Council was asked about a potential community garden

Kevin Prosser had questions for the Clearbrook City Council at their March 14 meeting concerning a potential location for a community garden. The council thought that property near Kloser Park would be a solution as it also has water available. They will be checking to see if that would be the best place and how the garden would be run.

Police Report
Police Chief Ryan Solee had a quote from Blue Shield Tactical Systems to bring Officer Des-escalation Instruction Course to the police department this summer. The cost would be covered by some of the \$10,000 grant that was received from TEAM Industries Foundation. He had spoken with several officers, chiefs and sheriffs about this and there was interest. Council members thought that the grant could also be used on other projects for the city but

it covers only de-escalation, mental health, bike safety and body armor. This would be done in Clearbrook instead of having police officers attend the same course elsewhere. He would get the word out so that other departments could be in on the training as well.

Solee also gave the incident report with: Alarm 3; Assist 1, Assist Other Agency 1; Crimes against Family 1; Disorderly 1, Disturbance 1; Harassment 3; Information Only 1; Medical 4; Motor Vehicle Crash 1.; Park Complaint 2; Traffic Stop 5, Welfare Check 1 for a total of 26 records.

Council member Dale Volstad brought up truck parking on city streets once they start to thaw out and the snow melts. Trailers can be parked in the city lot across from the bank. They were also questioning the tonnage that the streets would

bear. They will check that out before the next meeting.

Fire Department
Fire Chief Adam Krog was at a fire so there was no department report.

Liquor Store
Karra Weems, Manager of the Municipal Liquor Store stated that she had a \$2,698.57 profit for February. February was a harder month and a shorter one. The pull tabs have been keeping up and the Electronic machine has been busy.

Utilities & Maintenance
Mark Snobl was wondering if there would be any help this summer to help clean for at least 20 hours per week. The council questioned if a high school student could be used and what is the legal age.

He was wondering what would happen with the construction starting up. They have moved in some equipment. Oak and Pine Street will be having the most problems this spring with the snow melt.

Nick Rankin has completed his classes and will be licensed after his final test.

City Clerk
Lucie Thompson stated that Ryan Solee is getting busy with the police department taking up more of his time and would not like to manage the city pool. He will get the chemicals and get the pool up and running and check on things. The lifeguards could manage the concessions and keep track of staffing. They will put in an ad to get a new manager.

No new information was received on the estimates from WSN for the water meters.

Tamara Edevold of Bagley retires from NELL board after 15 years

After 15 years with the NELL (Northern Exposure to Lifelong Learning) board, Tamara Edevold of Bagley turned over her gavel and records to her successor Becky Friberg, also of Bagley, on March 3, 2022 at NELL's March meeting.

Tamara, who began her tenure with NELL in 2007, replaced former director Al-len Greenberg of Bemidji. She has planned over 300 seasonal programs for NELL audiences and is credited with helping the organization to grow through these past 15 years. She was hired in 1990 as the Executive Director of the Clearwater County Historical Society, and began building that project into the highly successful program that it is today.

As to the NELL program, which she joined in 2007, she was recruited by NELL board member Roger Pearson of Bagley. He wanted someone who was knowledgeable in running a non-profit and someone interested in programming. She has helped build the NELL program ever since and has been a major part of its' programs over the years. She and her husband Mark Edevold are both award-winning historians.

The NELL programs are planned by the members of the NELL board with its' director. There are two seasons (spring and fall) of free lectures on various topics called "Lifelong Learning." They cover a wide

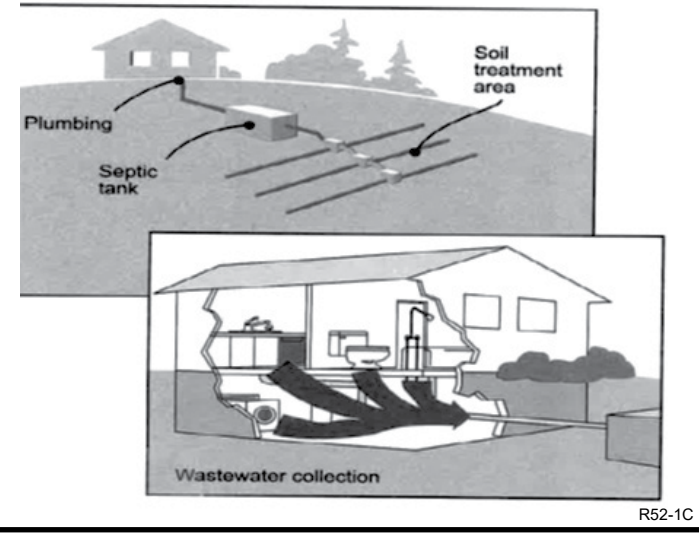

Continued from front page water tower and water treatment facility funding options that were discussed at the last meeting. They include loan and grant funding through USDA and looking at request for state bonding funds.

