Enbridge holds Zoom meeting

Enbridge hosted a virtual Community Meeting through Zoom for the Clearbrook locals on Wednesday, March 30, 2022, at 1pm. Pre-registration was required to attend the virtual event. Several areas discussed were Safety, Delivery, Operations and Maintenance.
Enbridge has been around since 1949, as 'Lakehead' until 20 years ago then the name changed to Enbridge. The company meets more than 70% of the oil refining demands in fourteen states of the Midwest. Enbridge expands beyond our region and works with renewable energy, natural gasses, and liquid carrying pipelines. With the completion of the new Line 93, formerly known as line 3, there are 1,331 miles of pipeline between eight pipelines here in the state of Minnesota, according to the Community Engagement specialist Laura Kircher.
The meeting was due to the directions under Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the US Department of Justice, after the oil spill in the Kalamazoo River near Marshall, WI in 2010, and gave instructions for Enbridge to deliver a Consent decree. The meeting was informative about what Enbridge has done historically, to current management, and continued commitments. (For more details check <https://epa.gov/enbridge-spill-michigan>)
In Clearwater County there

is a pump station that is permanent. Bemidji Area Operations specialist, Adam Dittus, reported that there will not be any projects in the near future like the Replacement of Line 3. There will be expected annual upkeep and assessments of the new Line 93. Dittus stated, "(Enbridge) extends beyond construction." There are programs monitoring and maintenance is done internally and externally around the clock every day. The high-quality materials, like anti-corrosion coatings as well as cathodic protection and pressure testing help keep Enbridge's projects running at top notch. Enbridge would like to expand to have more locations running on solar powers. It was very evident that the community and environment is taken care of and respected by Enbridge.
Patrick Hughley, Tribal Engagement Efforts, was proud to state that at the peak production point of Line 93, the entire Enbridge employment, 7% were identifying as Indigenous. With a combined 57 miles of pipeline going through two tribal lands, Hughley stated that continued conversations with protection of water and land is very important. Chris Pope, Enbridge Specialist, stated that in Clearbrook the water wells were not impacted by the Aquaphor breeches. Two of the three breeches have been completely sealed off as of January

2022. The breeches were caused by the soil being a mixture of sediment and clay. It was also reported that landowners whose property held Line 3 have five years to make a choice to either keep the old pipe securely in the ground and sealed off, or to have Enbridge remove the pipe. Pope reported that already 80% of the landowners have chosen to keep the outdated pipeline in their ground.

Helbergs are new owners of Gonvick Meat Market

The Gonvick Meat Market has been around for one hundred and twelve years. New owners have taken over as of March 31, 2022. Ben and Shelly Helberg will be taking over the business that Roger and Gail Crane have had since 2007. Several owners have had the business throughout the year serving the community.
Joseph Galenski was the first one listed in 1910 and then it was transferred to Ole Malmo in 1913. P.O. Peterson took over in 1914 with the help of Adolph Marmorine, Ole Malmo, P.O. and Mrs. Pederson.
Olai Skime was the owner of the Meat Market in 1919 sold it to George Norquist in 1928. George and Nora spent their newlywed years in an apartment at the back and above the store until they moved to the east suburb of Gonvick.
Dan Christianson bought the market from Norquist in 1970 and in 1976 Dan sold to Tilford and Phyllis Crane. They signed the final papers on Saturday, March 20. Before Tilford and Phyllis Crane moved to Gonvick with their four children they had lived in Duluth. Tilford had worked construction.
In 1984 the Cranes decided that the Meat Market building needed an upgrade so they hired Arlie Fore with his pulp hauling truck to come and take down the building. They were able to have a Grand Opening of their new facilities on Saturday, January 26th to tour the new plant and have some coffee and goodies.
As far as they can remember only one animal tried to get away from the butcher shop. Dr. Suess wasn't back in town with his Push Me Pull You, but that is what it looked like to residents in Gonvick. Cranes had a hold of the front end with a rope and one was pushing from the back end.
The Helbergs will start a new chapter in the 112 year old business in Gonvick. The name is the Gonvick Meat Market and they have kept the same telephone number as Cranes had with 218-487-5256. They will be doing the same work with on farm pick-up, custom butchering and processing.
Ben has been working with Roger since November as he has been tutoring in the business. Roger will also be assisting him from time to time with questions. Ben worked pipeline and

last year spent time working in Alaska. He did not get to have quality time with his two sons Bryce 14 and Sabin 16.
Ben and his wife Shelly are also planning on having their sons helping out in the business when they can. Besides the meat market they have beef cattle at their place south of Clearbrook. The boys will be showing their animals including horses and dogs at the county fair.
Shelly graduated from Clearbrook High School and Ben from Bemidji High School. Their sons go to school at Clearbrook-Gonvick.
The Helbergs say they are planning to run the business the same as Roger and Gail have been doing for the past few years.
The Cranes are planning an appreciation for their many customers to have a Grand Opening for the new owners on Friday, April 29. They will be having goodies from 11:00 to 1:00 that day.
Stop by and meet the new people taking over the business in Gonvick who will continue the tradition of a meat market.

