Clearbrook-Gonvick school board decided to delay approval of the building contract

At the regular meeting on August 19th, the Clearbrook-Gonvick school board decided to delay approval of the building contract for the early childhood addition. Following the state review of the project, it was determined that additional requirements for a firewall must be made in order for the project to meet building codes. Information on the costs of these changes were not available to board members at the time of the meeting. Representatives from ICS Consulting were expected to have cost information available within the week. An additional meeting will likely be scheduled to discuss the building contract once the district receives this information.

Several board members expressed frustration over the additional costs caused by the firewall upgrades. Board members also voiced concerns about changes to the plans that were made to bring the project more in line with the project budget. Bids for the project came in higher than expected, requiring changes in the original plans. Superintendent Jeff Burgess provided several possible avenues for funding the remaining budget overage of the project, which is now approximately \$20,000.

The administration reported on preliminary testing results. The district's math and science scores have both shown improvement. The district's math scores increased by 3.7%, while the overall math scores for the state decreased by 3%. Science scores improved by about 5%. The state science scores were not available for comparison at the time of the meeting.

Reading scores for the district went down .4%, but this decrease wasn't as large as the state's decrease of 1%. The reading scores are approximately 2% below the state average reading scores.

"We want to continue working toward our goal of at least being as good as the state," Principal Carl Dugstad said of the reading scores. Superintendent Jeff Burgess stated that they hope to achieve this goal in the coming school year. Burgess also commented that the focus will continue to be on the curriculum and covering all the subject areas.

Burgess and Dugstad reported on efforts to improve the American Indian Education program. Policies and procedures are being updated to ensure that documentation is done correctly. The administration will also be focusing on taking advantage of various sources of funding available for the program.

Regarding financial issues, Superintendent Burgess informed the board that there were no unexpected expenses during the past month. The audit has been completed. The auditors will present the report to the board at the October meeting. Burgess expects that results of the audit will be similar to last year's results.

Burgess met with SFM, the new workmen's compensation insurance provider. Matching funds are available for items to improve safety. The district applied for these funds and used the money for things such as mats to decrease slips and falls in the school's entry ways.

Superintendent Burgess also encouraged the board members to attend the staff breakfast on Monday, August 26th.

The bus routes for 2019-2020 were approved by the board members. The pick-up location at St. Mary's will remain the same. Some routes average over the 80 miles per day maximum allowed in the contract with the Stein's Bus Service. The transportation committee will meet with the Steins to discuss the overages.

The negotiating committee has come to an overall agreement with the Education Association and the new teacher contract was presented to the board. The teacher contract shows 2% increases in salaries. Health insurance contributions were increased by \$250. Two early childhood teachers have been moved to the teachers' contract at level one and level two. These teachers had been on a separate pay scale. While this move does not take into consideration all of their experience, it does bring the early childhood educators into the same contract as the other district teachers. Language regarding a retirement benefit program for teachers employed before 1990 was removed from the contract as no current teachers are eligible for these benefits. The

new Minnesota teacher licensing system includes four tiers. Tiers 1 and 2 are for teachers who have a bachelor's degree or are beginning, probationary teachers. Tiers 3 and 4 are for those teachers who are licensed in their field area or those who are working outside of their field area but have a four-year teaching degree. Contract benefits can differ between the various tier levels. The new contract was approved by the board.

The board approved the disposal of old computers by either selling or giving them away to students. Recent legislation allows schools to do this. The computers the district would dispose of in this way still run, but do not work with the district's current system. Staff will work to develop a process for the sale or giveaway of the computers. Priority for receiving the computers must be given to students receiving free or reduced-price lunches.

The board accepted the resignations of Jennifer Mathison and Peggy Arlaud. Both have worked as paraprofessionals for the district. In other staffing issues, a staff seniority list has been created and will be posted. If corrections are necessary, the list will be updated and presented to the board at the next meeting.

Jeff Burgess requested and received the board's approval for a research project. The project will be done as part of an educational research class Burgess is currently taking. The research will focus on the impacts of data-based PLCs (Professional Learning Communities). Teachers who have students taking the MCA test will be asked to complete an anonymous survey.

The consent calendar was approved as presented. Bills paid include \$17,079.69 to Clearwater-Polk Electric, \$12,610.00 to Firefly Computers, \$4,177.64 and \$4,092.75 to Marco, \$3,764.84 to Garden Valley Telephone Company, \$3,113.90 to Stein's Bus Service, LLC, \$2,533.25 to 2 Loons Letters & Threads, \$1,889.38 to BRIC, \$1,674.80 to BSN Sports, \$1,460.00 to NW Service Co-op, and \$1,000.00 to Birchdale Fire & Security.

The next regular meeting of the school board will be Monday, September 16, 2019.

County Demolition Debris Land Disposal permit reissued for ten years

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on August 20, 2019.

Environmental Services Director, Dan Hecht brought copies of the Permit Reissuance for the Clearwater County Demolition Debris Land Disposal Facility, which was recently issued by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency for the solid waste facility on Fairground Road, Bagley. It is issued for a ten year period, beginning July 30, 2020.

"We operated the solid waste facility for 27 years without a permit, beginning in 1976" he said, recounting a little bit of the history of the facility. "In about the mid-90's, the State started pointing out things found that were wrong and needed to change because they wanted to get the County into the permitting cycle as an enforcement tool."

"This is the last permit for the current demolition landfill facility, because the remaining space will be filled to capacity before the permit expires. We use about 3,000 cubic yards of space per year and there are approximately 24,000 cubic yards now remaining."

