Grygla's group of ladies held a sewing day last March with Irene Smith, Pam Smith, Sue Aune, Ida Stanley, Barb Picolet, Rose Hanson and Cheryl Sistad in attendance. The group also did their own sewing at home that allowed them to donate 37 quilts to veterans in need. Picolet says they are given to homeless vets or those who are in the hospital. "We have our name tag on them. Some send very nice thank-you cards," she says. The groups plans to keep sewing for the veterans as long as they can.

In addition to the 37 quilts, other items that went to the Fargo VA October 3-16 included 18 lap robes, 10 afghans, 8 decks of cards, 10 dental floss, 14 tooth brushes, 7 tooth-



pastes, 47 bars of soap and 10 pens.

"We would like to recognize the area churches that also

gave us quilts for the veterans. Grace Lutheran of Grygla, United Lutheran Church of Gatzke and Bethesda Lu-

theran Church of Skime, and those who gave us donations; it all adds up and makes a difference," stated Picolet.

Youth Gear up for hunting weekend

Area youth, ages 10-15, are gearing up to participate in a special deer season that runs from Thursday, Oct. 20, to Sunday, Oct. 23. "Youth can hunt with adult mentors during youth deer season," said Mike Kurre, DNR mentoring program coordinator. "The season is a way to focus on young hunters so they have good experiences and learn valuable skills."

Blaze orange requirements apply to all hunters, trappers and adult mentors in areas open for the youth deer season. Youth must meet all firearms safety requirements, purchase a license and use the appropriate firearm for the permit area in which they are hunting. Youth may take a deer of either sex and may only take one deer during the youth season.

An adult mentor must accompany the youth but may not hunt or carry a firearm and does not need a license.

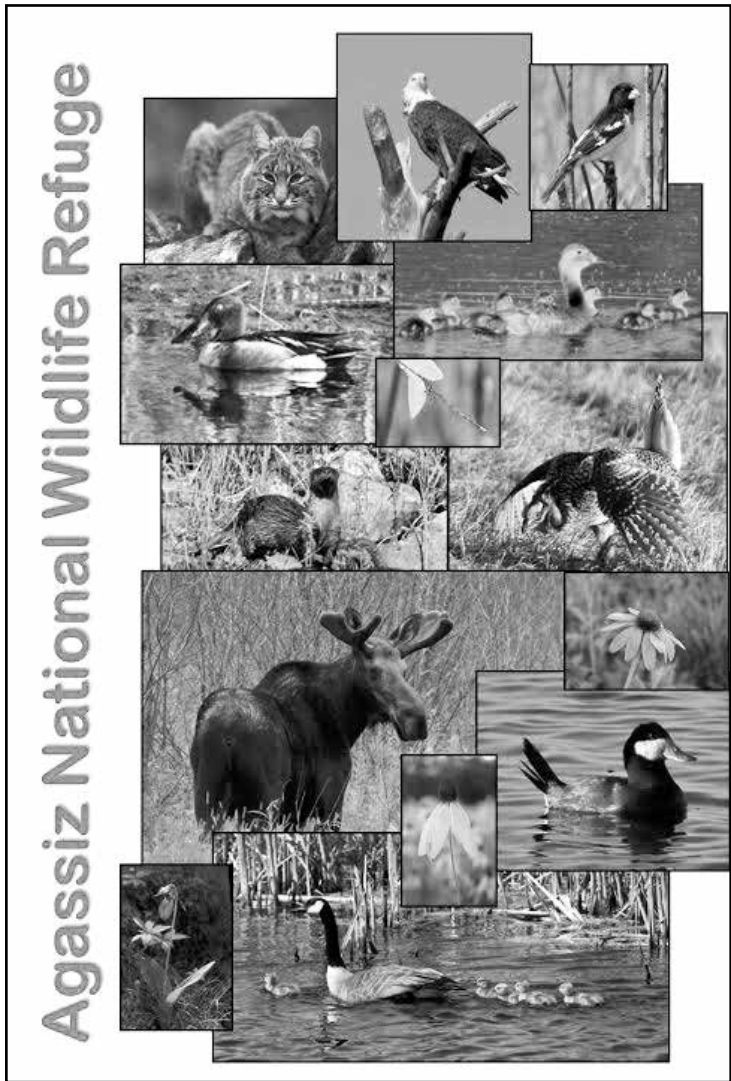
The disposable wipes you use for personal care, changing diapers, cleaning your home, or wet mopping may be labeled “flushable.” And it’s true that they will usually go down your toilet when flushed. But unlike toilet paper, they don’t break down. In many cases, wipes are made with the same man-made fibers — such as polyester, polypropylene, and rayon — that go into clothing and other fabrics.

