Louise Sundquist Retires After 40 Years-March 2019

Louise Sundquist retired this January after serving for 40 years as the Winsor township clerk. A retirement celebration took place between the Winsor annual meeting and regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, March 12th. At the celebration, Township Supervisor Troy Horn presented Louise with a plaque in appreciation of her years of service.

Forty years ago, Louise was appointed to the clerk position of the Winsor town board as a replacement for the previous clerk who was moving out of state. Louise had always had an interest in bookkeeping so the clerk position was a good fit for her. She stayed on the board for 40 years, maintaining the records, books, and papers required to keep track of township business. During this time, she has seen changes in how the work is done, with increased reliance on computers. In addition, many more reports are now required.

Besides taking notes at all of the township meetings, the clerk handles a great deal of paperwork. Louise spent many hours preparing the reports that need to be filed with the county auditor or state auditor. Year-end reports must be completed and sent in by deadline dates, making the period from January through April extra busy.

"It was quite simple when I started," Louise says of the bookkeeping she did for the township.

As time went on, more and more of the work was done on the computer. The first computerized accounting system was a fairly simple one. This helped ease the transition from the paper accounting systems the township clerks were accustomed to using. Over time, the programs have become more complicated. Louise sometimes found the computer changes frustrating as she adapted to new programs. Without formal

computer training, she often had to teach herself how to do the program, learning as she went along.

Louise found the responsibilities of the township clerk position to be like those of a city clerk as far as the paperwork was concerned. However, the township operated with a smaller budget than most cities. Louise was happy that she didn't have to deal with some of the duties a city clerk might have, such as city sewer and water concerns.

The decision to retire came when Louise felt it was time for someone else to do the job and bring some new blood to the board. She believes that

serving on the board helps new people to know what's going on in their community. Stephanie McKnight agreed to take over the position as township clerk and that helped make Louise's decision easier.

After 40 years of service, Louise said she will miss working with the people. She will also miss the meetings where she learned about the many aspects of township business. She found this interesting because things were always changing. But just because Louise has retired from her duties as clerk doesn't mean she won't be busy. Louise plans to stay active in the community and she always has things to do!

County, townships, and schools impacted by loss of tax revenue

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on April 9, 2019.

County Auditor-Treasurer Allen Paulson informed the Board of Commissioners that the Great Lakes Gas Company north of Shevlin won their tax appeal with the State Department of Revenue, resulting in a total of \$113,760 less in tax revenue.

"This will impact Clearwater County, both Bagley and Clearbrook-Gonvick school districts, six townships, the Red Lake Water Shed, Headwaters Regional Development Commission (HRDC), as well as the State. The townships are Dudley, Holst, Leon, Pine Lake, Shevlin, and Winsor," Mr. Paulson stated.

"Clearwater County will lose \$45,777 and the State \$35,070 in tax revenue. The others affected will lose a total of \$32,913 in tax revenue, with May-June settlements to the schools changing. New tax bills are to be mailed out shortly reflecting the changes.

Auditor Paulson handed out a new non-union salary scale, retroactive to January. Motions were approved for the increase for non-union employees.

"The need for a new scale with a .50% increase for non-union personnel is due to a fluctuation on starting wages," Commissioner Neal Illies explained.

"The purpose is to make it fair to all," Chairman John Nelson stated.

The County Board Chairman was authorized to sign the lease renewal agreement with

Clearwater County and Sanford Health of Northern Minnesota with an annual lease fee of \$132,000. A list of improvements expected to be done has been requested.

The Auditor-Treasurer was authorized to pay the submitted invoices of \$123,623 for the County Revenue Fund and \$13,168 for the Nursing Service Fund.

"We are \$2 million ahead of where we were last year in the County Revenue Fund," he said.

Attorney Al Rogalla has interviewed a University of North Dakota first year law student to hire as a Summer Intern.

"This would be paid for from the Crime Victims Advocate fund, at no cost to the County," he stated.

He asked the Commissioners for a motion to approve the hire of Ashley Boomgaarden at \$13.92 per hour, with no other benefits, for the period from mid-May through mid-August. Commissioner Mark Larson made the motion, Mark Titera seconded, and it was passed.

"An intern has to learn everything, including being a victims advocate," Commissioner Neal Illies suggested.

Environmental Services Director, Dan Hecht was given authorization for the County Board Chairman to sign the "Contract for Services, Weed Task Force Specialist", contract agreement between the County and Blake Peterson for the 2019 calendar year.