He pointed out areas of which he wanted the Commissioners to be aware:

State inspectors want certain items to be covered daily, such as electronics and tires, because at other facilities they're finding that chemicals leech into groundwater from wastes that are exposed to weather. It's impractical for our facility to comply with such a requirement, said Dan. Most of the electronics are recycled, but they're stored outdoors while they're waiting to be loaded, he stated.

Ground water monitoring is being done at a substantial cost, per State requirements, because demolition landfills are

being found to have impacts on groundwater statewide.

"Because our groundwater monitoring system is so new, there are more questions than answers coming from the results, such as flow direction." He said it takes time to establish the water flow direction and our data only goes back 8 years.

"It's something we have to work on, but it's very likely by the time we have all the answers, the facility will be closed."

U of M Seminar: The University of Minnesota will be conducting educational seminars to homeowners regarding how private wells and septic systems function and the related maintenance in communities that request it. The classes will also provide property owners with basic information on chemicals of emerging concern such as pharmaceuticals, personal care products, and the potential impact on groundwater.

The seminars are provided through a grant from the Minnesota Department of Health,

with a goal of 50 people in attendance.

"I would like to take advantage of this, and they have excellent educational speakers available. People throughout the county would be invited," Dan said. There are some minimal costs such as providing snacks to encourage attendance, and Septic System Owners Guides (a cost of \$3 each), as well as advertising.

Commissioners thought there may not be enough interest to hold an event locally.

Transportation Service Available to Clearwater County Seniors

Clear Waters Life Center is home to a transportation service available to Clearwater County residents who are 60 years and over and are having difficulty getting to everyday activities that require transportation. This might be especially true for those who live in the country on gravel roads where The Bus does not travel. Senior Connection Transportation Service contracts with volunteer drivers who use their own vehicles to transport clients and receive mileage reimbursements. Drivers must pass background checks and have medical clearance, a current driver's license, and proof of insurance.

A Voluntary Cost Share Contribution is based on income and distance traveled. For example, the cost for a round-trip of 11-20 miles for someone whose income is \$1,012-\$1518 is \$4.00. This contribution is completely

voluntary, but a client's contribution of any amount will help prolong the life of the program. Sorry, we are not able to provide transportation for those who qualify for Medical Assistance. If you are on Medical Assistance, you can receive transportation to medical appointments by calling Clearwater County's Department of Human Services, 218-694-6164.

Weekdays, our transportation service is available for medical appointments, community events, shopping, a haircut, or other errands. Lack of social activities is a very real thing for those who are without transportation, our service can help alleviate isolation and loneliness. Our transportation service can be made available weekends, as well. If you need a ride to church or a weekend activity, we will do our best to match you with a driver.

VETERANS LEGACY MEMORIAL:FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE August 23, 2019. VA launches Veterans Legacy Memorial to honor deceased Veterans online. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), National Cemetery Administration (NCA) launched the Veterans Legacy Memorial (VLM), August, 14th, the country's first digital platform dedicated entirely to the preservation of the memory of the 3.7 million Veterans interred in VA national cemeteries. Each Veteran will have their own memorial page on the VLM, a secure, web-based platform that creates a perpetual memorial extending beyond the physical border of the national cemetery. "Veterans Legacy Memorial ensures "no Veteran ever dies" by honoring the legacy of our nation's Veterans, not just in our cemeteries, but in a new and innovative digital setting," said VA Secretary Robert Wilkie. "It enhances the onsite national cemetery experience and extends the experience to those who otherwise are unable to physically visit the cemetery." NCA, in conjunction with VA's Office of Information and Technology, built the architecture for the site starting with the information contained on every Veteran's headstone. In the initial rollout, the public will be able to search the site for Veterans, find out where they are buried and read the basic details of their lives and service. Future capabilities may be expanded to allow families, survivors, fellow Veterans and others to add historic photos and share memories to a deceased Veteran's memorial page. Such capabilities will include provisions that allows NCA to manage the site in a manner that maintains the same level of decorum our customers experience in our national cemeteries. Dan assured them that he believed there would be much interest and wouldn't be surprised if the attendance doesn't fill a room.

"In my experience there is a lot of interest by home owners in how the septic system works." The Commissioners were in favor of scheduling a seminar in the early spring as building season gets under way.

County Auditor-Treasurer Allen Paulson reported that County Program Aid that will be received in 2020 went up by \$22,980 to a total of \$787,783.

"This is aid the counties get that is based on population and valuation," he said. "It will be put into the County Revenue Fund and will offset against overall taxes."

He was authorized to pay the submitted invoices of \$38,715 for the County Revenue Fund and \$14,634 for the Nursing Service Fund.

Recycling Saves YOU Disposal Fees

If you think that recycling isn't worth the bother, think about what it costs you to throw your recyclables in the trash.

Clearwater County pays tipping fees by the ton for trash hauled to the Fosston Incinerator. As the tonnage increases, the costs also increase. A state-of-the-art Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) recovers recyclables from trash, but the MRF operates more efficiently if it's separating mixed recyclables only, rather than recyclables from trash. Some of the recyclables aren't pulled out and end up in the landfill. Not only that, but the tipping fee for mixed recyclables is ZERO, which saves the county money!

You can reduce the volume of rubbish by recycling your paper, cardboard, plastic food and beverage containers, steel cans and, of course, aluminum and glass containers!

Take them to the recycling bins located by the County Highway Department in Bagley. Thank you!
