Curt Meyer presented an update on water tower leak repairs

Brennan and Bryce Roepke, representing the Jack Pine Pals 4-H Club, attended the May 13th Clearbrook city council meeting along with their mom, Carrie. The boys presented their club's Lending Library in the Park project. Club members plan to build the libraries, exhibit them at the fair, and then set them up in parks or playgrounds in each city of the county. The libraries provide a way for kids to share books, encouraging them to leave a book in the library and take a different book home to read. The council voiced their support for the project and will work with the youth to place the library in Clearbrook.

Curt Meyer, WSN engineer, presented an update on water tower leak repairs. A plumber is scheduled to replace water tower fittings on May 15th. If necessary, a welder will be available on May 17th to complete the repairs. Curt also discussed the city water and sewer project, describing the various sources of funding for the project. Plans are scheduled to be completed and ready for review soon.

Drainage issues on the north side of town are being addressed. Curt has contacted Dave Marshall, a wetland specialist, who will do measurements on levels and acreage of the wetland area. Once this has been completed, options for correcting this issue will be laid out for the city.

The council approved several resolutions presented by Cliff Knettel, funding specialist for WSN. These are requirements for the city as a recipient of a \$600,000 Small Cities Development Program Grant and funding from the Public Facilities Authority. These include policies on displacement and relocation, use of excessive force, drug free work place, and fair housing plans. While most overlap with the city's current policies, the resolutions are required by funding providers to ensure that policies remain in place until the project's completion.

Mayor Goudge asked about additional costs the city would incur as a result of temporary financing loans the city will need for fees incurred in the bidding and planning portion of the sewer and water project. The WSN representatives responded that interest expenses and loan fees have been included in the budget for the project. Curt also provided the council with information on assessment for

various projects. He will provide a comparison of assessment policies used by other cities to the Clearbrook council.

A public hearing will be held prior to construction. The public will also be informed on the progress of the project on a continual basis once it is underway. One option, according to Curt, could be public meetings held every other week for the duration of the project to provide updates to residents

Members of Elim Lutheran Church were present to gain information on the impact of project costs on their church. Curt explained that some funding sources for the project can be used only for specified aspects of the project. Further review is needed to determine if the Elim portion of the project will qualify for Rural Development funding. As the plan is finalized, better information will become available on specific funding issues.

Mayor Goudge brought up concerns about the intersection of Lake and Hazel. The hill and curve have caused problems for drivers, especially under icy conditions, and traffic is increasing there as more homes are being built in that area of the city. Curt responded that this issue can be addressed in the upcoming project.

Brandon Larson reported for the Clearbrook fire department. The fish fry and raffle fundraiser event was successful and the department received positive feedback on both the food and the change of location to the gym. The department has responded to a few medical calls recently and also dealt with a small grass fire on Saturday, May 11th.

Robin Proffitt, the new Kloster Park Manager, was in attendance, expressing her concerns about cleaning the ball park prior to the first event scheduled for June 9th. Many trees are down and parts of the fencing needs to be repaired. The Community Club donated \$7,500 for Agrilime, which will need to be applied. Lucie is applying for a Twins grant that could provide matching funds for preparing the ball fields for the playing season.

Robin and Lucie are also addressing needed improvements for the concession stand. A new sink was purchased last year but needs to be installed. Better storage is also needed. The council approved spending of up to \$1,500 to improve the concession stand.

Joy Walberg, liquor store manager, reported on activities at the bar. The customer appreciation event was well received and may be repeated in the future. A meat raffle will be held May 18th, with proceeds going to the summer recreation program. The bar staff will be serving a wedding on May 25th. The council decided to include 25 free drink tickets in the rental/use packages of booking weddings. Bingo will take place at the bar on June 8th and a meat raffle to raise funds for Kloster Park will be held on June 22nd. Summerfest activities will include two con-

certs by "Elvis" on Friday night and Todd will DJ on Saturday evening.

Garden Valley has approached the city regarding placing open Wi-Fi in a city building. The council is concerned about time city employees might have to spend managing issues pertaining to the Wi-Fi. Another concern is advertising requirements from Garden Valley. It was determined that more information is needed from Garden Valley representatives before making a decision.

Police Chief Dan Gazelka reported 59 incidents, but clarified that 28 were traffic stops performed as part of a state-funded traffic enforcement program. There has been an increase in burglaries and thefts in homes, garages, and cars, requiring extra hours for investigation by the police department. Residents are encouraged to report suspicious activities and provide information such as license plate numbers to the police. The Gloria's Collectibles owner was contacted. This building will be sold back to the city and torn down.

