Seatbelt use to be addressed in county

The Clearwater County Sheriff's Office is sponsoring two Clearbrook-Gonvick students in a "Job Shadowing" program for the 2015-2016 school year. The program is for seniors who are interested in a career in law enforcement. Recently the students completed a six week project studying the use of seatbelts by motorists throughout the Clearbrook-Gonvick school district. Seventeen locations in ten townships were selected for the survey. The results of the study were that only 67% of people traveling through the school district

wore their seatbelts. Minnesota's state average is 94%. The areas with the lowest seatbelt usage were vehicles traveling along the Lindberg Lake Road (46%), the Clearwater Lake Road (65%), and State Highway 223 (66%).

The Clearwater County Sheriff's Office plans to address these problems by assigning deputies to extra patrol of problem areas. The Minnesota State Patrol has also offered to assist in extra patrol. Not wearing your seatbelt is considered a primary offense

in Minnesota, which means a driver can be pulled over and fined by law enforcement just for the seatbelt offense. Fine and court cost equal \$110.00.

The sheriff's office is asking everyone to please use their seatbelts and for parents to talk to their children about the importance of wearing them. With the changing of the weather the sheriff's office asks that everyone take the extra time to make sure their windows are clear of frost and to watch their speed. Road conditions can change quickly.

Loader leased for Gonvick City Maintenance

The Gonvick City Council at their regular October meeting had Justin MacPherson, a representative with ASC Construction Equipment Inc out of Fargo, North Dakota, present information on a loader for the city. Each year the city leases the equipment for snow plowing and other duties and they signed a lease with ASC for a Volvo L60G wheel loader. The lease includes a 2 1/2 yard general purpose bucket and ribs for exchanging the buckets.

Joe Amundson, City Maintenance had the ash trees removed that were east of the community center under the power lines. They were done with the help of Eric Hamen

from Ottertail Power Company.

An insurance adjuster from the League of Minnesota Cities examined the roof from the wind storm this summer. He determined that the insurance would cover approximately \$600 and the deductible is \$500. This was tabled to look for estimates on the cost of shingles versus steel.

Enbridge filed comments with the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission

Enbridge filed comments with the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission in support of rejoining the Certificate of Need and Routing Permit dockets for Sandpiper as well as developing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). Enbridge values a regulatory process based on predictability of process, schedule certainty and party accountability. To date, the Sandpiper Pipeline Project's regulatory process has fallen short of meeting those expectations in spite of developing an exceptional record based on tens of thousands of hours of field work and analysis and the clear establishment that Minnesota, and the surrounding states, need this important infrastructure project to move forward.

Today, at the request of the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission (MPUC), Enbridge filed its comments with the hope of restoring predictability to the regulatory process, developing a schedule that can be relied upon, and

maintaining party accountability. Enbridge supports rejoining the Certificate of Need and Route Permit dockets and then developing an EIS to restore stability to the regulatory process.

Enbridge's decision to support the development of an EIS is not one made lightly. The significant delays in the process have far-reaching impacts not just for Enbridge, but for the citizens of Minnesota. Further delay means continued high volumes of rail traffic, and that 1500 new construction jobs and \$25 million in local tax benefits will not be realized in 2015, and possibly 2016. In order to solidify the regulatory process and create substantial safety and financial benefits for the state of Minnesota, Enbridge believes an EIS is the best option to ensure those benefits become reality.

Enbridge, along with the MPUC, will continue to pursue Minnesota Supreme Court Enbridge...

Tracy Imle of Gonvick has been the liaison between the three groups. Tracy has worked with the project since 2008. The Clearwater Christmas Project provides families with toys for their children and provides help with their Christmas dinner. Area officials tour Enbridge's Clearbrook Terminal

On Tuesday, Oct. 27, Representative Steve Green, three Clearwater County Commissioners (Dan Stenseng, Neal Illies, John Nelson) and Clearbrook Mayor George Postier toured the Enbridge Clearbrook Terminal and the newly-completed Line 67 pump station to get a better understanding of the operation and to ask questions of company officials.

