Juve takes over his new position in Clearbrook

Mark Juve is now the President of the bank in Clearbrook. He has been working at the bank since July of 2010 when they hired him as the Vice President. After Brad Eck's retirement on March 31, David Felch became the Chief Executive Officer in Clearbrook. Juve has been officially named the President for Border State Bank. The First State Bank was sold to Border State Bank at the beginning of this year and the name will be officially changed in October.

Juve is a 1980 graduate of Erskine High School. He received an AA degree in Business Administration from Northland Community College in Thief River Falls. He received an internship at American State Bank in Erskine and then he worked there for 15 years. He spent two years at First National Bank in Fosston.

Eighteen years ago, he also started Juve Real Estate and since his move to the Clearbrook Bank, his wife Tracy, has completely taken over the business. They have six agents that are working for them. He is also the broker for the business.

The daily operations of the bank will basically remain the same as before with the same staff that they have had at the bank. Border State has 10 locations: Badger, Baudette, Coon Rapids, Greenbush, International Falls, Lancaster, Middle River, Rochester DPO, Roseau and Thief River Falls. Larger loans will be able to be made in Clearbrook with a higher lending limit. His duties will be to oversee loans and other management duties. Border State has a Human Resources person who will take over the hiring and other staff administration, and training of personnel.

A question came up about using the check blanks with the First State Bank instead of Border State Bank. They will be good for one year.

Border State's mission is "to serve our communities. We want a safe, healthy and prosperous community for our children and ourselves. We'd like to see our local businesses grow and prosper. Shop, invest, and volunteer locally."

Mark Juve is a father and grandfather. He and his wife Tracy have three sons: Jacob and Breanna and their one year old daughter Lennon live in Grand Forks. Dusty is married to Hunter and they live in the Twin Cities. Their third son Justin is a junior and is being home schooled.

Ice fishing and hunting are two hobbies that he enjoys doing as he and his wife Tracy live in the country between Gonvick and Fosston.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

The Enbridge Line 3 Replacement Project is reaching the final phase of the Permitting Process and what a long road it has been. Supporters have rallied to attend so many meetings, 65 in total and send thousands of comments and letters to regulators, newspapers and elected officials during the past four years. Our voices were heard and documented for the record.

This is the process that Enbridge has been required to go through in order to replace their aging pipeline in Minnesota. Enbridge has been more than happy to meet all the regulatory requirements and answer questions from concerned citizens.

The economic benefit of this much needed replacement has been anticipated for a couple of years and our small communities in Northern Minnesota look forward to seeing their men and women who work the pipeline industry back in our state and close to home.

Al Monaco, President and CEO of Enbridge Energy, recently announced that landowners with the current Line 3 crossing their property will have the option of leaving the pipe in the ground or having it removed. This announcement shows that Enbridge does listen to the concerns of Minnesota's. I hope that the landowners consider all the additional risk to the environment that removing the existing Line 3 from the ground will create. Line 3 currently lies in the middle of six or seven pipes (depending where you are) crossing Minnesota. and the process of removing the pipe is far more dangerous than deactivating the pipe in-place and building a new Line 3 in a new trench next to, but not in the middle of the other operating pipelines.

The final PUC decision on Line 3 is coming. Landowners across Minnesota have watched and listened along with the PUC and Regulators, and look forward to the final decision expected in late June.

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Bush Foundation Grant Will Help BSU Researcher Explore Race Relations in Bemidji

A Bemidji State University professor is beginning a three-year project to examine race relations in the Bemidji region with support from a \$200,000 Bush Foundation grant.

Bemidji counts Minnesota's three largest native nations — the Red Lake Band of Chippewa, the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe and the White Earth Nation — among its neighbors, and U.S. Census Bureau data shows that more than 21 percent of Beltrami County's 46,500 residents — and 12 percent of Bemidji's 15,000 residents — identify as American Indian.

Dr. Vivian Delgado, currently an interim assistant dean in BSU's College of Arts and Sciences who will be returning to the faculty this fall an assistant professor of indigenous studies, says while American Indians make up a significant portion of the Bemidji region's population, they are disproportionately represented when examining factors such as poverty and suicide.

"We know that native people have the highest incidents of health conditions at the hospital, the highest rate of incarceration, the highest rate of suicide," she said. "And there's still a lot of issues with poverty."

To address those disparities, Delgado is assembling an eight-person Gweekendam Team, named for an Ojibwe word meaning "changing mind," to explore structural oppression, institutional racism and systemic gaps in opportunity and access — not only among American Indian people but all people of color in the Bemidji area. In addition to Delgado, the team includes:

- Erika Bailey-Johnson, director of BSU's Sustainability Office
- Bill Blackwell Jr., executive director of BSU's American Indian Resource Center
- Joe Boudreau, Native American Liaison, Sanford Health Bemidji
- Tori Dahlke, retention counselor with BSU's Advising Success Center
- Dr. John Gonzalez, professor of psychology at BSU
- Tim Sumner, Beltrami County Commissioner
- Dr. Brian Xiong, coordinator of BSU's Center for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

Delgado says the team will spend this fall undertaking extensive training with national experts on historical and intergenerational trauma, restorative justice and mindful inquiry, among other topics. She says the training will help the team understand its own preconceived notions regarding racial issues in the region.

"We all have them," she said. "But we can't go out and have difficult conversations with other people who have their

own defaults if we haven't addressed our own. So we begin with ourselves."

And, she says, the training is necessary to properly equip members of the team with the tools they'll need to confront the issues they're likely to encounter when meeting with members of the community.

"I don't want to burden the team with issues that they feel unable to address," she said. "All native communities have been affected by inter generational historical trauma, so you don't put salt on the wound. When they go out to interact with the community, we want to be sure we're all coming from the same place and our heart is in the right place."

