County Coroner resigns; new RN hired; construction bids awarded

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on April 16, 2019 to cover agenda items from Nursing Service, Engineer, Veterans Service and Auditor Treasurer.
County Auditor Treasurer Allen Paulson said a letter of resignation from the County Coroner has been received, effective the end of May.
“This gives us time to look for someone to take over,” Mr. Paulson said. He said there is another doctor in the area which may be able to take on the responsibilities.
Director of Nursing Marissa Hetlund received authorization to hire Aaron Spray as a full time Registered Nurse. She will work more than 1040 hours per year at step 4.
Engineer Dan Sauvé awarded bids for the previous week's bid opening in four categories. Those awards are as follows: Grade widen, bridge, and culvert replacement project to Red Lake Builders of Red Lake, Minn. in the amount of \$1,929,136. Pavement Markings to Traffic Marking Services of Maple Lake, Minn. in the amount of 60,378. Re-gravel project to Vogt's Dirt Service of Bemidji in the amount of \$285,366. Bituminous surfacing to Mark Sand & Gravel of Fergus Falls, Minn. in the amount of \$1,580,655.

Bids ran 4-6% higher than last year, Dan said.
“Did you know it would be higher?” Commissioner Mark Larson inquired.
“I knew it would be higher, but it is comparable to what other counties are getting,” Dan responded. “And when we are getting quotes for bids, it is a delay of around three months.”
County Veterans Service Officer (CVSO)/Safety Controls Coordinator Harry Hutchens, III submitted his Quarterly Report to the Commissioners for review. The report showed 323 telephone calls, 28 office visits, 10 home visits, 308 emails, as well as other contacts made with 90 “unique clients” during the quarter from January through March of 2019.
Commissioner Dean Newland asked for a clarification as to what a “Unique Client” is.
Mr. Hutchens explained that there may be many different types of contact with a particular veteran, and all of those contacts collectively are for one Unique Client.
“It all centers around that Veteran,” he said.
He attended the Spring Minnesota DVA/CVSO Conference at Walker, Minn. on March 19-21.

During this quarter, he also facilitated the Clearwater County Safety Committee Meetings for January and March. Safety Guidelines were passed by the Board.
Another matter from the CVSO had to do with concerns from some individual clients, reported to him by a third party who said the individuals wished to remain anonymous. He said he has not been able to resolve their issues as a result, but is very willing work with and to hear their concerns.
He has taken the matter to the Human Resources Director (HRD), Al Paulson for help in

Gonvick City council approves attorney agreement

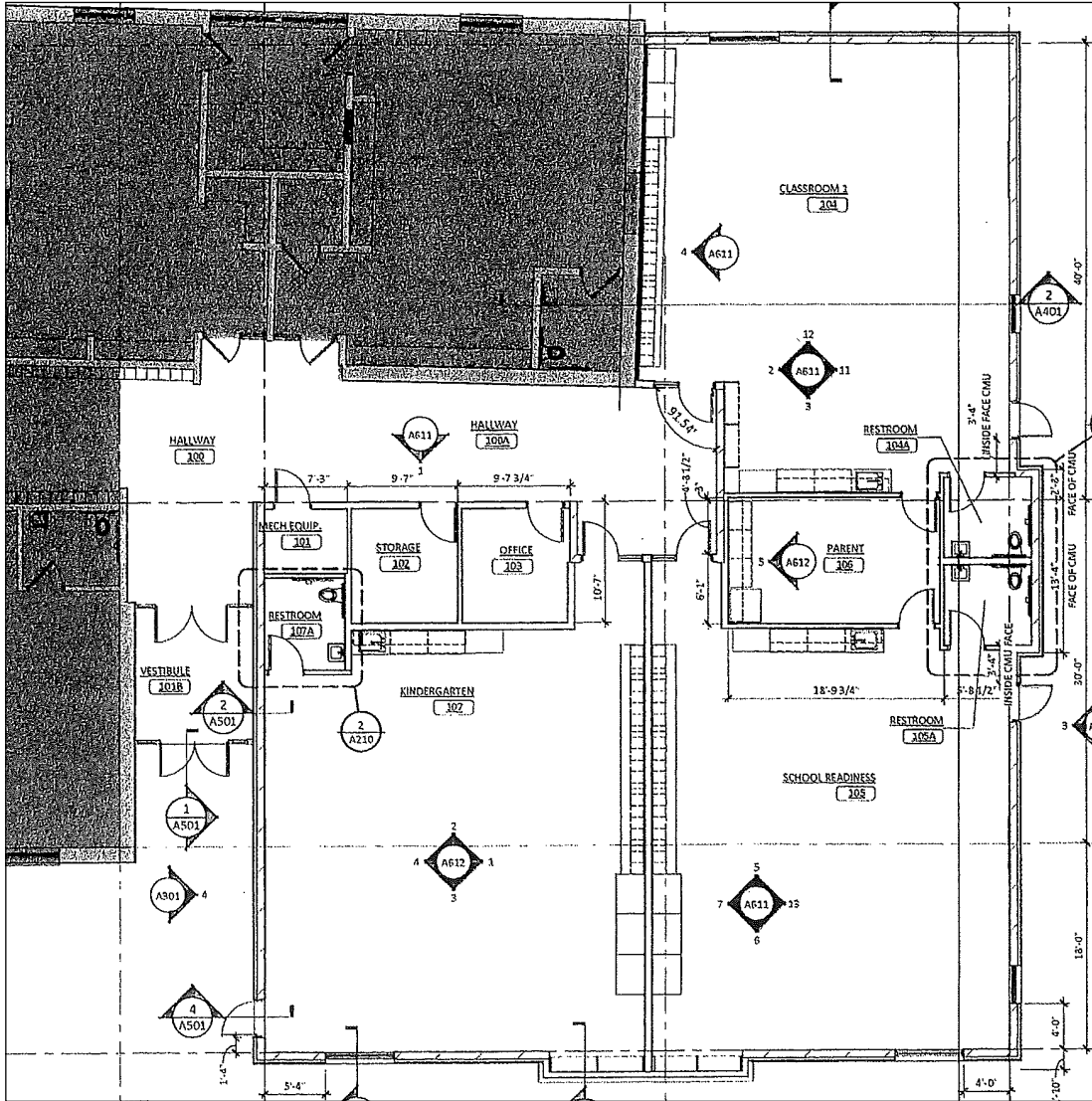
The Gonvick City Council at their meeting on April 12 approve the agreement for services for the year with the Clearwater County Attorney.
They also approved 10 hanging flower baskets from Grow It Garden Center in Gonvick. This will be paid from the beautification fund which was donated by the Gonvick Diamond Jubilee. Quotes will be obtained to install edging around the playground.
Snow is piling up all over and discussion was held on the drainage at Forsberg Storage Rental units.

