County holds public hearing for 'Renewable Energy Ordinance' to include solar energy

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on June 30 for a Public Hearing regarding the adoption of a Clearwater County Renewable Energy Ordinance. Guests attending the hearing were Alden Hough, William (Bill) Prochaska, and Ken Oraskovich.

Dan Hecht, Environmental Services Director opened the hearing with remarks about various aspects of the Renewable Energy Ordinance and its purpose. The ordinance is meant to replace the previous ordinance from 2011, which was only for wind energy, to now include solar energy.

"The two main goals of the new ordinance are to provide for decommissioning requirements, knowing these projects are known for being short term; and to have set backs in place," he stated. "The requirements are on the permanent application. These are just for commercial use as defined. (Energy) is intended for sale."

Ken Oraskovich remembered that the County has said you can't tell property owners what they can do on their own property. He wondered how energy easements would be used.

"There is no number on this type of easement, as with Fish & Wildlife easements," said Commissioner Dean Newland.

"There is a potential for land owners to get rid of renewable energy projects on their property. But with Fish & Wildlife there are no options," stated Commissioner Mark Larson.

"Setback and decommissioning are the issues with energy," stated Commissioner Mark Titera.

"I am in favor of the Fish & Wildlife easements. There is no evidence that those easements have decreased the land values of property," Commissioner John Nelson said. "I think the land will be worth more to hunters - that's what they want."

The question of who would pay the taxes on such projects was discussed. Possibly, the lease owner would pay the taxes. Commissioner Nelson did not wish to see local taxpayers take on the expense. Chairman Neal Illies thought the tax base would be established by the value of the panels.

Guest Alden Hough said he was attending the hearing due to his interest in energy alternatives, what is being discussed here, and what is going on in Clearwater County, where he has lived his entire life.

"I am not opposed to any type of alternative energy, but there are concerns," he said. "When a lease ends there is a lot of land that has no value until it (the project) is removed, so the lease owner wants to walk away. Make it air tight where they can't walk away and leave the land with little value."

He thought there is a need to require the lease owners to have a bond or assurance to cover the decommissioning of the projects.

Bill Prochaska suggested that some infrastructure such as concrete pipe and copper would not decline in value, as things like the solar panels and other parts.

"Some other company may be ready to assume the projects," he said.

Dan Hecht said he spent a lot of time to make sure the draft of the ordinance thoroughly covered the decommissioning cost of projects.

Questions came up regarding how to make sure this would happen, and when. The importance of consistency throughout the County regarding decommissioning the energy projects was brought up; and land values of residential property next door affected by adjacent projects, which it was felt would not be welcome to new owners. It was suggested that the Assessor might be consulted. It was also concluded that better technology can be expected in the future which would change things.

It was thought wording of some of the language in the ordinance needed to be stronger to impress the requirement for decommissioning of projects when they become obsolete or those with leases wished to cease the project.

The Commissioners felt this was an important discussion and needed more time to consider. Dan Hecht will revise some of the draft. The decision was made by the Commissioners to reconvene the hearing on July 14 at 9 a.m. for the Renewable Energy Ordinance.

Bruce Cox, Land Commissioner brought a motion to accept the proposal of Thompson Gravel and Rock to demolish and remove the laundromat located on tax-forfeited property in Gonvick for \$5,370. The motion was

changed to reflect accepting the bill that was paid for this work, which had already been completed. The motion was passed.

Chairman Neal Illies requested that approval be obtained from the Board prior to its action in the future, as the County is striving to have consistency in such matters.

Another motion from Commissioner Cox was to share half of the cost with the City of Bagley for demolition of a tax-forfeited house in the city street right of way. Tax-forfeit account fund will pay \$1,750.

"There is no way to rebuild on the property since it is in a flood plain," stated Commissioner Mark Titera.

Commissioner Cox said this property has been taxed by the County, and they collected taxes on it for 100 years, even though it was on the right of way and shouldn't have been taxed.

