'CVSO is trained, mandated and guided Federally' CVSO will attend National Conference for valuable training and continuing education

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners authorized the County Veteran Service Officer Hutch Hutchens for travel out of the state to attend the 2019 National Association of CVSO Conference at Cleveland, Ohio June 3-7 (NACVSO) at their April 30th meeting. CVSO Hutchens explained why he felt adamant as to the value of this conference. "The position of County Veteran Service Officer (CVSO) is not only a County and a State Association, but much of what I do is governed by a Federal Association. We are trained, mandated, and guided Federally," he stated. "The second part of Veterans Services is regarding health care, and the third is the cemetery care provided with grave markers by the Department of Veteran Affairs from the State, which are also dictated from the Federal government. The Transportation Program is the only service that is just used in the County."

Commissioners Neal Illies and Dean Newland voted against it, believing that he might receive the same information online. Several visitors who were in attendance came to give support for his attendance at the National Conference. Rose Surdez, who worked nearly 43 years for Clearwater County Memorial Hospital, said Hutch responded quickly whenever they called him regarding a veteran's needs. Leonard Stinar and another visitor, both veterans, said Hutch has been extremely helpful in researching and helping them secure needed benefits since he became the CVSO here. "This is a big job, with all the rules and regulations to learn. This helps the County, and will save money in the end," said Leonard Stinar. "I am a veteran also," Commissioner Newland said, "and this is not about whether he does or does not do his job. I don't think he should go out of state." Mr. Hutchens has attended the National Conference in the past at times at his own expense when denied expenses by the County. **Safety Program Policy for 2019:** "We consider accident prevention to be of prime importance. Hazard control is key to our culture of safety awareness," states the Safety Program Policy Statement the

County Commissioners have approved for 2019. This includes reasonable safe and healthful working conditions; maintenance of equipment; development and training of safe work methods; and compliance with Federal, State and Local laws regarding safe working conditions in order to enhance accident prevention efforts. **Environmental Services Director,** Dan Hecht reported to the Commissioners of a damaged compactor that is in need of repair. While the trash compactor saves a great deal in shipping costs to the County Commissioner Illies said it was a washout when they purchased the used compactor. "It saves a lot of money in transportation," Dan said, "by shipping 18 tons (at a time) instead of 5 tons to Crookston." Some townships are in need of higher fences since much trash in lost to the wind at all the sights. **Engineer Dan Sauvé** received approval to hire Mr. Shane Huschle to the Heavy Equipment Operator position at the salary of Grade 12, Step 1 or \$15.39 as identified in the IUOE Local 49 Union contract. All Commissioners were present at the meeting: John Nelson, Neal Illies, Dean Newland, Mark Titera, and Mark Larson.

"The first thing to do is to contact your District's Commissioner and discuss the matter with him."

Often matters can be resolved ahead of time which make it unnecessary to be listed on the agenda. Also, it may not be an issue that the Board is able to consider. After discussing the matter with the District Commissioner, if it is appropriate for a Board meeting, then the Commissioner will contact the Chairman of the Board in order for the matter to be scheduled on the agenda ahead of time. 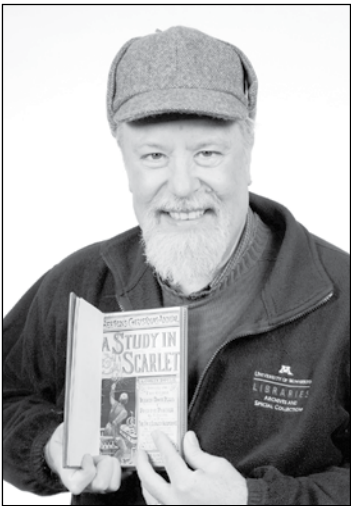

Now hear this... by Harry Hutchens, Clearwater County Veterans Service Officer

ORIGINS OF MEMORIAL DAY: Three years after the Civil War ended, on May 5, 1868, the head of an organization of Union veterans – the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) – established Decoration Day as a time for the nation to decorate the graves of the war dead with flowers. Maj. Gen. John A. Logan declared it should be May 30. It is believed the date was chosen because flowers would be in bloom all over the country. The first large observance was held that year at Arlington National Cemetery, across the Potomac River from Washington, D.C. It was not until after World War I, however, that the day was expanded to honor those who have died in all American wars. In 1971 Memorial Day was declared a national holiday by an act of Congress, though it is still often called Decoration Day. It was then also placed on the last Monday in May, as were some other federal holidays. The crowd attending the first Memorial Day ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery was approximately the same size as those that attend today's observance, about 5,000 people. Then, as now, small American flags were placed on each grave – a tradition followed at many national cemeteries today. In recent years, the custom has grown in many families to decorate the graves of all departed loved ones.

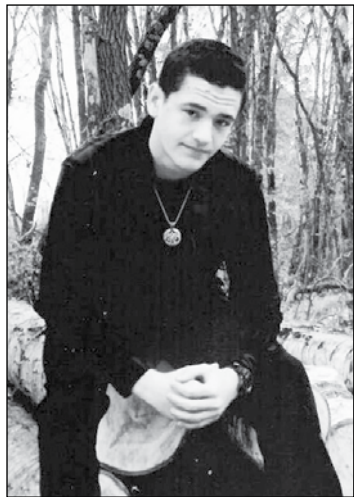

Two Newspapers in NW Minnesota make changes or close

There has been bad news for a couple of small newspapers in northwestern Minnesota. The Warroad Pioneer has announce that their last weekly paper will likely be May 7th. The publisher is holding on to the hope that someone will purchase the publication. This ends a 120 year old institution.

