DNR to fly elk surveys

The Department of Natural Resources began conducting aerial elk surveys by airplane last Wednesday, Feb. 1, in the Kittson County and Grygla elk ranges. The crew finished flights in the Lancaster area last Friday and will be in the Grygla area this week, weather permitting. They've had good weather conditions thus far and are seeing elk. These flights are conducted annually during the winter.

"The recent snow allows us to begin the elk surveys," said Doug Franke, Thief River Falls area wildlife supervisor and elk survey coordinator. "Our goal is to conduct the surveys in the next couple of weeks."

DNR pilots will use airplanes that fly low-level surveys during daylight hours at an altitude of approximately 200-300 feet.

Questions about survey flights should be directed to the northwest regional wildlife office in Bemidji, 218-308-2680.

Last year, researchers from the DNR and Minnesota State University-Mankato began a study (that will run through June of 2018). The research project was the first of its kind in Minnesota and has an end goal that includes improving the understanding of the elk species and developing management programs that will benefit the elk and their habitat, while minimizing conflicts with landowners. In coordination with the study, 20 elk were collared in northwestern Minnesota last February, which included 3 from the Grygla herd.

Elk are managed to maintain a free-ranging, wild population in northwestern Minnesota. Three herds, totaling an estimated 130 animals, comprise the state's entire elk population.

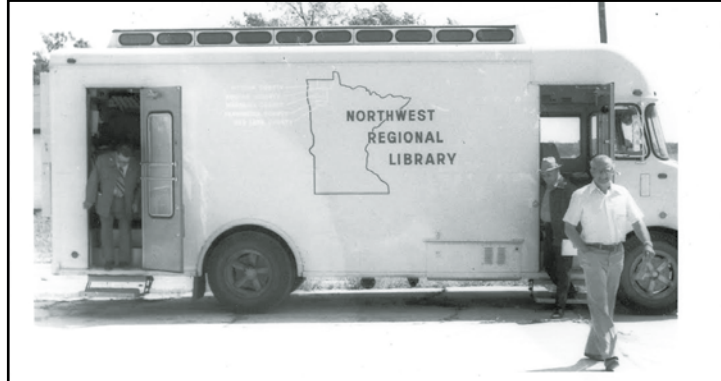

DNR Deer Management meeting
Meeting attended by 22 people, at the Ralph Engelstad Arena, TRF, on Wednesday, January 31.

Purpose: To communicate the MNDNR responsibilities and efforts related to deer management while defining strategic goals, objectives and strategies that direct deer management in Minnesota into the future.

DNR staff was on hand representing divisions of Fish and Wildlife, Forestry, Ecological and Water Resources, and Parks and Trails to answer questions and facilitate small and large group discussions. Participants discussed Deer Management Plan draft topic areas that included, but not limited to:

- Deer population management, monitoring and research
- Communication, information dissemination, engagement and accountability
- Hunter and non-hunter satisfaction
- Funding for deer management
- Healthy habitat
- Healthy deer
- Impacts of deer on other resources

Comments provided by attendees were recorded on flip-chart paper and summarized by staff. It was communicated that any participants wanting to ensure their individual comments are received, should submit their comments in one of the following ways:

Comments will be accepted between January 30 and March 2, 2017. (A second comment period will be offered once a draft Deer Management Plan is written, in 2018.) Comments will be summarized in March, 2017, and will be shared with DNR staff and Deer Management Plan Advisory Committee (DMPAC) members. DNR will not respond to individual comments, but will provide a response to key themes identified in the public comments later this spring.

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Good news for northwest Minnesota

Representatives Dan Fabian, R-Roseau, and Deb Kiel, R-Crookston, are encouraging northwest Minnesota residents to explore new health insurance options available as a result of Medica’s decision to re-open enrollment for 2017 due to lower-than-expected re-enrollment of previous customers. Medica previously met its approved enrollment cap in November, but opened new slots last week.

