No tax-payer appeals at County

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners meeting and the Board of Equalization were held on June 13, 2017.

A moment of silence was held simultaneously to Remember with Honor former Clearwater Register of Deeds and Recorder LeRoy Larson,

and Clearwater County Court Administrator Vernon Lundin.

Mr. Larson was elected and served the residents here from August 15, 1964 to December 31, 1990. He recently died on May 28, 2017.

Mr. Lundin served from January 1, 1972 until his retirement in 1993, and died recently on May 6, 2017.

Board of Equalization: County Assessor Jamie Freeman and Deputy Assessor Eric Beier came to conduct the Board of Equalization meeting. No tax-payer appeals were brought to the meeting.

County Wide, a 5% increase, except Long Lost Lake; Pine Lake Township, a 10% increase; and Popple Township,

a 5% increase – on residential SRR land and structures has been recommended by the State Board.

“There is a really strong market right now,” stated Ms. Freeman. “There is more new construction this year than in 2016.”

A question was discussed regarding a local honey farm that does processing/extracting of honey that was denied agricultural tax basis.

“This could be a (matter for) a tax-court case,” stated Commissioner Dan Stenseng, “as dairy farmers also process a raw product (milk) and ship it out. So does the honey farm.”

Shooting Star Casino is in the process of placing the casino parcel in Trust to give them an exempt classification. It is not complete at this time, and their attorney says it could take another two years, which Ms. Freeman says is a benefit to Clearwater County.

Commissioner Neal Illies said, “The U.S. Law asserts the land be put into trust for the tribe.”

The Board included an Assessor's Overview, which points out that Minnesota Statutes dictate that all property be valued at its market value, which is determined by the assessor as the price the property would likely sell for on the open market. Assessor's values (sales ratios) must fall between 90%

and 105% of market, or must be raised or lowered. Six sales is considered a valid sample, or a three year history is used at times.

Another point in the summary states that the assessor is required by law to view each property at least once every five years.

Eric Beier, Deputy Assessor, will complete education in August and will then have the required 12 months of assessment experience to be eligible to apply for a "Certified Minnesota Assessor" license.

Jill Evje, Sr. Assessor Clerk, is also taking additional education.

The Assessor's office continues to work on the Vanguard conversion.

Park Security at the Long Lake Campground was discussed by the Commissioners, with Commissioner Stenseng suggesting that there is a need

for some kind of a warning system at the campground.

Commissioner Illies thought a possible siren warning would be effective as a storm warning. Commissioner Stenseng added that there is no security there from 2 - 5 a.m.

"This is something to keep in mind," said Chairman Dean Newland.

County Highway Department: A motion was passed by the Commissioners to approve payment of Highway Department bills in the amount of \$19,871 as presented.

County Auditor Allen Paulson was authorized to pay the submitted invoices of \$274,723 for the County Revenue Fund, and \$8,123 for the Nursing Service Fund.

Commissioners present at the meeting were Daniel Stenseng, Dean Newland, John Nelson, Neal Illies and Arlen Syverson.

I do remember, as a 6th grader, playing in a baseball game north of Gully. I also played for an American Legion team in Leonard. The field was north of Leonard, I've looked for it but can't find it.

An interesting story comes from the Leonard Legion team. Clearbrook didn't field a Legion team one year so, three of us played for Leonard.

We were scheduled to play Fertile at Leonard. When Fertile got to Leonard they could not find the baseball field. They asked for directions.

I still remember team members laughing as they got out of their vehicles. They were laughing at our baseball field. They weren't laughing as they left, because we beat them 3-2.

Dale TeHennepe was our pitcher and he was a very good pitcher. Fertile had several players who went on to play college baseball, including Arlo Brunserg, who played nine seasons of professional baseball.

We had defeated a team that was undefeated until they got to the State Legion Tournament.

I bought a fishing kayak and this summer I plan on fishing all the small lakes around Clearbrook. Including Deep Lake, Steenerson Lake, Falk Lake, Johnson Lake and others. I used to do this as a teenager.