Donations were received by the city from Clearwater-Polk Electric Coop Trust in the amount of \$1,000 for the All-School Reunion.

The council passed a resolution to accept the \$28,468 that has been allocated to the City of Clearbrook through the American Rescue Plan Act for the redistribution of unrequested Coronavirus funds.

The council also passed a resolution reestablishing precincts and polling places for the upcoming election in November. The City Hall on 200 Elm Street SW will be Precinct 1 at the community center.

Monthly claims for \$48,167.04 and Additional Claims of \$76,932.19 were approved. \$21,000 for State Fire Aid was for the Fire Department Relief Association.

The meeting was adjourned for a closed meeting on an employee matter.

St. Paul, MN – On Monday, House Democrats refused to take a vote on refilling the Unemployment Insurance (UI) Trust fund and saving Minnesota businesses from years of massive tax hikes — some ranging from 30% or higher.

Despite efforts from House Republicans working with everyone to find a solution, House Democrats still refused to bring the UI Trust Fund legislation to the House floor for a vote. The legislation had support from Governor Walz, House Republicans along with Senate Republicans and Democrats.

“Business owners and consumers ultimately lose,” Representative Matt Grossell (R-Clearbrook) said. “The House Democrat Majority had a chance to fulfill a promise to not punish MN businesses who were forced to close during the Walz shutdown, but they've failed Minnesota businesses by their inaction.”

The UI Trust Fund legislation that would refill the state's \$2.7 billion deficit has not moved in committee since February. House Democrats refused to hear the bill and it was not signed into law by the March 15 deadline.

Even the Commissioner of the Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED) encouraged House members to pass the legislation, citing that without it, a tax hike would burden business owners for the next six years.

As far as legislation goes, I authored a bill for Park Rapids. This bill would allow for local tax revenue to be used for improvements to some of

Short meeting of the County Commissioners

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on March 15 with all commissioners in attendance either in person or by video conference. The meeting began at 10 am and following the Pledge of Allegiance and approval of the agenda and minutes of the last meeting, they moved on with business items.
Trudi Alberg, Board Coordinator, submitted invoices that needed to be approved. Board Chair, Mark Titera made the motion to authorize the Auditor to pay submitted invoices of \$76,770.55 from the County Revenue Fund and \$6,225.90 from the Nursing Service Fun. Motion was seconded and passed.
Dan Hecht, Environmental Services Administrator asked for the board to approve a proposal from SampleTech Environmental and Industrial Sampling Services in the amount of \$5,785 per year for 2022 and 2023 for groundwater monitoring services at the demolition landfill. Motion was made by Commissioner Illies, seconded by Commissioner Newland, and was passed. Hecht explained that he had another proposal that he will hold onto until the

next meeting regarding the purchase of chemicals as he is expecting one more quote. Hecht also gave an update on the multi-county group that is working on a new regional landfill. The group had submitted a grant proposal that was not accepted by the state. One of the commissioners asked if the group was going to proceed on the project or if they would disband. Hecht stated that they will continue planning and that there may be another grant opportunity later this year. With many counties running out of landfill space, the need remains, and Hecht expected that the other counties would be interested in continuing to discuss the project even if grant monies are not available in the immediate future.
Lisa Syverson with the Public Health/Nursing Service submitted a proposal to hire Barbara Kitto, CAN, at Step 7-part time. Kitto has 20 years' experience in home health care. Motion was made by Commissioner Larson, seconded by Commissioner Newland, motion passed.
County Engineer, Dan Sauvé distributed a certificate of performance for Davidson Construction, Inc from Newfolden

regarding their completion of the walking/bike trail between the Clearbrook-Gonvick School and the Clearbrook swimming pool. The certificate showed that the original amount for the contract was \$412,642.00. The total value of work certified was \$395,147.46 with no exemptions. Commissioner Nelson made the motion to accept the Engineer's Certificate of Performance for SP 015-090-002 and to concur with the City of Clearbrook to authorize final payment to Davidson Construction, Inc. Motion was seconded by Commissioner Larson, motion passed.
There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:25 am.