Included in Medica’s options is the Medica Altru plan, which covers a large number of hospitals and providers in northwest Minnesota in Kittson, Marshall, Pennington, Polk, Red Lake, and Roseau counties. A list of hospitals covered through the Altru plan is avail-

able on Rep. Fabian and Rep. Kiel’s website, but includes multiple hospitals around the area.

“This announcement is good news for northwest Minnesota residents,” said Rep. Dan Fabian, R-Roseau. “Many folks may be planning to skip coverage for 2017 due to poor network access. I hope they will take a look and see if these newly-available plans make sense financially and logistically for your families.”

Last week, the legislature passed the health care relief bill that provides a 25% premium discount for 2017 coverage. MNsure has since extended the open enrollment period through Wednesday, February 8 to give Minneso-

tans more time to shop around. A separate, special enrollment period for 2016 Blue Cross or HealthPartners customers who lost coverage for 2017 can still enroll through another insurer through February 28 for coverage effective March 1.

“This news gives residents in our area additional choices for their 2017 health care,” added Rep. Deb Kiel, R-Crookston. “I encourage everyone to look at these new options, and hope this can help provide an affordable coverage option.”

Medica policies are available for purchase only through MNsure. Fabian and Kiel encouraged anyone with questions to contact their offices for assistance.

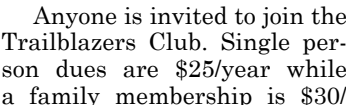

Even though they didn't qualify for the World Champions like they have the last four years, advisor Isaac Kvasager says it was the best year yet. "This was arguably our best year as a team in terms of what we were able to build and the high level of programming we accomplished," he commented.

There are 230 teams in the state, so making it to the state semi-finals in St. Cloud was a great achievement for the team. Kvasager pointed out that all teams making it to the finals get an invite to the World Champions; in the semi-finals, team 4149G was just one win short of a world's trip.

However, the Iron Chargers have qualified for the US Open, which will be held in Council Bluffs, Iowa, on April 6th-8th. They plan to start fundraising for that upcoming competition.

It was fun for parents, friends and fans to follow along with the team's matches. The updates, posted by the team, are being provided below for your reading pleasure.

Friday night, February 3: 4149C and 4149G have two matches each. Both teams won their first matches. C team went against their partners last year and won the championship by 1 point! We are going to spend a bit of our night going over the robots and modifying some code...very proud of the team. The fact they never stop working to make the robots better is why they have so much success.

Saturday, February 4: Saturday brought each Grygla team 5 matches. C team went 4-0. G team went 3-1. After qualifications, team 4149C is ranked 5th and 4149G is ranked 16th.

Very good considering there are 61 teams here. Only 24 of the 61 teams even make it into the finals so both teams did awesome!

The brackets worked in such a way that our teams have to go head to head in the quarter finals. The G team's alliance won the first of three! The G team alliance knocked out the C team alliance! Onto the semi-finals for G team!

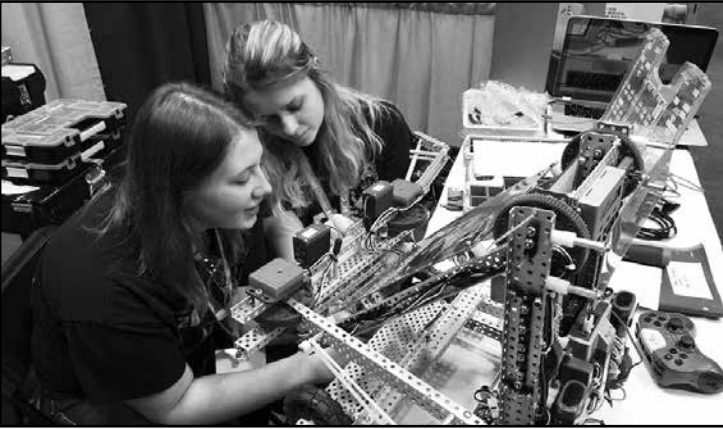