Following the training period, in the spring of 2019, Delgado says the Gweekendam Team will begin meeting with members of the community for roundtable discussions. The grant calls for the team to hold three discussions using mediator-guided protocols during the first year of its work, with additional roundtable discussions to follow in the second and third years.

Delgado says that other community organizations are doing good work to address racial disparities in Bemidji, and she hopes her team's work can help to elevate those initiatives.

"There are a lot of allies and advocates for native people who haven't been given the opportunity to express how they feel they can contribute to a more wholesome community," she said. "So we don't want to just focus on the negative — we want to focus on people who actually feel that they have something to contribute. There are a lot of good people in our community — on campus and off campus — and we want to complement what they're doing."

From my email... 'Someone asked the other day, What was your favorite fast food when you were growing up?'

'We didn't have fast food when I was growing up, I informed him.

'All the food was slow.'

'C'mon, seriously. Where did you eat?'

'It was a place called 'at Home,' I explained. !

'Mom cooked every day and when Dad got home from work, we sat down together at the dining room table, and if I didn't like what she put on my plate I was allowed to sit there until I did like it.'

By this time, the kid was laughing so hard I was afraid

he was going to suffer serious internal damage, so I didn't tell him the part about how I had to have permission to leave the table.

But here are some other things I would have told him about my childhood if I figured his system could have handled it :

Some parents NEVER owned their own house, never wore Levis, never set foot on a golf course, never traveled out of the country or had a credit card.

In their later years they had something called a revolving charge card. The card was good only at Sears Roebuck. Or maybe it was Sears & Roebuck. Either way, there is no Roebuck anymore. Maybe he died.

My parents never drove me to soccer practice. This was mostly because we never had heard of soccer.

I had a bicycle that weighed probably 50 pounds, and only had one speed, (slow) We didn't have a television in our house until I was 11.

It was, of course, black and white, and the station went off the air at midnight, after playing the national anthem and a poem about God; it came back on the air at about 6 a.m. And there was usually a locally produced news and farm show on, featuring local people.

I was 19 before I tasted my first pizza, it was called 'pizza pie.' When I bit into it, I burned the roof of my mouth and the cheese slid off, swung down, plastered itself against my chin and burned that, too. It's still the best pizza I ever had.

I never had a telephone in my room. The only phone in the house was in the living room and it was on a party line. Before you could dial, you had to listen and make sure some people you didn't know weren't already using the line.

Pizzas were not delivered to our home. But milk was.

All newspapers were delivered by boys and all boys delivered newspapers-my brother delivered a newspaper, six days a week. It cost 7 cents a paper, of which he got to keep 2 cents. He had to get up at 6 AM every morning.

On Saturday, he had to collect the 42 cents from his customers. His favorite customers were the ones who gave him 50 cents and told him to keep the change. His least favorite customers were the ones who seemed to never be home on collection day.

Movie stars kissed with their mouths shut. At least, they did in the movies. There were no movie ratings because all movies were responsibly produced for everyone to enjoy viewing, without profanity or violence or most anything offensive.

If you grew up in a generation before there was fast food, you may want to share some of these memories with your children or grandchildren

Just don't blame me if they bust a gut laughing.

Growing up isn't what it used to be, is it?

My Dad is cleaning out my grandmother's house (she died

in December) and he brought me an old Royal Crown Cola bottle. In the bottle top was a stopper with a bunch of holes in it. I knew immediately what it was, but my daughter had no idea. She thought they had tried to make it a salt shaker or something. I knew it as the bottle that sat on the end of the ironing board to 'sprinkle' clothes with because we didn't have steam irons. Man, I am old.

How many do you remember?

Ignition switches on the dashboard.

Real ice boxes.

Pant leg clips for bicycles without chain guards.

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Tick Season Is Here!

Recognizing the symptoms of Lyme disease is important to your health. If you have been bitten by a deer tick (Ixodes scapularis), there's a chance you'll contract Lyme disease. Though rarely life-threatening, the infection can cause health problems if left untreated.

Tick season generally lasts from April to September. Unfortunately, deer ticks (also known as black-legged ticks and bear ticks) can survive in cold temperatures, so you can't count on the first frost to protect you from Lyme

disease. Recognizing the symptoms of Lyme disease is crucial to your health. Here's what you need to know... Lyme Disease can look like a lot of other diseases. Lyme disease and its symptoms can vary widely – or even be nonexistent! After a bite, it may be weeks, months, or years before the first sign of infection occurs. Some people exhibit a rash after they're bitten. For other people, there's no external sign at all until they develop arthritis. 8 Common Symptoms That May Accompany a Lyme Disease Infection, Fever, Rash, Chills, Headache, Muscle aches, Joint pain, Fatigue, Swollen lymph nodes. These are the same general symptoms of flu or chronic fatigue syndrome, which is why it's so easy to misdiagnose. Lyme disease can be cured if it's caught early enough. Patients will be given a course of antibiotics and usually recover quickly. Even in cases where the disease is caught later, there's still a good chance that it can be successfully treated. You'll find deer ticks from coast to coast in the Northern Half of the United States. Only deer ticks spread Lyme disease, but that's not the only disease that ticks can spread. Ticks can transmit bacteria and even viruses to humans, including babesiosis, anaplasmosis, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever and tularemia. Because ticks are climbers, it's important to check yourself thoroughly after walking in the woods or being outdoors. If you catch a tick while it's still mid-bite, don't panic. Remove the tick as soon as possible. It's a good idea to keep the tick to bring with you to the doctor's office. That can help them to identify the type of tick and whether or not it carries Lyme disease.
