Residents come to County Ditch 2 Hearing to discuss revisions near Shevlin

County Engineer Dan Sauvé explained the legal process regarding the County Ditch 2 Hearing held at the Courthouse on September 8, 2015.
“This is a legal process by Minnesota Statute 103E. Clearwater County manages County Ditch 2 (CD2) on behalf of the property owners. The purpose of the hearing is to document lost or nonexistent records and to correct records to what the ditch system exists today,” Mr. Sauvé said.
Six Shevlin area residents were in attendance for the hearing: Wesley Luccar, Fred Halverson, Alfred Sether, Calvin Larson, Barb Jansen, and Mike Smith.

The area being addressed is County Road 110 to the outlet at Shevlin Township Road (360th Street) into the Little Mississippi River. Sauvé projected the map of the area on a large screen, and handouts of the map were also available for review.

The Drainage Authority (Clearwater County) requires this record correction to establish the lost, missing, or non-existent records of the ditch system. The funding to do so comes from the Ditch Fund. The survey, ditch inspection, and engineers report for the reestablishment of the Gouty Ditch 2 records cost \$1,536; leaving a balance of \$9,109.

Sauvé said that the original survey of County Ditch 2 was done in 1906, and the original engineer’s report and construc-

tion contract provided minimal detail. He stated the original cost to construct County Ditch 2 was \$2,586.

Testimony was called for by the Chairman Dan Stenseng. He noted that Arlen Syverson remembered playing in the area as a boy and that it was always a ditch; Calvin Larson said his great grandfather was part of the original petition for a ditch there. One resident said he thinks there is a spring in the area, and that water fills the ditch and freezes in winter. Sauvé said County Ditch 2 runs year around.

“Doing this reestablishment of the ditch system records today is necessary to correct the ditch system and make it officially part of the ditch system files,” Sauvé said.

While Calvin Larson said the ditch area had been maintained, both in the 1970s and in 2000, Sauvé stated there is no documented record of it. He has inspected the area three times since coming to Clearwater County. The County has done some work on the system to remove beaver dams, paid for by the CD2 ditch fund.

One resident asked how the Township got into this project, since Shevlin Township does the work.

Sauvé stated that the County cannot legally spend their own money for the project.

After the hearing was finished, a resolution was presented regarding the reestablishment of County Ditch

2 records; and that the Engineer’s report from investigation was to be used to correct and reestablish the ditch system records. Commissioner Neal Illies made the motion to pass the resolution, and Commissioner Arlen Syverson seconded the motion, which was passed unanimously.

A motion to authorize the County Highway Department to clean out the Main Ditch of County Ditch 2 from Station 172 to the outlet using County forces and equipment, and be paid from the County Ditch 2 funds was made by Commissioner Neal Illies, seconded by Commissioner Arlen Syverson, and was passed unanimously by the Board.

He said the work would begin immediately to clean out cat tails, and clean out the ditch from Station 172 to the outlet. The County Highway Department will have a backhoe available for a month with which to do the work, which involves the last 1500 feet of the ditch before it outlets into the Little Mississippi River. Some culverts the Township said are in rough shape would be the responsibility of the landowner or the Township.

The work will proceed until the Ditch Fund is exhausted. He said that once the fund is exhausted, they will probably have to assess properties to build up the fund again.

County Commissioners and County Attorney were present at the hearing.

Commissioners approve unloading ramp at landfill and software for jail

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on September 8, 2015. It was noted that a guest was present, Tammy Hanse, who is a nursing student at BSU. She said as part of her class, she was to become involved in the community, so she decided to attend the Board meeting. She is a registered nurse, and resides in Bagley.

Environmental Services Director, Dan Hecht brought a proposal for the construction of an unloading ramp at the demolition landfill by Hanson Silo Company for pre-fab concrete panels, including delivery and installation in the amount of \$6,840, plus site preparation in the amount up to \$1,500 by a local contractor. These amounts would be paid from the Recycling account, and adjust the 2015 budget by that amount.

Since this work was budgeted for 2016, a discussion began as to why this is being done now. Commissioner John Nelson thought the department is spending too much money, and that this type of situation has come up before regarding budgeted items.