While the motion passed for the County to share the costs with the City of Bagley, Commissioners Neal Illies and Mark Larson were not in favor, voting against it.

County Interviews: The Board discussed whether or not to have a Commissioner present during employment interviews for the various County departments, including Health Services, Health and Human Services, Highway and others. The goal is to be consistent, and if they have a Commissioner at one department, then it is important to have one at each department when interviews take place.

The Chairman, Neal Illies said that in the past it has been mostly left up to the department heads but often a Commissioner has been present at interviews.

"I've sat in on many interviews over the years, and think we should consider 'Why we do it,'" Commissioner Dean Newland stated.

"We do it for consistency of procedures," Chairman Illies responded, which Commissioner Newland said he agreed with being consistent.

The Board consensus was that they continue the practice of having a Commissioner present at County interviews, but to share the responsibility among the five members.

All Commissioners were present at the meeting: John Nelson, Neal Illies, Dean Newland, Mark Titera, and Mark Larson.

Covid 19 road trip is a possibility

For me, the most memorable stop, ever, on a road trip was a visit to the memorial for native Gonvick son, David Soren Birkeland. Dave, 54, CEO and President of First National Bank of South Dakota perished in an airplane crash on April 19, 1993. Seven other South Dakota leaders, including South Dakota governor George S. Mickelson, were on a state plane returning from Cincinnati on an economic mission when the plane crashed, killing all.

The memorial to all eight men is in a garden next to the beautiful State Capitol in Pierre, South Dakota. Photos and tributes to each of the lost men are printed in bronze below a sculpture of powerful fighting horses.

The statue of the pair of powerful fighting stallions crowns the top of the monument. The dramatic horses sculpture was enlarged in bronze from a smaller mahogany carving by Korczak Ziolkowski, the creator

of the world's largest mountain carving, Crazy Horse Monument in the Black Hills of South Dakota.

David grew up on a quiet street in Gonvick with his parents, Soren and Mildred, and his brother, Glenn. Their congenial neighbors next door were the Albert Johnsons and on the other side were the Johnsons' daughter Rosie and Verner Odegaard and family. David, a star basketball player, graduated from Gonvick High School in 1956. He went on to earn a degree at Concordia College in Moorhead then he earned a law degree at UND. He married his wife, Mary, in 1969, after meeting her nine months earlier when she came into the Minneapolis bank where he worked. They had two children, Jennifer and Jonathan.

He was elected president of First Bank of South Dakota in 1980 and soon became division manager overseeing operations for First Banks in South and

North Dakota and Montana. Dr Paul Dove, President of Concordia, told the Argus Leader "He had the habit of running through the banks he supervised, opening closed doors and saying, 'What's going on here? 'Is everything all right? Is the bank treating you right?'" Dove described him as a man with a smile, twinkling eyes, a slouchy walk and a rumpled suit. "David was our servant. The center of his faith was not his ego but his neighbor, Dr. Dove concluded.

David was to hand his daughter Jennifer her diploma from Concordia in May 1993. He was president of the Board of Regents at Concordia College, having served on the board for 23 years.

In this strange time of Covid 19, a road trip is a possibility. At the state tourist plaza at I - 29 and Brookings, helpful guides directed my late husband and me to drive via De Smet to Pierre.

Sanford Health updates visitor policies and practices

Sanford Health is updating its visitor restriction policy and visitor monitoring practices, effective today.

Hospital visiting hours will be 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily (previously started at 8 a.m.). Each pediatric and neonatal patient in any Sanford Health clinic or hospital will be allowed up to two visitors per appointment (adult or minor). This can include parents, guardians or other support persons.

Upon their arrival, visitors to the Sanford Bemidji Medical Center will now encounter the hospital's new guest screening system, Easy Lobby.