The contract is for approved gravel pit inspections, encouragement of others to become ap-

proved, and to write newspaper columns to inform the public about week control efforts by the County. It is for an estimated 30-50 hours at \$36 per hour during 2019.

Composting of organics recycling was discussed with the Board.

"It is estimated that 30% is organic material that goes into the land fill," Dan stated. He said Polk County is trying to build an infrastructure for composting in Crookston. They have machines to farm out, which are being used in other counties and he would like to see it used in the schools here, as it can offer considerable savings for the recycling efforts.

The Clearwater County Noxious Weed Task Force formed in 2005 (listed in 2019 Board & Committees as "Weed Task Force") was dissolved by motion of the Board.

He is looking into obtaining an estimate for crushing concrete again for the county land fill. The last time for two to three years worth was \$8,500 in 2014, and the department does not want to be surprised by an unanticipated much higher bill.

"Some of the concrete can then be sold back out over our cost," he said.

Engineer Dan Sauvé and Assistant Pat Holloran opened bids for the summer construction season including bituminous surfacing; pavement markings; regreveling; grade widen, bridge, and culvert replacement.

Engineer Zach Thoma discussed the bike trail plan

Dr. John Eggers came to the Clearbrook City Council meeting on April 8, 2019 to provide an update on Project Graduate, a community effort supported by 205 community organizations and agencies, including the Clearbrook city council. The goal of Project Graduate is to graduate 100% of students across the nation through a no-cost plan that emphasizes the importance of graduation. Dr. Eggers shared materials with the council that can be used to help promote involvement in this project. The council expressed their appreciation for these efforts.

Zach Thoma, engineer with Karvacko, was at the meeting to discuss the bike trail plan. A general, "big picture" plan will be developed first, allowing for potential issues such as construction noise and dust, wetland or habitat impacts, or historical landmark concerns to be addressed prior to the finalization of plans. Construction of the bike trail is set to begin during the 2020 season.

Chief of Police Dan Gazelka shared statutes regarding hazardous buildings that he has researched in regard to the Gloria's Collectibles building.

The possible courses of action were examined by the council. As the next step, Gazelka will draft a letter from the council to the building owner. Other police department issues include the burglary at the elevator that is still under investigation. Many animal complaints have been brought to the department recently, all related to the bears in the area.

Adam Krog, Fire Chief, reported on topics affecting the fire department including training, budget, fund raising, and maintenance. In 2018, the department responded to 120 calls. This year has been slower, with 19 calls handled so far. These include 14 medical calls, three chimney fires, one vehicle fire, and one structural fire. The department has participated in pipeline scenario training in Bemidji. A free 2-day training for the new truck's phone system was provided to the department by the manufacturer. Enbridge hosted a chiefs' training event attended by the Clearbrook department. Grass fire training is set for April 9th with the DNR.

Members of the fire department have also been examining the budget with the intent of cutting expenses where possible. Fund raising activities have been expanded over the last several years, with the addition of the daddy-daughter dance and fall banquet. Raffle tickets will be sold at the upcoming fish fry. The department passed a resolution to contribute \$5,000 in 2019 toward the cost of the recently purchased truck. Other monies raised by the department will be used in ongoing projects such as the installation of the new gear washing equipment that was purchased with grant money. Truck maintenance issues, caused by hard water and low usage of pumps, will also need to be addressed this year to prepare the trucks for certification. Besides increased fund raising efforts, the department is continuing to look for grants and other sources of financial support.

Krog also listed fire hall maintenance issues including bathroom plumbing problems and ongoing difficulties with the lighting. The council passed a motion to accept Hill River's bid of \$1,800 for parts and labor to replace current lighting with new LED light fixtures. The fire department will look into getting a licensed plumber to deal with plumbing issues.

Joy Walberg reported on the municipal liquor store. Income has increased in comparison to last year and many

events are being planned for the coming weeks. On April 20th, a meat raffle will take place with proceeds going to the DARE program. Bingo is scheduled for the first Saturday of May. Summerfest entertainment is being lined up for Friday and Saturday of that weekend.

Several equipment and maintenance issues regarding the liquor store were discussed by the council. Joy is looking into sources for fabrication and installation of a new metal sign for the bar. She has also found high bar stools that may be purchased to replace the old chairs. The costs and size of commercial air fryers were discussed but purchase will likely be postponed in favor of buying new seating. A commercial glass installer will be contacted to look at the window in need of repair.