The tour, led by Bemidji Operations Manager John Pechin, Terminal Team Lead Dale Bergquist, Line 67 Engineering Supervisor Bob Lisi, and Public Affairs members Patrick Hughley and Jen Maleitzke, included stops at the control center, the meter proving facility, pig (smart tool for checking the integrity of the

lines) launcher/receiver traps, Line 2b hydro-test operations, Line 67 pump station and booster pumps and the pig-washing station.

The group had a good dialogue on many topics, including the proposed Sandpiper pipeline project, the number of staff employed at the Clearbrook Terminal (17 full-time Enbridge employees, plus numerous on-site contractors) and the capacity that travels daily through the Terminal. Hughley noted that Enbridge provides nearly 85 percent of Minnesota's refining capacity through connections from the Clearbrook Terminal to the Minnesota Pipeline System.

Rep. Green asked how Enbridge shuts down a pipe if there is a leak. Enbridge staff

responded that the entire pipeline is shut down immediately if the control center sees a pressure loss, the line is isolated in segments and personnel are sent to inspect the pipeline.

After learning Line 67 is now moving its full permitted capacity of 800,000 barrels per day, the group discussed the important role Clearwater County plays in providing energy security to Minnesota and the U.S., and impact of the operations for the country's energy independence.

Commissioner Illies said "I am very impressed at the measures that Enbridge takes to assure that the oil moves safely through the lines and for the safety of their employees. The fact of hundreds of thousands of barrels of oil being transferred every day through these lines speaks volumes of Enbridge's commitment to safety".

Commissioner Nelson stated "the pipeline is an asset to our community, I greatly appreciated the tour and found it to be very informative".

Commissioner Stenseng said "We, in Minnesota have no coal, natural gas or oil and are completely dependent on other sources for our energy. It is so interesting to know that about 10% of the oil consumed each day in America is pumped thru the Enbridge station here in Clearbrook and that about 85% of the oil consumed in Minnesota is delivered by Enbridge to the Minnesota Pipeline System that begins here in Clearbrook. The importance of these facilities cannot not be over stated".

NRCS Announces Early EQIP Signup for FY 2016 Funding

Agricultural producers looking to solve natural resource problems on their farms will want to plan ahead and sign-up early for United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) funding. Cathee Pullman, USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) State Conservationist in Minnesota, announced that farmers interested in the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) need to apply by November 20, 2015, for funding in 2016.

EQIP is a voluntary program that provides financial and technical assistance to agricultural producers. These contracts provide financial assistance to help plan and implement conservation practices that address natural resource concerns and for opportunities to improve soil, water, plant, animal, air, and related resources on agricultural land and non-industrial private forestland.

"EQIP is just one tool for landowners who want to apply conservation practices on the ground," said Pullman. "By working with the local NRCS offices, you can apply for NRCS programs which work

Minnesota Students' Scores Mixed on Nation's Report Card

The National Center for Education Statistics released the 2015 National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP)—otherwise known as the "Nation's Report Card"—showing mixed results for Minnesota students. The data show that eighth-grade students are outperforming their peers nationwide on both reading and math. Minnesota fourth-grade students continue to score high on math, while reading scores dropped from 2013.

"The data underscore the urgency we feel in Minnesota. Across the nation and here at home, these results show there is still much work that needs to be done for our students," said Education Commissioner Brenda Cassellius. "While we can be proud of our students' relatively strong performance compared to other states, it would be a mistake to be complacent given that there is still significant room for improvement."

How Minnesota Students Performed on the 2015 Nation's Report Card

Every two years, a representative sample of Minnesota fourth- and eighth-graders takes the NAEP. Approximately 5,000 students from each grade are tested on either math or reading. A science portion is also administered, but those results are not available until spring. NAEP results for Minnesota students remained mostly constant from two years ago when the last report was released.