Mumps found at Win-E-Mac School

Recently, many shocked parents in the Win-E-Mac School district received a letter, just after the end of the school year. The letter was from Polk County Public Health and stated: "Dear Parents: Cases of mumps have been confirmed in students at Win-E-Mac School. The cases were identified at the end of the school year. We'd like to provide you with some information about mumps illness along with a few specific action steps. Mumps is an infection caused by a virus. The most common symptoms include swollen glands in front of and below the ear, fatigue, headache, and low-grade fever. Mumps is spread by coughing and sneezing or through direct contact with the saliva of an infected individual. Symptoms of mumps usually develop 16 to 18 days after exposure, but may develop from 12 to 25 days after exposure. Most individuals in Minnesota are vaccinated for mumps. The vaccine is about 85 percent effective, so it prevents a significant number of mumps cases. However, this also means that some individuals will get mumps even if they have been vaccinated.

Here are some things you can do:

Check your immunization records to make sure you've had two doses of the measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine.

Watch for symptoms even if you have been vaccinated. Although you may have received the MMR vaccine, immunization is not always 100% effective, and immunity decreases over time. Early symptoms usually begin 2 to 3 weeks after exposure. If you develop symptoms, they would be expected to occur between now and June 13, 2017.

Stay home and call your healthcare provider if you have

symptoms of mumps. Anyone suspected of having mumps should be evaluated by a health care provider. (Call the provider before going to the facility. - They may want you to go to a specific area and/or wear a mask). Note: It may be helpful to take this letter with you to show to your health care provider. If symptomatic, stay home from school, work, daycares, or any group activities. Wash your hands often and cover your cough and sneezes

Thank you, and please call Polk County Public Health at 218-281-3385, if you have additional questions.

Message to Minnesota Healthcare Provider: The MDH is currently recommending that individuals who receive this letter be evaluated for mumps: when there is presence of low-grade fever, headache and parotid, sublingual or submaxillary gland Swelling. What is mumps?
Mumps is a viral infection that primarily affects the saliva glands located between the ear and the jaw. What are the symptoms of mumps? Symptoms of mumps include low-grade fever, headache, muscle aches, tiredness, loss of appetite, and swollen salivary glands under the ears or jaw on one or both sides of the face (parotitis). What health problems does mumps cause Up to 30 percent of a people infected with the mumps virus do not have Symptoms. Orchitic (swelling of the testicles) is a common symptom in males after puberty.

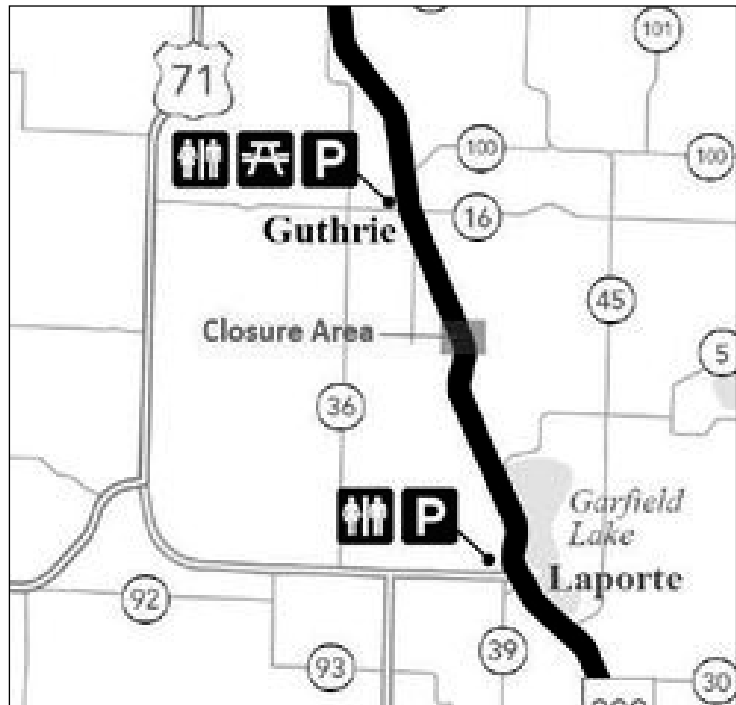
Rarely, swelling of the spinal cord and brain (encephalitis) occurs. How is mumps diagnosed? Mumps may be diagnosed by looking at symptoms and laboratory test results. Health care providers may collect samples from the mouth or throat, as well as urine and blood samples to test for the virus. There are other illnesses that can cause similar symptoms, so it is important that the correct laboratory testing is done. How is mumps spread? Mumps can be spread when a person with mumps coughs or sneezes near you, or if you touch fluids from the mouth or nose of a person with mumps and then touch your eyes, nose, or mouth. Sharing beverage containers, eating utensils, cigarettes, and kissing are other examples of how the virus can be spread in fluids between individuals. How long is a person with mumps contagious? Mumps can be spread 2 days before symptoms appear through about 5 days after. Mumps is most contagious 48 hours before the illness begins. Is there a vaccine for mumps? Yes. Mumps vaccine is contained in the MMR vaccine (Measles, Mumps, Rubella). One dose of mumps vaccine will be effective in approximately 80 percent of people vaccinated, but 2 doses of mumps vaccine will be effective in approximately 90 percent of people. This means it is still possible for someone with 2 doses of MMR to get mumps. Learn more on the MMR Measles, What can be done to prevent mumps? The best way to prevent mumps is to get vaccinated. Persons who have mumps should stay at home for 5 days after swelling starts so that they do not spread it to others. Is there a treatment for mumps? No, only symptom care. Trail to close