Mr. Hecht’s defense is that nothing is gained by putting it off, and that there is gain by doing it sooner. By postponing the project, they risk the potential cost would increase.

“I am trying to find ideas to make things more efficient,” he said, “anything that saves labor and money.”

Commissioner Arlen Syverson said he agreed that sometimes postponing a project costs more. Commissioner Neal Illies thought the expenditure should remain in the 2016 budget.

The motion for the project was made by Commissioner Dean Newland, and seconded by Commissioner Syverson; when the vote was called for there were three yes votes by Commissioners Newland, Syverson and Dan Stenseng. No votes were made by Commissioners Nelson and Neal Illies, and the motion passed. The reason given for their no votes was that since this expenditure was to be a part of the 2016 Budget, it could have been postponed until sometime later.

Commissioner Nelson emphasized that Director Dan Hecht is doing a good job in his duties.

County Ditch 2 Hearing was conducted by County Engineer Dan Sauvé.

“The purpose of the hearing is to document lost or non-existent records and correct records to what the ditch system exists today,” Mr. Sauvé said. The area being addressed is County Road 110 to the outlet at Shevlin Township Road into the Little Mississippi River. (See related article regarding this hearing.)

Other Highway Department business included a change in policy for payment to authorized trappers in control area of the County for evidence of removal of a beaver or muskrat (in the form of the tail). The incentive will be \$40 for a beaver and \$15 for a muskrat.

The Engineer was authorized to advertise for a heavy equipment operator in order to maintain a list for future needs.

A Certificate of Performance was accepted for County Edge Line rumble stripes on various roads in Clearwater, Polk, Red Lake, Pennington, and Roseau Counties, authorizing final payment for work done in the amount of \$366,617. Federal Aid funds 90% of this project, with the County responsibility for the remaining 10%.

Board approval was extended to pay Highway Department bills in the amount of \$27,334.

Sheriff Darin Halverson received authorization to purchase LETG jail management software in the amount of \$14,698, and to be paid out of the software development account. Commissioner Nelson asked if everything will become paperless, and the Sheriff responded that They have the capacity to do complaints now, and citations may be paperless by next year.

The Sheriff was given authorization to accept and sign the 2015 Emergency Management Performance Grant in the amount of \$14,868, as part of the 2015 budget; and the 2015 Minnesota OHV/ATV grant for fiscal years 2016-2017 in the amount of \$12,726.

Each County pays 10% local share of the work done in their County. Clearwater County local share is approximately \$10,323.66, Pennington is \$4,040.31, Polk is \$10,912.50, Red Lake is \$1,621.42, and Roseau is 11,049.51. This was based on the original contract amount and will be adjusted down some because the project underran. The local share is also eligible for State aid maintenance or construction funding.

County Veterans Service Officer received approval to

enter into the annual subscription to *Ancestry.com*, Library Edition, for a period from September 1, 2015 to August 31, 2016, at the annual discounted rate of \$2,050. The 2016 Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs Operational Improvement Grant approved this expenditure. Commissioners agreed to try this for one year.

County Auditor-Treasurer received authorization to pay the submitted invoices of \$87,187 from the County Revenue Fund, and \$36,543 from Nursing Service.

Commissioners present at the meeting were Daniel Stenseng, Dean Newland, John Nelson, Neal Illies and Arlen Syverson.

Enbridge to conduct hydrostatic tests

Enbridge will be conducting a hydrostatic pressure test, commonly referred to as a hydrotest, of one of its pipelines in your area beginning September 14. A hydrotest is a planned and controlled assessment that provides a pipeline operator an opportunity to verify the strength of a pipeline utilizing water. A hydrotest is designed to intentionally elevate the pressure on a section of the pipeline above the normal maximum operating pressures. During the test, the pipeline will be removed from normal operations, oil will be removed, and the pipeline will be filled with water dyed with a biodegradable, green color.

“The safe operation and maintenance of our pipelines

is of the utmost importance to Enbridge. Integrity work, like pressure tests, promote the continued safe and reliable delivery of energy for all consumers,” said Enbridge’s Trent Wetmore, Superior Region Operations Director.