Contrary to what many Veterans believe, receiving a 0% disability from the VA is actually a win! Many Veterans see the 0% and believe it's the VA denying your claim. However, that is untrue. If the VA is going to deny your claim they will say "denied". The VA granting a 0% to your disability means that they acknowledge that the military caused a disability to you, though at the current level it is not disabling enough to hinder you or compensate you for it.
The good thing about a 0% service connected rating from the VA, is that you can always ask for an increase in the future. Generally, this is done one year after receiving your 0%. Asking for an increase to your VA ratings is very normal and something all Veterans should look into. If you have received a 0% rating from the VA, I highly encourage you to ask for an increase 1 year after receiving said rating. The fact of the matter is that being service connected through the VA at any rate has its benefits and one shouldn't be upset with a 0%. Because at the end of the day, it's still a victory. Finally, if you would like to get together with me to discuss your VA benefits that's great! I just ask that you schedule an appointment that way I can dedicate time specifically to you and research your records. A lot of the VA benefits depend on when you served, how you served and where you served.
Therefore, there is rarely a one size fits all answer and it truly is individually based. That's why I ask for appointments, that way your time is utilized in the best manner possible. That all being said walk-ins are always accepted.

Women of Clearwater County Olga Peterson
Olga Hulteen Peterson was born on February 28, 1914 to Oscar and Kristansia Hulteen at the Hotel in Bagley. She was one of five children and the family lived in Holst Township. Olga attended Pine Dale school in Holst Township and then graduated from Clearbrook High School in 1930.
Olga graduated from Bemidji State Teacher's College in 1932 with a Teaching Certificate. She taught for one year in Mineral Center, Minnesota, and then returned to Clearwater County. Olga taught at Shevlin school in 1947-48, and had 42 kids in one classroom! After Shevlin she taught at Happy Hollow School in Holst Township for several years. From 1952- to 1979 she

was at the Clearbrook School. She received her BS degree in elementary education from Bemidji State University. When she retired in 1979, she had been the Clearbrook school principal for 27 years and in education for 37 years.
When she was teaching at Mineral Center near Grand Marais, she met her future husband. Don was working for the Forestry Service at Tofte. They were married on December 2, 1933 and were together for 67 years before his death in 2001. They moved to Holst Township a few years after they married where Don farmed and worked construction. They raised three children- Yvonne, Duane and Blake. Don died April 13, 2001.
Olga was involved in numerous community organizations, including the Clearbrook Senior Center, Good Shepherd Church council, 4-H leader, Community Education board, Board member of Good Samaritan, County Delta Kappa Gamma, home extension study group, and a member of the Dudley Doers Home extension group.
She was a Clearwater County First Lady honoree in 1984. In March of 2005 she was named to the Northwest Minnesota Women's Hall of Fame.
Olga died March 20, 2011 and is buried at the Bagley City Cemetery.