Portion of Paul Bunyan State Trail in Hubbard County to close for construction

A portion of the Paul Bunyan State Trail, located 2.5 miles south of the town of Guthrie in Hubbard County, will close Monday, June 26, to allow a private contractor to replace an 8-foot diameter culvert under the trail. The trail segment is expected to reopen by early to mid-October.

"At this location, the culvert replacement does not allow for a safe alternate trail route," said Dave Schotzko, Parks and Trails area supervisor in Bemidji. "Trail users are advised to plan accordingly."

The trail is 115 miles long,

stretching from Crow Wing State Park near Brainerd to Lake Bemidji State Park north of Bemidji. It is the longest of Minnesota's state trails and the longest continuously paved rail-trail in the country.

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Minnesota State Fair to Host Job Fair June 28

The Minnesota State Fair, along with several of its vendors, will host a State Fair Job Fair from 4-8 p.m. on Wednesday, June 28, in the Progress Center on the fairgrounds. That evening, more than 600 fair-time positions will be available.

The applicant line will begin forming at 3 p.m. outside the Progress Center, and anyone in line by 7:45 p.m. will be able to participate. Applicants will meet with a State Fair representative and, if their skills and experience match

an open position, a fair department or vendor will interview them. Resumes are not required but will be accepted. Positions available at the Job Fair could include: ticket selling, ticket taking, parking and park & ride attendants, cooks, cashiers,

retail sales, food and beverage servers, custodians and more. Wages for most positions range from \$9.50 to \$10 per hour. If hired, employees will receive free State Fair admission. Job seekers are encouraged to speed up the process by registering online before coming to the Job Fair. For those who don't register online, registration forms will be available at the Job Fair.

DISPOSING OF LEFTOVER SEED

A significant amount of seed planted this year will have been treated with a fungicide, insecticide and or nematocide. For one reason or another, farmers may find themselves with leftover seed treated at the end of the planting season.

If so, and now you want to dispose of it; keep the following points in mind:

Do not allow treated seed to enter the food chain

Treated seed is not to be used for food, feed or oil processing, and care must be taken to not contaminate grain going into the food or feed market.

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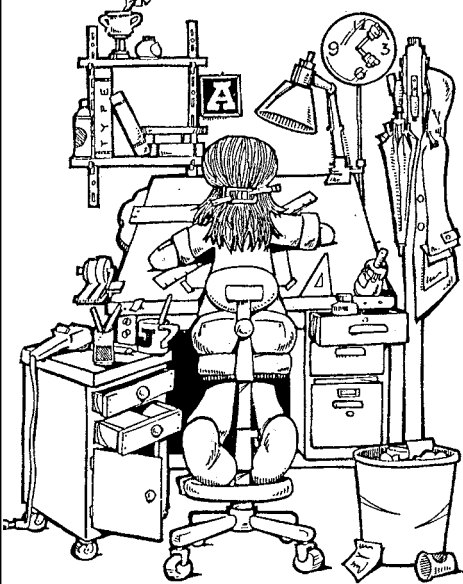

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There is ZERO tolerance for treated seed in the export market, meaning that a single seed could result in the rejection of an entire load.