No redistricting expected for County Commissioners

Despite the public hearing set for April 12 to discuss the matter, no redistricting is expected for the Clearwater County Commissioners this year.
The hearing to consider the current population maps for the county is required by the state to ensure the needs of each district are accurately represented according to the population.
County Commissioner Dean Newland, of District Two, said the board does not expect any changes to the county districts. "It's more of a formality that we hold the meeting," Newland said. The districts are based on the census numbers and there was no change from the last census."
Newland said the districts are based on a formula that looks at population shifts within the county. In the last census in 2020, Clearwater County did not have any significant shift in population, meaning each of the five districts has roughly the same number of people it did 10 years ago.
The state formed the 2022 Minnesota Special Redistricting Panel for the congressional districts and is requiring each county to look at the numbers and consider redistricting county lines if necessary. Copies of maps and plans can be inspected by the public at the county auditor's office.
Neighboring Mahanomen County has four of its five commissioner districts holding a reelection, as that county did have significant population shifts.

The Clearwater County Sheriff's Department hired Chase Moses to replace outgoing deputy Brandon Goodwin. Moses, a former military police officer from West Virginia, has worked in the Clearwater County jail for several months. Moses' position is full-time, beginning this week.
Along with a new deputy, squad cars for the sheriff's department are being upgraded with new in-squad camera systems thanks to a \$12,000 donation from the TEAM Foundation.
Sheriff Darin Halverson explained that the current systems being used by the department are outdated and do not connect to the same network. The new system permits all three squad cars to be on the same network. Equipped with body microphones, the Motorola in-car video systems allow for high resolution video and backseat monitoring. The design is engineered to increase safety within the industry by providing real-time recording and a wide-angle format to capture more of the situation. TEAM Industries provided the funding through the TEAM Foundation, which offers a grant program to non-profit organizations and schools. The focus is on public safety and enhancing life in rural Minnesota. The foundation began in 2003 as a way TEAM Industries could continue building and improving the community, a goal

its founder set early on. The donation allows for the purchase of two camera systems, while the department will purchase the system for the third car. The roadside weed spraying will be in the northern part of the county this summer and handled by Nutrien Ag Solutions of Kasota, MN, which came in as the lowest bid for the project at nearly \$20,000. Dan Hecht, head of Clearwater County Environmental Services, said he has confidence in the company's ability to perform the services that helps eliminate weeds along public roadways. "I feel pretty good about it," Hecht said. "They are always available for information via email when I need it." The county spraying is divided into four sections, and 2022 will cover the townships of Pine Lake, Sinclair, Winsor, Clover, Leon, Hangaard and Greenwood. In-person township association meetings will hold discussions regarding the summer spray schedule, Hecht said.

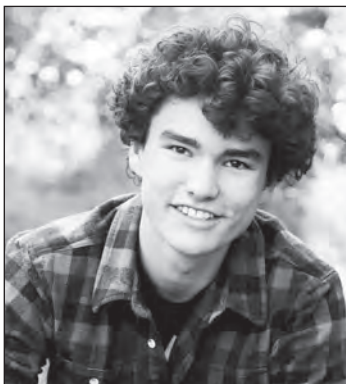

Here we are at the start of April and still churning through legislation.

We have been busy getting bills passed through committees and sent to the floor for a vote.

We've seen some reports of the Avian flu impacting our chicken and turkey flocks in Minnesota. Our poultry is safe to eat and since the outbreak of 2015, our farmers, legislature and Minnesota Department of Agriculture have worked to better understand this disease.

This week, I filed legislation for water system and sanitary sewer improvements for the City of Bagley. The legislation gives \$6.6 million to the city for designing, engineering, constructing and rehabilitating the infrastructure and replacing the water main. I am glad to see



this bill is being heard in committees, and I will be sure to update you on any progress it makes.

Yesterday, the House passed the reinsurance legislation and it is headed to the governor's desk for a signature by today's deadline. This will reauthorize the Minnesota Premium Security Plan for five years and fund it at \$890 million for three years. I am glad that both sides of the aisle were able to come together and pass this legislation before another deadline slipped away.

I look forward to continuing through the legislative session and am always interested to hear from you. God Bless!

The bill is currently in the Capital Investment Committee for review.

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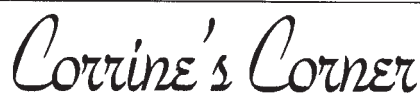

Women of Clearwater County
Georgianna Rydeen Moen
Interviewed by Jacquie Pool-er in 2001

Georgianna Martha Rydeen Moen was born February 22, 1911 to Herman and Minnie (Lundy) Rydeen. The Rydeen and the Lundys both came to Leon Township in 1896..

The Rydeen family consisted not only of Georgianna, but also Gladys and for a short time Rudolph. Rudolph was born in February of 1904, and Gladys in February of 1909 Rudolph was only 11 days old when he died of pneumonia.

