Carl Dugstad is settling in as the new principal at the Clearbrook-Gonvick School. He is excited for this year to begin. It is his 12th year in education. The previous principal Jeff Burgess had most of the things ready for the next school year. The master plan for the students schedule is done so he does not have to reinvent the wheel. Students in grades 7-12, schedules are available on Synergy. They can log in to check it out. He has been working on grants and financial items.

He comes from a family of teachers as his mother Connie (Berberich) Dugstad Bishop and step-dad Charles Bishop were teachers in the Red Lake County Central Schools. He has two step-sisters who are

also teachers and one that is married to a teacher.

Carl is a 2002 graduate of the high school in Oklee and a 2007 graduate of Bemidji State University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Secondary Education and Teaching. He received his Master of Education in 2015 from Bemidji State. He is officially licensed to be a K-12 Principal.

He started teaching in 2007 at Cass Lake-Bena High School as a Social Studies teacher for seven years and as the Head Basketball Coach. In the fall of 2014 he was a Social Studies Teacher and Head Basketball Coach until he became the Technology Coordinator at the Laporte Schools in 2016. He served as the Coordinator and

as the high school principal.

Carl is married to Tiffanie (Malwitz) a 2004 graduate of Red Lake County Central in Oklee.

They have three children in their family. They first adopted their son Ty and in January of 2016 they became a family of four when they adopted a girl Devyn. Their family was not complete as in June of this year they welcomed their son Will into the family. They bought a house in Clearbrook, took a new position at the school and had a new baby to take care of, all at the same time. Many people helped to get their new house ready for them.

Carl stated, "the position is challenging as it has a lot of moving parts and he likes it."

The 2018 Extension Farm Family Award Honors The Lewis Family

The Lewis Family Farm started when Roger Lewis purchased 40 acres at the age of 14. In 1958, Roger bought a neighboring farm. This is where Roger and his wife, Mary, raised chickens, pigs, sheep, and dairy cows. In 1990, Tim (Roger's son) took over the dairy operation along with his wife Cindy and their four children. In 2000, Tim and Cindy built a double 8 milking parlor stall allowing them to expand their milking herd to 120 head of cattle. They did this by raising their own young stock.

In 2017, they sold a majority of their dairy cows and transitioned to a beef herd of red and black Angus. They currently have 80 beef cows and the farm is about 800 acres. From the 800 acres and some rental fields, they grow their own corn, alfalfa, soybeans, and oats.

Tim and Cindy Lewis, their daughter, Jenifer Underwood and her kids Kyle (18), AnnMarie (16), Kevin (15), Adrianna (13) and Kian (11) run the farm. The kids help with milking, feeding calves, picking up rocks and haying.

The family has been involved with 4-H and the Beltrami County Fair for 25 years. They showed their dairy cows every year at the fair and enjoy answering questions about their dairy cattle. The Lewis family offers school tours in the spring and fall of the year to educate youth on the Lewis' farming operation. Cabins to become part of Itasca State Park Clearwater County Board approves DNR purchase of Bert's Cabins

DNR personnel Gary Heoft, the DNR Manager, and Rita Albrecht, Regional Director, NW Region, were on the agenda to complete their request for County support to purchase the Bert's Cabins property. Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on August 14, 2018.

"We are excited for the owners to leave this legacy for the people of the State of Minnesota," Rita said.

Engineer Dan Sauvé was present for the discussion and said there is a County access road, which is a public road, maintained there. He said it is a County Aid road.

The property, owned by Dave and Pat Evenwoll, is located in Itasca State Park and includes 20 acres of land, which will be included in the State Park System. The Board of Commissioners voted unanimously to give their support for the purchase; however it was emphasized by Commissioner Dean Newland as to the need for the DNR to pursue a land swap.

"We have to look in fairness regarding a land swap as previously discussed," he stated.

Rita said they will be looking into it and have some ideas they hope to pursue when more time is available.

