Pottery Studio Open House

An open house at the Gonvick Clear Water Life Center pottery studio gave people an opportunity to tour the newly relocated art space and also try their hand at creating with clay. The event was held on Monday, February 3rd, with a soup lunch offered before the tour.

The open house kicked off a pottery class, with the first session held after the tour. The class will be held on Mondays through March 9th from 12:30-2:30. Cost for each session is \$5.00. The classes will focus on hand-building techniques. The open house also introduced the new location of the pottery studio in the Gonvick "old school".

Becky Dorman led the tour and answered questions of those who attended. The studio offers the space, as well as all of the equipment and art supplies needed to create a variety of pottery projects. The equipment includes a kiln, a slab roller, and two pottery wheels.

Becky showed the group many of the finished art pieces that have been created in the art studio using hand-building techniques. Bowls and cups, buttons, a birdhouse and a cribbage board were among the pieces that have been made by members of the studio.

The first class was creating ocarinas, Mexican whistles made from clay. The students began with a lump of clay, forming a ball, then a pinch pot. By the end of the class, they would have formed their own ocarina. The whistles will be dried, then fired and glazed.

Becky Dorman taught the ocarina class. On February 10th, Vickie Kolden, a retired art teacher, will lead the class. Al Spray was scheduled to teach on February 17th, and LeAnne Walberg will take over teaching the last three sessions.

The classes are open to anyone who is interested in learning about working with clay. These classes are also a good introduction to the workings of the studio that is open for independent work on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Studio memberships are offered at a daily rate of \$5.00, a weekly rate of \$10.00, or a monthly rate of \$30.00. The memberships give unlimited access to the pottery studio, equipment, and materials such as clay and glaze to help you create almost anything you can imagine out of clay.

In the first session of the 6-week pottery class, students created Mexican clay whistles. Vickie Kolden and Mike Mason, shown to the right, completed the first steps of their ocarinas. The ocarinas will be dried and then fired in the kiln.

Clearbrook City Council has busy February Meeting

The Clearbrook City Council held its regular monthly meeting on Monday, February 11, 2020. Items on the agenda included the council vacancy and several issues related to the 2020 water and sewer construction project.

A city resident requested time to speak on sewer issues at his home. The council members received information from the resident and discussed the problem with him. Several plumbers have been involved. The issue was tabled to allow council members to get more information from the plumbers before having further discussion with the resident.

Police Chief Dan Gazelka presented his report to the council. A new vehicle has been purchased for the police department and will be available once the necessary equipment installations have been completed. The council has decided to sell the old vehicle, a 2010 Dodge Charger. The Charger will be advertised in the Leader-Record and sold "as is" through a sealed bid process. The minimum bid for the vehicle's purchase will be \$2,000.

Jason Bakke gave a report on the utilities and maintenance department. An inventory of the water tower parts has been completed for insurance purposes. Maintenance work has been done on one of the wells. Frequency of maintenance on the wells was also discussed with council members.

Lucie Thompson read the Fire Department update provided by Fire Chief Adam Krog. In January, the department responded to nine medical calls, one motor vehicle accident, and one chimney fire for a total of eleven calls. In February, the department has responded to two medical calls. Enbridge has provided a \$7,500 grant for the fire department. The department is planning a Daddy-Daughter Dance for Saturday, March 14th. The annual fish fry and raffle fundraiser is scheduled for Saturday, April 25th.

Council members discussed the possibility of building a new fire hall. They addressed current and future needs, sources of funding, and possible locations of a new building. Members also talked about the possibility of

building a larger city building to accommodate maintenance and utility and the police department as well as the fire department. A committee will be formed to brainstorm on both the needs and the options and an estimated cost for constructing a new building.

Joy Walberg updated the council on the monthly activity at the municipal liquor store. The Valentine's Day Steak Fry scheduled for Friday, February 14th will also serve as a kick-off fundraiser for the All-School Reunion fireworks. Forty have signed up for the meal. The Clearbrook Community Club is donating the food for this fundraiser. The next Bingo night is scheduled for March 7th, and meat raffles will take place on February 29th and March 21st. City staff is looking into credit card payment programs designed for government organizations that would reduce the city's costs.

Lucie Thompson, City Clerk, reported that several residents have expressed interest in the open council seat. The deadline for submitting a written letter of interest for the vacancy is February 28, 2020.

Lucie is in the process of sending out letters to obtain easement for the water and sewer project. Residents affected by the easement request can sign and return their letter or attend a meeting on Wednesday, February 26th from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. Representatives from the city council and staff and WSN plan to be present at this meeting to answer questions pertaining to easement issues.