Wipes snag on any imperfection in sewer pipes, catch passing debris and grease, and create a “ball” that will grow to plug the pipe. This can cause sewer backups in your home’s or your community’s pipes, creating expensive and messy

problems.

Wipes can also get drawn into sewer-line and wastewater treatment plant pumps and clog and damage them. Municipalities must manually clear out pumps or remove clogs, and sometimes have gone to the expense of replacing or upgrading equipment to deal with wipes-related issues. Besides creating unpleasant problems for wastewater workers, wipes clogs are expensive to address and becoming much more frequent. Those expenses will eventually be passed on to community residents in the form of higher fees or taxes.

Wastewater treatment is critical to protecting the environment in Minnesota, particularly water quality. Flushing wipes can cause problems that divert wastewater resources and weaken environmental protection. If you must use wipes, put them in the trash!



Get out and explore our National Wildlife Refuge this week

National Wildlife Refuge Week – observed October 9–15, 2016 – reminds Americans how nature enriches our lives and adds to the beauty of our country. What better time to celebrate that connection with the natural world and Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge. Celebrated during the second full week of October since 1996, Refuge Week highlights the National Wildlife Refuge System – the network of lands and waters that protect wildlife and their habitats.

National wildlife refuges have been part of America’s proud natural heritage since the first refuge was established in 1903.

At Agassiz you can enjoy a range of outdoor activities. There is a four-mile self-guided auto tour route to enjoy the scenery - open dawn till dusk from May through mid-October. There’s also an observation deck located near the west Refuge entrance at Parker Pool, to give you a slightly elevated glimpse of the habitat and

bird life on this pancake-flat landscape. If you truly want more of a ‘birds-eye view’ of the Refuge, you can climb our 100 foot observation (fire) tower. An access key can be checked out during office hours. If you prefer to take a leisurely stroll, there are three hiking trails for you to explore, not far from the Refuge office.

In addition to wildlife viewing, several different hunting opportunities are available at Agassiz Refuge. Coming up this month is the Youth Deer Hunt Oct. 20th -23rd.

National wildlife refuges enrich human lives. They help conserve wildlife, protect against erosion and flooding and purify our air and water. They also pump \$2.4 billion into the national economy and support more than 35,000 jobs, according to the peer-reviewed report Banking on Nature.

Chargers football falls to the Storm

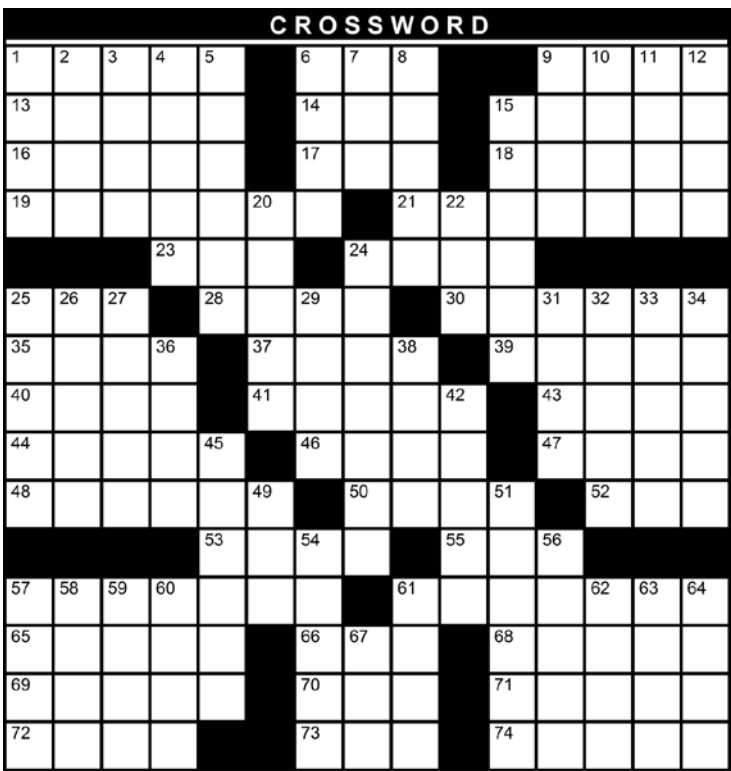
Last Friday night, the Chargers played an away game against Stephen/Argyle Storm. The victory went to SA with a final score of 44-12.

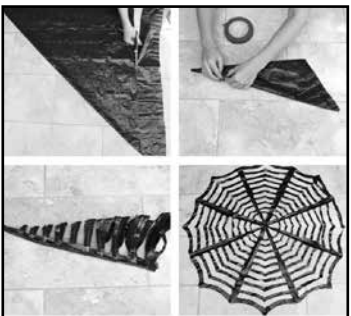
Wreath forms are available at any Target, Walmart or craft store. Grab one, along with some caution tape and there you have it – your very own DANGER AHEAD wreath!

