Dee's Leonard Cafe is one of many who serve potato klub

Starting in the fall and lasting through the winter months, fans of potato klub can enjoy this favorite dish on Thursdays

at Dee's Leonard Cafe. Deanna and Milo Durkin, who own the restaurant, Deanna's brother Erick Colborn, and Angela Seyller are the early morning part of the team that create this dish and serve it to their eager customers.

Dee has been cooking since she was about nine years old. But potato klub isn't really something she grew up eating or preparing. She added klub to her cooking repertoire when she worked at her family's restaurant, the D and R Café in Bagley. There klub was made in big batches with many kettles on the stove. Milo used a drill to mix the large batches of dough. When she opened the restaurant in Leonard, making klub wasn't necessarily in her plans. But Ritchie Langseth encouraged her to make klub like his mom, Betty Langseth. And Betty told Dee, "If you make potato klub with onions, the people will come." That has proved to be true at the Leonard Café. Each week, during the fall and winter months, Dee and Angela Seyller make enough

klub to satisfy 75 or more fans of this Norwegian dish.

A lot of labor goes into each batch of potato klub. Fifty to 75 pounds of potatoes need to be peeled and quartered. Onions are chopped. A large kettle of water flavored with ham is heated on the stove. Angela grinds the potatoes and onions together, then drains off any excess liquid. Flour, salt, and pepper are added and the dough is mixed by hand. Each klub is then formed, also by hand, around a good-sized chunk of ham. Next, the klub are placed in the large pot on the stove and cooked until they float. At this point, it's time for the klub to come out of the water and they are kept warm until they are served. All this gets done while Erick prepares for lunch and cooks up breakfast orders for customers and Dee keeps an eye on a blueberry pie baking in the oven. Tables also have to be bussed and dishes washed.

Angela learned how to make the klub from Dee and has been making it for almost three years. The grinder is loud, so Angela completes the grinding in a back room. She and Dee do not use a recipe. They both know how much potato and flour to combine until the dough feels right. They know from experience how much salt and pepper to add. When it comes time to roll the klub dough into balls, Angela uses "about a palmful" to create each serving. Each week, Angela and Dee make one batch of klub without onion, but most customers prefer the onion-flavored version. Dee has found that Yukon potatoes produce a better colored klub as these do not turn gray in the cooking process.

Clearbrook-Gonvick School Board gets school bond issue at 2.06%

The Clearbrook-Gonvick School board met on Wednesday, January 23. That morning the bonds had been sold for the addition to the school building project. That includes early childhood/elementary classrooms and office, storage and mechanical spaces to be constructed. Four bidders for the project with the lowest going to Baird out of Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The 2.06% rate was very good according to Jodie Zasbaugh, with Ehlers and Associates Inc who has been handling the bond issue. It was very close bidding with the highest being 2.15% from Northland out of Minneapolis. Superintendent Jeff Burgess and Paula Boomgaarden in the school Business office had answered several questions on the condition of the school district. They are maintaining stable financial projections, a strong reserve and the enrollment is better. They were assigned the Triple A rating for the district. With the low interest rate they will be able to save money in the end of the project. Discussion was held on the investment of the bond money. The board looked at three options that the finance committee will be meeting on to determine the best for the funds to be placed for the project. Local banks, Ehlers and Associates who has been working with the district on the bond issue at about 2 to 2 1/2% or the Minnesota School District Liquid Asset Fund which is about 3%. They will be getting the figures for the best deal for the district. The board passed

the resolution awarding the sale of the bonds.

Principals' report
Principal Carl Dugstad, up dated the board on the backpacks and blankets that will have to be put in the lockers as there is getting to be too many in the classrooms. There is a locker for each student in the school.

A penalty of 4 days in ISS with a ticket from Andy Anderson the Behavior Interventionist at the school as punishment has been recommended. Vaping is the inhaling and exhaling the aerosol referred to as vapor which comes from an e-cigarette or similar device.

Dugstad attended a professional development in Thief River Falls on suicide prevention. What to do if someone is talking about suicide. They plan to tie it in with the Kindness squad.

The Math Corps is up and running. This is for 4 th to 6th grade students to help get better math scores. Tammie Ehlers will be the tutor.

Superintendent's Report
Superintendent Jeff Burgess informed the board that there is a need for a mixing motor for the air that will cost \$6,000 to fix. There is a lot of stuff in the storage shed that will have to be auctioned off as it getting too full.

The financial report is staying on track. The most is paid out for licensed instruction. They have used 37% out of the budget so far this year. They are on the same pace as last

year. The revenues are up a tad from last year with the student counts.

The 2019 Legislative agenda was indicated with the General Education formula being number one. The School board association proposes a 3% increase for each year of the biennium and index pupil formula to inflation.

A question was asked as to when the Superintendent evaluation was to be done.

No committee reports.

activities for each district. The focus will be on middle school with Robotics and Stem and graduation to improve the rate of students finishing school. The plan has to be sent by March 15.

The board will follow the policy on winter weather procedures. The school will start two hours late if the temperature is minus 30 and the wind chill is minus 40.

The next school year calendar was discussed. There were two proposals; one with school ending before Memorial Day and one after. Both would include graduation for seniors during Memorial Day weekend. The seniors be would be done after graduation. The teacher contract day is for 177 days. The committee will be working on it and bring back to the board.

The Soil & Water Conservation district brought up a rain-water pond idea for the south east corner of the school property. This is usually wet and would be no cost to the district except some in kind student volunteering. The mowing would have to be done on the edge of the pond after it is completed. The board suggested that no maintenance

other than mowing the perimeter would be part of the plan. The Soil & Water representative will prepare a plan and present to the board at a future meeting. The next board meeting will be February 25.

Representative Matt Grossell Legislative Update District 2A

Rep. Grossell introduces bill to defund sanctuary cities

ST. PAUL – On Thursday, January 17, State Representative Matt Grossell, R-Clearbrook, introduced HF 117, a bill to remove state funding from sanctuary cities in Minnesota. "We have laws for a reason and all units of government, from the Federal Government down to the smallest cities, should follow the law," said Rep. Grossell. "It is appalling and quite unbelievable to have some of the largest cities flagrantly violating the laws of the United States. If people want immigration laws changed, there is a process for that. We cannot have entire cities openly defying laws."

The bill will strip municipali-

ties who operate as sanctuaries for illegal immigrants of Local Government Aid. Local Government Aid (LGA) is a general purpose aid that can be used for any lawful expenditure. It is intended to be used for property tax relief.

For all Minnesota cities, the state budgeted \$534,398,012 for 2018 and \$534,398,012 for 2019 for LGA.

Rep. Grossell continued, "The state is spending significant sums to assist local cities. We need to make sure the taxpayer dollars are being used for lawful purposes and to help the citizens and people in Minnesota legally."

A Senate version, SF 80 was also introduced by Senator Paul Utke, R- Park Rapids, and referred to Taxes.
