If funded, would be first service of its type in MN

Plan aims to help veterans get speedy approval from VA

An otherwise routine meeting of the Clearwater County Board on Jan. 4 took on an air of excitement as Veterans Service Officer Logan LeClair told of a plan that could help veterans get the care they need.

LeClair explained to the commissioners that if he can obtain the funding, he would work with Sanford Occupational Medicine for veterans medical opinions to aid in the VA claims process.

He gave an example of a veteran who has pancreatic cancer. This veteran needs to have a doctor provide an opinion as to whether or not the cancer was caused by exposure to Agent Orange. LeClair said many of his clients only utilize the VA medical centers for their care, and VA doctors generally do not write such opinions. So, a veteran needing an opinion must get that opinion written by a private practice physician.

This situation creates a hardship for veterans in need of care, and LeClair sees this idea as a way to help them. He said he can expect from 20 to 30 cases a year where his idea could help. It does not apply to all claims he deals with.

He told commissioners, "You have to treat VA claims like a court case," needing to prove that the veteran qualifies for VA care.

"If we do this," he said of

his plan, "we will be the first in Minnesota to do so." He noted that another county is waiting to see if his plan pans out and would likely utilize that same plan.

LeClair needs board approval for funding the plan. He said he can expect to get some funds from a state grant and some from donations, noting that some organizations in our county have indicated they will support the plan with some donations.

He said he has run the plan through the Sanford legal team and there were "no hiccups."

He noted that he has experienced the need for medical evidence. He said that the Minnesota Department of Veteran Affairs told him, "If you can get medical evidence to back up a claim, it will improve the success rate" (of getting claims approved for VA care).

LeClair said it simplifies the process and doesn't place a burden on the veterans and will speed up the care process.

He estimated the cost at \$15,000 to \$24,000 per year. He told commissioners he hopes he would be able to pay back their allocation – if granted.

Commissioner Neal Illies said, "I support the idea." However, he said the county needs to fund veterans transportation, too.

Commissioner John Nelson

noted that in some years the veterans transportation fund has enough money and some years it gets used up before the year is over. The dollars donated to that fund vary from year to year.

Nelson also noted that if a patient has private insurance, then they should have a report to back their claim.... This should be a subject for our senators.... Veterans need to contact their representatives. It's a shame that the VA won't write an opinion."

Commissioner Mark Larson said LeClair's plan would have to be utilized for veterans without insurance.

LeClair said most veterans use the VA for their care. He noted that the more credentials behind a report, the more likely the claim will be approved by the VA.

Commissioner Dean Newland said he'd like to see LeClair try it for a year.

Still, funding is the issue. Illies told LeClair to come back with a list of donations and grant money. LeClair said he can get some preliminary numbers.

Board Chairman Mark Titera told him the department heads will meet on Jan. 14, where this topic can be discussed again after looking at numbers for donations and grants.

Road projects for the year 2022 were approved for bid advertising by the Clearwater County Board on Tuesday, Jan. 4.

The projects to be completed are as follows:

Pavement markings across the county;

Re-graveling county roads on the south half of the county; Replacing a bridge on Pine Lake Township Road T-46 (520th Street); and

Bituminous surfacing of the following roadways or portions thereof: County State Aid Highways 3, 4, 10, 25, 28, 34, 35 and 49.

About the bituminous resurfacing, County Engineer Dan Sauvé told commissioners the county will be applying 16,000 tons of mix.

Here is a list of the roads to receive bituminous:

CSAH 3 from TH 92 to CSAH 14 Mill 2" overlay 2.5" CSAH 4 from TH 92 to CSAH 5 Mill 2" overlay 2.5"

CSAH 10 from TH 223 to CSAH 3 Mill 1" overlay 1.5", some subgrade

CSAH 49 from TH 92 to 1 mile east and Reconstruct 900 feet of Leon Twp Rd. Mill 1.5" overlay 2.5"

CSAH 35 from CSAH 7 to CSAH 34 Mill 1" Overlay 3"

CSAH 34 from CSAH 35 to CSAH 28 Mill 1", Overlay 3"

CSAH 28 from CSAH 34 to CSAH 25 Mill 1" Overlay 3"

CSAH 26 from CSAH 25 to CSAH 27 Mill 1" Overlay 1.5

CSAH 25 from CSAH 28 to CSAH 27 Mill 1" Overlay 1.5

Sauvé also presented a detour agreement with the Min-

nesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) to use CSAH 39 as a detour for their Trunk Highway 200 construction project from Mahnomen to Roy Lake. This was approved by the commissioners.

