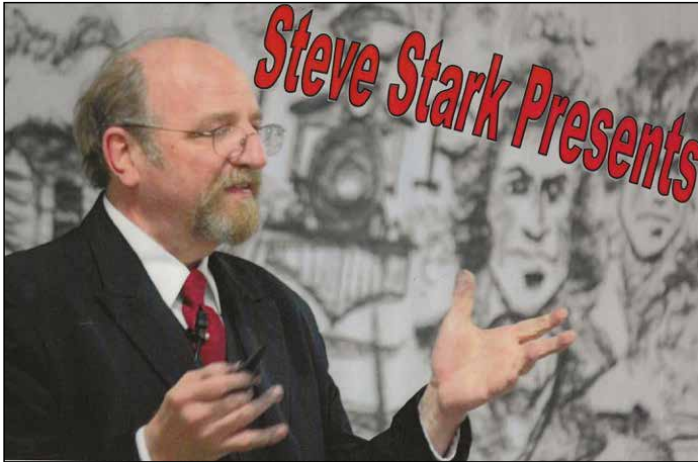
with his son.

Gonvick City Council meeting

The Gonvick council at their meeting had County Engineer Dan Sauvé present to discuss future rebuilding of streets and sidewalks. He informed the council that County Road 7 is scheduled to be overlaid in 2023 and Main Street will be rebuilt in approximately 10 years. When Main Street is rebuilt the sidewalks will also be rebuilt, but meanwhile, there are sections that are in need of repair. Sauvé agreed that

the county will provide the fill and use of their dump truck to haul away the old material if it is in the county right of way. At the present time a section of sidewalk in front of Clearwater Coating has to be replaced. Pond Construction will be doing the work.

The council discussed vacating city easements through Dale and Gina Schmunk's property. The process would have legal fees and costs to do

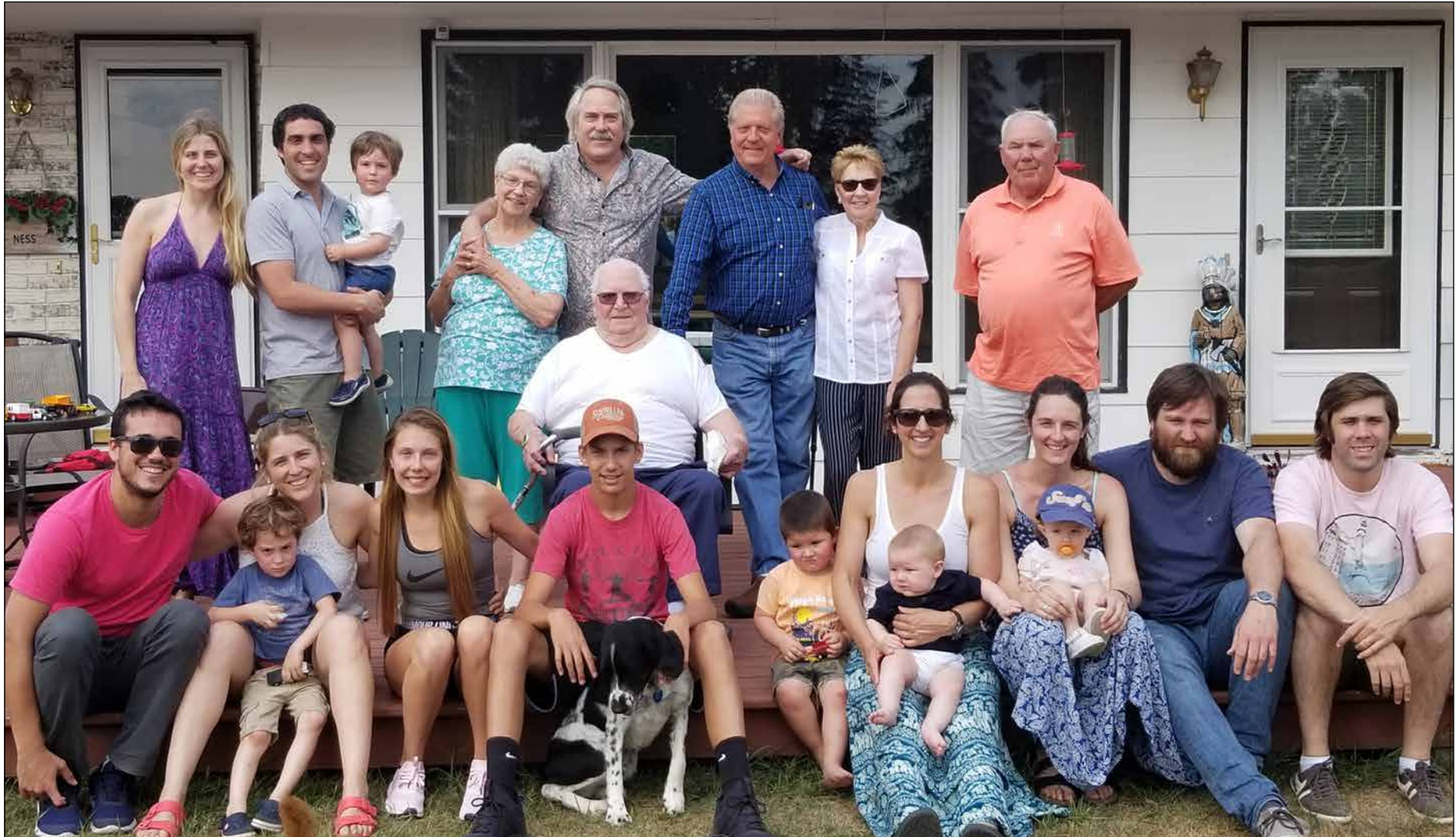
the vacating.

