Improvements at township garbage collection sites discussed at County Commissioner’s meeting

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on Tuesday, August 16. The meeting began with the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by the review and approval of the agenda and minutes from the last meeting.

A brief meeting was held for Unorganized 143-36 Township Board, to review and approve the budget for 2023.

Next on the agenda was a report from Dan Hecht, director of Environmental Services. At the last commissioner’s meeting, Hecht had explained that Jerry Illies had spoken to him about doing some work at the Dudley Township collection site. Illies was on hand to explain that he was willing to do some tree removal, grading and adding gravel at the site to make it bigger and easier to manage. There was discussion about these improvements not being in the budget for 2022, but the board approved to spend up to \$4,000 this year on these items. Fencing at the sight could be considered during the budget building sessions for 2023. Hecht shared a list of expenditures that have been paid by the county and townships on the collection sites since 2009 which totaled \$151,005.00. Hecht shared a request to approve expenses of \$29,165.00 for improvements at the Itasca Township collection site. Commissioner Mark Lar-

son expressed concern that the project was done by the township before the commissioners were made aware the work was being completed. Other commissioners agreed with Larson’s concern. During the discussion Commissioner Neal Illies stated “What can be done at this point? Are we not going to approve it now?” Commissioner Dean Newland made a motion to approve the expenses with Itasca Township paying 25% of the project (\$7,291.25) and the county paying 75% (\$21,873.75). The motion was seconded by Commissioner Illies and was passed, with Commissioner Larson voting “no”. The subject of paving being done in the future at the collection sites was also discussed, with all the commissioners in agreement that paving will not be done at any of the sites.

Brielle Prokosch from the Soil and Water Conservation District with a letter of intent to donate a waterless watercraft cleaning station to the Minnesota DNR for use on Clearwater Lake. The commissioners approved to have chairman Mark Titera sign the letter of intent on behalf of the county.

Lisa Syverson from the county Nursing Services addressed the board about hiring a part-time home health aide. The board approved hiring Michaela Swenson for the position.

Auditor-Treasurer Al

Paulson had three requests for the board to consider. The first was to authorize the Auditor to pay submitted invoices of \$97,124.31 from the County Revenue Fund and \$7,005.51 from the Nursing Service Fund. A motion was made and passed. The next request was to require tax forfeiture parcels number 24.308.0010 and 24.308.0020 (the Good Samaritan buildings and property in Clearbrook) to be repurchased together as they are a combined business. A motion was made and approved. In the final item of business for the meeting, Paulson requested the board to approve the acceptance of a \$7,664.00 donation from the TEAM Foundation to the Clearwater County Sheriff’s Office for the Life Saver Project. A motion was made and approved.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:55 am.

In addition, Cassandra may also treat poisoning, drug overdose, loss of consciousness, major burn, spinal cord, head or brain injury, severe allergic reaction and visible broken bones.

When asked of her idea of care, Cassandra shared her goal is “to collaborate with my patients to provide an individualized, evidence-based care plan.”

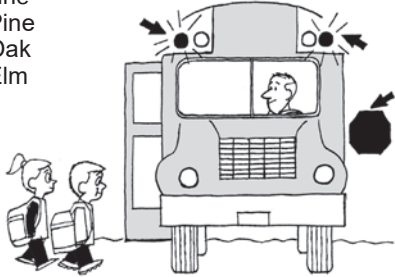

Doc sighed. "I always have to work. I thought someone invented Labor Day so no one would have to work. Labor Day's about my busiest day of the year!"

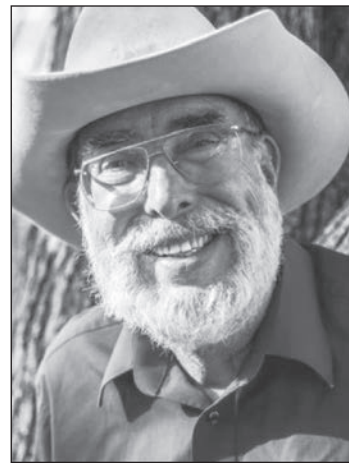
"You're kidding. It's a national holiday, why would you have to work? People go fishing, go bowhunting, take the family water skiing, Climb mountains. Fun stuff."

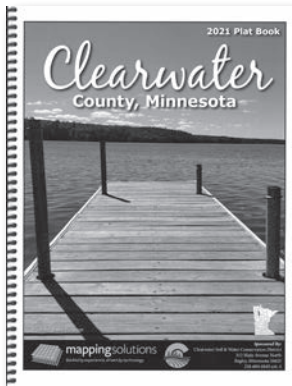

3 fun activities to engage kids in conservation

Conservation is a collective responsibility shared by individuals across the globe. The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources reminds firearm and muzzleloader hunters who want to harvest antlerless deer in a deer permit area designated as antlerless permit lottery this hunting season to purchase their license by Thursday, Sept. 8. Hunters who purchase their license on or before this date are automatically entered into the lottery for the deer permit area or special hunt area they declare.

Successful applicants will receive a postcard in the mail authorizing them to take an antlerless deer using their regular license in that antlerless permit lottery area. No application is needed to take antlerless deer in permit areas with either sex, two-deer limit, three-deer limit or five-deer limit designations.

Hunters who want to participate in special firearm or muzzleloader deer hunts also need to apply for permits that are issued through a lottery. That application deadline is also Sept. 8.