The city is pursuing the purchase of a house located near the pool. City staff is currently working with Clearwater County staff to determine property tax liabilities for the house. Once the tax status is known, the city will set an offering price for the house.

During the meeting, the parking ordinance was presented for the second reading. Council members also motioned to approve a DNR license for the water and sewer project. This fifty-year term license is required for projects that cross public water ways.

Donations of \$40 for the fire department and \$600 for the

Clearbrook pool were received from Mary Gustafson. The Clearbrook Community Club donated \$2,180 from the game card raffle for the All-School Reunion. Acceptance of these donations, along with the \$7,500 Enbridge grant for the fire department, was approved by the council members.

The council members received a proposed parking map from Curt Meyer, WSN engineer, that depicted changes to parking configurations on First Avenue and Main Street. According to the plan, some of the current diagonal parking on these streets would be changed to parallel parking. The council discussed their concerns regarding these proposed changes including potential snow removal problems and decreased space for unloading of trucks. Council members planned to meet and discuss the current and proposed street measurements and parking layouts. If necessary, Dan Sauvé, County Engineer, will be contacted to address the city's concerns about the proposed parking plan.

Zach Thoma, engineer with Karvakk, brought several options for the culverts near the city park that could tie into the bike trail construction project. Estimates for total reconstruction of the culvert is \$75,000 to \$80,000 for engineering and construction costs. A less expensive option involving extending the current culverts is estimated to cost around \$25,000. The council will make a decision on the culvert construction at a later date.

The council chose to wait until 2021 to begin construction on the bike trail. At this time, funding for the project will be available and the city will not have to pay construction costs and then wait for reimbursements. With the water and sewer project construction taking place this summer, council members also were concerned about having two contractors working in the same location at the same time.

Monthly claims of \$49,314.12 and additional claims of \$117,003.91 were approved by the council. A single approval of North Country Hardware monthly claims of \$443.54 was approved with Shawn Johnson abstaining.

Easement limits passed for Clearwater County

Commissioners discuss need for Second Amendment Resolution

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on February 11, 2020 to discuss a number of pertinent issues, including protection of gun rights with a resolution being considered for Clearwater County; new limits for easements by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service; Environmental Services; and upcoming road projects in the county.

Second Amendment Sanctuary Resolution Note:

At the time this article was written the Board of Commissioners had NOT yet voted whether to pass a Second Amendment Sanctuary Resolution or not. Due to newspaper deadlines, the results will be published the following week. Results can be obtained from your District Commissioner after vote at the Board Meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 18.

A resolution or an ordinance for Clearwater County is being considered. A committee consisting of Sheriff Darin Halverson, Commissioners Dean Newland and Neal Illies, Attorney Al Rogalla, Sam and Caren Smith was appointed to determine what is the best approach to this issue and whether or not to proceed with the passing of a resolution.

The Feb. 11 Board meeting discussion concluded that the U.S. Constitution already guarantees the Second Amendment right to bear arms.

Community members in attendance were Bill Stoller, Clearbrook Legion Commander, Leroy Sundbom, Terry Maddy, and Sue Titera.

"Our Second Amendment right to bear arms is already protected by the constitution, and we swear to that when we take our oaths of office as commissioners to support the Constitution," Commissioner Illies commented.

"The Governor also swears to that," said Leroy Sundbom.

"More gun control legislation is expected to come," it was re-

ported from Steve Green.

U.S. Fish & Wildlife Easements: The Commissioners discussed setting a limit on how many easements, either wetland or habitat, the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service should be allowed to secure in light of previous issues on this matter, one being the perpetual nature of the easements.

Commissioner John Nelson proposed allowing up to five easements in a year; however, for lack of a second to his motion, the motion failed.

Commissioner Dean Newland stated that a consensus among the commissioners on the issue should be reached.

Chairman Neal Illies made a motion that Clearwater County allow U.S. Fish & Wildlife to bring forward two wetland or habitat easements per year. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Mark Titera. Three yes votes were made by Commissioners Neal Illies, Mark Titera, and Dean Newland; with no votes by Commissioners John Nelson and Mark Larson. Therefore, the motion passed, resulting in the limit of two easements per year.

"It should be the landowner's choice," stated Commissioner Nelson. Commissioners Newland and Larson indicated they are not in favor of the perpetual easements.

Commissioner Illies indicated that there may be effects on land values, which Commissioner Nelson said is speculative.