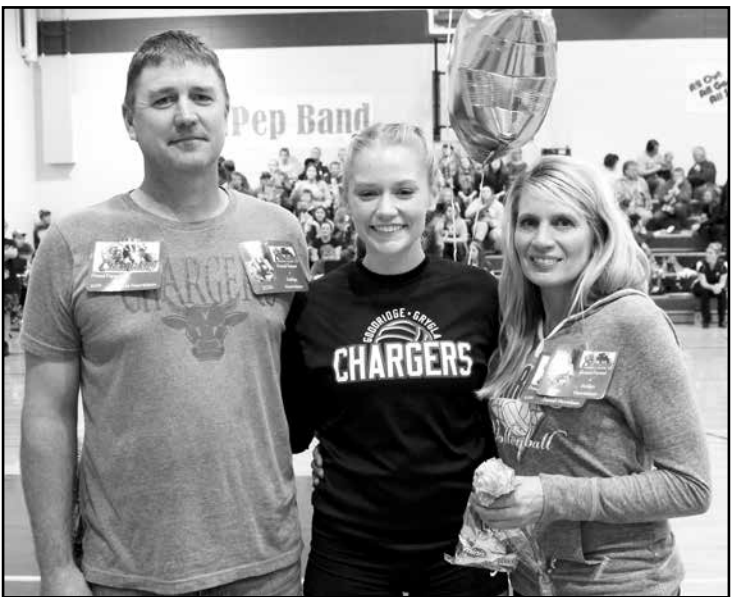

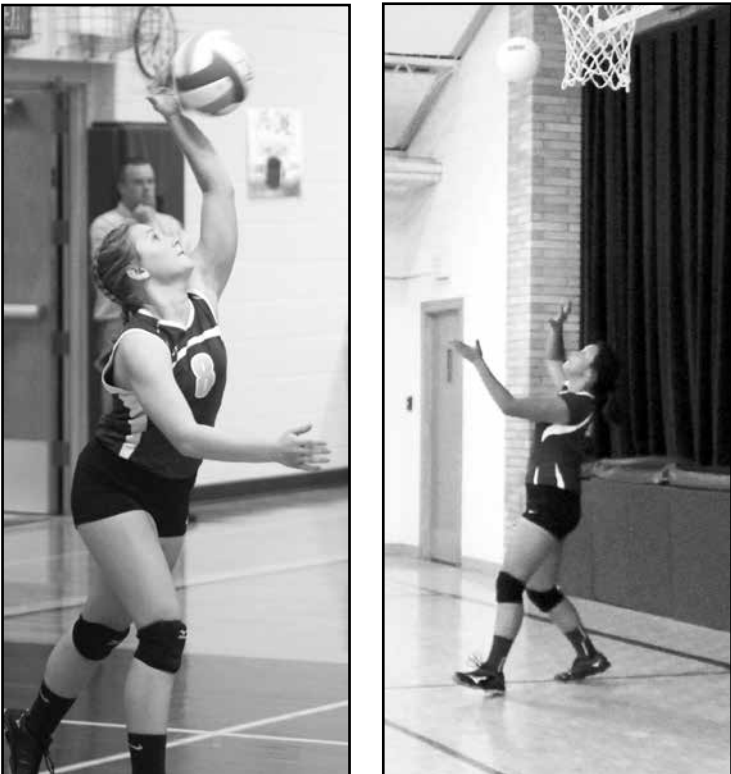

The volleyball games start at 5pm with the 7th and C team playing; 8th and JV will begin at 6pm with the Varsity game to follow.