Gary mentioned there is an 81 year old museum on the property as well.

Commissioner Neal Illies asked for comments from Representative Steve Green at the previous meeting at which he was in attendance: "DNR sales in trade hardly ever happen, and the sale can't be final until the other property is sold," he said. "Sales don't generally happen unless they are part of the deal."

U. S. Fish & Wildlife per-

sonnel Lynn Sebek and Alisha Haken, Deputy Project Leader, US Fish & Wildlife Service received approval for wetland easements in Clearbrook, containing 59 and 14.9 acres in Eddy Township. Agricultural use is permitted, the properties remain in their ownership, and they will continue to pay property taxes.

During the comment/discussion period, Commissioner Newland repeated his objection to the perpetual part of these easements. Also that people in the area have been solicited by Neil Powers (previous project leader at Tamarac) to put land into wetland easements.

"I have a real problem with that," he stated. "In my area a group of people received encouragement to do so. We don't have a right to tell people what to do."

Ms. Haken said she is going to look into that, and said she didn't realize that he did that.

Director of Nursing Marissa Hetlund received approval to advertise for the position of a part-time School Health Para.

"This position is something we have contracted for, and the past para has retired," she said, explaining the need for filling the position.

Land Commissioner Bruce Cox said the tornado warning alarm for the park has been obtained, and needs to be installed.

Commissioner Neal Illies asked about the radius of the alarm.

"It will be best at the park and lake, and then depends on which way the wind blows," Bruce responded.

He was given approval for the purchase of a duplex water softener system to replace the failing system at the County

Park. A new system will be obtained from Ecowater Systems for \$3,300.

"This system is budgeted and is a capitol improvement," he said.

County Veterans Service Officer Hutch Hutchens was authorized to execute the grant contract with the Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs to conduct the County Veterans Service Office Operational Enhancement Grant Program.

"The grant must be used to provide outreach to the county's Veterans; to assist in the reintegration of combat Veterans into society; to collaborate with other social service agencies, educational institutions, and other community organizations for the purposes of enhancing services offered to veterans; to reduce homelessness among veterans; and to enhance the operations of county Veterans service office," as specified in Minnesota Statutes.

A question about flag protocol at cemeteries was asked by Commissioner Dean Newland, who is in charge of five cemeteries. It will be discussed at a later date.

County Engineer, Dan Sauvé received approval for payment of County Highway Department bills as presented in the amount of \$37,610.

County Auditor Allen Paulson was authorized to pay the submitted invoices of \$200,991 for the County Revenue Fund and \$49,028 for the Nursing Service Fund.

The Treasurer's Office will now be changed to the Auditor-Treasurer's Office in the Clearwater County Personnel Policy.

All Commissioners were present at the meeting: Daniel Stenseng, Dean Newland, John Nelson, Neal Illies and Arlen Syverson.

Historical Trekkers Tom Jessen and Steve Orr at History Center Sept. 9

Historical Trekkers Tom Jessen and Steve Orr at History Center in Shelvin Sept. 9at 1:00 p.m. In 2014, Tom Jessen and Steve Orr embarked on a 340-mile canoe trip, traversing 42 portages and some 37 lakes. They followed old fur trader routes along the Minnesota-Canadian border. What makes this journey unique is that they competed the journey wearing authentic clothing and using hand-carved canoe paddles, plus food and equipment from the 1740s. Orr and Jessen are “historical trekkers.” And to plan this trip they studied primary documents from fur traders, explor-