Library LINK Reminder - "We are open!" Karen Stormo, who manages the Gonvick Library LINK, wants to remind the public that they are open, with no expectations of closing. Hours of operation are Monday 9-11 a.m., Wednesday 3-5 p.m., and Thursday 4-7 p.m. They had the 2nd highest circulation of all LINK sites in 2019, and are

located in the Community Center. Look for more about the Link and other services they offer, as well as the special celebration planned for their 15th Anniversary!

County Engineer, Dan Sauvé received approval for payment of the Clearwater County Highway Department bills as presented in the amount of \$83,917.

He said the whole proposal for upcoming construction work is on the County web site. Clearbrook will take two years, as they are replacing water and sewer in 2020-2021, which is managed by the city.

Land Commissioner Bruce Cox was authorized for the sale of a State Tax Forfeited parcel of land located in the City of Bagley in Lots 4, 5 and 6. The Clearwater County Board approved the sale in the amount of \$200 plus fees and tax, for a total of \$278.65.

Environmental Services Director, Dan Hecht received authorization to accept the proposal dated Feb. 3, 2020 from Wenck Associates, Inc. for engineering and consulting services related to the demolition landfill in the amount of \$7,500. This motion also rescinds the motion dated Nov. 12, 2019 to approve a task order from Terracon Consultants in the amount of \$4,990, for a hydrogeologic work plan related to the demolition landfill; the new motion authorizes the task to be done by Wenck at an estimated cost of \$4,500, a one time cost.

The tasks to be performed are for regular annual professional groundwater monitoring evaluation and reporting items that are ongoing expenses.

"I am pleased with how this worked out," he said. The motion made by Commissioner Mark Titera an seconded by Commissioner Mark Larson was passed, adding that the total contract cost is \$7,500 annually.

great increase in alertness, energy and attention. However, they can be very dangerous if used in higher doses or by crushing the pills and snorting them to get high. They can cause high body temperature, high blood pressure and an irregular heartbeat, all of which can be life threatening.

Depressants work by making your body feel relaxed, calm and sometimes sleepy. Over time, you may find that you need a larger dose to feel the same effects. You need to talk to your doctor if you feel that you need a higher dose. Choosing to self-medicate yourself can cause severe consequences. Confusion, memory problems, slowed breathing and poor balance can all happen with a higher dose than prescribed. Mixing alcohol with depressants can slow your heart and breathing and lead to death. Taking depressants for a long time and suddenly stopping can also have life threatening consequences such as seizures.

So why is prescription drug abuse on the rise? Some believe that it is because more drugs are available to more people. On-line pharmacies are also more prevalent than years ago. These types of pharmacies make it easy for people to get these drugs, even for teens.

Young people in particular are at a high risk for prescription drug abuse. Parents should discuss the dangers of taking a prescription medication that is not theirs or abusing the ones they are prescribed. If you have children in your home, make sure your medication is locked in a medicine cabinet and keep track of the quantities that you have so you can track if any go missing. If you have unused medication in your home, bring them into the Clearwater County Sheriff's Office lobby and deposit them in the medication drop box (there is no charge for this service). Some teens report taking prescription medications to school and selling them to make extra money. Others talk about going to parties and sharing them.

If someone is addicted to using or selling prescription drugs, they may turn to stealing to support their habit. Don't carry your prescription drugs in your vehicle or on your person. We receive several reports each year of people who have had their prescriptions taken from their car or purse if left in a car. When you throw away your prescription bottles, tear off the label. People will go through dumpster sites and look for prescription bottles. If you are prescribed a medication that they want, you may have just become a target for your house being burglarized. Remember, it may even be someone you know that wants to steal your medication.

So, what can you do if you suspect a loved one is abusing prescription medication? Start an intervention process. Confront the person who is struggling with this addiction. Anger and denial are common reactions. Be patient and understanding and let them know you care about their wellbeing. If you catch it early enough, you may be able to convince them to seek treatment. Hold that person accountable. Don't turn your back on them and hope for the best. This type of drug abuse is no different than illegal drug abuse. The person's mind is not thinking clearly and the drug is doing the thinking for them.

Prescription drug abusers are not always the stereotypical drug user that many people think of. They are our neighbors, friends and family. They are good people that have had their life changed by addiction. This is becoming an all too common problem in our communities.

Understanding its existence and knowing what to look for will help in curbing this problem. Unfortunately, there is no magic cure. Being alert to changes in people and talking about prescription drug abuse with your family is a start. If you feel that you may be becoming addicted to prescription medication yourself, seek help immediately. Early detection and intervention may prevent a possible problem from becoming a lifelong addiction.