“With recent updates to visitor and screening guidelines, visitor monitoring has become more challenging,” said Joy Johnson, vice president of operations for Sanford Health of Northern Minnesota. “This new system not only assists us with maintaining visitor guidelines but also allows us to identify all in the facility should an emergency situation arise helping us keep patients, staff and visitors safe during visitor restrictions at the hospital.”

Easy Lobby is an automated visitor management system that the Sanford Bemidji Medical

Center has been using for 3rd floor OB/GYN visitors since fall of 2017. With Easy Lobby in use by all visitors, security is able to accurately identify all who are in the hospital in real time.

With this new system, visitors will present their ID. It is scanned into the system, and a paper badge is printed with their name, date and the location they will be visiting. Visitors are required to wear this badge throughout their visit. If a visitor returns the next day, they will be issued a new badge for their visit that day.

All other prior visitor guidelines remain in effect:

• One adult visitor is allowed with each patient at hospitals and clinics across the health system.

• All visitors will be screened according to current CDC guidelines, and are expected to wear a cloth or surgical mask at all times. This does not apply to COVID-19 specific units.

• Similarly, for clinic visits and outpatient appointments, one adult visitor is allowed with each patient. The visitor is expected to wear a surgical or cloth mask at all times.

As a reminder, anyone who is not feeling well, should not ac-

company another patient to an appointment or visit anyone in a hospital. If you have COVID-19 symptoms please call your regular health care provider or a Sanford healthcare provider at (218) 333-5000—do not come in-person to the clinic in order to protect staff and other patients. Those symptoms include fever, chills, sore throat, cough, new onset of shortness of breath, new onset of loss of taste and smell, new onset of muscle pain, nausea, vomiting and diarrhea.

The Polk County Wellness Coalition launches BeWell

The Polk County Wellness Coalition (PCWC) works on improving health and wellness throughout Polk County by helping to make healthy choices easier where we live, work and play. Achieving and maintaining physical and mental health can be challenging and it is critical to nurture both, as one can affect the other. To promote mental well-being, PCWC is launching a community-based initiative, known as BeWell.

BeWell supports health through happiness and meaningful relationships using proven resiliency tools. BeWell aims for a community that flourishes by practicing positive emotion, engagement, and positive relationships. Evidenced-based mental health resiliency tools (such as Random Acts of Kindness, Gratitude- 3 Good Things, Taking it Outside, Thank-You letters, and Social Connectedness) incorporated into daily life will create reserves of well-being that can be drawn upon when times are tough. Individuals and organizations are invited to participate!

Polk Norman Mahnomen Community Health Board (PNM CHB) completed their Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP), which was adopted by the PNM CHB on November 23, 2019. A Community Health Improvement Plan is a long-

term plan, describing how the local health departments and a broad set of community partners and stakeholders plan to address needs identified in recent community health assessments. The 2020-2024 plan is based on a community health assessment, which was completed for Polk, Norman and Mahnomen Counties in 2017 and 2018. The top 10 PNM health issues were identified from the assessment. Partners cultivated and established strategies for addressing the top three health priorities (focus areas) for 2020-2024. One of the top three health priorities for Polk, Norman and Mahnomen counties is improving mental health and well-being.

Positive mental well-being can increase social connectedness and can decrease the amount of adults feeling hopeless, anxious, or loss of interest. Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), and Trauma and Hope Informed Care are a high priority for many agencies and school districts. In Polk County, we want to work to increase resiliency and coping strategies, while reducing the stigma around mental well-being.

Lloyd Schleicher, aka my Dad, was born July 15, 1920 on the Schleicher farm in Lessor township.

His parents were Arthur and Elsie Schleicher, and he had two brothers, an older one named Roy, and a younger one, Gordon. He was baptized and confirmed at Immanuel Lutheran Church, and has been an active member of that church his whole life.

He has been a Sunday School Teacher, a member of the male and mixed choirs, a church council member, church president for several years, an usher and an elder.

Dad attended grade school in District 189 in Lessor township and graduated from 'Mac Hi' high school in 1938. When he and his brothers were young teenagers, they had to take over the farm duties when their dad died at age 43.