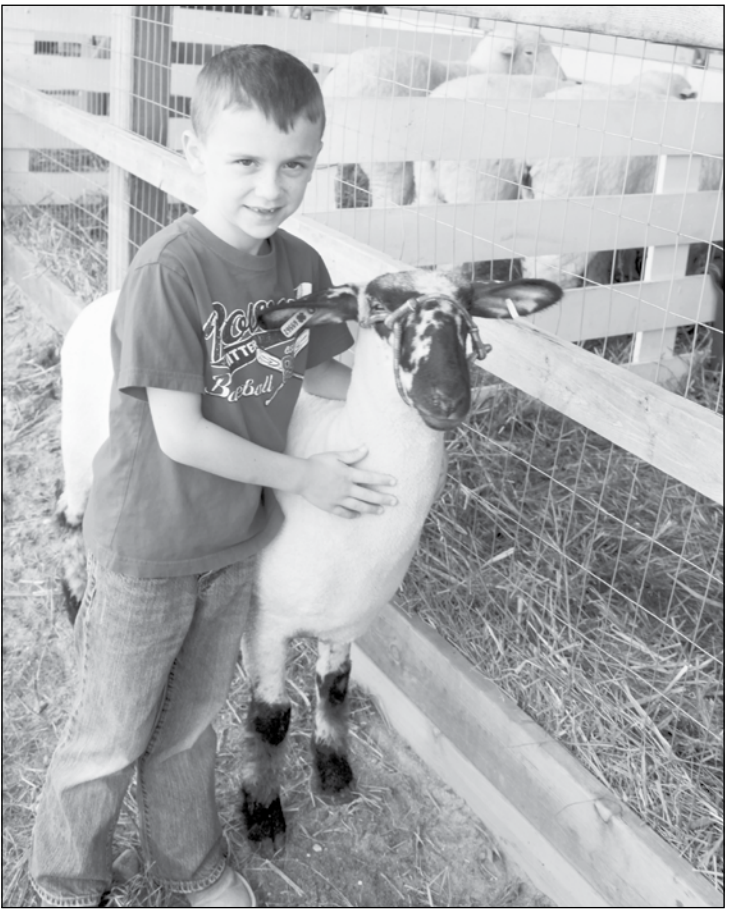
ers and diarists of the era. More than two centuries ago, rugged French Canadians traveled long distances through Canada and northern Minnesota to transport pelts to market. Leaving from Crane Lake, Orr and Jessen recreated such a journey. They paddled to Rainy Lake, then east into the Boundary Waters Canoe Area and ended at Grand Portage. 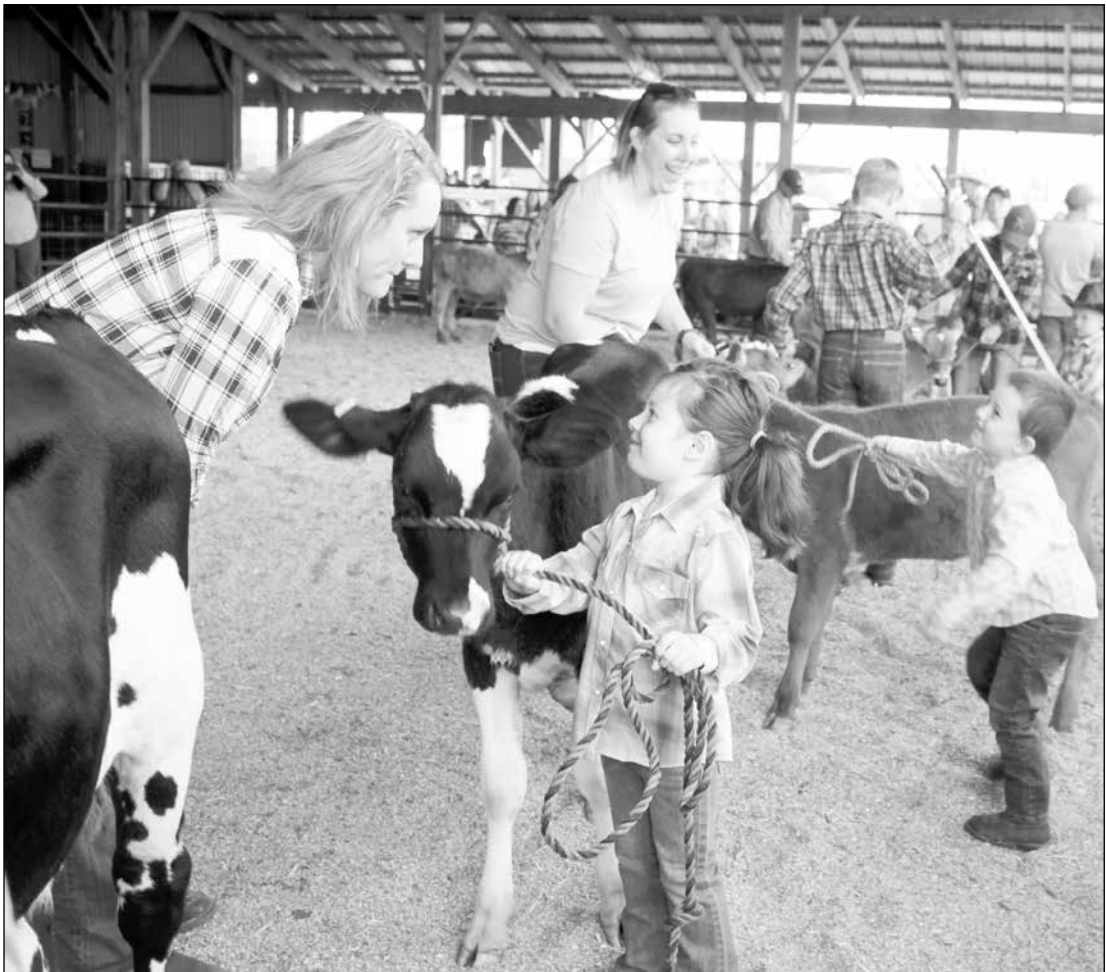

