Shelter and signage for Pine Lake residents

The Gonvick City Council at their meeting on Friday, June 14 had Staci Reed bring to the council the possibility of signage for the road for Pine Lake residents in case of a severe storm. The signs would let the residents of Pine Lake area know where the safe place would be to go. Cost for the signs was a concern and warning is usually done by the Gonvick Fire Department. She will be meeting with the department on Monday, June 24.

The county and the Gonvick Fire department has an Evacuation Plan for mobile home parks in the City of Gonvick and residents of Pine Lake. The Clearwater County Sheriff's Office will dispatch the Gonvick Fire Department in the event of hazardous weather.

The Fire Department will sound a steady blast of sirens The Fire Department shall

warn residents of mobile home parks and by loud speaker of evacuation.

In the event of an evacuation, residents should immediately find shelter in the basement of the Samhold Lutheran Church in Gonvick. The fire department has a key to be used in that emergency. It is located to the east of the Gonvick Fire Department building.

Mowing of private property was brought up as blight issues that needed to be taken care of by residents.

Clearbrook-Gonvick Police Give Presentation on Use of Force

Two guns, looking exactly alike, sit on the table. Size, shape, markings are identical. But one is real, the other is a fake. In a calm, brightly lit classroom it is impossible to tell the two apart. So imagine trying to tell the difference between the two in a tense situation, possibly loud, maybe outside in the dark. If the gun is pointing at you, you have to make the decision if that gun is real in a fraction of a second.

This is an example of the type of real-life decisions police officers deal with every day, all across the country. On Tuesday, June 18th, Officer Matt Stiehm presented a community program on use of force by police. The program took place at the Clearbrook Community Center. Police Chief Dan Gazelka and police officer Zach Karayel were also there to help the public understand the real-world situations facing police officers.

Use of force describes a range of ways police officers gain control of dangerous situations, where they need to make an arrest or protect citizens or themselves. The goal would be to use the least amount of force possible. But dealing with citizens who are not complying with officers' directions or threatening officers or other citizens make use of force a reality in police work. Law enforcement officers are well-trained in the use of force, learning how and when it should be used. Police departments have policies governing use of force. In addition, both the Minnesota and U.S. Constitutions determine what police officers can and cannot do.

Use of force by police gets a lot of attention, especially if a death occurs. This might give people the idea that use of force is common. Fortunately, that's not the case. In one year, police across the United States have an estimated 67,000,000 face to face contacts with members of the public. Most don't involve use of force, and only one in 67,000 contacts with police results in death.

In our community, the percentage of use of force is even less. The Clearbrook police respond to around 700 calls per year. So they do deal with crime. But the incidence of use of force here is only one or two times per year. Good relations

between police departments and communities helps decrease the need for use of force. Well-trained police officers are also a big part of reducing the times force is used.

"Clearbrook is fortunate to have a police force that is engaged in keeping fresh on what's going on in the world of law enforcement," Officer Stiehm said, describing the training the local department receives.

Officers serving Clearbrook and Gonvick attend classes at the Tribal College in Cass Lake on topics like use of force, tasers, and fire arms. Chief Gazelka recently attended an advanced firearm training taking over 70 hours, where he shot 1,000 rounds. Officer Stiehm is also a member of ILEETA (International Law Enforcement Educators and Trainers Association), an organization that keeps officers current and aware of what is going on in law enforcement issues.

As police officers respond to a variety of calls, they face many challenges. In addition to their training, the police have a variety of tools they use including handcuffs, tasers, and pepper spray. Choosing the right tool in the right circumstance is a challenge, and often must be done in a split-second. The police officers want to use the least amount of force possible, while still protecting themselves, suspects, and the public. Another challenge is the weight of the equipment. Wearing the vest and carrying all the equipment can add 60 to 70 pounds to the officer's weight.

Another good tool officers have is their body camera. These can provide evidence and education for officers and investigators. But the body camera has limitations. While officers use all their senses to assess a situation and act, the camera has a narrow field of vision. It can't see what is at the side or behind the officer. And the camera doesn't remember previous encounters an officer has had with a person with a history of violence.

Even with good training, making the right decision at the right time is not an easy task for police officers. As they enter any situation, they must quickly take in information, make a decision, and act. While they have been trained in a variety of

methods and tools they can use, they often don't get much time to make these important choices. The officers demonstrated how even from 21 feet away, someone can get to a police officer before the officer can draw a weapon.

Those who serve in police departments are well aware of the importance of the decisions they make. In the state of Minnesota, around 380 officers report being assaulted. Seven police officers have been killed in the state from 2008 to 2017.

Members of the community can have unrealistic expectations of police officers and that can cause frustration for both sides. An example of this is believing a police officer can shoot a gun from an attacker's hands. Some of these ideas come from movies or television shows, where special effects and staging create a fantasy world. The ability to solve crimes in 30 minutes or 60 minutes like television cops also becomes an unrealistic expectation for real police.

"Officers are supposed to have superhuman performance and superhuman abilities, which they don't. They only have what they know at the time," Officer Stiehm stated.

Clearbrook officers would like people to know that they have specific procedures they must follow if they have had to use force. Some procedures pertain to how and when information can be released. Investigators will try to have a complete picture of the situation they are dealing with before they release information. The rights of the police officer as well as the suspects or victims must be protected through the investigation. At times, family members must be notified. The police officers ask that people be patient with the process and avoid rushing to judgment before the full investigation is complete.

The officers of the Clearbrook-Gonvick police hope that use of force continues to be a rarity in our community. However, they will continue to train and stay on top of new information and methods in their field. Officer Stiehm plans to offer this program again later this year, to help keep the public updated on how our police department is dealing with use of force issues.

As supporters of this project, we know there will be efforts to delay this project even further and we encourage the state to focus on the narrow review ordered by the Minnesota Court of Appeals to prevent more delays.

"Communities across Minnesota are waiting with urgency, not just for the \$2.6 billion investment in the state's energy infrastructure, but also to protect the environment which is progressively more at risk as this review process continues. The critical Line 3 Project will replace an aging pipeline on which the state relies for energy security and economic competitiveness.

"We firmly believe replacing Line 3 is in the state's best interest and stand behind the continuous unanimous approval of the Line 3 Replacement Project Certificate of Need by the MPUC. The Project will provide quality jobs to more than 6,500 Minnesota workers including 2,100 family-sustaining construction jobs, and bring Minnesota tradespeople back home to work."