An update on utilities and maintenance was given by Jason Bakke and Mark Snobl. In addition to the water tower repairs, they are dealing with replacement of the fire hydrant damaged by state plows. It is expected that the state's insurance company will pay to install a refurbished hydrant, the solution requiring the least digging and least disruption of services. The city approved the purchase of a used dump trailer for \$5,000. Approval for up to \$24,000 to purchase of a 1991 road grader was given, provided Mark or Jason check it out before purchasing.

Lucie Thompson, city clerk, reported that the high school shop class is building a gazebo that will be placed near the Veterans' Memorial. Gary Prosser has been working with Tom Anderson of the Clearbrook American Legion to determine placement of the gazebo, which is being built by Ross Faldet's building trades class at the high school.

Building permits for Osmondson, Weber, and Gustafson were approved by the council.

Monthly claims of \$38,689.57 and additional claims of \$80,735.66 were approved by the council. North Country Hardware monthly claims of \$121.72 and \$223.50 were also approved, with Shawn Johnson abstaining.

DNR hears Commissioners' concerns/questions

Engineer reappointed four more years

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners heard from the DNR when they met on May 14, 2019.

Rita Albrecht, Northwest Regional Director; John Williams, Regional Wild Life Manager; and Nathan Kestner, Regional Manager of Ecological & Water Resources came to visit the county board for the purpose of giving the northern counties an update of the activities they are coordinating at this time. They include forestry, lakes, wild life management, and flood control. The northwest Region includes 23 counties and they are making a visit to many of the more northern counties, including Cass, Clearwater, Red Lake and others.

The meeting was open for the Commissioners to bring questions and issues of concern to their attention, which is summarized as follows:

Commissioner Dean Newland started off with a review of DNR management of Upper Wild Rice Lake, along with Lake Minerva and continued difficulties there,

a history that goes back to 1968. Mr. Williams said there are photos of that area which he will make available to the Board.

"I would like to see your photos; now there is nothing but cat tails and mud. There used to be lots of rice, and a desired water level for that of 18 inches around the edge. I think the DNR totally failed in this case," said Commissioner Newland.

"There was a worry about a fish kill," was cited by Mr. Williams as the reason for the DNR management actions taken.

"I'd like to know what you are doing about the land exchange (for land the DNR acquired) with the county?" asked Commissioner Mark Titera.

"There is only about 9% of State land that the DNR manages in Clearwater County," answered Ms. Albrecht. "We have talked to Land Commissioner Bruce Cox. The land has not been identified as actual salable parcels, and what is there is of low value. There is work to be done on that. Our focus recently has been on the licensing and permitting

process to pass for the pipeline."

Commissioner Titera said there are some parcels in Popple Township, and Commissioner Neal Illies also mentioned other parcels that didn't sell a few years ago.

They are governed by statutes, and can bring these back for the Fall sale. PILT – Payments in Lieu of Taxes – available since 2013, are a monetary benefit to the County, but there is skepticism as to how long those may last.

"The pipeline is very important to Clearwater County. There are many proponents here including those with wells nearby for drinking water," said Commissioner Illies regarding the long process to get approval for the pipeline projects.

"We have no position. We are not for or against projects. They have to be able to meet specific permit requirements," Nathan Kestner, who manages water resource concerns said. "If there is something you can do to minimize the impact on wetlands, then it becomes necessary." MPCA

helped write up policy for the pipe line.

"I hope this is a strategic and scientific process," Commissioner Illies said, and emphasized the need for it to be fair.

Commissioner Mark Larson brought up the frustration many feel as to why the process of approving projects seems to take forever.

"The flood reduction plan on Lost River, a structure like that on Little Pine Lake, was stopped due to a 'Trout Stream Designation' where trout never took," he said. "Where is the practical side of it?"

"We try to think of ways so it won't do harm to the trout stream," Nathan said. "A bridge or dam require a permit, and a dam is most damaging."

"Can't you take the designation of 'Trout Stream' off?"

"This is a not often utilized process. There are those who still wish to keep that (Trout Stream Designation) open for the future.

Nearly \$20-million of capital credits have been authorized by the board of directors for payment to Garden Valley members over the last 15 years.

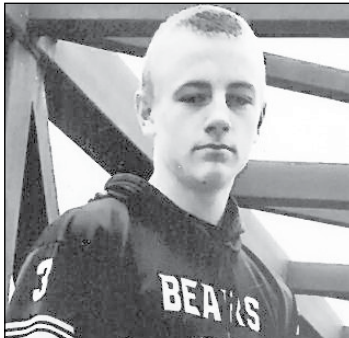

Household Hazardous Waste Collection

Polk County Environmental Services is once again holding its annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection events. The first collection event will be held at the Fertile Fairgrounds on Friday, May 31st from 3-6pm. The second collection will be at the East Shore Beach Area of Maple Lake off County Highway 10 on Saturday, June 1st from 9am-12noon.