The 2018 Financial Statement and Audit Report from Miller McDonald was approved. The net ending balance was \$31,949. With \$536,315 budgeted out of the actual \$568,264.
Bills were paid for General \$27,878.51; Water and Sewer \$3,962.12, Fire \$3,074.54 for a total of \$34,915.17.

USDA NRCS Announces Sign-Up for Conservation Stewardship Program

The next deadline for Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) applications to be considered for funding this year is May 10, 2019. USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) plans to invest up to \$700 million for new enrollments and contract extensions in fiscal year 2019. The 2018 Farm Bill made several changes to this critical conservation program, which helps agricultural producers take the conservation activities on their farm to the next level.

Through CSP, agricultural producers and forest landowners earn payments for actively managing, maintaining, and expanding conservation activities like cover crops, tree/shrub establishment, pasture improvements, and pollinator habitat – all while maintaining active agriculture production on their land.

The program provides many benefits including increased crop yields, decreased inputs, wildlife habitat improvements and increased resilience to weather extremes. CSP is for working lands including cropland, pastureland, and nonindustrial private forestland.

NRCS recently made several updates to the program to help producers better evaluate their conservation options and the benefits to their operations and natural resources. These tools also enable producers to see potential payment scenarios

VA's Office of Mental Health and Suicide Prevention is the national leader in making high-quality mental health care and suicide prevention resources available to Veterans through a full spectrum of outpatient, inpatient and telemental health services. Additionally, VA has developed the National Strategy for Preventing Veteran Suicide, which reflects the department's vision for a coordinated effort to prevent suicide among all service members and Veterans. This strategy maintains VA's focus on high-risk individuals in health care settings, while also adopting a broad public health approach to suicide prevention. VA has supported numerous Veterans and has the capacity to assist more. In fiscal year (FY) 2018, 1.7 million Veterans received Veterans Health Administration (VHA) mental health services. These patients received more than 84,000 psychiatric hospital stays, about 41,700 residential stays and more than 21 million outpatient encounters. Nationally, in the first quarter of FY 2019, 90% of new patients completed an appointment in a mental health clinic within 30 days of scheduling an appointment, and 96.8% of established patients completed a mental health appointment within 30 days of the day they requested. For FY 2018, 48% of initial, in-person Primary Care — Mental Health Integration (PC-MHI) encounters were on the same day as the patient's PC encounter. 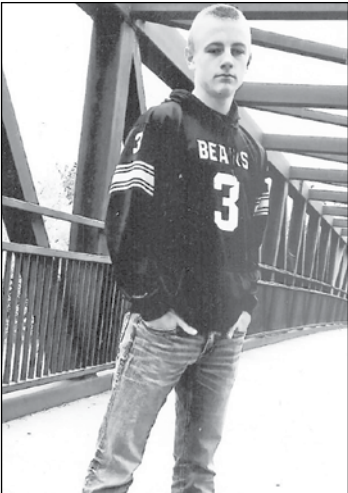