MDA Announces Good Food Access Program Awardees

\$233,750 in Grant Funds Awarded to Fourteen Projects Statewide

The Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA) is pleased to announce that fourteen projects statewide, almost twice as many as last year, have been awarded funding through the Good Food Access Program (GFAP). A total of \$233,750 in grant funds has been awarded to projects to purchase equipment and make physical improvements, increasing access to affordable, nutritious, and culturally appropriate foods in underserved and low and moderate income communities.

“Upgrading and purchasing new equipment can be a significant barrier for grocery stores and small food retailers and the Good Food Access Program helps to eliminate some of that financial burden,” said MDA Grants Supervisor Ashley Bress. “The grantees are using these funds to offset the costs of equipment purchases like produce cases, refrigerated cases, and freezers.”

Additionally, farmers’ markets are helping to increase access to locally grown foods through installation of electrical outlets, generators, awnings and canopies, coolers, and produce displays.

D & R Grocery is a family run grocery store that has been operating for 32 years in rural Oklee. For their GFAP project, D & R Grocery will replace a dairy condensing unit, a three door freezer, two glass door condensing units, and compressors. The replacement of this equipment is essential for the delivery of nutritious, affordable, and locally sourced food for the Oklee community.



The new freezer is only part of the upgrades at D & R Grocery. Older freezer/frigerators will be getting upgrades such as compressors.

Six aspiring nurses awarded loans

BEMIDJI, Minn. – Sanford Health and Northwest Technical College (NTC) are partnering to help aspiring students reach their goals of becoming licensed practical nurses (LPNs).

If you think that recycling isn't worth the bother, think about what it costs you to throw your recyclables in the trash. Clearwater County pays tipping fees by the ton for trash hauled to the Fosston Incinerator. As the tonnage increases, the costs also increase. A state-of-the-art Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) recovers recyclables from trash, but the MRF operates more efficiently if it's separating mixed recyclables only, rather than recyclables from trash. Some of the recyclables aren't pulled out and end up in the landfill. Not only that, but the tipping fee for mixed recyclables is ZERO, which saves the county money!

You can reduce the volume of rubbish by recycling your paper, cardboard, plastic food and beverage containers, steel cans and, of course, aluminum and glass containers!