The other changes involves the Crookston Times, which has been a daily newspaper is going to go from a Monday to Friday daily paper to a bi-weekly newspaper, beginning on May 6th and will be publish on Monday and Wednesday. The Crookston Times has been printed since 1885.

The Crookston Times is not reducing the staffing and will concentrate more on the digital aspect of their business, though clicks, likes, shares, and retweets don't pay the bills.

Many local newspapers are transitioning over to online subscriptions and advertising.

USDA Announces New Decision Tool for New Dairy Margin Coverage Program

Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue announced today the availability of a new web-based tool – developed in partnership with the University of Wisconsin – to help dairy producers evaluate various scenarios using different coverage levels through the new Dairy Margin Coverage (DMC) program.

The 2018 Farm Bill authorized DMC, a voluntary risk management program that offers financial protection to dairy producers when the difference between the all milk price and the average feed cost (the margin) falls below a certain dollar amount selected by the producer. It replaces the program previously known as the Margin Protection Program for Dairy. Sign up for this USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) program opens on June 17.

"With sign-up for the DMC program just weeks away, we encourage producers to use this new support tool to help make decisions on participation in the program," Secretary Perdue said. "Dairy producers have faced tough challenges over the years, but the DMC program should help producers better weather the ups and downs in the industry."

The University of Wisconsin launched the decision support tool in cooperation with FSA and funded through a cooperative agreement with the USDA Office of the Chief Economist. The tool was designed to help producers determine the level of coverage under a variety of conditions that will provide them with the strongest financial safety net. It allows farmers to simplify their coverage level selection by combining operation data and other key variables to calculate coverage needs based on price projections.

The decision tool assists producers with calculating total premiums costs and administrative fees associated with participation in DMC. It also forecasts payments that will be made during the coverage year.

"The new Dairy Margin Coverage program offers very appealing options for all dairy farmers to reduce their net income risk due to volatility in milk or feed prices," said Dr. Mark Stephenson, Director of Dairy Policy Analysis, University of Wisconsin, Madi-

son. "Higher coverage levels, monthly payments, and more flexible production coverage options are especially helpful for the sizable majority of farms who can cover much of their milk production with the new five million pound maximum for Tier 1 premiums. This program deserves the careful consideration of all dairy farmers."

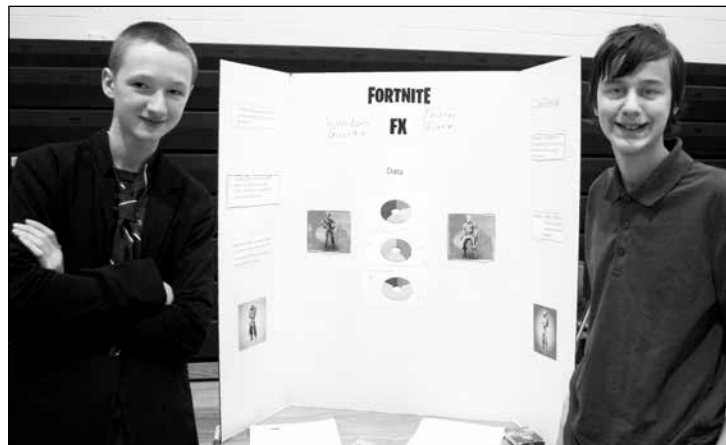

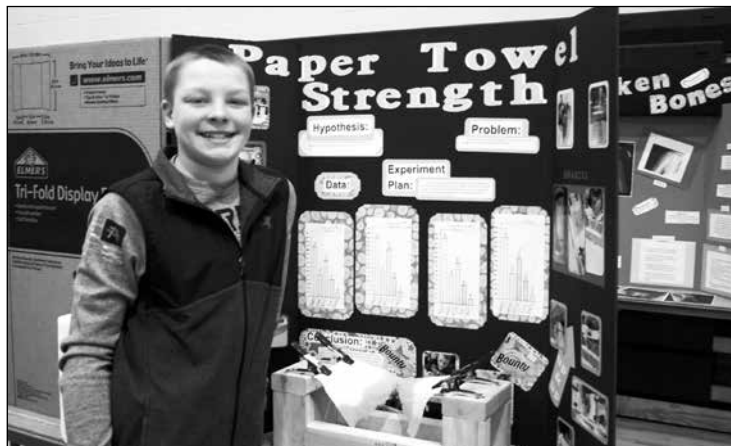

Cost-Share Grant Assistance Available for Replacement Septic Systems for Low-Income Homeowners in Clearwater County Clearwater County is administering grant funding made available by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency for upgrade of non-compliant septic systems. City of Clearbrook Receives \$600,000 Grant

The City of Clearbrook has been approved for a 2019 Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED) Small Cities Development Program Grant (SCDP) in the amount of \$600,000. These funds originate at the federal level from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and pass through DEED to be used by small cit-

ies and rural areas across the state. WSN's engineering team assisted the city with their grant application, and engineering needs, helping them obtain the funds necessary to improve the city's water infrastructure system. The grant will be used to improve the city's water and sewer lines, refurbish the existing water tower and de-

molish an abandoned water tower. WSN's engineering team worked with the city to analyze the sanitary sewer system and water system and provided engineering plans for improvements of the systems. Several alternatives were evaluated for improving the systems. Once a solution was decided on, the city embarked on securing financing for the

projects and now with this last piece of the funding puzzle, work is scheduled to begin late summer. Mayor Dylan Goudge stated, "These planned infrastructure improvements are critical to the well-being and prosperity of our citizens and local businesses. The Small Cities Development Program Grant fills an important gap

in affordably financing these improvements for our immediate needs, and for generations to come." The Minnesota DEED Small Cities Development Program (SCDP) helps cities and counties with funding for housing, public infrastructure and commercial rehabilitation projects. WSN's engineering team is a