Eighth-Graders Third-Best in Math, Seventh-Best in Reading

Minnesota eighth-grade students saw increases in their national ranking, up from fifth in math and 11th in reading, from 2013. Scores for state eighth-graders were significantly higher than the national average, with eighth-graders posting the highest ranking for reading on record. Data also show that female eighth-graders in Minnesota outperformed their male counterparts in reading, while achievement gaps persist in both subjects.

Fourth-Grade Math Scores Still Top of the Pack

Despite a dip in scores, Minnesota fourth-graders scored significantly higher than the national average, ranking number two after leading Massachusetts in 2013.

Fourth-Grade Reading Scores Drop

According to the 2015 NAEP scores, Minnesota fourth-grade students scored slightly higher than the national average on reading, though the difference is not statistically different. This is a dip from 2013, with Minnesota's rank nearing its 2011 level.

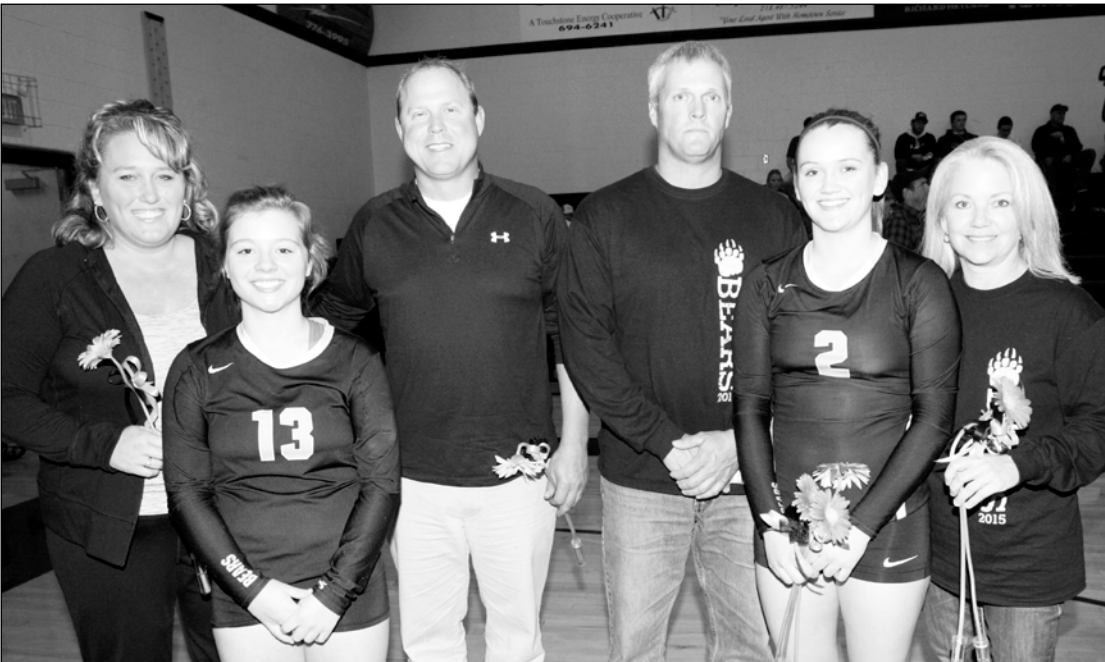

Hunters and other recreationists asked to report bear den locations

Hunters and other recreationists spending time outdoors this fall are asked to report the locations of occupied bear dens they encounter within an hour's drive of Bemidji, and in and around the Chipewewa National Forest, north of Grand Rapids.

Bear researchers with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources are starting a new bear study in the summer of 2016 and hope to fit a number of bears with GPS tracking collars.