Household hazardous products, if not properly used, stored, and disposed of, can pollute the air and water. These collection events, along with year-round collection facilities in Crookston and Fosston, give Polk County residents the opportunity to take part in protecting the environment.

Household hazardous wastes accepted at this event include: cleaning solvents, paints, stains, strippers, automotive products (carburetor cleaners, brake, steering or transmission fluid, etc.), aerosols, adhesives,

pool chemicals, photographic chemicals and hobby chemicals.

Products that are NOT accepted include: business and agricultural wastes, compressed gas, explosives, radioactive materials, tires, fluorescent bulbs or used oil.

Polk County's collection events are part of the Northwest Minnesota Household Hazardous Waste Program in cooperation with Polk County Environmental Services, the Maple Lake Improvement District and the city of Fertile. Polk County Environmental Services accepts household hazardous wastes from Polk County residents year-round. This ongoing collection in Crookston is located at the Polk County Transfer Station and is open M-F from 7-5:30. 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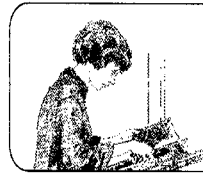

Such ceremonies are particularly dignified and solemn occasions for the retirement of unserviceable flags. There is a flag collection box at the Courthouse Service Center window area specifically for the purpose of receiving these flags with ongoing dignity. Or, you can take your flags to your local American Legion post. They will be happy to retire your flags

in their next disposal ceremony. Local Boy Scout Troops also perform and even integrate this ceremony into their many patriotic activities.

AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY POPPY: On Memorial Day and Veterans Day, millions of red crepe paper poppies—all handmade by veterans as part of their therapeutic rehabilitation—are distributed across this country in exchange for donations that go directly to assist disabled and hospitalized veterans in our communities.

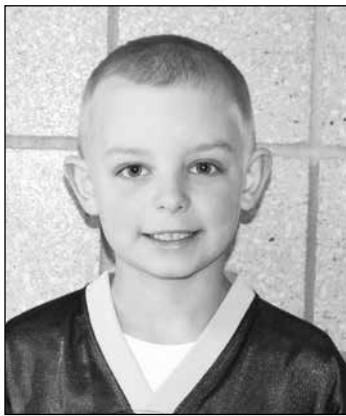

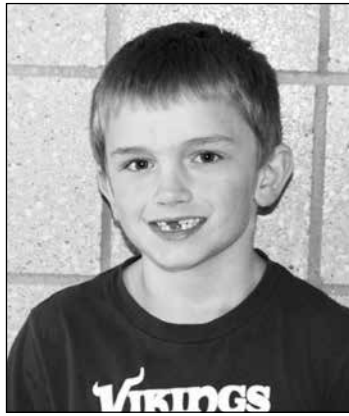

We don't make the rules. We only administer them according to the democratic process," Nathan added.

There were several other issues discussed, such as pollutants, soil types, and how important monitoring of the projects is. The culvert elevation at 4-Legged Lake was another issue, a ditch that was not realized was there for 50 years; the possibility of starting bear-hunting at an earlier date. Nuisance bears, turkeys, and eagles that do damage to farmers crops and livestock was also of concern.

"We try to be objective and transparent," said Ms. Albrecht. "We are using education on what our process is, and through public meetings. We will type up the notes about these issues and concerns, and questions and look at what we can address."

"Thank you for the opportunity to come. We appreciate the discussion and hearing about your challenges," she said.

"Thank you for coming, and to the Commissioners for good questions and discussion," Board Chairman John Nelson said.

Perpetual Land Easements: The Board discussed the perpetual easements required by the Fish & Wild Life, and the possibility of lowering that to five or ten years, so it wouldn't affect potential buyers who may oppose that. It would take a change in the rule, but even if they may personally be against it, the commissioners still believe the property owner has a right to have the easement if they wish to in order to receive the payment, which has sometimes been more than 30% of the land value in the past.

Sheriff Darin Halverson received authorization from the Clearwater County Board to sign the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Beltrami County for Text-to-911 Service, for a period of 12 months at \$100 per month.

"I would like to see a letter to them saying we appreciate all they do to help us, and thank you for being here," said Commissioner Neal Illies. The Sheriff said he would send them a letter to that effect.

The Sheriff will sign the Joint Powers Agreement with the State of Minnesota Department of Corrections for the Sentence to Serve contract effective July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2021 in the amount of \$29,475.

The Board approved and adopted the 2019 fee schedule for the Sheriff's Office and Jail as presented.

Dan Sauvé was reappointed to the position of County Engineer for a term of four years from May 2019 through May of 2023.