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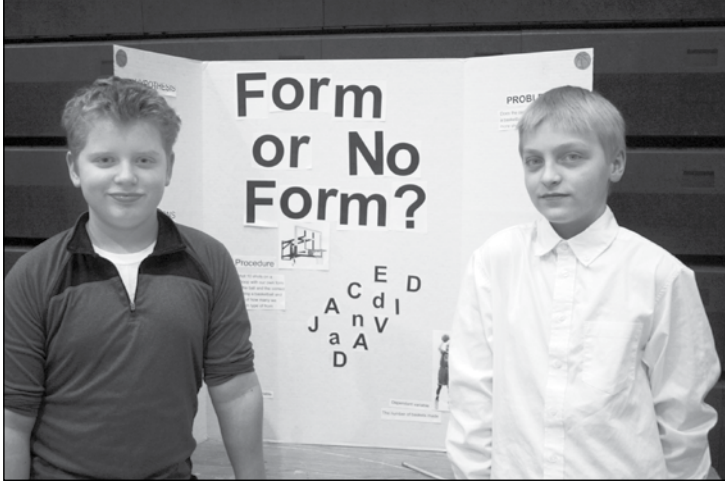

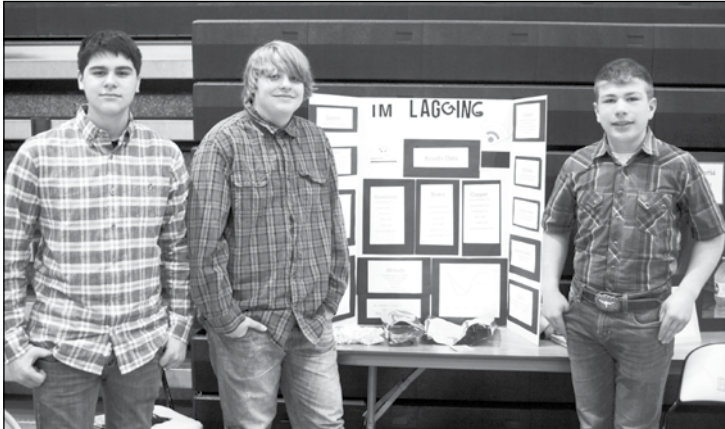

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Recycling Saves YOU Disposal Fees

If you think that recycling isn't worth the bother, think about what it costs you to throw your recyclables in the trash.

Clearwater County pays tipping fees by the ton for trash hauled to the Fosston Incinerator. As the tonnage increases, the costs also increase. A state-of-the-art Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) recovers recyclables from trash, but the MRF operates more efficiently if it's separating mixed recyclables only, rather than recyclables from trash. Some of the recyclables aren't pulled out and end up in the landfill. Not only that, but the tipping fee for mixed recyclables is ZERO, which saves the county money!

You can reduce the volume of rubbish by recycling your paper, cardboard, plastic food and beverage containers, steel cans and, of course, aluminum and glass containers! "Skin cancer is the most common cancer in the United States, and it is estimated that one person dies from melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer, every hour," said Dr. Natalie Roholt. "Yet not only is skin cancer preventable, it's highly treatable when detected early."

The free SPOTme® skin cancer screening is open to anyone who is not a current patient of Sanford Bemidji Dermatology or who has not been seen at the dermatology clinic in the last three years. Screenings will be completed by a certified dermatologist and participants will have the opportunity to schedule any necessary follow-up appointments

Social Security Combined Trust Funds Gain One Year Says Board of Trustees

The Social Security Board of Trustees today released its annual report on the long-term financial status of the Social Security Trust Funds. The combined asset reserves of the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance (OASI and DI) Trust Funds are projected to become depleted in 2035, one year later than projected last year, with 80 percent of benefits payable at that time.

The OASI Trust Fund is projected to become depleted in 2034, the same as last year's estimate, with 77 percent of benefits payable at that time. The DI Trust Fund is estimated to become depleted in 2052, extended 20 years from last year's estimate of 2032, with 91 percent of benefits still payable.

In the 2019 Annual Report to Congress, the Trustees announced:

- The asset reserves of the combined OASI and DI Trust Funds increased by \$3 billion in 2018 to a total of \$2.895 trillion.

- The total annual cost of the program is projected to exceed total annual income, for the first time since 1982, in 2020 and remain higher throughout the 75-year projection period. As a result, asset reserves are expected to decline during 2020. Social Security's cost has exceeded its non-interest income since 2010.

