Nursing home resident reunites with dog

Cornerstone Nursing and Rehab resident, Pat Hart, had a special visitor this summer. Mr. Dog made the journey from Iowa with his current owners to see his best friend and former owner.

In 2019, Pat lived in Iowa. He had just retired and was planning on moving to Minnesota when he suffered a major stroke. He was admitted to a nursing care facility in that

state, and sadly had to give up his beloved pet. Pat's brother and extended family live in the Bemidji area and it was arranged to bring Pat to Minnesota to Cornerstone Nursing & Rehab to be near family. Mr. Dog had to stay behind in Iowa.

A neighbor of Pat had graciously taken in Mr. Dog and cared for him. Unfortunately, her circumstances changed, and she was no longer able to

provide the care that Mr. Dog needed. Her friend Julie, who had fallen in love with the little dog's charm, offered to take him. Mr. Dog now became part of Julie and Jim's fur family; however, Pat no longer knew where his little buddy was for certain. During visits with his cousin Barb, Pat often mentioned Mr. Dog and how he missed him, so she started checking and eventually located Julie.

Emails were exchanged and photos were provided for Pat could see how well Mr. Dog was doing. Pat was thrilled with each photo. It comforted him to see his old friend was so well taken care of but still missed him a great deal. Julie graciously supplied Barb and Pat with photos on a regular basis along with updates of how Mr. Dog was faring in his old age. Every photo of Mr. Dog was carefully hung on the bulletin board in Pat's room and all the staff became aware of Mr. Dogs high status in Pat's world.

In July, Julie emailed Barb asking if a visit would be a good idea. There was some concern and debate, but it was decided the joy would out-weigh the sad. Jim, Julie and Mr. Dog made the 10-hour trip from Iowa to Bagley. On Wednesday morning, they met with Barb and headed over to Cornerstone. Barb had not told Pat that Mr. Dog was coming for fear something would happen and the trip would not take place. All Pat was told when she took him to the patio area was that he had a special visitor. He looked quite puzzled as he did not recognize Jim or Julie, but then he saw Mr. Dog.

Pat and Mr. Dog were able to visit for several hours on Wednesday and Thursday before Jim and Julie had to return home. While another visit may not be possible, Julie and Cornerstone will be arranging for a Facetime call in the near future so Pat can see Mr. Dog more on a regular basis.

County hires interim Assessor

At the Oct. 12 meeting of the Clearwater County Board of Commissioners, Terrie Johnson was hired as the interim County Assessor for the time period of Oct. 12 through Dec. 31, 2021.

Johnson has 35-years' experience and is professionally designated as a Senior Accredited Minnesota Assessor (SAMA) which is required for the position. Johnson is a member of the Minnesota Association of Assessing Officers (MAAO) and the International Association of Assessing Officers (IAAO). From Nov. 2013 to July 2020, Johnson served as the Mahnomen County Assessor until her retirement. Prior to that, Johnson was a County Appraiser in Polk County and an Assessment

Clerk and appraiser in East Grand Forks.

The County Assessor position in Clearwater County has been vacant since this spring and the county is still seeking candidates to fill the position for the long term.

Johnson has developed a plan to prioritize working on the backlog of work that has accumulated and has received approval of the plan from the MN Department of Revenue. Johnson will also be training the new Deputy Assessor, Amie Willborg and hiring another appraiser to get the Assessor's office back to being fully staffed.

Johnson lives in rural Mahnomen county with her husband Gerald, who is a rancher and farmer.

I had served in other law enforcement jobs at different departments prior to Clearbrook and Gonvick and deployed to Bosnia and Iraq with the US Army prior to my law enforcement career. I realized I had been serving in one capacity or another for over 20 years!

At the end of my weeks off, I decided the time had come, and began the paperwork that would enable me to move on with my next phase in life. I expanded both my Body-camera auditing business and Permit to Carry, Advanced Firearms and Self Defense courses through "Rampart," and both endeavors are going quite well.

the position pending my official resignation. Veterans Home, Pine Lake Dam and introduction of interim Assessor on agenda

Clearwater County Commissioners met on Oct. 12 with presentations made by the Beltrami Veterans Service Officer and representatives of the Red Lake Watershed District.

Scotty Allison, Veterans Service officer from Beltrami County and Joe Vinnie were present to thank the board for financial support of the new Veterans Home being constructed in Bemidji. Construction on the facility has started and is expected to be completed in late 2023. The new home will employ 130 staff. The new facility will be a benefit to veterans in the Clearwater County, offering them care closer than current options of Fergus Falls or other facilities farther away. A wait list will open in the summer of 2022 for veterans.

Myron Jesme and Tom Anderson made a presentation about projects underway in the Red Lake Watershed. One of the projects expected to be completed this fall is the replacement of the Pine Lake Dam. The new dam will better regulate the flow of water into the lake, helping manage the oxygen levels. The dam will also allow for fish passage.

Deputy Sheriff, Vern Wittenberg, sought the boards approval for Candace Colter to be hired as Jail Administrator, which was approved.

County Attorney, Kathryn Lorschbach, presented a revised procurement policy for the county. Lorschbach explained that the policy is needed to be compliant with federal grant applications. County Engineer Dan Sauve expressed concerns about the wording of the revised policy because it did not include exemptions that had been included in the 2018 policy. Sauve explained that the exemptions are needed to be able to do routine maintenance on equipment and that the wording in the revised policy was not clear. A motion to approve the revised policy was made and passed. Aff

ter the policy was approved, the commissioners asked Lorschbach, Sauve and Auditor-Treasurer Allen Paulson to meet and discuss additional revisions of the policy and for them to present recommended changes at a future Board of Commissioners meeting.

