2001 when those four boys played in their high school gym. Geoff's grandma still has the original video from that day, too.

Little did they know it, but Eagle Creek was off to the races.

The 4 guys were practicing 1-2 times a

month at the café in Gatzke, which is still their practice site today. Each time they'd get together, they'd learn some new numbers. It wasn't long before Eagle Creek knew enough to perform a full set of songs. "It took us a few years to really get going," said Gavin. "But pretty soon people were calling us to play all over." The band was traveling from Baudette to Minneapolis to Duluth to Hibbing to Fargo, Grand Forks, and everywhere in between! Whether they were performing in parks, at weddings, local festivals, fairs or bars – the crowd loved them and the band was making quite the name for themselves. To date, they have shared the stage with big names like Neil McCoy, Phil Vassar, Emerson Drive, David Nail and Restless Heart, to name a few. Eagle Creek was entertaining their fans with covers of old and new country, classic rock, 50's music and party favorites! They even added a few originals to the mix. However, these days the band sticks strictly to covers as time doesn't allow them to write their own music.

At their busiest, Eagle Creek was performing 38 weekends out of a year; these days it has slowed down to 15-18 weekends a year. It's a little tougher as time goes on, as each of the band members now all have their own families.

Nick Olson was with the band for 9 years, but left in 2010 due to a job change. Andrew Daly replaced him on drums and has been with Eagle Creek ever since. Also joining the band, was Geoff's dad, Randy Larson.

With new members joining the group, comes a new sound. "If you haven't heard us for a few years, you're in for a big surprise," promises Gavin. "What went from a band with one singer, is now a band with five vocals all singing together. It's fun to see how far we've come," he added.

On lead vocals and acoustic guitar, Gavin Nordby lives in Grygla with his wife, Tera, and their three children. He works at Digikey in Thief River Falls and says when he's not focused on the band, he enjoys "huntin', fishin'.....and lovin' every day!"

On bass guitar and vocals, Tony Nordby and his wife, Courtney, live in Thief River Falls. They have a little boy, McCoy, who is 4.5 months old. Tony works at Houston Engineering, Inc.

Geoff Larson's musical contributions to the group include co-lead guitar, vocals and mandolin. He is employed by MnDot as an inspector and resides in St. Hilaire.

He and his wife, Steph, have one son, Lyrick, who is almost 5; they also have a little girl on the way due in September.

You'll see Randy Larson on stage with the band; he plays co-lead guitar with his son, the fiddle, and also offers vocals. Randy brings much experience to the table as he used to play with Saddle Tramp and is a member of Back Behind the Barn Boys. He has three kids and lives in Gatzke.

Also a part of the group is Andrew Daly on drums and vocals. Andrew works at Falls Radiator and is married to Felicia; they have three children and live in Thief River Falls.

It's been a few years since Eagle Creek has performed at the Grygla Fall Festival, but their fans are gearing up for an exciting weekend! This Saturday, August 27th, Eagle Creek takes the main stage in their hometown from 8:30pm-12:30am. Talking to a few members of the group, each one had something different to say about their upcoming performance!

Gavin says, "We've got some new songs coming this weekend. We've got some Journey, Fleetwood Mac, Luke Bryan – you're going to hear some fun songs and a new sound with our added vocals."

Tony agrees, adding, "We're bringing you quality dance music with lots of vocal harmonies and an array of instruments." Tony also says his favorite song to perform is "Fishin' in the Dark."

With "8675309" being his favorite song to perform, Geoff says it's going to be a pretty big show this Saturday night. "We've got Kickin' Entertainment coming with a huge light show and Kiesow has some big sound coming. We hope to see all of you guys on the street!"

The Grygla Fall Festival runs August 26th-28th; a button is needed for admission to the street dance and can be purchased in advance for \$8 at local businesses. Buttons will also be for sale at the gate, costing \$12 each.

As for the future, the members can all agree they hope it continues to shine bright. "Of course you always want to dream big," says Gavin. "Sure, it would be fun to one day play on the Grand Ole Opry stage," he confessed. But Geoff adds, "There's nothing like playing locally for all the people you know. This Saturday night will be a great time and we'll see you there."

NW Minnesota Ag Lender's Conference

University of Minnesota Extension is hosting an Ag Lender's Conference in Northwestern Minnesota on September 21, 2016. The event will be held at the Youngquist Auditorium on the University of Minnesota Crookston Campus. The conference will focus on farm financial trends for Minnesota producers and will also have an emphasis on the sugar beet industry. Registration will begin at 9am, with the conference convening from 9:30am to 3:30pm.