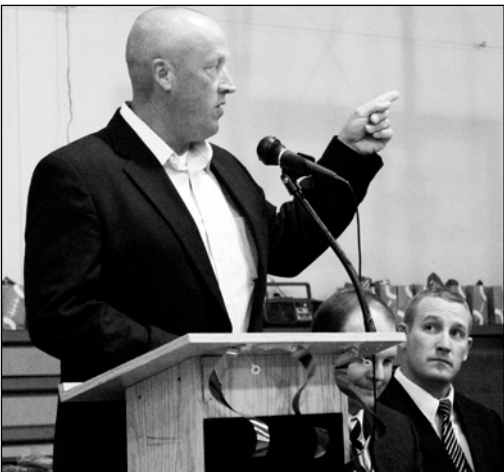
"Getting a few bears collared in winter would really help jump-start the study," said Dave Garshelis, DNR bear project leader. "It would allow us to get a whole year of movement data, which we can't do with bears that we catch and collar in mid-summer."

The purpose of the study is to examine how bears may have responded to changes in the forest since the 1980s. The DNR previously collared bears in this same study area, roughly between Grand Rapids and Bigfork, through the 1980s and early 1990s. Those bears were located weekly from an airplane to understand how they moved and what habitats they used most. The new generation GPS collars will collect their own locations and transmit these locations via satellite to the researchers. "It appears that the age and composition of trees on the national forest has changed significantly during the past 30 years," said Garshelis, "and with that has been changes in food supplies for bears. Bear research provides a better understanding of factors that cause populations to change, and in this way enables the DNR to better manage and conserve this species."

Anyone finding a den in either area is asked to obtain a GPS location (if possible) and call Dave Garshelis in Grand Rapids at 218-327-4146 or 218-328-5172.