City Maintenance person Joe Amundson stated that the roof leak on the water plant/ fire hall has been repaired.

A quote for \$6,000 to replace the computer software at the wastewater treatment plant was delayed. The computer needs rebooting daily and it was determined that it is functioning.

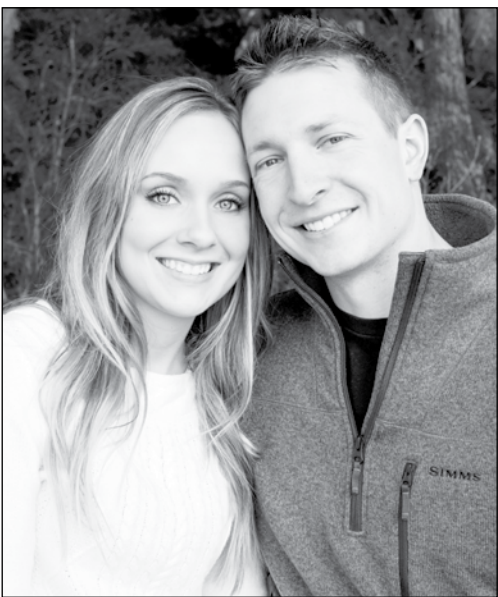

Interview with Bruce Engebretson, Instructor at Fosston Fiber Festival, Clearbrook The Fosston Fiber Festival is moving this year. It will be held October 6-7, 2018 at the Clearbrook City Hall in Clearbrook, MN. For more information, see fosstonfiberfestival.com or call 218-657-2502. The festival features vendors and fiber artists teaching workshops. This interview is one in a series of interviews with some of the festival participants. To learn more or sign up for workshops, see the festival website for details. How long have you been in the Park Rapids area? I've spent my life in the Height of Land, Frazee, MN. I bought some land in the Smokey Hills six years ago so I could set up a weaving workshop and loom museum. I have several looms, spinning wheels and other tools, some of which are over 200 years old, that still turn out beautiful items. Where did your interest in fiber arts start? Over 40 years ago, my parents took me to the State Fair and I saw a demonstration on spinning and weaving. What is your current fiber art passion and what would you like to learn in the future? I'm currently working on a tapestry. I am hoping to communicate with others through art. There is so much technology and so much information being pushed on us, that using art, and textile in particular,

we can communicate on a more fundamental level. I really don't want to learn any new technique. I am interested in broadening my level of knowledge on the subjects with which I am currently familiar. What other ways do you combine your interest in fiber and your interest in history? Using original tools and methods and sharing that information with others is the focus of my workshop. I find something comforting in creating those items used in every day wear. I learned from my community, especially the women in the community and I want to share that with others. Blankets, mittens, socks, all the basic textiles not only show their ethnic background, but also create continuity. How rich is the history of the fiber art tradition in the northern Minnesota area? As long as there are people who want to work with their hands, the traditions will continue. So many people are content to make do with items offered in stores. There is such a satisfaction in creating something yourself. I had the good fortune to have good teachers. The ladies of the community and some of my other teachers have supported my love of textiles. Norman Kennedy* has become a very good friend over the years and I still rely on him when I have questions. Are there other events where you will be teaching

this year or other ways people can learn more about you? I'm not as interested in teaching classes as I am in teaching individuals. That being said, I will be teaching a class on Latvian Belts at the Fosstong Fiber Festival. USDA Launches Trade Mitigation Programs