There is a second detour agreement that MnDOT is talking about that they have not presented yet. That is for work they are planning on TH 92 from Zerkel to CSAH 35. MnDOT wants to use CSAH 37, CSAH 2, and CSAH 13 for a detour. According to Sauvé, that is a long detour and the county is worried about people using shorter gravel roads as an unofficial detour. There is a potential that local people will just use CSAH 35 and CAR 103, which are gravel roads, to avoid a longer detour. The conversation on this detour centered around asking MnDOT to address the unofficial detour. The commissioners asked about traffic counts before and after the start of MnDOT's project to show that the roads are being used as a detour.

Sauvé has borrowed counters from MnDOT State Aid to get traffic counts. The County Highway Department has some counts already on those roads.

In relation to this unofficial detour, Commissioner Dean Newland asked if Sauvé could "put in your two cents worth" and ask MnDOT to apply calcium chloride to control dust. The main concern was where the detour passes by homes. Board Chairman Mark Titera also asked about using a traffic counter.

Sauvé said, "I'll see what we can negotiate."

Sauvé later noted that if Mn-

DOT places calcium chloride on CSAH 35 and CAR 103 for the whole road or just in front of people's houses, it's likely the county will not bother with a traffic count if that happens. If the county cannot negotiate the calcium chloride up front, then Sauvé said he will try get traffic counts before MnDOT starts their project.

In other matters, the Commissioners approved the expenditure of \$12,500 (in annual payments of \$2,500) for software in the Recorder's Office. Before the vote, Illies questioned "who owns the data?" when the data goes onto the servers of the company providing the software and service: TrlMinsystem. County Recorder Brenda Knable said using TrlMinsystem will allow the transfer of existing data from the old system to the new, saving a lot of time. An optional system to replace the outdated M.O.M.S. software would not allow this efficient transfer of data.

Funds for the new system will come from the Recorder's Office compliance account.

Environmental Services Director Dan Hecht brought two topics before the commissioners.

One was to grant additional payment to Stantec for a change order when the firm drilled wells for hydrogeologic investigation at the landfill. Stantec is seeking an additional \$1,611 to cover labor and travel expenses incurred because the well drilling work took longer than anticipated.

Hecht said the well drillers experienced cave-ins that ate up more time to complete the well drilling.

Commissioner Neal Illies said they should have expected the difficulties as they knew the site was a gravel pit. Nevertheless, commissioners approved the added expenditure, with Illies being the only "nay" vote.

Hecht brought another motion to approve a contract with Liberty Tire Recycling to haul tires from the landfill at a cost of \$300 per ton, compared to \$260 per ton last year. Hecht said a fuel charge is also being assessed. He discussed how tires are assessed various fees when brought to the landfill to help recoup the county's costs, and noted that Liberty is the only game in town, with no options for the county. The motion to approve the contract was approved.

Two motions for the Sheriff's Office were approved. One was the purchase two laptop computers to upgrade two outdated ones at a cost of \$5,412. The other motion was to accept the off-highway vehicle safety grant of \$9,154 and authorized the board chair and sheriff to sign and execute the grant.

Nurses hired: The Clearwater County Nursing Service was authorized to hire three nurses: Kimberly Fast-Watkins, Laurie Beier, and Jennifer Haman.

Gonvick's Blood Drive Brings in 34 Volunteers

GONVICK, MINN. - The Gonvick community hosted a blood drive with Vitalant on January 5 at Clear Water's Life Center which helped collect a total of 34 units of blood products for patients in need.