Pipeline crews will be monitoring the test closely; however, if a member of the public should discover a release or discover a pool of colored water near the pipeline right-of-way, please stay a safe distance away from the pipeline and call the Emergency Response line at (800) 858-5253. If a section of pipe releases water during the test, water may spray briefly into the air and possibly pool on the ground. Enbridge

crews will respond immediately to clean up the area and repair the pipeline.

Community members who live and work along the pipeline may see Enbridge personnel deploying boom in one of numerous waterways along the route as part of this exercise. This is a normal part of our emergency preparedness plan for this exercise and should not cause alarm.

The tests are expected to last for 10 days.

Local Archaeologists to present “Archaeology in Clearwater County: An overview of the prehistoric and historic sites that have been studied in Clearwater County”

Minnesotans need to register vehicles

The Minnesota Department of Revenue reminds Minnesota residents that motor vehicles they purchase, including recreational vehicles, must be registered in Minnesota and are subject to the state's 6.5% motor vehicle sales tax. This rule applies regardless of where the vehicle was purchased.

"Most Minnesotans abide by our tax laws when purchasing motor vehicles in Minnesota or elsewhere," said Revenue Commissioner Cynthia Bauerly. "We've had continued success working with our partners in law enforcement in Minnesota and other states to investigate and charge Minnesota residents who are evading taxes they owe on their motor vehicle purchases."

In 2010, the department launched a project to combat a growing trend of motor vehicle sales tax evasion, especially in the purchase of recreational vehicles (RVs). Minnesota residents would set up shell corporations in Montana (in these cases, limited liability corporations, LLCs) in an attempt to evade paying sales tax on high end recreational vehicles. Those who have not paid taxes on a motor vehicle or recreational vehicle should contact the Minnesota Department of Revenue at 651-556-6684.

Fall is in the air and school is back in session. Kids are getting back into the classroom, meeting up with friends, doing activities, and of course GETTING SICK again! So to keep your child healthy and out of the doctor's office, here are 5 great tips on how to boost your child's immune system this cold and flu season.

1.) Eat lots of fruits and vegetables! Try to get your child to eat 5 servings of fruit and/or vegetables every day. (A serving is about 2 tablespoons for toddlers and 1 cup for older kids.)

2.) Get enough sleep! A newborn may need up to 18 hours of crib time a day.

True Potato Seed
As gardeners harvest potatoes this fall, you may notice something that resembles green cherry tomatoes at the top of the plants. These are not actually small tomatoes, but rather, they are potato fruit containing seeds.

Potatoes belong to a small family, the Nightshade or Solanaceous family. The other members include tomatoes, peppers and eggplants. Potatoes resemble tomatoes more than the other family members. Potatoes and tomatoes can share diseases like late blight. Occasionally, you will see ads in garden magazines for a grafted tomato-potato mix up that produces tomatoes on

the top and potatoes in the soil. This grafted plant does not produce a great number of either, but is more of a novelty to impress your fellow gardeners.

It's uncommon for potatoes to produce seed, but it does occur when weather conditions favor their development. Potato flowers look very much like tomato flowers except instead of being yellow, the potato flowers can be white or lavender or pink. It depends on the type of potato as to the flower color. Most years, July and the beginning of August are hot and sometimes dry months. Those cute little flowers fall off the plants and never have the opportunity to go from flower to fruit. The cool weather with adequate rain allowed the flowers to remain, pollinate and grow into small potato fruit. These look suspiciously like small, round or oblong cherry tomatoes.

Potato fruit is not edible. More precisely, they are poisonous. They contain high amounts of solanine that can make the eater very ill. Solanine is also found in potatoes that are dug, left in the sun and the skin turns green. Besides being very bitter, eating plant parts containing solanine can lead to headache, abdominal pain, shock and diarrhea. If little kids are around, the fruit should be removed so the children are not tempted to eat them.

If you saved the ripe seeds inside the potato fruit, you would not get the same kind of potatoes as the parent plant. It would take several years to

So marvel at the fruit of your potatoes – this is not going to be a yearly event. It is not an evil omen or bad luck. Your potatoes below the soil will be just fine. Just blame it on the weather.