Jason Bakke and Mark Snobl reported on utilities and maintenance issues. They are dealing with fire hydrants damaged over the winter. Insurance will cover the costs of repairing the hydrant hit by the state plow. Jason and Mark will both be attending classes as soon as possible to obtain licenses for drinking water and wastewater.

Lucie Thompson, city clerk, reported that the water tower project is tentatively set to start at the end of May. A total of five individuals have applied for the Kloster Park and the City Pool Manager positions. Interviews will be scheduled soon with hopes of finalizing the hiring at the May council meeting. Quotes for the pool painting project were discussed. Council members requested information on warranties for the painting work.

In other city business, Lucie, Mark, and Jason are involved in ongoing work on a wellhead protection plan. This plan is mandated by the state and concerns the preservation of safe drinking water in the city. Lucie will receive the update on the ordinance relating to structures next week. Garden Valley proposed a plan for public access to free wi-fi in a community space. After discussion by the council, no action was taken at this time.

A motion was passed to accept 2019 camping rates. Rates at RV sites will be \$20 per day, \$120 per week, and \$350 per month. The tenting rate is set at \$10 per day.

Monthly claims of \$63,998.35 and additional claims of \$80,351.87 were approved by the council. North Country Hardware claims of \$267.75 and \$59.81 were also approved, with Shawn Johnson abstaining.

The board will review your assessments and may make corrections as needed. Generally, you must appeal to the local board before appealing to the county board of appeal and equalization.

Thoughts from the Sheriff

Clearwater County Sheriff Darin Halverson

As we begin to dig out from this long winter, some may discover that seasonal cabins or other buildings that are not occupied during winter months have been broken into. This is not something that any of us want to have happen, but it is a reality. Burglaries are not limited to seasonal properties, so I want to take this time to remind people about what they can and should do if they are a victim of such a crime.

If you discover a building belonging to you or one that you watch over has been broken into, call into your local law enforcement agency to report the crime. A deputy or officer will respond to your location and assess whether there are any items of evidentiary value. Not every scene will provide law enforcement with evidence that will be sufficient to assist in the prosecution of a case. Depending on how long ago the break-in occurred could influence how much DNA or fingerprint evidence is still present as both of these deteriorate with time. If the deputy is able to collect evidence, it can take months to get any results back due to the large caseload the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension Forensic Lab has.

When you call in, do not tell the dispatcher that a deputy or officer is not needed at the scene. Sometimes, people do not want to bother law enforcement because they do not feel that anything of real value was taken or that nothing can be done anyway. The only way that something can be done is if we know it happened.

Our office attempts to be proactive in preventing break-in's by being out actively patrolling the county. A part of this process involves conducting traffic stops

on vehicles that are committing traffic offenses or have equipment issues. During these stops, we have been able to identify people and have found stolen property that has led us to solve open cases. In addition, during these traffic stops, we often find people who are on warrant status for crimes that they have been alleged to have committed. The patrol function of our office is vital in our fight against all crime in the county.

There are a few things that you, as a community member, can do to assist law enforcement in this battle. Be alert to suspicious vehicles in your area and call those in to local law enforcement. If possible, get a license plate, as this will help in identifying the current owner of the vehicle. Sometimes, thieves use tactics such as pulling into your driveway to see what you have laying around that would be easy to steal. If you are home and see these people, they will leave immediately or they will tell you they are looking for someone and they must have gotten the wrong place. If this happens to you, always call the description of the vehicle and the occupants into law enforcement. Chances are, your property is on the radar for a break-in or theft.

As a property owner, you can also do some things to help deter thieves. First, install outdoor lighting on your property. The more lit up an area is, the less attractive it is to thieves. Many people are installing security cameras or game/trail cameras on their property. These cameras have assisted our office on more than one occasion in solving a crime. Just because you have these installed on your property

will not guarantee that if you are the victim of a break-in or theft that we will be able to identify the suspect. Sometimes the lighting may not be good enough to see or the suspect may be wearing a hood or mask in an attempt to disguise their appearance. With that said, it is still better to have something than nothing.

Another important thing to remember is to take an inventory of your belongings and write down serial numbers on your bigger ticket items such as firearms and electronics. These are popular items to be stolen and having serial numbers helps to identify the items and whom they belong to. We have property in our evidence that has remained unclaimed because there is no serial number to identify it or people have not made a report and we have no way to search our database to find the owner.

As a community, we need to look out for one another. Law enforcement cannot be everywhere all the time, so we need the community's backing. I strongly believe that the most effective law enforcement comes from community help and support. Remember, we are all in this together. Working hand in hand is what is most beneficial. You are law enforcement's eyes and ears.