A total of 34 individuals volunteered to donate blood and 30 individuals were able to successfully donate at the Vitalant blood drive on January 5. A total of five donors also came forward to donate Power Red Cells (2RBC) which collects two units of red blood cells while returning platelets, plasma and a saline solution back to the donor.

Vitalant expressed their gratitude to Fay Bjerke, who coordinated the drive, American Legion Auxiliary which sponsored the blood drive, and Clear Water's Life Center which provided the location.

Living through a pandemic can lead to many uncertainties, although one thing we are sure of, is that the need for blood never ceases. Blood is only useable for 42 days, so a constant supply is always needed, no matter the season. Winter has challenges with the threat of weather/travel and planning, but the winter weather is no wonderland for hospital patients who depend on blood to keep them healthy and alive.

Donors can make a convenient appointment to give blood at www.donors.vitalant.org or by calling 877-25-VITAL. With each donation, donors receive a free total cholesterol test and earn reward points.

Blood donation takes about an hour from check-in to refreshments, while the blood draw typically taking less than 10 minutes. Donors can save about 20 minutes by completing their Health History Questionnaire the day they donate on www.vitalant.org/health

Gonvick Council has regular December meeting

The Gonvick City Council held the 2nd reading of the proposed public Nuisance Ordinance at their regular meeting in December.

They also made their resolution certifying the 2022 Levy to the Clearwater County Auditor at 5%.

No progress or updates on the Water Improvement project was available.

City maintenance person Dan Johnson stated that the new plow came for his equipment and it has really been useful for removing snow in a hurry. The plow fits on the pay loader that the city leases.

Fire Department issue with a call for a house fire north of Gonvick. Otherwise it has been quiet except for a few medical call.

There has been interest in purchasing Lots 10, 11, 12, 21 22 and 23 of Block 3 of Railroad addition. Council was receptive to selling and will discuss this at a later date.

Expenditures were approved with water and Sewer \$4,369.55, General \$30, 400.34, Fire \$7,569.40 for a total of \$42,339.29.

SNOW REMOVAL SAFETY CONCERN

A safety concern was brought to the Clearwater County Highway Department's attention recently; the concern has to do with snow removal from private driveways. Individuals have been removing snow from their driveways by pushing the snow out of the driveway and across the roadway, or leaving windrows and piles of snow on the road. This is causing a serious safety issue by creating a driving hazard. In accordance with MN Statute 160.2715, it is unlawful and considered to be a misdemeanor to push snow across the roadway or deposit snow on the roadway.

Instead of pushing snow across county roads, driveways can be cleaned by pushing the snow into the county ditch on the same side of the road as the driveway. The snow on the left side of the driveway can also be removed to form a "pocket". The majority of the snow from the roadway will go into this "pocket" so as to reduce the amount of snow being redeposited in the driveway from the county snowplow.

If you must enter the roadway to clear snow from the driveway it is very important to remove any and all snow that is carried out onto the roadway. Please don't leave that snow for the snowplow operator. The snowplow may not come back to that area for several days and any snow left on the road will be a hazard. The snow will freeze in the windrows and ridges and is very difficult to remove.

Ferol Anderson Lee 1907-1998

Ferol Anderson was born on December 22, 1907 in Estherville Iowa. She came to Clearwater County with her parents and 5 brothers in 1914. Her family purchased a farm 10 miles northeast of Gonvick. The farm had been the known as the "Meadows" post office and store. Ferol attended school in Greenwood Township.

In 1926 the family moved to Clearbrook. Ferol graduated from Clearbrook High school in 1927. She continued her education at the teacher's training school in Stillwater and then came back to the county and taught school at Leonard for 6 years.

Ferol married LJ Lee in 1934. LJ was also from north of Gonvick, near Berner. LJ served in the state legislature for a dozen years, first elected in 1960. He was also mayor of Bagley, a city council member and a county commissioner. LJ was also a business agent for the Local 49ers.

Because LJ was in construction, they moved around the state when they first married until 1941, when LJ went to Greenland and England where he worked during WWII. During that time, Ferol lived in Bagley with their two children John and Catherine. Ferol supported the war effort at home by being active in the Gas Mileage Board, the Red Cross, Promoting War Bond sales and church activities.