(Washington, D.C., September 4, 2018) – U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue today launched the trade mitigation package aimed at assisting farmers suffering from damage due to unjustified trade retaliation by foreign nations. Producers of certain commodities can now sign up for the Market Facilitation Program (MFP), while USDA will also begin to purchase identified commodities under a food purchase and distribution program. Additionally, USDA has begun accepting proposals for the Agricultural Trade Promotion Program (ATP), which will help American farmers find and access new markets for their products. In total, USDA will authorize up to \$12 billion in programs, consistent with World Trade Organization obligations.

Perdue announced in July that USDA would act to aid farmers in response to trade damage from unjustified retaliation. President Trump directed Secretary Perdue to craft a short-term relief strategy to protect agricultural producers while the Administration works on free, fair, and reciprocal trade deals to open more markets in the long run to help American farmers compete globally. These programs will assist agricultural producers to meet some of the costs of disrupted markets. “These programs will allow President Trump time to strike long-term trade deals to benefit our entire economy, including the agricultural sector, in the long run,” Perdue said. “Farmers will tell you that they would always prefer to sell a good crop at a fair price, rather than receive government aid, and that’s what long-term trade deals will accomplish. But in the meantime, President Trump has promised that he will not allow American agriculture to bear the brunt of the unjustified retaliation from foreign nations. Today we are putting the President’s promise into action.”

Keep Kids E-Cigarette Free Know the risks of e-cigarettes for kids. Have you seen your kid’s USB flash drive lately? It could actually be an electronic cigarette (e-cigarette) containing nicotine. E-cigarettes are the most commonly used tobacco product among U.S. middle and high school students, and USB-shaped e-cigarettes are increasing in popularity. As parents prepare to send their kids back to school, take time to learn more about the dangers of e-cigarettes for young people. What are e-cigarettes? E-cigarettes are electronic devices that produce an aerosol by heating a liquid. E-cigarettes come in many shapes and sizes. Most have a battery, a heating element, and a place to hold a liquid. Some e-cigarettes are made to look like regular cigarettes, while some look like USB flash drives, pens, and other everyday items. Larger e-cigarettes such as tank systems, or “mods,” do not resemble other tobacco products. E-cigarettes are known by many different names. They are sometimes called “e-cigs,” “e-hookahs,” “mods,” “vape pens,” “vapes,” “tank systems,” and “electronic nicotine delivery systems.” Using an e-cigarette is sometimes called “vaping” or “JUULing.” Flavored e-cigarettes are very popular, especially among young people. More than 8 of every 10 youth aged 12-17 years who use e-cigarettes said they use flavored e-cigarettes. More than 9 of every 10 young adult e-cigarette users said they use e-cigarettes flavored to taste like menthol, alcohol,

candy, fruit, chocolate, or other sweets. What is JUUL? JUUL is a popular brand of e-cigarette that is shaped like a USB flash drive. Like other e-cigarettes, JUUL is a battery-powered device that heats a nicotine liquid to produce an aerosol that is inhaled. All JUUL e-cigarettes have a high level of nicotine. According to the manufacturer, a single JUUL pod contains as much nicotine as a pack of 20 regular cigarettes. Although JUUL is currently the top-selling e-cigarette in the U.S., other e-cigarettes are becoming available that look like USB flash drives. Because of their shape, school teachers might not notice students using JUUL in school, including in classrooms and bathrooms. Why are e-cigarettes unsafe for kids, teens, and young adults? Most e-cigarettes contain

nicotine—the addictive drug in regular cigarettes, cigars, and other tobacco products. Nicotine can harm the developing adolescent brain. The brain keeps developing until about age 25. Using nicotine in adolescence can harm the parts of the brain that control attention, learning, mood, and impulse control. Each time a new memory is created or a new skill is learned, stronger connections – or synapses – are built between brain cells. Young people’s brains build synapses faster than adult brains. Nicotine changes the way these synapses are formed. Using nicotine in adolescence may also increase risk for future addiction to other drugs. https://www.cdc.gov/features/ecigarettes-back-to-school/index.html?scid=OSH_email_E100