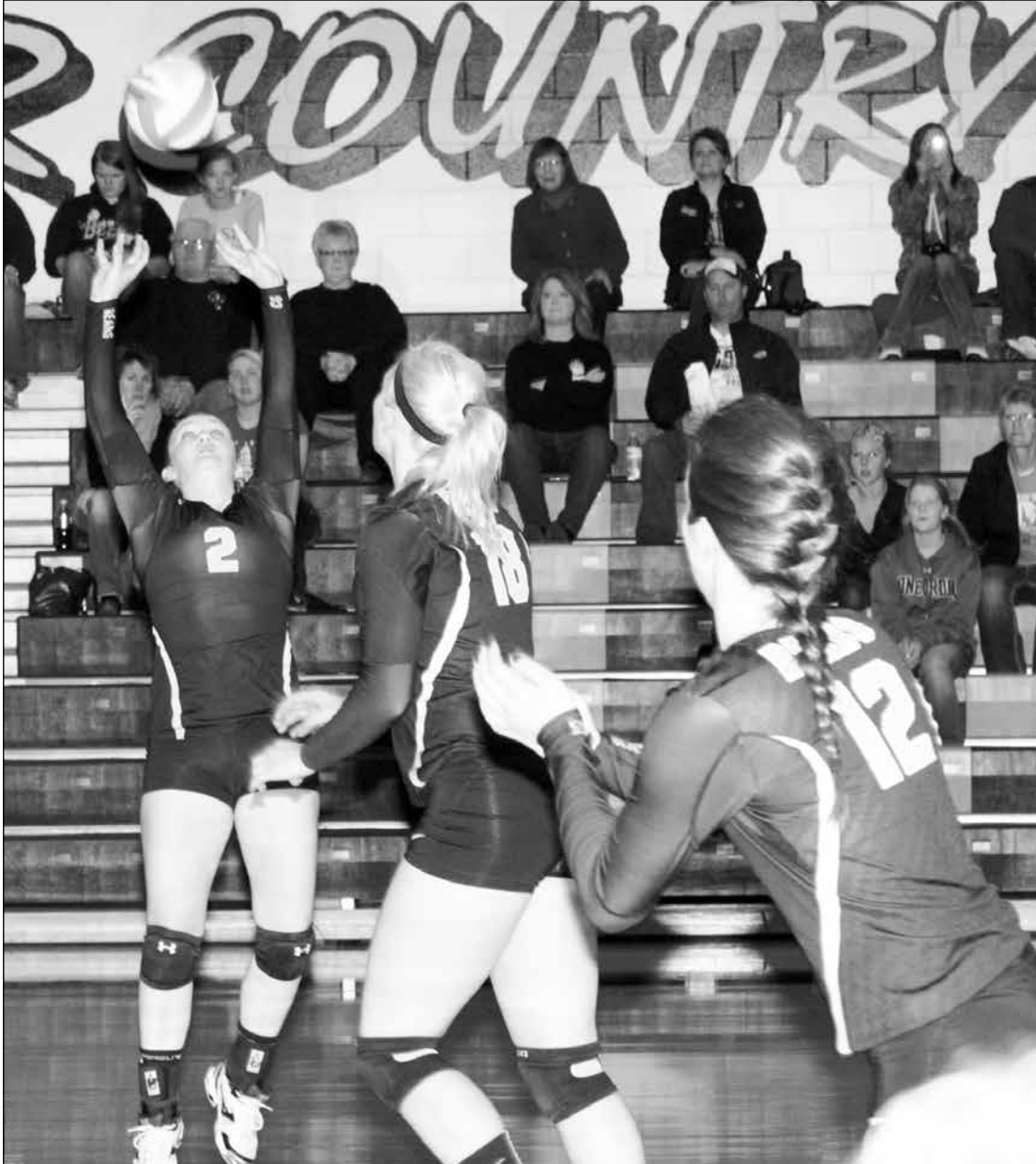

Fruit Flies in the Home

Fruit flies are particularly common in homes during fall. These tiny flies are about 1/8th inch long with a tannish body, and a dark-colored abdomen. An easy way to identify fruit flies is by their bright red eyes. However, their eyes do appear darker after they are dead and may not be as distinctive. Be careful, not every small-sized fly you encounter is automatically a fruit fly. Moth flies, phorid flies (also called hump-backed flies), and fungus gnats can also be common in homes. It is important to know which fly you are seeing because control will vary depending on which fly is present. If you have any doubts as to which fly is in your home, have an expert identify it for you.

Fruit flies can potentially be carried into homes in fruits and vegetables or they could fly in from the outside. Once in homes, they are attracted to fermenting and souring smells, e.g. around garbage containers and produce that is starting to become overripe. Fruit flies lay

their eggs in a wide variety of sites as long as they are moist, contains fermenting organic matter, and are in reasonably undisturbed places.

You can help prevent fruit flies by eating fruits and vegetables while they are fresh or keep them refrigerated; do not allow produce to sit out and become overripe. Also, keep the inside of garbage containers clean from food residues. Rinse bottles and cans that you recycle and remove recyclables on a regular basis. Don't forget to periodically clean recycling containers to prevent a build-up of food residue. Remove garbage in tied plastic bags on a regular basis.

If you find you have a persistent problem with fruit flies, the most effective, permanent control is sanitation, i.e. eliminate their food source. Fruit flies are commonly found infesting overripe fruits and vegetables like bananas, tomatoes, potatoes and onions. Also look for them around soft drink, wine, and beer bottles and cans that are being saved

for recycling as well as in the recycling container itself. Another common site is trash containers especially when they are lined with plastic bags (look between the liner and the container). Remember that the source of the infestation may not be where the adult flies are found.

Fruit flies, however, will take advantage of a wide variety of different food sources and there are also plenty of unusual sites where you may discover fruit flies. You may need to be a detective and be imaginative to determine where they are coming from. In one case, fruit flies were infesting a tea maker after tea was brewed but was not cleaned out before it was put away. In another instance, they were found in rotting osage oranges (non-edible fruit that are purported to repel insects, spiders, and rodents) that were left out and forgotten. Remember that fruit flies are found in moist, undisturbed places where fermenting organic material is found.