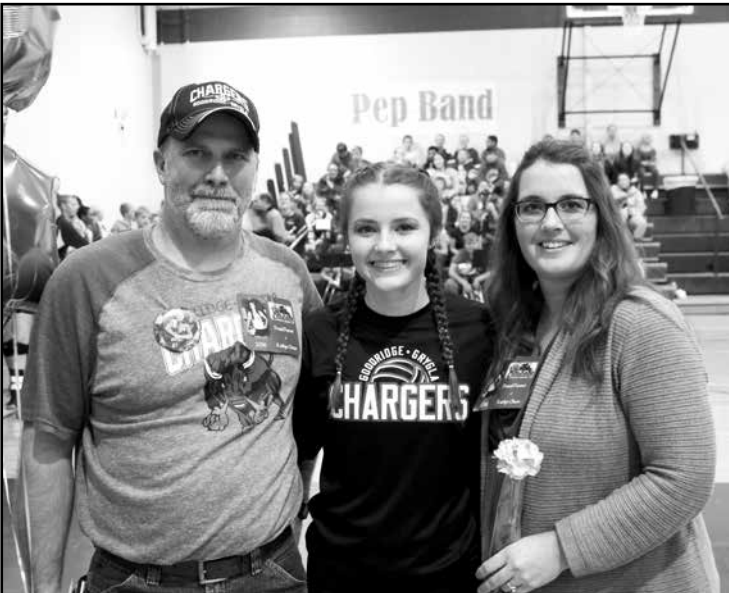

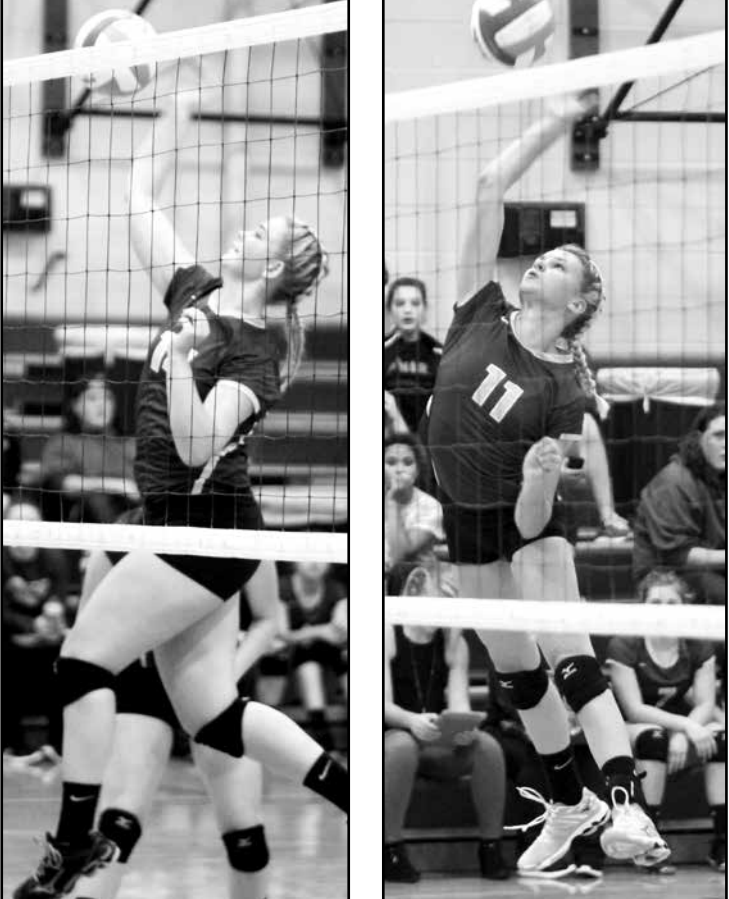

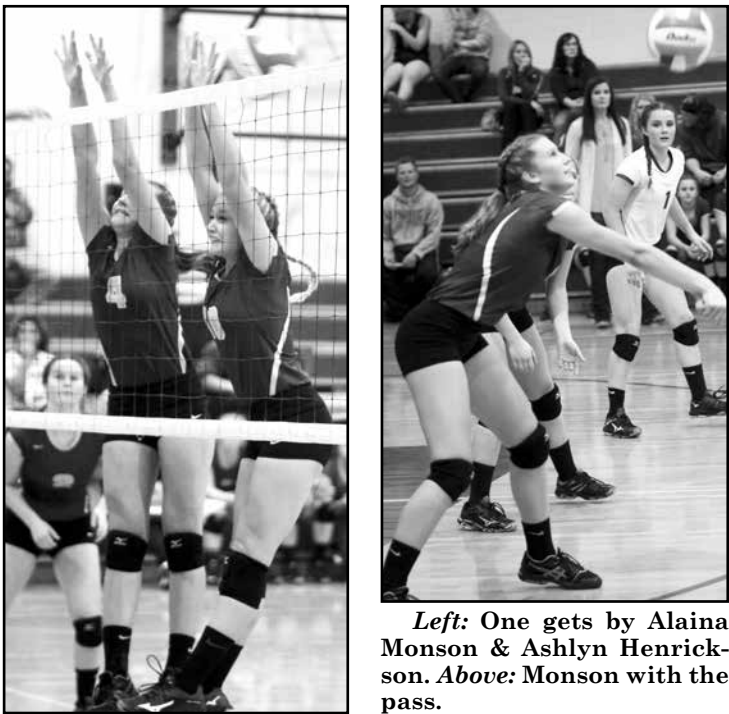