Keynote speaker for the day will be Dale Nordquist, Extension Economist and Associate Director of the Center for Farm Financial Management at the University of Minnesota. His presentation will focus on financial trends of MN producers. Also joining the program will be Ron Wirtz, Outreach Director for the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis, and Joe Hastings and Tyler Grove with American Crystal Sugar Company. Afternoon breakout

sessions will include farm tax implications of a challenging economy, a crop research update, and additional farm management perspectives.

We encourage lenders and other agricultural professionals to register today. Early bird registration of \$65 is available until Sept. 14th. After that time registration cost will increase to \$80. Registration can be completed in three ways:

Easy after-school snacks

Nutella and banana sushi

Ingredients:
2 tortillas
4 tbsp Nutella
2 bananas
Strawberries

Directions:
Place tortilla on a cutting board and spread with Nutella. Peel banana and lay in on the edge of the tortilla. Roll the banana and slice into rounds; arrange on a plate with the cut edge facing up – garnish with strawberry pieces!



Raspberry Greek Yogurt Pops

Ingredients:
1 cup plain greek yogurt
1 c fresh raspberries (or frozen)
1-2 tbsp. honey



Directions:
Put all ingredients in the blender and mix until well-combined. Pour mixture into your popsicle molds and freeze.

Apple Chips

Ingredients:
3 medium apples, unpeeled
Sugar, to taste
Cinnamon, to taste

Directions:
Preheat oven to 225 degrees. Slice apples on a mandolin slicer for best results (see note). Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper. Evenly line apple slices on baking sheet. Lightly dust apple slices with cinnamon & sugar. Bake for 2-2.5 hours, turning apple slices half way through.

Note: On the mandolin slicer, use the number 2 setting for crisp apple chips. For a more chewy apple chip, slice the apples on the number 3 setting. You may core your apples, but it's not necessary; just remove the seeds/centers as needed.

Fabian encourages local schools to apply for broadband education grants

The Minnesota Department of Education is now accepting applications for the Broadband Expansion Off-Campus Learning Grant Program from Minnesota public school districts, charter schools and education districts.

The Minnesota legislature created the program in 2016. A total of \$500,000 in new grant funds was authorized for the program in a continuing effort to improve broadband access with a focus on reaching stu-

dents in unserved/underserved areas and low income families. There are two grant opportunities available, one for off-campus learning grants and the other for a school bus internet access grant. Applicants can apply for both and are eligible for up to \$50,000 in funding per project.

"The Broadband Expansion Off-Campus Learning Grant Program was created for underserved parts of our state including right here in North-

DO IT YOURSELF

With the school year just around the corner, we're all looking for ways to stay organized and prepared for the school week. This super fun and easy DIY project is customizable with the kids helping by choosing their own pattern and colors for the project, along with their clothes for the week!

To make these hanger flags, you will need: Duct tape (solid colors or patterns), Sharpie markers, 5 hangers and a scissors.

Get creative with these - take the solid Duct tape of your choice and write the days of the week with a Sharpie marker. Cut the days out and prepare them to go on the flags. Next, using a cool patterned tape, cut out 5 strips that are least 5 inches long.

Grygla blood drive results

A total of 37 people volunteered to donate blood, with 32 being able to give during Grygla's August 10th blood drive. Six people gave blood on the automated 2RBC machine which collects two units of red blood cells during the donation, so a total of 38 products were collected; two people even volunteered for the first time!

Every community and everyone within each community has a stake in an ade-

quate blood supply. To meet the needs of local patients United Blood Services needs to recruit 550 blood donors every day.

Blood will be available only because of blood drive sponsors, coordinators, and volunteer donors. Blood donors are eligible to donate blood every 56 days.

Ralph Rundell coordinated the drive and the local Lion's Club sponsored and assisted with recruiting donors, publicity,

providing refreshments, and registering donors. Others who assisted the day of the drive were: Ida Stanley, Ruth Anderson, Laurie Polansky, Mildred Klamar, Sheldon Peterson and Nadine Wold.

Space to hold the drive was provided at the Community Center. The blood collected at this drive will help meet the needs of patients in 108 hospitals served by United Blood Services in this region.

Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP)

The Minnesota Farm Service Agency would like to remind Producers of the following Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) application closing dates for crop year 2017:

- September 1, 2016 – Fall seeded annual crops- Rye, value loss crops (turf grass sod, Christmas trees, ginseng, aquaculture) and controlled environment crops (floriculture and mushrooms)
- September 30, 2016 – Perennial Forage Crops, grass/legume seed, wild rice, select

fruits/vegetables (asparagus, rhubarb, strawberries)

Statement from Representative Dan Fabian on End of Special Session Negotiations

Last Thursday, legislative leaders met with Governor Dayton again to try and come to an agreement for a special session. While they were very close on most issues including tax relief and bonding, Democrats held up passing those bipartisan initiatives over a highly controversial Southwest Light Rail Line that is facing