Maintenance Department head Derek Loiland asked for approval to hire a tree service company to remove three trees and trim limbs on others on the

courthouse grounds. A motion was made and passed to proceed with the project.

Allen Paulson introduced Terri Johnson and asked the board to approve a contract to hire her on an interim basis through the end of the year to serve as County Assessor, which was approved. Paulson also asked for approval to advertise for an appraiser, also approved.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:53 am.

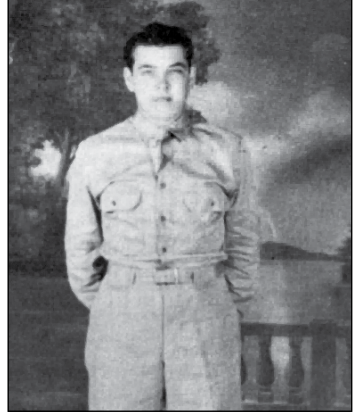
Becky Colebank, a retired attorney and veteran, has been

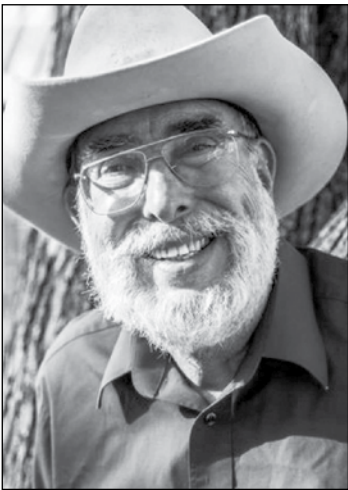
Home Country

In the next few weeks children all over America will suffer from one of the most serious of childhood diseases, common measles. It kills more children than any other infectious disease, I am told.

The details each year from measles are hard to calculate because many are attributed to pneumonia or encephalitis, two of the more serious measles complications. But the following facts have been accumulated:

One in 15 measles victims develops a potentially serious complication.

One in 2 suffers subsequent poor health for as long as a year.

Half show temporary abnormal brain-wave changes-changes which have been interpreted as possible evidence of brain involvement which may result in damage or mental retardation.

Measles rises to a peak in late winter and early spring. Much of the season is still ahead of us.

For almost two years vaccines have been available which, if employed, could have eliminated measles by now, according to one drug manufacturer. Earlier vaccines either required two or more injections, or made the child ill. Also, parents have tended to regard measles as inevitable.

None of these reasons has any further excuse for being.

A single injection of new

measles vaccine, we are advised provides prompt and long lasting protection. It is now available to physicians. And it produces minimal reactions in a small percentage of children.

The last remaining excuse, parental fatalism, is no excuse at all. It was understandable when there was no way to prevent measles. Now that the means are available, fatalism has become unforgivable apathy.

Canadian Border to Reopen

It was announced this week that the US will lift restrictions on land borders with Canada and Mexico in early November. This will begin allowing travelers from Mexico and Canada who are fully vaccinated for COVID-19 to enter the United States for non-essential purposes, including to visit friends and family or for tourism, via land and ferry border crossings.

This is good news but not great news for many in our area of the state but especially for those in the Northwest Angle who have been cut off and seen their economies devastated during the closing. So while it is good news, it is not great news as it simply does not go far enough.

The closing of our borders lasted far too long and the the sooner we can get back to normal the better. We are a free people in our respective countries. Our borders with Canada and Mexico—both going out and coming in—should be open to all legal citizens of our neighboring countries, vaccinated or not with a proper US, Canadian or Mexican passport to travel as freely as we did in the not so distant past. This vaccine required travel not only hinders my freedoms but the freedoms of millions of others in all of our respective countries by essentially marking us as unclean. It is unjustified and wrong and we have grown tired of it.

"Shortly before a House vote on the jobs bill, however, Grossell said he approached State Rep. Mohamud Noor — a Minneapolis DFLer who chairs the House Workforce and Business Development Finance and Policy Committee — to ask if the \$5 million loan program could be added at the last minute to the omnibus bill.

Grossell said Noor gave him a short list of issues to work out with the Republican-led Senate. Once Grossell cleared up the obstacles, top lawmakers agreed to amend the program onto the bill on the House floor. "I said these people have been cut off through no fault of their own through the border shut-down," Grossell said.

At the time, on the House floor, Noor said the legislation was an example of lawmakers from different parties and disparate geographic areas working together. In an interview last week, he said lawmakers "felt we had to do something" because the "lifeline" of these businesses were cut off during the border closures.

Noor said it's not that unusual for lawmakers to carve out specific help for certain areas or entities. There was also money for Rochester's Destination Medical Center in the omnibus jobs bill, as well as a loan for a Duluth paper mill. But Noor said the Northwest Angle is unique in that people usually have to go through Canada to visit it, and said federal members of Congress from Minnesota had also been trying to help people there."

How are Tribes being involved in this project?

We’re engaging with Minnesota Tribes and creating opportunities for their citizens and communities to benefit.

At Enbridge, we are proud of our relationships with Indigenous communities, and see them as mutually beneficial—economically, socially and culturally. Our Line 3 replacement marks an unprecedented level of Tribal engagement, inclusion and economic participation.

As part of the Line 3 replacement, we’ve committed \$100 million for Tribal-affiliated work opportunities, and we’re engaging with Minnesota Tribes on training, contracting, procurement and hiring.

A Tribal-led Cultural Resources Survey was completed along the project route. With representatives of nine Tribes doing direct survey work, and more than 30 Tribes involved via government-to-government consultation with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, this has been the largest such survey ever attempted in the energy industry.

Most importantly, we’ve been listening. From the start, we respected the wishes of the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe to route the new Line 3 around their reservation. We’ve also signed a 20-year easement renewal with the Fond du Lac Band and made further route changes based on the Tribal Cultural Resources Survey results.