Some people are tempted to spray fruit flies with an insecticide. While that will kill the flies you see, it is not

a long term solution and more will return. Just spraying adults doesn't have any impact on the source of the infestation and the larvae that are developing. As long as a food source still exists, adults will continue to be present.

Fruit fly traps (either store bought or homemade) generally do not eliminate fruit flies.

While you may capture some individuals, like spraying, it is difficult to catch them fast enough to actually eliminate them. However, you could use traps to help narrow down where infestations are located. By placing traps in every room, the trap with the most fruit flies usually indicates approximately where the problem can

be found. If you would like plans on simple homemade fruit fly traps – complete with pictures – give me a call.

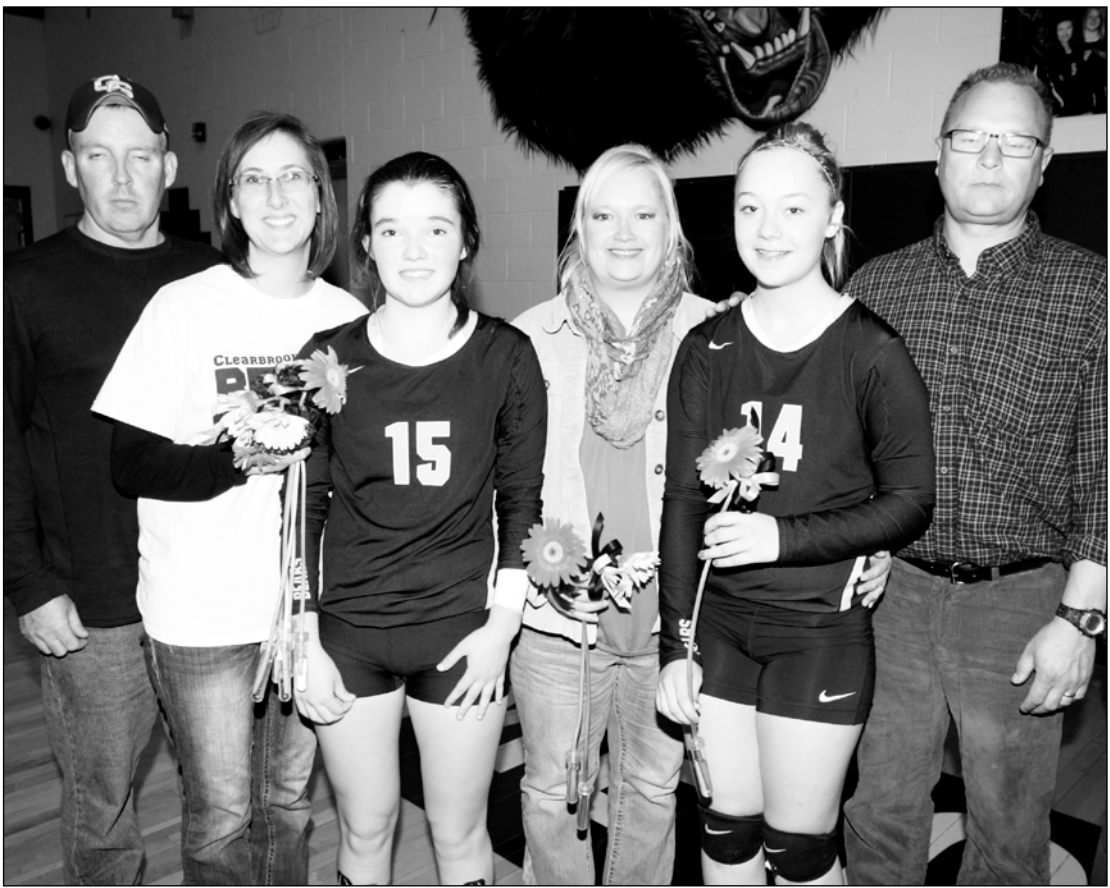