He married Gladys Simonson on July 10, 1943. The story goes that she wanted to wait to get married on his birthday, but

he didn't want to wait the extra 5 days. Over the next 14 years, they became the parents of four daughters, Carole, Paulette, Angela and Randi.

They had no sons, so we girls were taught to plow the fields, bale the hay, feed the chickens, wash the milking machines, etc. But we were not allowed to milk the cows, as Dad said that was not women's work. I also never got the horse I longed for, because he said if he had room for a horse, he would get another cow.

Besides being a dairy and small grain farmer, Dad was also active in many community organizations. He served as president of the creamery board, president of the Mac Cop board, 4-H leader, member and treasurer of Polk County NFO, member of Lessor 189 schoolboard, and vice president of the original McIntosh Housing Board.

He is also blessed to have the titles of "Grandpa" and "Great-Grandpa".

He had the top dairy herd in 1945 in East Polk County Testing Association.

In 1958, he and Mom were recipients of the Red River Valley Dairyman's award. After he sold the cattle in 1975, Dad was on the staff of NFO as Dairy Field Man, and later, Coordinator for Beef Cattle. In 1972 and '73, my parents housed the first AFS student in McIntosh, Lorna Ferrer from the Philippines. Four years ago, he attended the Polk County Fair where he accepted recognition of the Schleicher farm as a Century Farm. The house on the farm is the very one in which he was born.

Dad has enjoyed a variety of hobbies and travels over the years. He has enjoyed snowmo-

biling, fishing, bowling, golfing, dancing, and playing his father's violin. He and Mom traveled to Germany and Norway, did a 7-week tour of Alaska in their motor home, and spent 21 winters in the Arizona sunshine. They also entertained at many gatherings over the years, playing fiddle and keyboard.

In 2016, Dad moved into an apartment at Poplar Meadows Senior Living. He has enjoyed socializing with other residents, and has especially enjoyed his time playing Pinochle with friends from the residence and the community. He is looking forward to doing that again soon, after his 100th birthday.

On July 15, 2020, Lloyd Schleicher of McIntosh will be celebrating a milestone birthday.

The big celebration which his family had planned for his 100th birthday, had to be cancelled due to Covid 19 restrictions.

Enjoy summer's sweetness with MN berries

Check with local farmers about new COVID-19 procedures.

Berry season in Minnesota has arrived. Growers across the state are open for pick-your-own and pre-picked strawberries, and raspberry and blueberry season is right around the corner. You'll also find fresh berries at the farmers' market, grocery store, and farm stands throughout the state.

Berry season is short and sweet, with seasonal availability beginning in southern Minnesota and moving northward. The typical strawberry season is two to three weeks long, but the length of harvest varies from farm to farm depending on varieties planted, weather, and soil type. Mild temperatures in the 70s and 80s extend the season and allow berries to ripen at a steady pace, while excessive heat can cause berries to ripen more quickly and shorten the season.

Because conditions vary from region to region, the Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA) recommends checking with your local patch for information on availability before heading out to the farm.

The History Center in Shevlin is currently closed due to the Covid-19 pandemic. While you can't visit the museum, the staff will provide stories from our county's past- "The ABC's of Clearwater County" in the meantime.



Mary Gibbs

M is for MARY GIBBS

Mary became the first woman park commissioner in North America when Minnesota Governor VanSant appointed her to take over the duties of her father as commissioner of Itasca Park when he died in February 1903. In the early spring of that year, she had a tough job to do – A dam built by a logging company was causing Lake Itasca and Elk Lake to flood, threatening the trees that stood near the banks. Saving the trees had been part of a deal worked out by the state attorney general and the lumber companies. They could use the lake for logging if they saved the trees that grew around the lake itself.

By early April, loggers had cut and floated more than 9 million board feet of timber, which they were holding on Lake Itasca to send downstream.