As a young child, Georgianna remembers her days as carefree and fun, not that the young Rydeen girls were without work. From a young age, about the age of 6 or 7, Georgianna remembers she and Gladys were responsible for milking the cows. The Rydeens usually had between 6-10 cows that needed to be milked each morning and evening. Plus there was the wood and water that needed to be brought into the house. Herman Rydeen had a flowing spring on the farm, which he had piped to the barn; however, water still needed to be brought into the house.

The school she attended for the first year was District 20 School, just south of the former village of Olberg in Leon Township. The distance from the Rydeen farm to the school was 1 1/2 miles. Prior to heading to school, Gladys and Georgianna were still responsible for milking the cows, and if there were calves, they needed to be fed as well. Once the chores were done, they headed off to school, which ran from 9 in the morning until 4 in the evening. At school, the usual classes of reading, arithmetic, spelling, penman-

ship, etc., were taught. Of these subjects, Georgianna's favorite was reading, with spelling and history a close second. At the bottom of the list of classes was math. Georgianna always did fine in the subject, but she describes herself as not a mathematician.

After Georgianna's first year at District 20 School, Minnie and Herman Rydeen separated and later divorced. Georgianna to this day does not know why the marriage ended, but it did and the two girls and Minnie headed to Clearbrook, where they lived for a short time until their mother purchased a farm. Minnie supported her daughters by renting out the fields and raising cows and livestock. In addition Minnie was given \$120 a month in child support from Herman.

When Minnie first purchased this farm, the place was surrounded by woods and brush. This changed about 2-3 years after the purchase. Before Georgianna was 10 years old, fires swept the area. The neighbors plowed around the farm buildings for Minnie to keep the fires back and the buildings were doused with water in case of flying sparks. Though the buildings were saved, the woods and

brush were gone. Within a short time the farm was surrounded by about 40 acres of wild raspberries. It became Georgianna and Gladys' task to pick these berries. The berries were sold and added additional income to the household.

Although only a few miles separated Herman and Minnie's farms, it was still not possible for Gladys and Georgianna to see their father very often. Much of the winter months they did not see him at all. It was only during the summer, when the days were longer and there was no school, that the girls were able to see him on a regular basis.

From this new home, the walk to school was doubled. Her mother's farm was 3 miles from the village of Clearbrook, so Georgianna and Gladys would walk into town for school.

When Georgianna was 12 years old, buses came to Clearbrook. This did not really help the walk for Georgianna and Gladys. The wagons used for buses were high off the ground and difficult to get into, and the horses did not move very fast. Most children, including Georgianna and Gladys were able to walk faster than the buses traveled, so they usually continued to walk to school, even after the buses were implemented.

In 1929, Georgianna's high school days ended with graduation. Once that was completed, Minnie Rydeen and her daughters moved to Moorhead. There was family there, as well as Concordia College. For the next 2 1/2 years, Georgianna and Gladys attended school working towards their teaching licenses. In addition to their classes, both the Rydeen girls worked. Georgianna cleaned a private home every week to pay for her room and board. Once school was completed for the summer, Georgianna and Gladys would head back to their father's farm where they assisted on his farm.

College came to an abrupt

halt for Georgianna at the age of 19, when she had an acute appendicitis. Her father told her that he could not afford to send her to college and pay for the operation. In order to save her life, she of course received the operation, while Gladys was able to go on and finish school.

After recuperating from the operation, Georgianna went back to work. It was tough going, by this time the "dirty 30's" and the Great Depression had hit and it was very hard to make a living.

Also about this time, Georgianna met a man by the name of James Moen. He was a friend of her father's neighbor. She met him while attending a house party that the neighbors, the Walbergs were giving. Within a short time, James knew that Georgianna was the girl for him, and they were married on May 25, 1931, at the parsonage, with A. P. Anderson presiding. Anderson was then the pastor of Brorson Lutheran Church, later changed to First Lutheran Church of Bagley.

After their marriage, Georgianna and James moved back to her mother's farm, 3 miles from Clearbrook. Minnie lived with them until her death in 1960. The Moens operated a dairy farm, with added livestock. Their dairy herd was as large as 17 at one point. To supplement their farm income, James found work wherever he could.

It was while living on this farm that the Moen children were born. There were a total of 6 children, starting with Ernest on April 15, 1932; followed by Jimmie Dale on December 14, 1935; David on June 9, 1937; Richard on October 29, 1939; Mary Ann on June 20, 1944; and Judith on October 6, 1948.

With so many mouths to feed, both James and Georgianna were kept busy. In addition to her duties as wife and mother, Georgianna found time to help future generations. She wrote a short history of Clear-

brook called "Clearbrook...Our Town" and helped create a slide program for the bi-centennial in 1976.

James died in 2000.

In her 90 years, Georgianna Moen has seen life move from horse drawn wagons to automobiles, space travel and the computer age. Due to computers, people have come to expect

information of the past and present at their fingertips, and Georgianna has helped provide some of the early history of the county and Clearbrook for those fingertips.

Georgianna died August 3, 2005 and is buried at the Clearwater Cemetery near Clearbrook.