Sheep farming is more than just sheep. The Sustainable Sheep Farming event is focusing on diversity on the farm with speakers that include Celia Norgaard-Thompson of Gully, MN who works with her husband on a certified organic 140 acre family farm transitioning into a regenerative system focusing on livestock and small grains. 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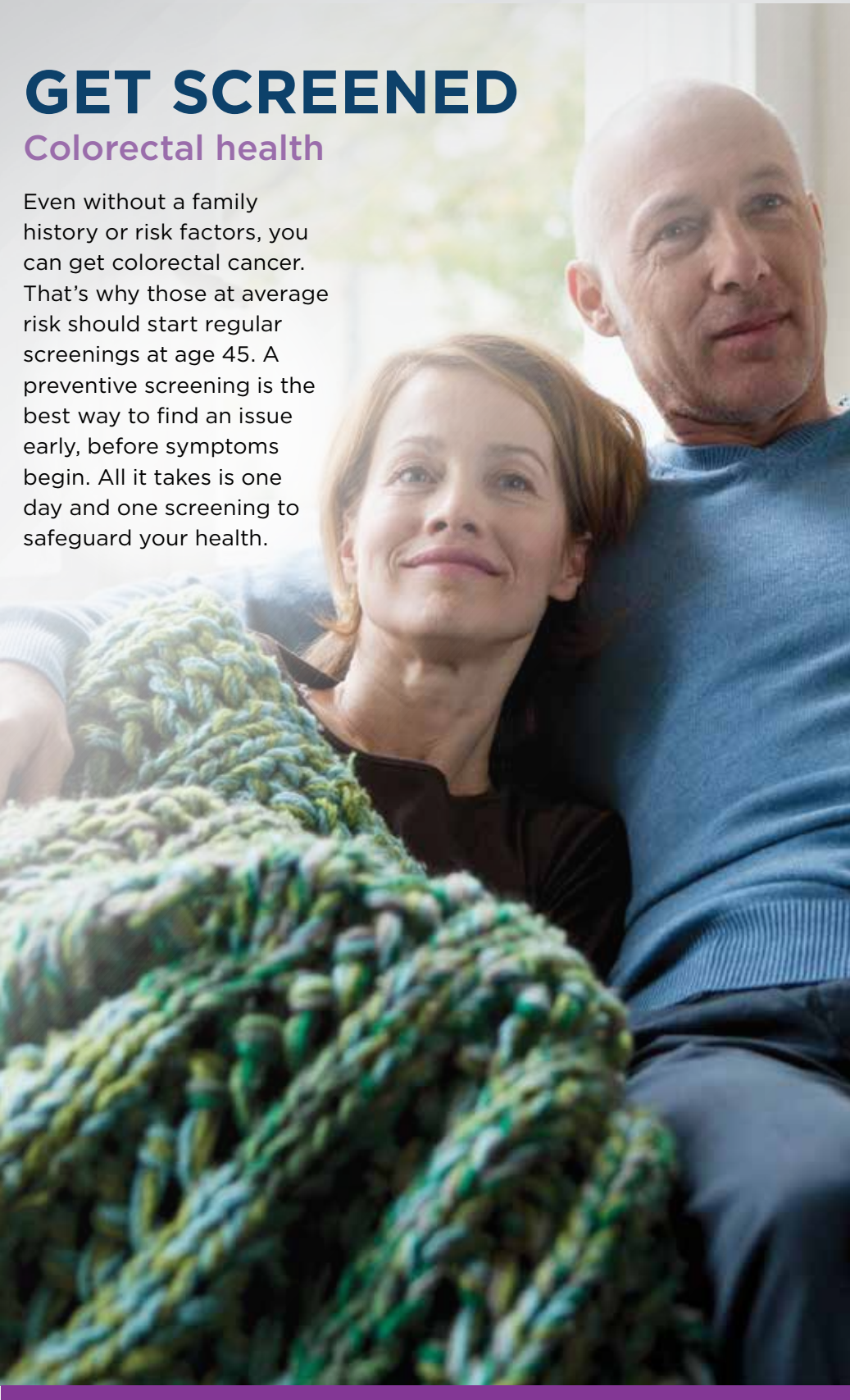

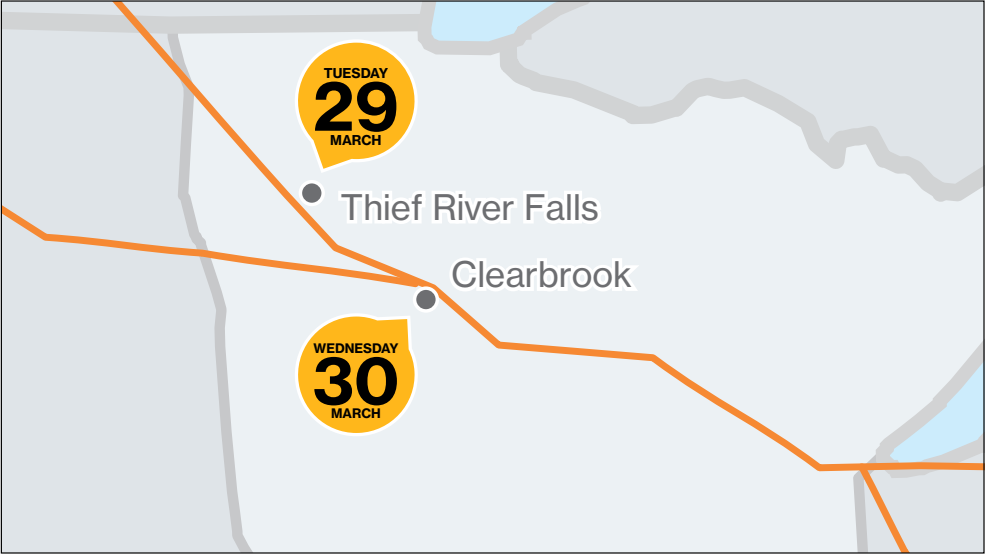