Everyone in the area knew it was causing trouble but the companies refused to lower the lake level by opening the dam.

On Sunday, April 12, Mary Gibbs decided to act. Along with her neighbor Theodore Wegmann, Mary tried to prevent the lumbering companies from criminally damaging park property. Their request that the gates be opened and the water be allowed to flow went unheeded by the men at the dam. Gibbs returned April 15. Again the men rebuffed her. Gibbs went back the following day, this time with more witnesses and a local constable to serve a warrant that the dam be opened. Gibbs was determined to enforce the law as protector of Itasca, and the men at the dam were equally determined to keep the sluiceway closed. When the Constable attempted to serve the warrant and order the gates opened, a man from the lumber company said, 'I'll shoot anyone who puts a hand on those levers.' The Constable returned the warrant to Mary unserved. Mary told the lumberman 'I will put my hand

there, and you will not shoot it off either. And she did. We don't know how long she kept her hand there, but this symbolic act of opening the sluiceway-she couldn't have raised the gate as it took six men to do that but it must rank as one of the most courageous, and risky, showdowns in early environmental history. Gibbs later admitted, "She didn't think it was a very smart thing for her to have done that as he the lumberman might just have done what he said." Mary was soon replaced with a permanent park supervisor (a man) and she moved to Canada, never again to see Itasca Park.

Mary died in Vancouver in 1983 at 104 years of age.

As far as we know, Mary Gibbs just might be the first woman in Clearwater County to have a song written for her. Folk singer Charlie Maguire wrote a song about Mary for the Itasca State Park Centennial. It is found on his "Wilderness Road" Album. Mary Gibbs is

He left here as an 18 year old boy in WWII. He told of an incident in jungle combat of holding up his helmet with a bamboo stick as the fighting had quieted down. The helmet was quickly struck with bullets from the Japanese so he buried himself deeper amongst his wounded and dead comrades.

He returned home with a "Dear John" from his sweetheart and no money as his father had drunk up all of the monetary contributions he had been sending home. So he re-enlisted and was stationed in Japan. (General Dean's ill fated 24th infantry division) at the start of the Korean War.

In letters sent home he told about being overrun and hiding in the hills. South Koreans were paid \$25.00 by the N.K Communist troops to turn in these hiders. Se he became a prisoner of war. We thought that he was dead as his mother or my dad (his uncle) never heard from him.

Then, I remember so well

how happy and thankful we all were as his name Virgil Ellsworth Lundy was one of the names on the exchange of names during the Panmun-jeom Truce talks.

Virgil never returned, he was an M.I.A., on the POW list and later controversially declared a "casualty."

I remember him when he returned from WWII and I as a 6 year old boy showed him the way to the Rydeens where my dad was putting up had.

In these trying times of COVID-19 we should reflect that praising what is lost makes remembrance dear

COVID CARES act funding to local governments

Governor Walz announced he would distribute the full \$841 million in federal CARES funding to local entities. The distribution is according to the approved compromise legislation the Senate and House agreed to in the special session.

"This money will hugely benefit our district in the near future, so I'm glad the governor decided to distribute the full \$841 million to local units of government, instead of sticking with his original plan of \$667 million," said Senator Paul Utke (R-Park Rapids). "That being said, we could have passed and implemented this plan last Saturday morning, if it were not for the governor's perplexing resistance and interference."

The compromise agreement distributed the local government funding fairly to Minnesota counties, cities, and towns based on a formula using their population.

The Senate passed the agreed-upon legislation with nearly unanimous support during the special session. The legislation brought transparency and fairness to the distribution since the federal funds were not subject to legislative approval and could be spent unilaterally

by Walz.

Minnesota received more than \$2 billion from the federal government to help local governments, health professionals, and businesses fight COVID. That money went into

an account called the Federal Coronavirus Relief Fund, so it could be quickly deployed to places it is needed most.

Clearwater County with a population of 8,815 received a total of \$1,110,134.
