Trail Does the 4th Up in Style!

Trail Minnesota USA was all high style in Red, White and Blue on the 4th of July. With even more than usual and fancier details, there was much thought that went into people's fashion choices this year. It paid off. Main Street in Trail was a very festive place.

In late forenoon on July 4th, the lunch stand opened in the pavilion. Someone was overheard to say "Can you get anything to eat down there in Trail nowadays?" Ha! Really. That person needs to get out more. The July 4th Lunch Stand in Trail was loaded with food choices. Cheap too. So you could get a couple of everything. And they had a lot so you could go back for seconds. But save room for Pie. There was lots of Pie. But... oh, dear... there were many kinds of pie. So you had to choose. Or... maybe have several pieces. That's probably best. Then: ice-cream. There was the ice cream treat after the street games. That was free, so you could buy one more piece of pie to go with it. Good plan.

On your way into the Pavilion where the lunch stand is, you would walk by Yvonne's Popcorn stand. It's called the Popcorn Stand and she does have popcorn; you could smell that right away when you got out of your car. But she had cotton candy too. That sticky-icky-goey melt-in-your-mouth; gotta-have-one-of-those cotton candy on a stick. And bright colored slushy drinks and all the other summer treats you need on the 4th of July. So... yes, you could get all you needed to eat in Trail on July 4th. There's the cold beer wagon across the way too. So one could settle in and just enjoy.

The Kid's Parade started at 1 p.m. Entrants came in from all directions to get signed up and issued a number. Just the registration is a sight to see. A few added touches could be requested from the face painter ... and the parade was underway. Karen Weber, wearing a stylish red t-shirt, led the paraders up and down Main Street. The judges each had a clipboard with multiple categories to review and assign points to. At the

end, the points were tallied to determine who would get place awards. It's complicated. So the parade had to roll up and down Main Street several times so the judges could do their job. In the end, First Place went to Grace Gunning, Faith Gunning, Sienna Flateland. Second Place went to Tayton Nyland, Emma Nyland, Carrie Schmit, Sylvia Schmit. Third Place was awarded to Lucy Schmit, Johnny Schmit, Ashton Amberg. Everybody gets 50 cents for participating. That's halfway to a root-beer float!

The parade was over and some of the entrants ditched their hot costumes. But they had proper standby red, white and blue attire. It's all in the planning, you know: pre-parade attire, parade attire, and post parade attire. Sometimes it's the same outfit- sometimes not; it depends. If you are Dorothy from the Wizard of Oz- you may decide that those so very cute ruby slippers are just not such good street game shoes. And, Batman's black cape can get a bit hot for running races. So you deal with that.

Then it is off and running. Street games started one minute after 2 p.m. because the street game helper had to finish her rhubarb pie.

There were running races, crawling races, hopping races, hopping backwards with eyes closed and one hand on your head races, wheelbarrow races, three legged races, sack races, and many more. Everybody got a quarter for participating. More pie.

There was a shoe toss... everybody had to wear at least one shoe for that one. The street games were divided into age brackets so the little kids didn't get stepped on. It would be too crowded otherwise too.

But the one event that everybody plays, no matter your age, is... The Egg Toss.

This is a big deal. People practice all year with their partner for this. Note: Watch out for those Softball Players... they are really good at Egg Tossing and Catching. But they make mistakes too. One miss or broken egg puts you out of the competition.

The way it works is like this: Everybody needs a partner. If you don't have one- there is usually somebody around to be your partner. But it's best if you decide on your partner about July 5th the year before, so you can practice. All the people line up about four feet apart facing each other. Special recruits helped carefully hand out eggs to people in one line.

The other line will anxiously rub their hands and stretch their finger muscles. On the word "Go!", the people with the eggs will toss them to their partner in the other line. If partner number 2 catches the egg and it doesn't go "smush" in their hand, they stay in the competition. If the egg falls on the ground or breaks, it's game-over for this year. Bummer. More practice.

Each time the egg is tossed and successfully caught, the partner with the egg takes one step backwards before tossing it back again. As eggs break or fall on the ground, the contenders get fewer and fewer.

The tension builds as the competitors take steps backwards, making their tosses farther and farther. As they hear "oh!" when eggs fall, and "yuk!" when eggs break and groans and moans of disappointment all around them, it's hard not to be nervous.

As the crowd gets quieter and the space between tossers widens, the pressure mounts. At some point, it will get down to two sets of partners. Nerve-racking is what it is. They might go just one more toss or it can go on for several tosses. Concentrate... concentrate...

Eventually there will be a pained "oooooooooh" as somebody's egg goes down.

To be an Egg Toss Champion in Trail on the 4th of July is something to be proud of. There's been talk of a hall of fame... look for that next year. If you are a former champ, and had your picture in the paper... or took a picture yourself... or still have the prize egg... bring it and your name and the year... it's time to start properly recognizing these exceptional talents.

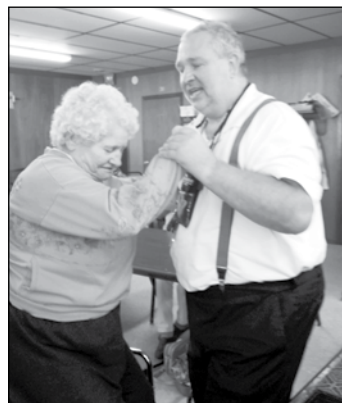