* The best option and most preferred option to dispose of leftover treated seed is to plant it on fallow ground or an unused parcel of land. Depending on the seed treatment, there may be restrictions on planting depth and rate. Seeding for wildlife habitat is also a possibility when allowed on the seed bag label.

* Seed burial may also be allowed if the label states so; although care must be taken to avoid burial next to water sources.

* Take care of spills: Take care to clean up or cover up any spills with soil as some products can be hazardous to birds and other wildlife, or may be toxic to fish and aquatic invertebrates. This also helps minimize exposure to people, especially children.

* Other options include disposal in an approved municipal landfill, use as fuel source for a power plant or kiln or incineration by a waste management facility.

* Never compost treated seed and never burn treated seed in a stove that is used in the home, farm shop, etc.

will likely be noted as plants continue to grow. Given that seedling diseases have developed in some of the well drained soils at Rosemount, Mn., These problems are not restricted to poorly drained fields this year. Now is a good time to scout fields for seedling disease problems.

How can you know if seedling diseases are developing? Infection of seedlings before or after emergence can result in missing plants, plants that are stunted and dead, rotted roots, and wilting. Slow plant emergence could be due to many factors, including seedling disease and crusting. Vigilant scouting and diagnosis are often required to identify the cause of a problem. Scouting can reveal where and which diseases are developing, and can assist in managing them and understanding efficacy of seed treatments for future years.

Scouting and diagnosis

Timely scouting is important because seedling diseases often develop rapidly and can decompose quickly. Fresh, intact plants with clear symptoms and without extensive rotting are needed for diagnosis. Samples can be submitted to the University of Minnesota Plant Disease Clinic (pdc.umn.edu) or other diagnostic laboratories for diagnosis.

Common seedling diseases

Pythium root rot, Rizoctonia root and stem rot, Fusarium root rot, and Phytophthora root rot are common soybean seedling diseases in Minnesota. The soil borne pathogens that cause these disease are widespread and persistent in field soils across the state. These pathogens are also key targets for most fungicidal seed treatments.

Pythium root rot

The wet and cool soils that occurred in many areas with the frequent rains in late May may have been especially favorable for Pythium seed and seedling root rot. Pythium infections typically result in brownish-colored, rotting tissue. The U M has identified over 20 species of Pythium that infect soybean in Minnesota. Many of them can also infect corn seedlings, and some prefer warmer soil conditions than others.

Phytophthora root rot

This disease is also favored by wet and saturated soils, although it generally prefers

warmer soil conditions than Pythium root rot. The light, soft rot symptoms on roots caused by Phytophthora are very similar those caused by Pythium, and laboratory diagnosis may be required to tell which disease it is. Phytophthora can damage soybean seedlings or initiate infections in the spring that may result in severe root and stem rot in July and August. Two species of Phytophthora (P. sojae and P. sansomeana) are known to infect soybean in Minnesota.

Rhizoctonia root and stem rot caused by Rhizoctonia solani is also a widespread problem in Minnesota. Warm and moist soils favor Rhizoctonia root and stem rot. Plant stand loss can be high when the soil is warm (74 F or higher) and wet while seedlings are in the VE to V1 growth stages, as these are prime conditions for disease development. Thus late May to early June emergence in wet and warm soil favor Rhizoctonia root rot and stem rot. Reddish to dark brown, firm and often sunken, lesions caused by Rhizoctonia can be confused with those caused by other seedling diseases.

Fusarium root rot is another common soybean seedling dis-

ease in Minnesota that can cause significant damage. The typical symptoms are damping off and root rot with dark brown lesions. As with Pythium, there are multiple species of Fusarium (over 10) in Minnesota that can cause root rot on soybean and corn. Many different conditions can favor disease development by the different species of the Fusarium pathogen.