- The year when the combined trust fund reserves are projected to become depleted, if Congress does not act before then, is 2035 – gaining one year from last year's projection. At that time, there would be sufficient income coming in to pay 80 percent of scheduled benefits.

"The Trustees recommend that lawmakers address the projected trust fund shortfalls in a timely way in order to phase in necessary changes gradually and give workers and beneficiaries time to adjust to them," said Nancy A. Berryhill, Acting Commissioner of Social Security. "The large change in the reserve depletion date for the

DI Fund is mainly due to continuing favorable trends in the disability program. Disability applications have been declining since 2010, and the number of disabled-worker beneficiaries receiving payments has been falling since 2014."

Other highlights of the Trustees Report include:

- Total income, including interest, to the combined OASI and DI Trust Funds amounted to just over \$1 trillion in 2018. (\$885 billion from net payroll tax contributions, \$35 billion from taxation of benefits, and \$83 billion in interest)

- Total expenditures from the combined OASI and DI Trust Funds amounted to \$1 trillion in 2018.

- Social Security paid benefits of nearly \$989 billion in calendar year 2018. There were about 63 million beneficiaries at the end of the calendar year.

- The projected actuarial deficit over the 75-year long-range period is 2.78 percent of taxable payroll – lower than the 2.84 percent projected in last year's report.

- During 2018, an estimated 176 million people had earnings covered by Social Security and paid payroll taxes.

- The cost of \$6.7 billion to administer the Social Security program in 2018 was a very low 0.7 percent of total expenditures.

- The combined Trust Fund asset reserves earned interest at an effective annual rate of 2.9 percent in 2018.

The Board of Trustees usually comprises six members. Four serve by virtue of their positions with the federal government: Steven T. Mnuchin, Secretary of the Treasury and Managing Trustee; Nancy A. Berryhill, Acting Commissioner of Social Security; Alex M. Azar II, Secretary of Health and Human Services; and R. Alexander Acosta, Secretary of Labor. The two public trustee positions are currently vacant.

Drug Enforcement Administration National Take Back Day Set for April 27

The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will host its 17th annual National Take Back Day, Saturday, April 27, from 10 a.m.-2 p.m., at designated sites across the nation where individuals can dispose of unwanted, unused and expired medications in a safe and secure location. Since the first National Take Back Day in 2010, the DEA has collected nearly 10.8 million pounds of unused medications.

Across the five state Omaha Division, which includes Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota and South Dakota, as well as counties in Illinois and Wisconsin, approximately 200 sites will be available for turning in medication.

"Many people don't realize the risks associated with keeping unused or expired medication in their home medicine cabinets," Special Agent in Charge Richard Salter Jr., said. "It happens all too often that a family member or friend will steal one or two pills, maybe even an entire bottle, from the cabinet of a family member or friend. Misusing these medications can lead to accidental overdose, addiction, or untimely death. By safely disposing of these medications, the DEA hopes to reduce the potential misuse and abuse of powerful, addictive opioids."

The DEA is asking people to look through their homes and those of their elderly friends and family who may have unused, unwanted or expired medications and drop them off at secure sites staffed by local law enforcement partners. To locate a drop off site, visit the DEA Take Back webpage at www.deatakeback.com.

For individuals unable to find a nearby location, consider disposing of medications in a safe alternative way. Remove medicine from its original container

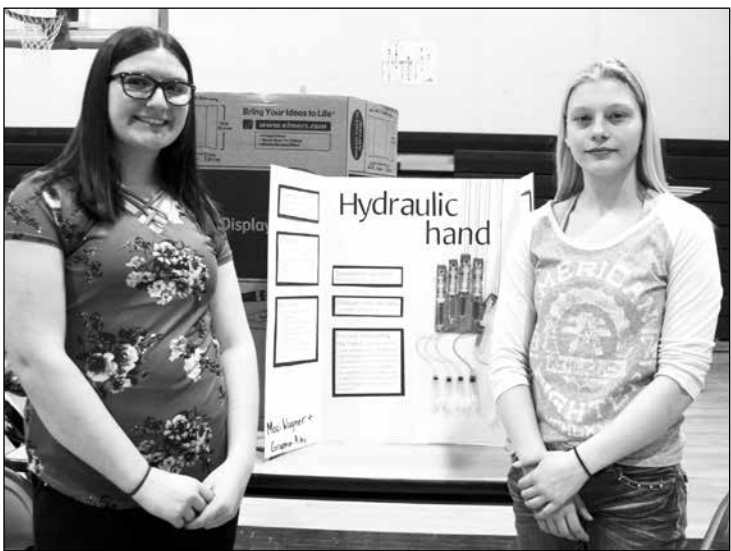
